

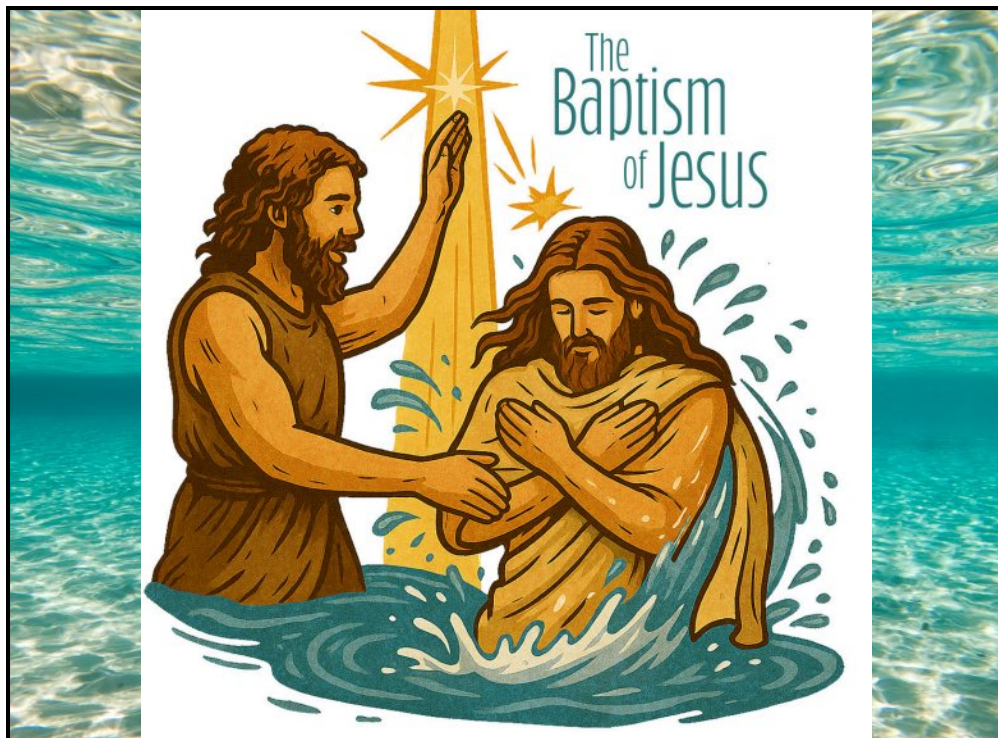

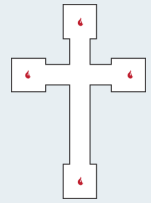

BAPTISM OF THE LORD

Weekly Reflection by Fr. Michael



Today we celebrate the Baptism of the Lord. In some ways this is a bit of a misplaced feast day. During the Christmas season we focus on the infancy stories of Jesus as a newborn child. Most of us associate a baptism with a newborn child. And so, a decision was made this would be a good place and time to celebrate the baptism of Jesus. However, Jesus was not baptized by John until somewhere around the age of thirty. It was the first major step of the beginning of his public ministry. Immediately after his baptism, he went into the desert for forty days and then began his public work. It seems a more logical place for this celebration would be just prior to Ash Wednesday.

However it was decided, this is our celebration of the day which is the final story of the Christmas season. There is an element of baptism of which we need to be reminded. It is meant to be a defining moment in life. That certainly is what happened to Jesus. Aside from one account of Jesus being separated from his parents around the age of twelve, we have no stories of the early part of his life. Presumably, he lived a somewhat ordinary life. However, at his baptism something significant happened. We hear about the heavens opening, the Spirit descending like a dove, and a voice from the heavens proclaiming Jesus as God's "beloved Son." It was a defining event in his life. From this moment he left for a long period of temptation, prayer, and fasting. Upon return, he began his public ministry.

There are good reasons for us to commonly celebrate infant baptism. But the elements of a dramatic or life-defining moment are lost when you are dealing with a newborn child. We need to remind ourselves what it means to be baptized in the Lord. As with Jesus, it is a moment for us to understand that we too are beloved children in the eyes of God. But once this relationship is understood, we are meant to be empowered to carry on the Lord's work in a significant way. It is not meant to simply be a nice little ceremony that happens once in life. Taking water from the baptism font to make the sign of the cross is a tradition that most Catholics practice. Again, it is not meant to be just some little blessing but rather a renewed desire to understand our kinship with the Lord and to diligently serve him in our lives. We pray that this celebration may renew in us our desire and commitment to be faithful disciples. We are united in being called to share in God's work.

The 11:30 Mass this week will be particularly joyful and energetic as we invite back all of the families who have had a baptism here at Holy Cross in the past year. It is always heartwarming to see mom and dad holding their little bundle of joy as they come forward for a special blessing. The babies are precious to see, but beyond that it is a true inspiration for all of us that the gift of faith is being passed on. We are grateful that many continue to seek Holy Cross as their spiritual home. May we strive to be a place where the power of the gospel is proclaimed and lived.

This week we dismantle all the Christmas decorations. Why is it a happy undertaking to put them up and a tedious chore to take them down?

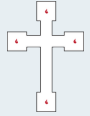

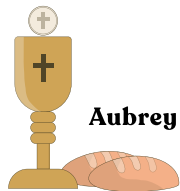

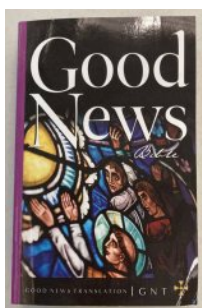

Practice of Charity

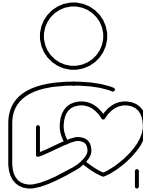
(Excerpt from "At Home with the Word 2026")

This week Psalm 29:2 urges us: "Give the Lord the glory due His name." The *Catechism of the Catholic Church* teaches us, "Praise is the form of prayer which recognizes most immediately that God is God. It lauds God for His own sake and gives Him glory, quite beyond what He does, but simply because He is" (CCC, 2639). Praise does not ask anything from God. It is a pure gift of your heart to the God who made you. Take time this week to practice the prayer of praise through different forms of prayer.

Adoration: Sit before the tabernacle and praise Jesus and His holy name.

Praise at Mass: Sing the "Holy, Holy, Holy" with all your heart this week.

Music: Listen quietly to a song of praise and sing this as a love song to God with the voice of your heart.

Practicing Small Acts of Kindness

Frederic Ozanam (1813–1853) was a Catholic layman in France. In 1832 an epidemic of cholera swept through Paris, killing up to 1,200 people each day.

As Frederic walked through the poorer suburbs on his way to the university where he was a student, he was deeply moved at the hopeless state of families who had lost fathers and mothers. He and his six friends decided to see what they could do. They began by giving a widow the remainder of their winter wood supply.

Frederic and his friends continued their work, and soon they were helping the less-fortunate people of Paris in many ways. Some people scoffed and asked, "How can seven men make a difference?" But they did. Eventually they formed an association and called it the Society of St. Vincent de Paul. The society they began has today some 107,000 members in the United States and 1,000,000 worldwide in 130 countries, providing aid in the form of medical supplies, food for the poor, counseling and education programs, and other services.

As Christians, we are called to care for one another and for the world God created through small acts that are part of our daily lifestyle. We don't have to look very far to find where we're needed; if we pay attention, the opportunities are usually right under our noses, in our own families, schools, parishes, and neighborhoods. As Mother Teresa once said, "We can do no great things—only small things with great love."

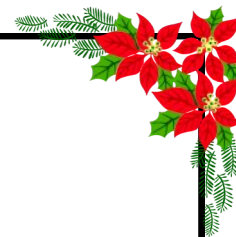

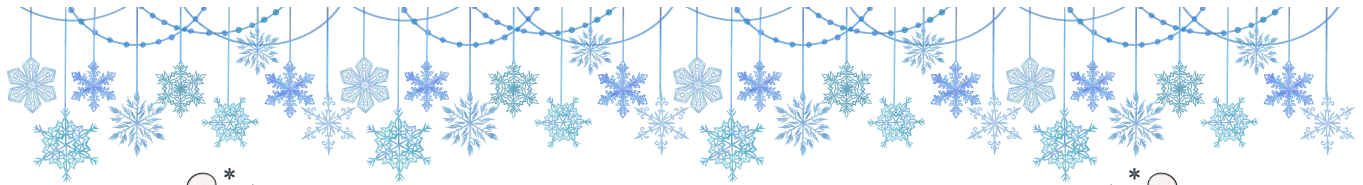
10 Tips for Better Family Mealtimes

1. Commit to a set time for meals (daily, weekly, or according to your schedule).
2. Turn off the TV, computers, and handheld games, and don't answer the phone. Don't flip through your mail.
3. Use prayer to mark the transition from busyness to mealtime. Be mindful of those who don't have enough to eat today.
4. Slow down enough to taste and enjoy your food.
5. Hold one conversation at a time. Everyone gets a chance to speak. You can disagree, but you can't be unkind about it.
6. Encourage laughter.
7. Practice manners, such as saying please and thank you and asking politely for people to pass the salt, and so on. Everyone stays at the table until they're excused to leave.
8. Give everyone a role in preparing or cleaning up. Even small children can help set the table or put napkins in place.
9. Regularly invite guests to your table. Welcome them as you would welcome Jesus. Treat your family members the same way.
10. Always end with a quick expression of gratitude to God and thanks to the cook!

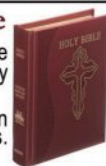

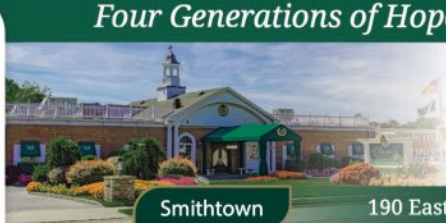
