Gianni Schicchi – Synopsis – Giacomo Puccini's Comic Masterpiece

The action takes place in Florence in the 1950's

The story is based on an episode from Dante's Inferno, the greedy relatives gather around the deathbed of the wealthy Buoso Donati, with exaggerated demonstrations of grief, they expect to be amply compensated by their inheritance, and are horrified to find that he has left the lot to a monastery! Rinuccio, Buoso's nephew, who truly loved his uncle, recommends asking Gianni Schicchi, who is the father of Lauretta, the girl he loves, to look into the matter to see if anything can be done. The family are horrified, Schicchi is an outsider and frowned upon by the wealthy Donatis as being beneath them. Seeing no other solution, the scheming family eventually agree and ask Gianni Schicchi to help them falsify their wealthy relative's will, to "fix" the problem, each taking turns at bribing him into leaving them the most valuable assets, the house in Florence, the Windmill and the prize-winning donkey! But all does not go to plan!

Giacomo Puccini (1858–1924) - Composer

Puccini is one of opera's most popular composers, famed worldwide for the drama and pathos of their plots, wonderful melodies and for the fantastic roles for singers.

Born in 1880 Lucca to a family of church musicians he moved to Milan to study at the Milan Conservatory. Puccini wrote his first opera, the one-act Le villi, for the Sonzogno Competition; though rejected by the judges, its successful 1884 premiere led Giulio Ricordi to take Puccini on. His second opera, Edgar (1889) was a failure, but he scored a major triumph with Manon Lescaut (1893), his first mature work. While completing Manon Lescaut, Puccini began a fruitful collaboration with librettists Giuseppe Giacosa and Luigi Illica, with whom he wrote arguably his three greatest operas: La bohème (1896), Tosca (1900) and Madama Butterfly (1904). Following the death of Giacosa in 1906 Puccini struggled to find new subjects and collaborators. However, he continued to create impressive works, with the dramatic 'Wild West' opera La fanciulla del West (1910), the tender 'lyric comedy' La rondine (1917) and his most ambitious project, the three one-act operas, that make up Il trittico (1918) which includes Gianni Schicchi as the final instalment, based on Dante's Divine Comedy.

Amanda Holden (1948-2021) - Musician, lyricist and translator

"Translating a text for performance in the theatre is like doing a vast multi-dimensional crossword puzzle while going on a long scenic journey. Its purpose is to sweep away a communication obstruction, but its art is elusive and complex"

Amanda Holden was a celebrated British pianist, librettist, translator, editor and academic teacher. She is best known for translating opera librettos to more contemporary English for the English National Opera, and for writing new librettos, especially in collaboration with Brett Dean. Amanda contributed to encyclopaedias such as the New Penguin Opera Guide. She also translated Mozart's Don Giovanni for Jonathan Miller in 1985. For the ENO, she also translated Handel, Donizetti, Rossini and Puccini.

Amanda's is the only librettist to have received the Olivier Award for Outstanding Achievement in Opera (2001), as well as the only translator to receive an Olivier nomination (2012) in the same category. She wrote more than 60 English texts for stage and concert performance, mostly opera.

Many English translations of opera have clunky diction, don't quite fit the music or flow smoothly for the singer. Aquarian Opera chose Amanda's translation because she clearly understands singers and the voice, as the libretto flows beautifully with the added bonus of being very funny.



She has also directed Panto and Musicals, including three shows at The Barn Theatre for Oxted Operatic, The Pirates of Penzance, The Wizard of Oz and for the junior company, Curtain Up! In 2023 she directed Me and My Girl for Molesey Musical Theatre. Melanie is now Artistic Director of The New Aquarian Opera Company, where she directed The Merry Widow, Trial by Jury, The Marriage of Figaro and the English premier of Gilbert and Sullivan's Improbable New Musical: Less Miserable!. Melanie is delighted to be working with Guy again, directing Gianni Schicchi along with the two concerts "The Last Night at the Proms!" (as part of the Barn Theatre's Centenary), and "A Night at the Opera" at The Cecil Hepworth Playhouse, and she hopes you enjoy the show!

Guy Middlemiss – Musical Director

Guy has been on the musical theatre scene for the last 30 years. Gilbert and Sullivan was one of his first engagements, with the Imperial College Operatic Society (London). Janette Cattell – Concert Soloist

Janette has very much enjoyed performing with New Aquarian Opera since the company's revival, with roles including Aline in *Less Miserable*, the title role in the *Merry Widow* and the Plaintiff in *Trial by Jury*. She combines a career as a city lawyer with her love of singing and has performed as a soloist with many operatic and choral groups in London and the South East in

roles as diverse as Mozart's Queen of the Night and the title role in *Kiss Me Kate*. She has also performed all of the lead soprano roles in the thirteen Savoy operas. Last summer she fulfilled her ambition to perform at the Edinburgh Fringe Festival, as Madame Goldentrill in Mozart's *Der Schauspieldirektor*. Her solo choral repertoire includes Handel's *Messiah*, Faure's *Requiem*, Haydn's *Nelson Mass* and, later this month, Vivaldi's *Gloria* with Gravesham Choral Society.

Andrew Claringbull – Maestro Spinelloccio the physician and Guccio the dyer

Andrew is delighted to back performing with The New Aquarian Opera Company after having taken the role of Sullivan in the English premier of Gilbert and Sullivan's Improbable New Musical, Less Miserable! and the cameo role of Petro Prichich in The Merry Widow. He has enjoyed performing principal roles at The Barn Theatre for the past 16 years in operas, musicals, pantomimes and plays. For very many years a chorister, Andrew is enjoying

stretching his vocal cords and once again singing opera. Previously with Aquarian he has also performed in Carmen and Die Fledermaus and is really looking forward to Gianni Schicchi.

George Coates - Gianni Schicchi

George is delighted to join forces again with New Aquarian Opera, having performed with them in 2023 in The Marriage of Figaro (Bartolo) and Trial by Jury (Judge). Recent productions with Guildford Opera have included Eugene Onegin (Gremin), Die Fledermaus (Frank) and Lakmé (Frederick). He has been training with Prof Alison Wells (RCM) and David Cowan (Opera North) at

the National Opera Studio. Originally a choral scholar at Christ's College Cambridge, he then joined the Bach Choir under Sir David Willcocks before progressing onto the stage with City Opera. Performing in London, Isles of Scilly and Yorkshire, George undertook roles in Gianni Schicchi (title role), La Bohème (Marcello), Marriage of Figaro (Count, Bartolo, Antonio), The Tales of Hoffman (Dr Miracle), Carmen (Dancairo), A Hand of Bridge, Samuel Barber (David) and II Tabarro, Puccini (Michele). He also sung with Aquarian Opera in The Tales of Hoffman (Lindorf and Dappertutto).







Anna Goodhew – Nella

Anna made her operatic debut at the age of 19, singing the role of Barbarina in Opera Brava's production of The Marriage of Figaro. She was a scholarship student at Guildhall School of Music and Drama, achieving both her BMus (1st class honours) and Guildhall Masters there. Since graduating, some of her favourite roles have included Contessa in Le Nozze de Figaro (NAO, Debut), Violetta in La Traviata (Brent Opera), Musetta in La Boheme (Amick

Productions) Rosalinda in Die Fledermaus (Guildford Opera Company), Clorinda in Cenerentola (GOC). In recent years, Anna has enjoyed bringing her joy of music to a wider audience such as participating in dementia friendly concerts with Songhaven, delivering opera workshops in schools and organising concerts for babies and young children with her company FunKey Foundations.

Anna is grateful for the support of her husband and two children, the youngest of which will be joining her on stage tonight!

Ella Goodhew – Gherardo & Nella's daughter

Ella attends Staines Preparatory School where she enjoys taking part in the school plays, singing in the choir and representing her house in the inter-house poetry competition! She is a keen musician; learning the drums, singing and piano. She studies dancing with The Performance Academy and received distinction for her most recent exams in ballet and modern. Above all, Ella loves practicing gymnastics; in the garden, at school, in the rehearsal room...you name it! She is very excited to be making her operatic debut in Gianni Schicchi, especially as she gets to share the stage with her mum for the first time!

Jane trained at the Royal College of Music. After graduation, she pursued a career in business and the charity sector, rehabilitating former prisoners. 

Will O'Brien – Betto di Signa

Will is delighted to be making his debut with New Aquarian Opera. He has previously performed in three different productions of Gianni Schicchi and played Marco, Beto and Gianni Schicchi on those occasions.
