Men's Shed Association Canberra

At the Men's Shed conference in 2007 it was agreed to form a national body, the Australian Men's Shed Association, (AMSA) with membership from all registered Sheds. A working party was set up to start the foundation and seven state representatives from NSW, Victoria, Tasmania and our Graeme Curnow, met in Canberra on November 10 and 11 this year to progress the organisation's development.

The meeting decided to form a national secretariat consisting of a board with one representative from each State and Territory, and employ one paid executive.

State Shed Associations will be comprised of Sheds operating from within their State and employ a paid State Coordinator. Within each State there will be clusters of Sheds within regions or with common interests. Eventually there will be up to eight paid Cluster Coordinators employed within States.

The Federal Government will be asked to fund this AMSA structure and the employment of coordinators.

The responsibilities of the national secretariat will be:

- communication through the national network of sheds via the newsletter and website;
- organising national conferences;
- representations to the Federal Government and large organisations;
- seek national fundraising;
- support individual sheds in applying for funds;
- · compliance development;

- promote and publicise Men's Sheds nationwide;
- coordinate insurance schemes; and
- develop training tools.

The responsible Federal Minister was unable to attend, but sent three of her Departmental Directors to meet with a representative group. There was no immediate promise of funds but the Shed reps did get a good hearing.

Voyager Centre Chermside

Thirteen members of Shed West visited the Voyager Centre at Chermside on September 30. Our hosts for the visit were Jim Whalan and Alan Walker, both Committee members of the Kedron-Wavell RSL Sub-Branch. Both men were very forthcoming with information about their Centre, their experience in acquiring equipment and materials for its development. The Centre operates under the auspices of the Kedron-Wavell RSL Sub-Branch, in a former Sea Scouts den.

The Centre is open to the general community, and operates on five days a week. Activities catered for at the Centre are diverse. They include woodworking, pottery, jewellery

making, art, lead-light glasswork, a pipe-band and meetings or presentations. Activities are conducted by specialist leaders, on a regular time rostered basis with an effective sharing of facilities.

Because of the broad range of activities and full schedule, effective operation requires all participants to leave the area clean and tidy.

There are strict processes and a system of qualified users for the operation of powered machines. Users are required to pay a fee for each session, and to meet the cost of special materials used.

The Centre was impressive in how effectively a modest sized facility can be used for a wide range of activities, with efficient use of space, good scheduling and the cooperation of participants.

Workshop tip

Often power tools such as routers and saws come with a small metal fence. However, they are often not long enough. To increase the efficiency, fit a 300 mm length of wood to the inside edge. This effectively increases their reach and accuracy (Charles Smith).

Basic woodworking

Members' basic woodworking skills have been put to good use under the expert guidance of Charles Smith and Keith Foy. Several work benches and fourteen wooden stools are under construction. These will be a valuable resource once our Shed is up and running.
