New Router Table

Back in February the management Committee committed funds to getting a new router table for Shed West. The new table has now arrived in the shed. This is a precision machine that will give members the opportunity to produce quality joinery easily and efficiently. As with all the Shed West machinery, members will need to undergo the usual Shed West training to gain accreditation to use the machine unsupervised. Members who were accredited to use the old Kreg router table, will need refresher training to come up to speed with all the features of the new table.




The new router table features a large cast iron table top, a Jessem Mast-R-Lift II router lift, a powerful 2400 Watt variable speed router motor, and a precision fence with fine adjustment screws.

The table package includes a bespoke castor mounted cabinet with drawers for storage of tools, router bits, and jigs.



The Jessem router lift is a premium quality tool that provides simple above-table access for changing cutters. The Jessem lift also enables fast, precise adjustments to be made to the cutter height from above the table. If you have used a router table where you had to get under the table to do these functions, you are going to love the new table!



The table features dust extraction ports, both under the table and behind the fence. When connected to a dust collector, dust and shavings are sucked away, keeping the work area (almost) squeaky clean.



Membership Fees

Annual membership fees are due at the end of next month. After a review by the Shed West Management Committee, membership fees will be increased to \$60 for the new financial year. This decision was made after consideration of rising running costs, including our insurance costs which account for a very large slice of the membership fees.

Membership fees made be paid at the shed, either in cash or by eftpos. If paying by eftpos, the transaction must record the member's name, and the purpose of the payment (i.e. membership).

Jewellery Box

I wanted to build a jewellery box for my granddaughter Grace. But I wanted it to be something very special that she would love and cherish for the rest of her life. So, a special project requires special treatment, special timber and a lot of time and love.

The box itself is 250 long, 150 wide and 90 high. The base adds a little more to the overall size.

The body is Queensland Silky Oak

The base, lid and the splines are of Huon Pine from Tasmania.

The lid inlay and lid lifting knob are of Purple Heart from Brazil.

The box is constructed with mitred corners reinforced with splines. The top was assembled onto a piece of ply then set into a rebate in the top of the box.

The engraving was done on the CNC router before the lid was set in



Inside are two trays. The top tray houses rings within the rolled felt section with the opposite side open for general use.

The bottom tray is designed to support the top tray but its tight fit and depth gives the illusion it is the bottom of the box. In fact, it is removable and gives a shallow secret compartment for all those private items.

The end result is one happy little girl and one proud Pa.

The month of May saw three very interesting presentations, commencing with Shed West member **David Arnold** (who is also the editor of this great Newslitter!) and the design and installation of an innovative modular furnace building for Port Pirie. The 75m high building needed to be assembled within an existing facility with minimal disruption to daily operations. The solution was to build it in China, and ship it to Australia in modules like giant Lego blocks.

From the President

Field Trip to Buderim Men's Shed

On Thursday, 12th. May 2022, fifteen members of Shed West visited the Buderim Men's Shed. The trip was well-organised by Phil Batten with everybody travelling in a 21-seater bus with an early morning start from Kenmore Plaza. Upon arrival, after a welcome tea break, we split up into smaller groups for a tour of the Buderim Men's Shed. All of us were suitably impressed by the facilities – especially the amount of area allocated for different activities. The Buderim Men's Shed (BMS) has a larger membership than ours in Kenmore with just under 300 members compared to our 147 at last count. BMS have been in their new premises comprising of three large sheds for the past eight years. They were successful in getting a number of different funding grants to build their new premises. To their credit, a lot of the work was undertaken by the members themselves – especially external landscaping works on the 1 hectare site.



Their three large industrial sheds can be simply described as one for noisy activities, another for quiet activities and the third for a central communal facility and function space – the last one is available for hire with other organisations in the local area. We were all impressed by the overall organisation, cleanliness, size, and equipment layout which is far more spread out than our own "very compact and much smaller" (by comparison) Green and Blue Sheds in Kenmore Hills. To give you an example - just in this one shed pictured at left that spanned 12-metres in width, we could easily fit three (3) of our Green Sheds with space to spare.



In addition to both woodworking and metalwork activities, the Buderim Men's Shed also has a fully equipped gymnasium where members can work out and exercise to maintain their health and overall fitness under the supervision of a retired physiotherapist. They also have a well-equipped kitchen facility with a large outdoor (undercover) BBQ and cafeteria area where our members were treated with a warm lunch of beef stroganoff, pasta and green peas cooked by Buderim Men's Shed resident chef.



In Buderim itself, they have their own very successful separate shopfront where they sell many different handmade items to raise revenue to cover some of their overheads and running costs.

All together it was a highly successful field trip, and we learnt a lot – all of which will be invaluable when we manage to secure upgraded premises for ourselves sometime in the near future.

Safety and Operations

Bench Grinders

At Shed West we currently have four bench grinding machines as illustrated below. There is much to know about grinding wheels and their use but for now we will focus on a few points as they relate to Shed West.

- Wear eye protection when using a grinder, especially when using the wheel brush. Hot metal flakes and wire bristles are thrown out at speed when using a bench grinder and can cause serious eye injury.
- Grey Aluminium Oxide wheels are most commonly used for grinding low carbon (mild) steel.
- White Aluminium Oxide wheels are the woodworker's choice because they provide a cool yet maximum cutting rate on the hardened tool and high-speed steel commonly found in woodworking tools.
- Cubic Boron Nitride (CBN) wheels are the first choice for wood turning lathe chisels and gouges because they run at a lower temperature and do not require constant dressing.
- Green Silicone Carbide wheels are suitable for non-ferrous metals which includes Aluminium, which is a metal seldom encountered in a wood working workshop.
- The grinding face of the wheel needs to be dressed periodically to keep the surface true and clean. Do not attempt to dress a grinder if you are not experienced see a supervisor
- Never walk away and leave a grinder spinning switch it off and wait for it to come to a complete stop.

SAFETY ALERT

None of the grinders at Shed West are currently suitable for grinding Aluminium or any other non-ferrous metals.

Aluminium must only be ground on a Silicon Carbide wheel, which is coloured green.



If Aluminium is ground wheels other than silicon carbide, the wheel will quickly become loaded with molten aluminium, and there is a significant risk that the wheel will overheat and explode in your face, causing serious injury.

Questions? Please ask a supervisor and he will make sure you get the information you seek.

See a supervisor if the surface of the grinding wheel is scored, uneven, or is clogged.

See a supervisor if the grinder vibrates during operation.

Never walk away from a grinder while the wheel is still spinning.

Stay safe folks and only use the tools for their intended purpose.

Tool Tips

Tool Storage



Look after your tools and store them well and they will last four lifetimes!

This is the tool chest of Henry O Studley, an organ and piano maker who worked in the late 19th century.

Store your tools like this, instead of thrown into a drawer or box, and they don't get knocked about, cutting edges stay sharp, and you can find them when you need them. I would say find them blindfolded, but perhaps not to be recommended with sharp tools. No doubt Henry also gave his tools a wipe with camellia oil occasionally to keep the rust away.

Perhaps you don't need to go to this extreme, and the ivory and mother of pearl inlay is a little bit ostentatious for a toolbox! However, the chest and its contents are a thing of beauty, and its creator was a master who took obvious pride in his craft and his tools.
