Vehicle Restoration Group



Work to remove the remaining body panels from Ollie has been completed. Ollie is now a bare chassis holding the engine, gearbox, suspension, steering and other driveline components.

During the month the VRG team got the engine to turn over on the starter motor courtesy of a battery donated by Battery World. With the use of the Shed's heavy-duty welding leads and a few sparks flying around the workshop, the subsequent compression test on each cylinder showed the engine will need a rebuild. However, with the engine turning over freely, we appear to have a sound starting point.



The gearbox also appears to be functional, so at this stage will need minimal work.

The rear differential is another matter, with small parts of the crown-wheel falling out of the oil drain plug as it was emptied. Options to secure a complete second hand rear axle are being looked at. Further work is still required to assess the hubs, brakes, and front differential.

Guest Speakers

Tuesday 22nd November - Lloyd Brown - 2 Squadron Operations in Vietnam

Former Shed West member Lloyd Brown spent twelve months as a navigator on the strength of 2 Squadron at Phan Rang during the period April 1969 to March 1970. He was the Weapons Officer for much of that time, and he was awarded an MID (he says, for doing his job). Lloyd was later involved in Vietnam during March and April of 1975 as Operations Officer with a detachment of C 130 aircraft operating out of Saigon on humanitarian sorties.

Lloyd will give a picture of just what life was like for Squadron aircrew during those turbulent years.

Tuesday 6th December - Baden Pearse - Keeping Foot and Mouth Disease Out

Posing grave threats to our exports-dependent agricultural industries, three serious viral livestock diseases are on our doorstep

While minerals account for the bulk of Australia's exports, agricultural exports of animal origin - for example, meat, wool, live animals, and dairy are an important component of our economy, accounting for 21.7 billion dollars last year. Australia's ability to export these commodities is dependent upon our disease-free status and this is at risk due to three, very serious, viral diseases that have spread around the world, including to our nearest Asian neighbours.

This talk will cover Food and Mouth Disease, Lumpy Skin Disease and African Swine Fever – what are they, what they look like and what we, as Australian citizens, can do to minimise the risk of disease incursion and the subsequent cessation of exports.

Shed West member **Baden Pearse** is a retired veterinarian who worked with farm animals variously as a herd health consultant, university tutor and state and federal government veterinarian. He has completed two Masters degrees; in sheep nutrition and reproduction, and preventative medicine, and a PhD in epidemiology from the University of California.

While working with animals for most of his career, Baden was, at one time, Principal Epidemiologist with Queensland Health contributing to vaccination strategies, and data analysis of men's and aboriginal health, cancer and hospital accessions.

Prior to retirement, Baden was the Field Operations Manager for the Australian Department of Agriculture, providing technical oversight and policy formulation for a team of 150 veterinarians working in food safety, animal welfare and meat exports. He has also been a technical specialist on government trade delegations to USA, China and Indonesia.

His experience with Food and Mouth Disease includes working as an epidemiologist in England during the 2001 FMD outbreak and visiting Nepal for an FMD training exercise for Australian veterinarians and farmers.

Apart from his interest in wood and leather work at Shed West, Baden has many toys including a 1928 Chevrolet which he has fully restored from the wooden spokes up, a 34 foot diesel live-onboard cruiser which he and Peter Merrell brought to Brisbane from Hobart and finally, he enjoys off road motorbiking although his still 18-year-old brain is far more adventurous than his 65 year old arthritic body allows.

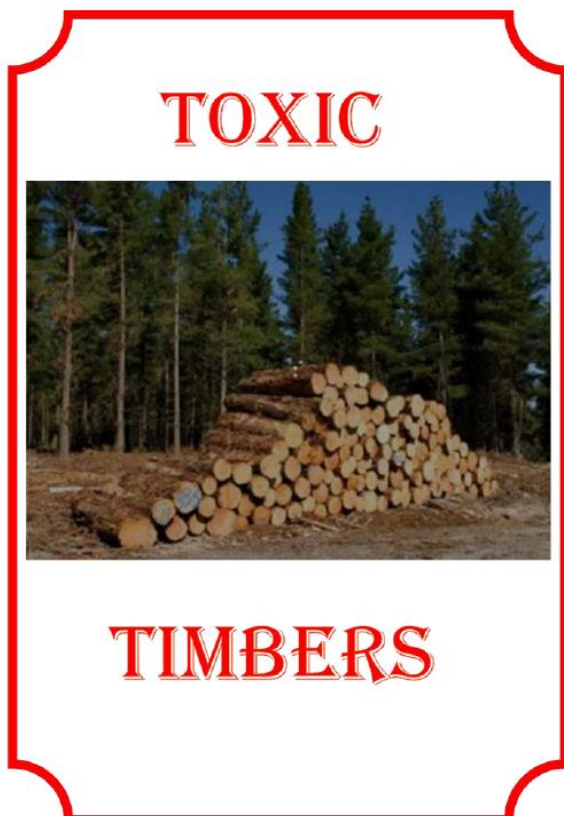

Tool Tips

Toxic Timbers



When working with wood, you need to be aware of the hazards. Exposure to wood dust and resins can have serious health consequences including skin and eye reactions, irritation of airways and lungs, and worse.

Some timbers are carcinogenic.

Whilst everyone should take normal safety precautions such as using appropriate PPE to keep wood particles out of your airways and eyes (particularly when sanding), it is well to be informed about the level of risk posed by different timber species.

Some useful information relating to toxicity of a range of timber species has been compiled and resides in a blue plastic folder in the document rack behind the slow speed grinder.

Sharpening on a Cubic Boron Nitride (CBN) Wheel

Recently we have been donated some old wood turning tools that we can recondition, sharpen, and make useful tools for our workshop.

ALERT

Our slow speed grinder has a CBN wheel which is only suitable for High Speed Steel (HSS)

We may have some High Carbon Steel (HCS) tools that we have not identified to this point, and they may not be suitable to be sharpened on the CBN wheel. If you are in any doubt whether a tool is HSS or not, please see Gavan Clarke. Please do not sharpen unidentified steel on the CBN wheel.

ALERT

Sharpening carbon steel on a CBN wheel will wreck the wheel, which costs \$300 to replace

Fun Facts About CBN

CBN is a synthetic chemical compound made up of boron and nitrogen atoms in a one-to-one ratio. It has a cubic crystal lattice, with its atoms arranged in a symmetrical, cube-shaped structure, very much like the crystalline structure of diamond. Its material properties include extreme hardness, stability under heat, and superior chemical resistance.

Cubic boron nitride is the second-hardest known material after diamond. For woodturners, it is the best grinding-wheel abrasive known. The biggest advantage of CBN over diamond is its chemical stability in the presence of nickel, iron, and related metals at elevated temperature. Diamond is soluble in these metals at elevated temperatures, meaning that it reacts with them chemically and dissolves. This makes it useless as a tool for high speed grinding of iron or steel. CBN, on the other hand, does not react and can therefore be used to cut these materials. Diamond hones work great on steel because the speed of honing is so slow. The heat resistance of CBN is quite high. In metal grinding applications where intense heat is generated, CBN is far superior to diamond.

One of the objectives of metallurgists as they are developing better High-Speed Steels is to get a more uniform distribution of fine microcrystalline carbides throughout the HSS. This makes the steel more wear resistant, so the time between tool sharpening is greatly extended. Most woodturners prefer aluminium-oxide sharpening wheels, which wear away faster than silicon carbide wheels, but don't heat the steel as badly. However, when the aluminium-oxide wheel encounters the microcrystalline grains of carbide in the HSS, the carbide isn't sharpened per se, it is worn down slightly, but not sharpened. At some point, the micro-grain of carbide is sticking out of the steel matrix enough that the grinding wheel simply tears it out of the steel matrix.

CBN wheels are far harder than carbide, and readily sharpen carbide. So, unlike aluminium-oxide or silicon carbide grinding wheels, when grinding a HSS woodturning tool with a CBN wheel, as the microcrystalline carbide grains are exposed, they don't get worn down, they get sharpened to the shape of the edge, and they don't get torn out of the matrix so much. So, a CBN wheel is a superior abrasive to aluminium oxide or silicon carbide.

CBN is for HSS only, not for carbon steel

Carbon steels may load up the surface of the CBN and render it useless

The Elsie Moore Traditional Christmas Pudding Recipe

Ingredients

½ tsp Mixed spice (try adding ground cardamom also)
½ tsp Nutmeg (freshly ground if possible)
½ tsp Salt (only add if using unsalted butter)

225g Sultanas
450g Raisins
225g Currants
225g Dates (chopped)
85g Blanched almonds (slivered)
60g Cherries (glace, halved)

225g White breadcrumbs
225g White sugar
225g Plain flour

340g Butter (remove from 'fridge and allow to soften)
6 Eggs
300ml Milk
1 tsp Almond essence
150ml Brandy or rum or cognac



Materials

Jute (or cotton) twine
Grease-proof paper

Method

Weigh /measure all ingredients prior to commencing mixing.

Grease 3 medium-sized (2 pint / 1200ml) pudding basins Cut paper to size.

Sift flour. Stir in salt and spices. Stir in breadcrumbs. Chop the softened butter into pieces and rub into dry ingredients. Add all fruit and nuts. Mix well.

Nearly fill greased basins. Cover with 4 layers of grease-proof paper, & tie with string. Put in boiling water, up to 2cm below the top of the bowl. Maintain at least 2/3 of bowl height. Simmer for 7 to 8 hours. Do not remove string and paper. Cool, & store in fridge until required. (These will keep for up to 12 months.)

Reheat (same method) for at least 1 hour on day of serving. Flame with brandy when serving if desired. Serve with Hard Sauce / Brandy Butter / Custard / Ice Cream / etc.
