Projects

What a busy month just passed, and why, because a major effort by our enthusiastic members has resulted in the near finished construction of six new letterboxes, six completed bird boxes and the sale last week of tow birdboxes and major progress in the final construction of components for John Lippiatt's nineteen Wheelbarrows! John does get upset if people do come along and buy one as he feels obliged to again top up his stock numbers for the Big weeklong Sale in November at Kenmore Shopping centre!!

We are catching up also with completion of outside Projects in hand which will allow us to clear our shed space and ready our members to start construction of new storage cabinets to house many hand tools etc so we can maintain a much tidier shed area. This initially will require no less than 12 sheets of heavy 2400 x 1200 mm plywood to be cut into about 175 pieces for drawers, shelving etc. David Arnold is the engineer and designer of this significant endeavour and of course all those little pieces will have to be assembled into three large storage units (see *Shed Storage Cabinet Upgrade* for more details). It will be a very interesting project and we are looking for volunteers to help here. We plan to work on this job in the afternoon say Tuesday thru Thursday from 1pm to about 4pm with 4 to 5 shedders each afternoon and of course you are not expected to participate each day but just for a time that suits you. This is a great opportunity for those wanting to gain new skills and learn from the experts. If you are willing, I can assure you we will teach you new Tricks. Please call me if you can help.

A month hence should see us well ahead in the above activities!

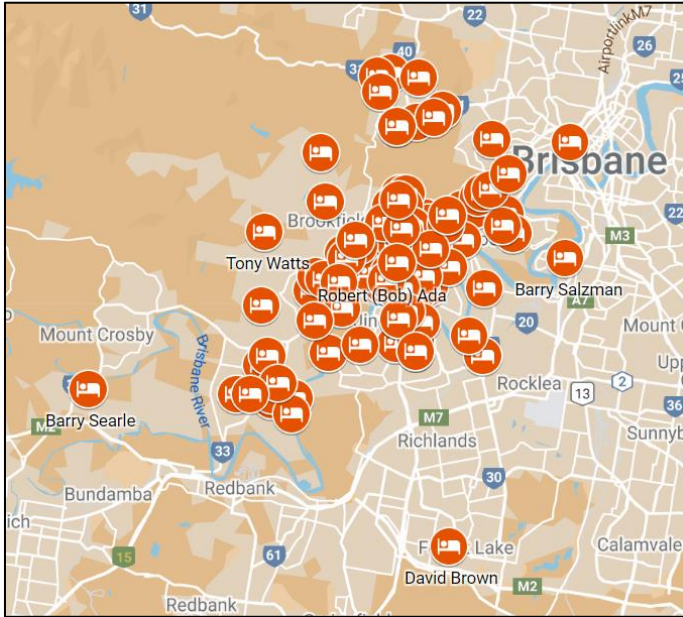
A new venture this month has seen Richard working with Russel to repair the tags on Russel's boots.

Using some proprietary software, Jim Watters has been able to map out the current distribution of our shed members within both the western suburbs and wider community.

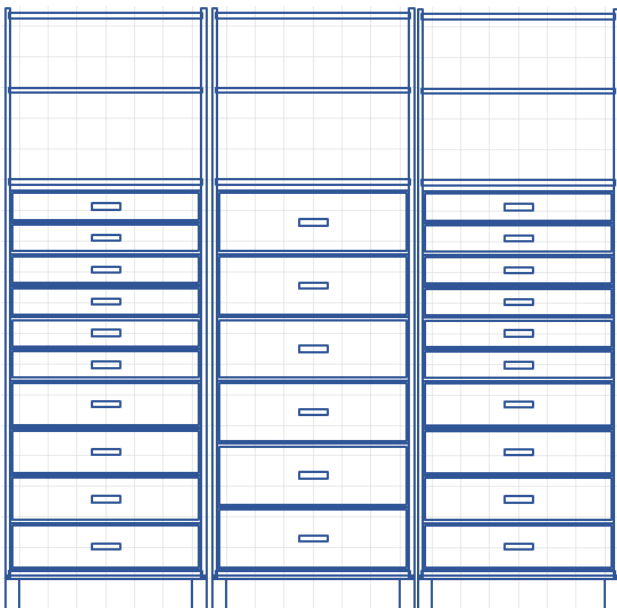

Shed Storage Cabinet Upgrade

Finding things at Shed West can sometimes be a bit of a challenge, especially when it comes to small tools or screws of just the right size. A big part of the problem is the way storage of small tools and consumables has evolved over time into a scattered assortment of drawers and cabinets of all shapes and sizes.

At the July Management Committee meeting, a decision was made to embark on a project to upgrade storage at the shed by constructing modular storage cabinets to replace the dispersed arrangement of motley cabinets and drawers we currently have. Plans have been drawn up, and we are in the process of buying materials for the build.



The cabinets will be 1950 mm high x 700 mm wide x 550 mm deep, with drawers of various sizes, and shelves above. The initial build will be three cabinets, as illustrated at left, with more to follow if all goes well.

The plywood for the cabinets is being bought pre-cut to reduce the work involved, and to ensure accurate cutting and assembly for a quality job.

The plan is to have a series of working bees dedicated to this project, on one afternoon a week.

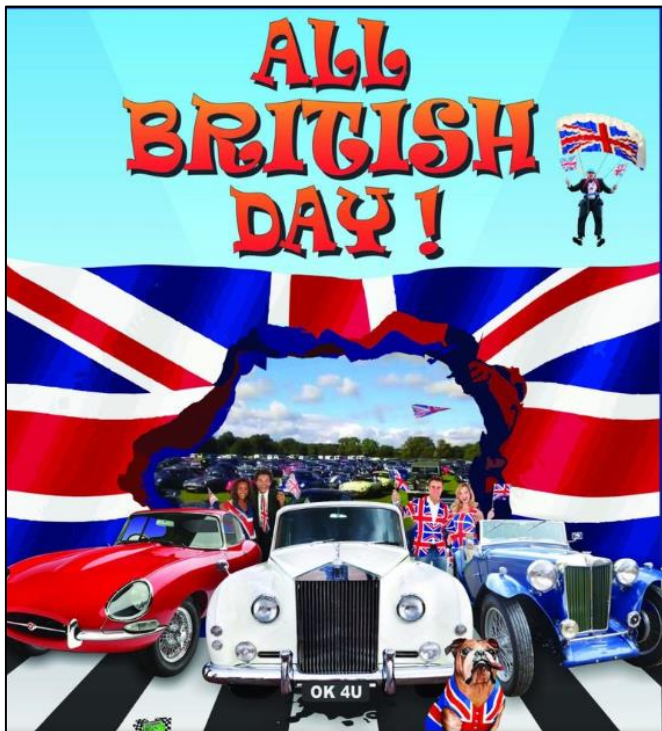

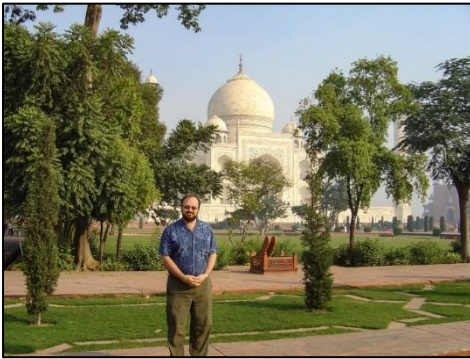

Member Project of the Month

An Introduction to Table Making



"Rome wasn't built in a day" is an adage reflecting the importance of time in creating something great. I resort to this wisdom to justify why it has taken nearly 20 years to finish my first woodwork project. The journey began in March 2004 when I was attending a meeting in Goa, India. A visit to the great Islamic mausoleum – the Taj Mahal - was a mandatory extension to my trip. The Taj Mahal is the greatest architectural achievement in the whole range of Indo-Islamic architecture.



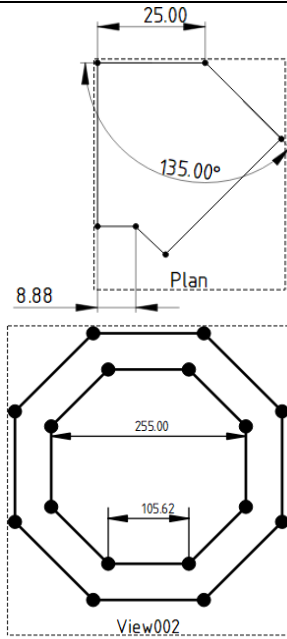
A feature of the Taj Mahal is the artistic marble inlay or pietra dura. Pietra dura also called "parchin kari", is a term for the inlay technique of using cut and fitted, highly polished coloured stones to create images. These inlays are either floral or calligraphic. In this second case, written texts are verses of the Koran.



Like all visitors, I needed a souvenir and thus purchased An octagonal marble plate with a traditional floral inlay (275mm vertex to vertex) from a factory in Agra. My plan was to set it into a small table.

Roll on 17 years with frequent reminders from those who must be obeyed, I got the message that I needed to do something with the marble tile. For \$50 membership I could access all the expertise needed at Shed West. The timber (West Australian Karri) was a bit more expensive. I also bought some pine to use for prototyping.

The project started in May 2021 and followed a sequence of steps.

- 1) Look for inspiration on designs from web images. (June-July).
- 2) Started with designing the tabletop and legs and drew up some plans in FreeCAD.
- 3) Modelled components using 3D Printer to check leg design. (August)
- 4) Attempted to construct an octagonal table first using pine. (September)
- 5) Attempt 1 involved trying to cut eight wedges and join with biscuit jointer (failed as minor errors in angles (minutes of a degree) left gaps
- 6) Attempt 2 joined two planks and cut out an octagon (worked)
- 7) With the help of Neil Rogers, took two joined pine planks and carved out a pocket for the marble and octagonal perimeter using the CNC router. (worked) (October)
- 8) Repeated CNC routing of Karri timber (November)



- 9) Treated tabletop with ~ 20 coats of shellac (French Polished) and sprayed a final coat of clear Cellulose Nitrate. (November)
- 10) Constructed eight legs by ripping karri to the dimensions in the design and gluing two strips to give the desired six-sided kite shape (November).
- 11) Oiled legs with Danish oil. (November)
- 12) Assembled table using figure eight links to connect legs (thanks to Howard's tip) (November)
- 13) Prepared skirts to strengthen structure (November)
- 14) Back to the pine prototype – produced legs and filled pocket with textured resin (January)
- 15) Routed grooves in legs to fit skirt (thanks to the new Router Table) (July).
- 16) Fitted skirts, reassembled table, reinforced skirts with 2cm quad (July).
- 17) Finished with seal of approval from family (July 2022).



Postscript: An interesting phenomenon was observed after the coating of the tabletop with Cellulose Nitrate spray. Although various websites confirmed that one could cover shellac with cellulose nitrate, what appeared several weeks after spraying were some cracks in the shellac layer. Possibly I should have left the layer mature longer. My initial response was despondency. However, everyone who has seen it like the pattern as it gave the impression of age.

I have yet to finish the prototype which only requires the fitting of stretchers to stabilise the legs.

Safety and Operations

Shed Working Bee / Clean-up

An Update of the Database from Your Shed Statistician



With the introduction of new machinery, new members and other members moving on, our database has not kept up with the changes. The updating of the machinery accreditation status of all members in our system is well under way. In simple terms it means the red and green boxes on your name badge should correspond with the data on our system.

Your new name badge / ID badge should look like this, with the appropriate coloured squares for your degree of experience.

The intention of the colouring system of the squares has changed since its inception. A green square would have indicated a member has trained in and is competent at using the machine unsupervised whilst a red square only indicated a supervisor. The problem with the previous system was that a member who had attended training but not yet competent to work unsupervised has no recognition on their badge, thus leaving supervisors unable to identify who has and has not been trained on which machine.

The new system gives recognition for training, needing overseeing, and differentiates that from the upper level of competence.

A green square now means you have undertaken training with a supervisor but still need overseeing to ensure you operate the equipment safely and competently. Over time and experience with the endorsement of a supervisor you will progress to the red level.

A red square means you are deemed competent to operate the equipment safely and unsupervised.

A supervisor can readily see by your badge if you are trained at an appropriate level to use the machinery required and enact the appropriate level of supervision.

You will notice that the Induction program is now identified on your badge.

To upgrade: All you need to do to upgrade your ID / Name badge is see Malcolm or myself, present your existing badge and the database will be updated and a new badge presented.

Tool Tips

Timber Identification



On the cupboard door next to Malcolm's office, there is a really useful timber identifier (*beautifully made*) that was recently donated to the shed. Whilst it might not have every hardwood type, there are plenty of timber examples laminated together, complete with their species, so this should stop a lot of arguments in the future.

Cutter Cleaning

For best results with any cutting tool, the blades need to be both clean and sharp. This is especially true of router cutters. This *Tool Tip* is about keeping cutters and blades clean by removing the build-up of residue that is left when cutting through the timber. Router cutters are used for illustration. However, saw blades, hole saws, etc. can be cleaned the same way. David Arnold



A blunt dirty cutter like this will never produce a clean cut! It will tear and burn the wood and make an unholy mess of your project.

Using a dirty cutter generates excessive heat and will damage the cutter. This cutter is cooked and is heading for the bin!



To clean a dirty cutter, soak your cutter in a cleaning solution to cut through the baked on grime. After soaking, clean off the residue.

If the cutter is really dirty, you can use a nylon brush, or you may need to soak for a few hours, and/or repeat the process. However, if you clean cutters after every use, a 5 minute soak and a wipe clean with a soft cloth should do the trick.



The cleaning fluid must be non-corrosive so as not to damage expensive carbide tipped cutters.

The CMT cleaner sells for \$33 for a 532 mL bottle from Carbatec (less the 15% discount for shed members).

The Ride Mechanic degreaser sells for \$20 for a 750 mL bottle from the local bike shop in Kenmore and works just as well.

Keep the cleaning fluid in a screw top plastic pot to get multiple uses.
