NOTICE

This is to advise you of an important Special General Meeting of the members of Shed West Community Men's Shed (Inc.).

Date: Wednesday 23 April 2025

Time: 10:30 am

Location: Men's Shed 98 Brookfield Road.

Purpose: The meeting will ask members to consider a number of amendments to the Constitution of Shed West. In July 2024, the Queensland Government introduced amendments to legislation the impacts how incorporated associates to review their governance procedures and structures. A set of model rules have been disseminated to provide guidance to associations and can be adapted for individual associations. They cover membership, fees, voting rights, and grievance management. In addition, Shed West wishes to seek Deductible gift recipients (DGR) status. Organisations that are endorsed as deductible gift recipients (DGRs) are entitled to receive donations that are deductible from the donor's income tax.

Amendments to the constitution of the association require a special resolution. Special Resolutions must be passed by a majority of at least 75% of the votes of those members who are entitled to vote and who vote in person or by proxy at a special general meeting called for that purpose.

Motion:

"That Shed West Community Men's Shed Inc constitution version 2 dated 23 March 21 be amended to accommodate changes in Queensland Association Incorporation Act 1981 reflected in the model rules."

The changes involve edits to multiple clauses and include the introduction of new clauses. The relevant documents are available at:

Management Committee Deliberations



The April management committee meeting addressed the usual range of reports.

The financial report for March was accepted. February/March are expensive months as insurance, council rates and other routine costs become due.

Reports were provided regarding several ongoing Shed projects and initiatives:

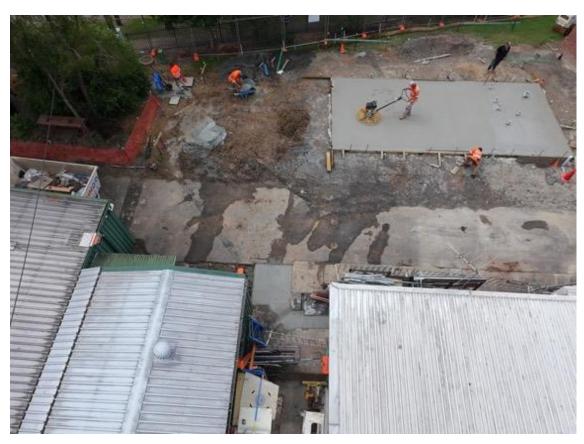
- VRG group anticipate the delivery of Ollie in the 3rd quarter of 2025.
- The woodturning group is progressing actively with most machines in use by group members
- The photography group has resurrected and has undertaken one field trip in March to photograph colonial Brisbane. A field trip is planned for mid-April with a focus on night photography.
- The Shed Speaker program is confirmed through to July.
- The Social Program for the next few months has been mapped out. Trips to the Brisbane Car Museum, and Samford Men's Shed are on the agenda, and a Wine and Cheese night is being organised.
- Funding has been sought through the National Shed Development program for a new electric BBQ
- An approach has been made to the Brisbane City Council for approval to install new lighting system in the Green Shed.
- An application for Deductable Gift Recipient (DGR) status has been submitted to the Taxation Office. To accompany this application revisions to the Shed Constitution will need to be approved at a Special General Meeting.
- Ralph Dowling's position as Safety Officer was confirmed.

• Equipment priorities were identified and approvals to purchase items for the maintenance of the planer, thicknesser and drum sander were ratified.

The major discussion related to managing the refurbishment of the Green Shed. Detail planning of the layout of the equipment in the shed, the positioning of lighting and arrangements for installation of ducting were reported. The week of 5-9th May as accepted as a critical period for rearranging equipment and a call-out for volunteers will be necessary. The Shed will be closed for work during that week. Parking on site will not be available.

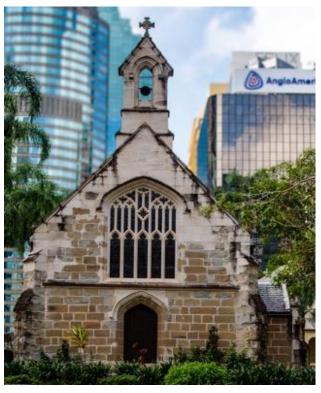

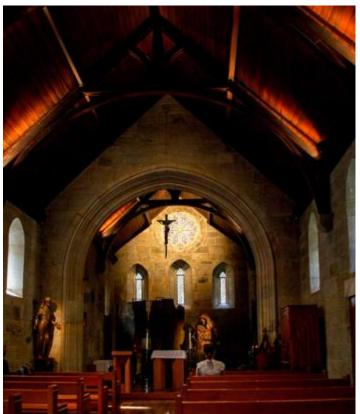

St Stephen's Chapel in Elizabeth
Street is of historical significance in
so far as its architect was Augustus
Welby Northmore Pugin. Pugin is
significant because he was the
technical designer of the Palace of
Westminster, that is the UK
Parliament building, and a champion
of gothic revival architecture. This
photo taken by Jim Watters creates a
tension between the earthy materials
of the chapel against the glass clad
modern buildings in the background
with their curved and straight lines,
even seen through the bell tower.



The interior of St Stephen's Chapel. The apse space contains the magnificent diocesan shrine of Mary MacKillop that has been created from the trunk of a camphor laurel tree.



Queensland Club on the corner of George and Alice Streets Brisbane is a neoclassical building built between 1882 and 1884. Russ Hawksford took this photo. The lighting contrast between the Alice St side facing the sun and the verandahs in the shade is eye catching.

Wood Turning Interest Group

Twenty-five members have registered their interest to be involved in the Shed West, Wood Turning Interest Group and their first activity is to begin the craft of "spindle turning". Spindle turning places the grain of the wood parallel with the axis of the lathe for turning. A simple example is in the making of a file handle or balustrading. At a later stage we will move on to bowl turning, which is in an orientation of "face grain", defined as the grain mounted in the lathe chuck at right angles to the lathe axis.

Shed West has only three lathes and so getting to the point of turning wood into chips and dust is a matter of waiting ones turn for a lathe to become vacant.



Shed West is in the process of upgrading the workshop and facilities and we are pleased to report that the wood turning group have scored new drawers for the gouges and chisels. You can see from the photograph that we have sorted the tools and labelled the drawers for easy identification. In the coming months the foot print of the workshop will be redesigned and all the machines will be connected to an efficient dust extraction system, which will include the lathes.

We look forward to showing you some of the skilful creations produced by our members.

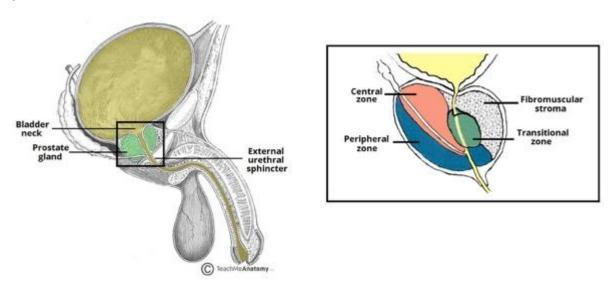

Tuesday 1 April 2025, Presentation by Dr David Cowley

Topic – Prostate gland, Cancer diagnosis and treatment, Incontinence, Exercises for regaining bladder control

David Cowley is a physiotherapist with extensive clinical experience treating men with incontinence following prostate surgery. David conducted original research in the field of prostate cancer and incontinence to be awarded a PhD qualification by The University of Queensland. David is currently studying to become a medical doctor and continues to research and support men with prostatic cancer and incontinence.

David gave a very informative talk and presented below is a summary written by the editor for the benefit of Shed West members who were not present. I trust my notes are reasonably accurate because this topic is really important for men at any age. Prostatic health and incontinence is complex and David's talk was an overview. Talk to your GP if you have concerns.



The prostate gland is the size of a walnut. It sits below the bladder and encases the urethra between the bladder neck and the external urethral sphincter. As a gland its job is to provide fluid to nourish ejaculated semen. The prostate has four zones that contain cells of different types. The Peripheral zone is where most, >75% of prostate cancers (mainly adenocarcinomas) arise. The Transitional zone incurs 20 of cancers and the Central zone 5%. Note that prostate cancers are often multifocal (2 or more areas of cancer arising from a single original tumour). The Transition zone is a zone of high cell turnover so tumour development here will impact the urethra because this zone wraps around it. Tumour growth occludes the urethra, reducing urine flow.

Prostate cancer is estimated to be the most commonly diagnosed cancer for males and for Australia overall. 26,400 cases were diagnosed in 2024. The overall prostate cancer 5 year survival rate is around 96% and drops to 36% for men whose cancer is advanced when detected. Predisposing factors for prostate cancer are 1. Age; 2. Family history; 3. Race; 4. Genetics.

A PSA blood test (Prostate Specific Antigen) is the standard test to determine potential prostate abnormality. An increased PSA value may be due to prostate infection (prostatitis), cancer, enlarged prostate (benign prostatic hyperplasia), urinary infection, or even recent vigorous exercise or ejaculation. Further evaluation by a urologist will likely be recommended by a GP. Most urologists will perform a Digital rectal examination to palpate the prostate to determine irregularity. The prostate's Peripheral zone mentioned earlier lies against the (anterior) wall of the rectum and as this is often a tumour site palpation can provide evidence that this zone is enlarged.

A urologist may order an MRI (Magnetic resonance imaging) to show tissue features in cross section layers of the prostate. The results of the MRI are expressed as a PI RADS score from 1 to 5 which is a standardized scoring system used to interpret prostate MRI scans and assess the likelihood of clinically significant prostate cancer. The MRI will be used by the urologist to determine if biopsy of the prostate tissue is required and where the biopsy sites need to be. Under general anaesthesia a trans-perineal biopsy of the prostate will be undertaken to collect many samples of tissue by hollow needles inserted into the prostate gland using a rectilinear grid and guided by ultrasound imaging via an anal probe. The biopsy samples provide a pathologist with a Gleason's Pattern of the make-up of cells / distribution of cancer cells and from this is determined a Gleason score indicative of the likelihood of a tumour at sample sites. The urologist may order a PET scan (Positron Emission Tomography) to reveal atypical metabolic activity in the body indicative of metastases that have spread from the prostate original tumour.

The stage of the cancer will determine the treatment that is best suited. If there is a low risk of harm Active Surveillance may be offered, requiring regular testing to check for any changes to the cancer. If the cancer changes further treatment may need treatment. High risk cancer stages require surgical and/or radiation treatment. In Australia Robotic Assisted Radical Prostatectomy is performed to reduce collateral tissue damage and improve post-surgical outcome for the patient. 43,000 procedures are performed in Australia each year and the recent analysis (Fifteen-Year Outcomes after Monitoring, Surgery, or Radiotherapy for Prostate Cancer, Handy et al, N Eng J Med 2023) indicates a 97% survival rate at 15 years post-surgery.

Incontinence is a major post-operative condition of prostatectomy. In a normal male pelvis bladder content control is maintained by the pressure in the urethra > pressure in the bladder. Urethral pressure is provided by four factors: 1. Smooth muscle located around the urethra. (Smooth muscle's normal state is tireless contraction.) 2. The Puborectalis muscle, 3. The Bulbocavernosus muscle, 4. The Striated Urethral Sphincter. The smooth muscle is removed with the prostate and the orientation of the

bladder is changed because it is pulled down to reconnect the urethra remaining below where the prostate was excised. These factors cause urine leakage post-operatively.

Pre-surgical exercises to learn how to control the muscles 2, 3 and 4 can greatly assist reduction in urine leakage. David demonstrated how these muscles can be innervated by conscious thought. The following slide may assist all men to improve control of these muscles for improved pelvic floor function as we age.

Post-prostatectomy incontinence - e.g., exercise program - and DEMO • Technique: 20 pulses - imagine gently, but quickly pulling your penis in and relaxing 20 times • Speed: Try to contract 10 times in 10 seconds, ensure you are releasing adequately between each rep • Endurance: Try to increase the intensity of your contraction up to 100% over 3-5 seconds; repeat 5x • Strength: Try to contract before you cough

David's take home message:

- Prostate cancer is common in Australian males
- Although often slow growing, is still a leading cause of cancer related death
- Diagnosis: PSA blod test → MRI → biopsy → PET-CT scan
- If localised prostate cancer radical prostatectomy or radiotherapy options for treatment but both can lead to incontinence:
 - Prostatectomy (high lilelihood of incontinence short term; low likelihood long term)
 - Radiotherapy (very low likelihood of incontinence short term, moderate likelihood medium term)
- Pelvic floor muscle training is a rehabilitation technique for improving continence.
- Pelvic floor muscle training should target technique, speed, endurance and strength of 3 muscles:
 - o Striated urethral sphincter (which you can feel at the base of the penis)
 - Bulbocavernosus (which you can feel between your penis and your testes)
 - o Puborectalis (which you can feel wrapping around your anus and rectum
- Performing these exercises bfore treartment helps lower the risk of incontinence afterwards

• Undergoing transperineal ultrasound assessment with your physiotherapist will allow you to assess how effectively you are using these muscles.

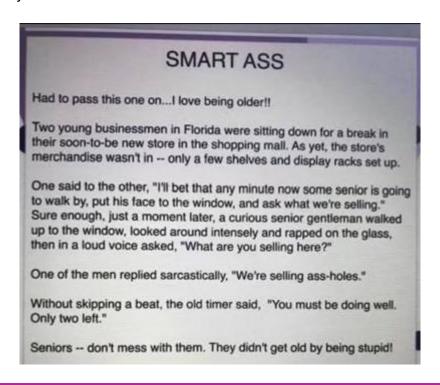

A Shed Supervisor, through negotiation, is assigned to a designated day to oversee all operations conducted within and enforce all duties listed below. An Assistant Supervisor is also designated on each day. *Either* of these two must be in attendance on their designated day.

- In the event that the designated supervisor is unable to attend, it falls on him to request that the Assistant Supervisor cover his duties,
- . Should the Assistant be unavailable then other Supervisors may be approached to cover his duties,
- If the designated supervisor needs to depart mid-session and the Assistant Supervisor is not in attendance, then a senior experienced and qualified member may be asked to assume the responsibilities of the Supervisor,
- In the event there are no designated, nor ordained Supervisors in attendance then the Shed must cease operations and close.

The responsibilities of the Supervisor include;

- · Ensuring members entering the Shed are wearing sturdy enclosed shoes.
- Prompting members to wear their name tag, sign in to the Shed and pay the attendance fee. Members must also remember to sign out so as to validate insurance cover.
- Making sure members using machinery have access to the required personal protection equipment (safety glasses, ear muffs, dust masks, etc).
- Ensuring members using machinery have been cleared to use the machinery by a mentor, are wearing a name tag
 that indicates that they can use the machine (i.e., have appropriate green dots on their name tags) and are using
 machinery in a safe manner.
- Ensuring members clean the workbenches or equipment they have been using as soon as they have finished their task
- . Ensuring members return tools and/or equipment they have used to their appropriate storage place.
- · Checking vacuum cleaners, dust extractors and filters are emptied and cleaned.
- Making sure the Shed is left in a clean and tidy condition at the end of the work session and ensuring the Shed and all other buildings are securely locked. All work should cease by 11.30 allowing time for cleaning up and sterilising all items used. Where possible the supervisor is to blow out the shed.
- All new members will receive a welcome pack detailing the operations of the Shed as well as the QMSA and the AMSA. It also outlines that all members will undertake the Safety Induction program despite not wishing to attend workshop activities.
- The Shed Safety Officer or his delegate will require that a member acting dangerously immediately begin observing
 safe practices. If the Safety Officer's (or delegate's) instructions are disobeyed, then he may ask the offending
 member to cease his activity and leave the premises forthwith. This person's right to work in the Shed workshop will
 be suspended until it is reviewed by the Management Committee.

NB. All items donated to the Shed will be scrutinized by the duty supervisor to determine what remains as Shed property and what may be allocated to wanting members.
