LAETARE SUNDAY

This is the fourth Sunday of Lent, which is traditionally called Laetare Sunday. The word means joyful or hopeful. It is meant to be a change in the tone of the Lenten season, which normally focuses on sacrifice and repentance. This is one of the two days during the year when the Church calls for pink or rose colored vestments, although purple may still be used. As this color is used infrequently, many parishes do not have vestments in this color. Up to this time, Holy Cross has never had rose colored vestments. However, this year that has changed. Many of us fondly remember Liz Shea who worked in our Religious Education Office for years as well as served as our Business Manager. Liz passed away in December, 2020. Her siblings asked if there was anything the parish needed in terms of celebrating the liturgy. It was suggested that we could use rose colored vestments, and they thought that was a great idea. The beautiful vestments Deacon Ralph and I are wearing this weekend were a gift from her family. We are most grateful for their generosity, and we will lovingly remember Liz whenever they are used.

The second weekend of March last year is when everything began to dramatically change. By that time, Mass attendance was starting to decline. On March 15, I asked Vincent Matula to sit in the front row to live stream the 11:30 Mass. I thought we might need to do that "for a few weeks." Little did I realize, that was the birth of "HCTV." Who would have known we were beginning to enter what will probably be one of the greatest challenges of our life? All of us suddenly had to adapt to new ways of life: public Masses cancelled, working from home, virtual classrooms, masks, quarantines, etc. Gratefully, it looks like the worst is behind us. I think all of us have come to appreciate life, loved ones, and ordinary activities more than ever before. There are many who still carry painful scars from all that has happened in these past months. I pray that this Easter will be a time for celebrating new life in a way we have never quite experienced.

We received guidelines from the Diocese for celebrating Holy Week this year. The good news is we will be able to have Holy Week. Palms will be distributed on Palm Sunday, and many of the traditional practices of Holy Week will take place. There will be some changes, such as not washing feet on Holy Thursday, but all things considered, we are in a much better place. More detailed information will be forthcoming. For those on our mailing list, you should have received a schedule of Holy Week celebrations in this week's mail. Have a blessed week.

REFLECTION FROM A PARISHIONER

I Give My Life Away (Week 4)

Last year at this time, I was faithfully attending Sunday Mass and happily teaching my literature courses at St. Joseph's College. Then in an instant everything changed. The first feeling was one of anger, of loss, of isolation, a real sense of crisis; cut off from the Church on a sacramental level was difficult: not being able to attend Mass, not receiving the Eucharist, no Sacrament of Reconciliation. To a certain extent, I felt my lifeline with the Divine was put on hold or, at least, deactivated. But then, in the midst of that seeming absence, I remembered something Fulton Sheen once said towards the end of his life, "Christendom is over, but not Christ." The Sacramental Christ might be temporarily suspended, but my relationship with him definitely was not. In fact, as I moved past fear and insecurity, I realized and remembered that Yes, Christ moves through the sacraments but beyond them as well, if he so chooses, and if necessity dictates. I remember a parish priest once telling me during a time of crisis to "Give Jesus some common sense, please."

And then I began to experience other ways of encountering Christ, for in the words of Gerard Manley Hopkins, "Christ plays in ten thousand places," and realizing that whatever I previously took for granted as always being there, took on a deeper, greater dimension. Christ, literally, had to walk with me, by me, alongside me, step by step, through loss, fear, and discouragement, and that's where consolation came in, knowing that the Divine Mercy is not only something that comforts and consoles during times of prosperity and peace but, even more importantly, during moments of desolation and despondency.

Yes, I was experiencing my own *Dark Night of the Soul*, but Christ was in it with me.

Dietrich Bonhoeffer affirmed that we must "stand side by side with Jesus our unseen Brother, bearing like him the image of God." And once I recognized that Christ was keeping stride with me or me with him, I understood that my faith, my Catholicity, my belief hadn't really disappeared but took on a different life, a new life, and that I couldn't put myself on pause waiting for the old life to begin again but had to live out the new life now, in the midst of potential death and darkness. And in some strange way, fear became a bit less present, and the unknown a little less formidable.



I recalled that striking and haunting image of Pope Francis invoking Christ's Mercy in a darkening and empty St. Peter's Square, reminding us from the Gospel of Mark of Christ asleep in a boat during a storm, his apostles crying out, "Teacher, do you not care that we are perishing?" And Jesus, waking up, rebuking the wind and stilling the sea, and reprimanding them with a "Why are you afraid? Have you still no faith?" That image served as a potent reminder for me that Yes, through the storm, amid the cataclysm, it does seem that, at times, Christ is asleep in the boat, but isn't it good enough just to know that at least He's in there with you?

SOMETHING DIFFERENT FOR LENT

As the journey through Lent continues, with its traditional practices of prayer, fasting, and alms-giving, the need for prayer seems uppermost in many people's hearts. In the midst of these uncertain times, it is natural to turn to God as our source of strength and solace. Prayer is our way to communicate with God, but prayer does not always come easy. In childhood we learned how to say our prayers, but it can take a lifetime to understand prayer itself.

Everyone's experience of prayer is unique. How do we pray? Do we recite formal prayers? Do we speak to God in our own words? Are we honest with God? Do we do all the talking, or do we allow quiet for God to respond? Do we wonder if God even hears us?

... do not be anxious about anything, but in everything **by prayer** and supplication with thanksgiving let **your requests** be made known to God. Philippians 4:6

Do we think we're not doing it right? Does our prayer make a difference in our lives? As we try to be faithful to our prayer life, questions like these may arise. And Spiritual Direction could be a good place to turn.

Spiritual Direction is a ministry in which a person (the *directee*) seeks help from a trained spiritual director in becoming more aware of how God is active in the person's prayer and in the person's life. Anyone who prays can benefit from Spiritual Direction.

In meeting with a spiritual director, directees share what is going on in their life, what God is like for them, and what happens when they pray. The director listens attentively, asks clarifying questions, affirms the directee's experience, and helps the directee recognize where God already is.

"Director" is a bit of a misnomer. A spiritual director listens and notices, and helps the directee to listen and notice. The director leads the session, but God is the *real* director, the guide in a holy conversation.

As a child, I learned that prayer is "talking and listening to God." I've grown to appreciate these definitions even more: Prayer is "a long, loving look at the real" (Fr. Walter Burkhardt, SJ), and prayer is "conscious conversation with God" (Fr. James Martin, SJ). Whatever our definition, this is key: God desires to be in relationship with each one of us, and prayer is essential to that relationship. God's invitation to prayer is extended to us every day. All we need to do is accept.

If you struggle to pray, if your prayer is a bit stale, if you have questions or doubts, if you want to deepen your relationship with God and others, why not give Spiritual Direction a try? We are halfway through Lent. It's not too late to change things up a bit. If you're interested, or want to know more, please give me a call at ext. 116. Spiritual Direction continues to be a great blessing in my life. I pray that many of you will come to know that gift.

LITURGY BYTES

Laetare Sunday

If anyone is weary by what they are doing or not doing for Lent, please rejoice TODAY because Easter is on its way! This weekend is the 4th Sunday of Lent! Today we notice the vestments are not purple but rose colored. Let us find joy in the Eucharist as we rejoice in the salvation that the Lord is giving us as we continue through this Lent of 2021.

More and more, the statement "silence is golden and sacred" is taking on a special meaning to me. This week I have been attempting to practice more silent moments each day by turning off the car radio, watching less TV at bedtime, and praying in the quiet when I awake each day. You are probably thinking, what does silence have to do with Liturgy??

What deserves our attention is becoming well versed in times of sacred silence when we gather for Mass each week. All of us are in a world that bombards us with a variety of smartphone alerts, news, and bright, flashing banners demanding our attention and reaction. Frequently, the only "downtime" for us is when the power goes out or our phone battery dies! At Mass, we need to practice more of those silent moments. In fact, since the beginning of Lent, you might have noticed that when we hear the Recessional or final hymn at Mass, the priest remains up in the front until it is concluded and processes out in silence. We need to model that posture, soak in the quiet, and leave the Worship space quietly at least to the front door. There are other moments in Mass when silence is observed, even for a minute or so, giving us a chance to think about what we heard. The more we embrace these moments, the more we will realize the gift of sacred silence. Perhaps you will give it a try to carry over some silent moments into your daily routines this week. Silence is an opportunity to stop and listen, and just observe and listen. Contemplate in our hearts what it is that God is speaking to us and how it is we will choose to respond to a loving God. Remember, "practice makes perfect!"

Vegetarian Kale Soup

Ingredients

tablespoon olive oil
 yellow onion, chopped
 tablespoons chopped garlic
 bunch Kale, stems removed and leaves chopped
 cups water
 vegetable bouillon (such as Knorr)
 (15 ounce) can diced tomatoes
 white potatoes, peeled and cubed
 (15 ounce) can of cannellini beans (drained if desired)
 tablespoons dried parsley
 Salt and pepper to taste



Heat the olive oil in a large soup pot; cook the onions and garlic until soft. Stir in the kale and cook until wilted, about 2 minutes. Stir in the water, vegetable bouillon, tomatoes, potatoes, beans, Italian seasoning and parsley. Simmer soup on medium heat for 25 minutes or until potatoes are cooked through. Season with salt and pepper to taste.

WHAT'S NEW? Spring Cash Fling

For many years the Cash Calendar was a part of the Holy Cross routine. This fundraiser provided some additional financial support to the parish. In addition, many parishioners enjoyed participating in it. Unfortunately, it was one of the many parts of parish life that was lost to Covid. At this time, it is unlikely that we have enough parishioners attending Mass on a weekly basis to support a monthly drawing.
