Underneath that quiet and reserved persona was a clever, knowledgeable man who liked a party, who had a cheeky sense of humour, and who liked a twirl around a dance floor, and who could hold a tune.

George was a kind, congenial and generous man. He loved fishing, gardening, and cricket. He loved fossicking in second hand shops, tinkering in his shed, and a good strong cup of tea.

He very much valued the friendships he made at the men's shed and holding the position of social convenor. He was in his element organising outings and functions for the members. One of George's proudest moments was December last year when he was awarded Life Membership.

Unfortunately, George's health in recent times declined, and prevented him from doing a lot of things he would have liked to do.

He is fondly remembered and will be very much missed.

Doug's efforts as project manager for community projects have been of enormous benefit to Shed West and to the broader community in the western suburbs. The varied and interesting projects that Doug has brought into the shed not only create a valuable sense of purpose and team spirit for the members involved but also provide a vital source of income for the shed. He will be a hard act to follow Ed.

#### Xylophones / Marimbas

In January 2022, Leanne Hodges was appointed the role of Arts teacher at St Brendan's. This role includes music and dance lessons. On receiving the position, Leanne keenly examined the extensive musical instruments in music classroom to find that there were very few large wooden xylophone options for the children. These instruments are used in the Orff, and Schulwerk early childhood methodologies that Leanne uses in her teaching. Xylophones are particularly useful as they are a big sturdy instrument. The children can clearly see the notes written on the keys to help them visually, and aurally the children can hear a lovely tone as they play.



These instruments retail commercially starting at \$400 each. With a budget not able to include such an expense, Leanne then asked her father, Dr Graeme Correll, a Shed West member, to inquire at the Shed to see if they would be interested in making 5 xylophones for the school. Graeme has previously made wooden instruments including xylophones, marimbas and harps all requiring a high degree of craftsmanship and painstaking patience. He approached the members of the shed who eagerly accepted the challenge and work was underway within a matter of days.

The sound boxes were a complex construction. Made from Jacaranda harvested after one of our early summer storms knocked a tree down near Graeme's home. The box was dovetailed using a dovetail jig made intricate by



having tapered sides of 3° and completed by Neil Rogers. He also cut the keys from Blackwood which has good tone and resonance and is most suitable for marimbas.



The men in the Blue Shed got to with the shaping of each key. Syd Hallas, Darryl Holden, Trevor Ward, Gil Trafford-Walker, Geoff Haigh, Phil Castle, Paul Steinmuller, Thomas Wittkopf under the able supervision of Warren Cameron then set about to assemble and finish the marimbas.



While that was occurring, the keys needed to be tuned. Graeme Correll achieved this by striking the key then measuring the emitted tone against a sound tuning app on his mobile phone.

Minor adjustments to the shaping of the underside key changes the note of the key. When that was achieved Graham passed the instrument back over to the men in the Blue Shed to put the final finishes to the project.



Within 6 months, after passing through many loving and crafted hands, five beautiful instruments were delivered.

On September 9, St Brendan's Primary School accepted the gift of 5 wooden xylophones from the Kenmore Men's Shed (Shed West) at a special presentation. The two student representatives gave a warming thank you speech while the gathered audience of students were excited and asked a variety of questions showing their interest in how musical instruments are made. These xylophones will now be used in the classroom music program by all grades in the school to extend their learning in all areas of music, especially the practical element of playing a musical instrument.

#### Vehicle Restoration Group

September was a busy month for the Vehicle Restoration Group. Early in the month Doug, Bruce and Michael visited the farm in Northern NSW to recover further parts for our rebuild. Surplus parts were also sought for the Shed West stand at the All British Day in the middle of the month (see separate report below).





The chassis and firewall on Agnes, the original long wheelbase Series 2A Land Rover donated to us last year, was deemed uneconomical to repair.

The VRG has been trying to source a replacement. Whilst the various Land Rovers that are available to us from the farm have similar corrosion problems, we have been able to source a structurally sound, partially dismantled long wheelbase Series 2A from a local restorer who specialises in sourcing Land Rovers from western Queensland. His vehicles have generally spent most of their lives in a dry, nonhumid climate and haven't been on the beach or on fishing trips to Fraser Island.

This week saw the arrival at Shed West of the western Queensland Series 2A and the remnants of Agnes leave site in part exchange. Whilst we have onsold some of the parts we stripped from Agnes, she has also provided us with a good set of body panels, cab interior panels and a trayback. All these items will go onto the new vehicle.

We have adopted the new 2A's nickname from the previous owner, so it is now called 'Ollie'. Our initial assessment of Ollie confirms that it has no rust in the chassis or firewall that will require structural repairs.

Series 2A Land Rovers were built between 1961 and 1971. From the chassis number, it appears that Ollie was an early Series 2A and was assembled in Australia in about March 1963. Whilst almost 60 years old, I expect Ollie is still a bit younger than most of us.

The VRG are currently undertaking a further assessment of Ollie and will meet this Friday morning (30<sup>th</sup>) at the Shed to discuss and plan the next stages of the project. All interested Shed members are invited to attend.

#### Vehicle Restoration Group at the All British Day



Shed West's Vehicle Restoration Interest Group was represented at the All British Day on Sunday 18 Sept by Bruce Woodhouse, Russell Hawksford and Doug Wait. We took a trailer-load of series Land Rover second hand parts and panels. The weather was brilliant, and we had prime position midway along a row of Land Rovers, ranging from early series 1s to current model Range Rovers, and even a SWB series 3 that had been converted to an EV by fitment of Tesla batteries and motors.

Shed West's new trailer proved its worth and its versatility, with the cage enabling us to hang items for better display.

Sales of parts realised more than \$1000, and we also met many fellow series LR restoration enthusiasts. We also made a number of excellent contacts with potential suppliers of parts and services, who unanimously expressed support for a men's shed venturing into vehicle restoration. We discussed what products Shed West could potentially offer, so there may be some future income for the shed.

Overall, we agreed that we should return to the event in 2023, hopefully with a rolling chassis to display!

Lastly, the day was a car-nut's dream. So many gleaming marques and models!

#### Shed Storage Cabinets Upgrade

We have now had three very successful afternoon working bees for this project. With our initial build of three cabinets now well under way, the participation from members has been outstanding, with a good cross section of participants. The less experienced members have been keen to learn new skills from the more experienced guys, and all the team are making an outstanding contribution.



The plywood for the cabinets was ordered pre-cut from our supplier. One hundred and fifty one separate pieces!

We were fortunate to have a plentiful stock of Rimu (an excellent New Zealand native timber) that is ideal for ripping into strips to provide solid edging to all the exposed plywood edges. A quantity of this timber will be set aside for use as we build more storage cabinets in the future. The generous donation of this timber to Shed West has saved nearly 20% off the cost of the project.

With the preparation of the components now almost complete, the cabinets will really take shape in the next few weeks.

## **Member Project of the Month**

#### Leather Bowl



Some time ago I saw a leather bowl on you tube but the moulds were expensive, not to mention the freight.

Running with the idea Ross Monks suggested cutting the mould from ply on the laser. This required several layers to get a reasonable depth and then glue together (2891), This had the added advantage that the depth could be changed in the future by either adding or removing layers.



Next a piece of leather was cut to rough size and wet, put in the mould and clamped down



and finish.

The finished shape removed from the mould ready to trim



A day later another piece was treated so there would be tanned leather on both the inside and outside of the bowl.

The two pieces were then glued together and stitched around the edge to give the finished bowl.
