The Universality of These Days

On any given Sunday, a little less than a thousand people will come to Mass at Holy Cross. These individuals carry in their hearts the issues of their lives. There may be concern for someone in the family who is sick. There might be reason to celebrate or give thanks such as a wedding, anniversary, or the birth of a grandchild. Or, life may be quite manageable and under control for the moment. Each person will have a different set of concerns, prayers, worries, and joys. We come together and share in the common prayer of the Mass, and then we go our separate ways.

These days are unique beyond measure. The coronavirus has created a common experience like nothing else we have ever experienced. It has transcended every distinction of life: nationality, economic status, political philosophy, age, etc. Like never before, we are all sharing in a common story and common ground. Sadly, this union is a frightening one. It brings with it many levels of suffering.

There is an opportunity to look at this crisis from a different perspective beyond the pain and sorrow. First, we can recognize and affirm the great human spirit which has arisen. Countless ordinary people are doing heroic work. But, there is a level that goes even far beyond that. We need to look at this from the level of faith. We need to see this as an unprecedented revelation of Christ.

Never before have so many people shared in a common experience of the cross. The scope and depth of suffering goes beyond anyone's individual life. We have seen beyond the shadow of a doubt that a virus has the ability to transcend all boundaries, touch every individual, and allow us to experience life in a different way. Can we be open to the possibility of the presence of Christ to do the same? Our Savior can do more to build life, than any illness can do to destroy life. These days have prompted all of us to look at life differently. Part of that new vision must be the power and grace of the Risen Lord.

This pandemic has created fear, anxiety, worry and even death. I don't think for one moment that God inflicted this pandemic upon us. But, I do think His presence and life is woven into every moment of it. It was the power of Christ that fed a multitude, calmed stormy seas, and raised Lazarus from the dead. This is our moment to know the strength of the Lord as we have never known. He has unmistakably crashed into our lives. Let us embrace Him and know His love. In the midst of this great absurdity and paradox, we thoughtfully and profoundly proclaim... Happy Easter! Alleluia!

A REFLECTION FOR EASTER



In the Gospel of John (3:16), we read, "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life." God so loved the world ... do we truly comprehend what that means? God's love for each one of us is so deep, so extravagant that God freely chose to take on human life, experiencing all (except sin) that it means to be human,

showing us how to live while enduring rejection, pain, and ultimately, death. But death for Jesus, we remember, is not a defeat. When seen through Easter eyes, the cross becomes a sign of hope, a sign of love, a sign of victory. Through the loving act of Jesus, light triumphs over darkness, good triumphs over evil, life triumphs over death. Not just for him, but for us.

For many, the joy of this Easter is tempered by the uncertainty and fear with which we are living. Now, more than ever, we need to embrace the Paschal Mystery and live as Easter people, knowing that God is with us and will bring us through our long Good Friday to a glorious and joyful resurrection.

Fr. Pedro Arrupe, SJ, the Superior General of the Jesuits for many years, suffered a debilitating stroke. Shortly before he died, he wrote a prayer which ends with the line, "It is indeed a profound spiritual experience to know and feel myself so totally in God's hands." The challenge now for all of us is to place ourselves totally in God's hands, trusting that all will be well, and all will be well, all manner of things will be well.

Hold on to love, everyone. Amen. Alleluia!

LITURGY BYTES

Triduum – Season or not?

Even though our Triduum celebrations (Holy Thursday, Good Friday and the Vigil) and even Easter have taken on a very different appearance this year, I can't help thinking about one of my favorite Scripture stories – the Road to Emmaus (Luke 24:13-35) when thinking about the Triduum (a/k/a my favorite time of the year). Yes, it is a separate season and actually one liturgy broken up into parts making it separate and distinct from the



Lenten and Easter seasons. Even though these moments this year have taken on a different experience for us, we will still embrace their importance in perhaps a spiritual way, because we are unable to be there in person. Last week, as I was walking outside to get fresh air, I starting thinking about these precious days ahead that have always deeply impacted my love for liturgy. For some reason, my mind wandered to one of my favorite Scripture passages – the Road to Emmaus (Luke 24:13-35).

I started thinking... Why didn't the two disciples recognize Jesus as they walked together while telling him all that had occurred: the Passover meal/Last Supper, the road to Calvary/Crucifixion and the Resurrection? Would I have recognized Him if I were there? Without coming to an answer, I fast forwarded to the present-day events and started making the following connections.

I thought about what we have been living with these past weeks and became overwhelmed as to what we have seen: the humble gesture of washing feet over and over within our own homes, and certainly in all of our medical facilities and beyond; we see meals being shared so all may be nourished, in a variety of ways the offering of "take and eat" rings out; we see suffering and even death (some very close to us), difficult and tragic as it is, we realize life isn't lost but changed, and we are able to realize that our Alleluia moment is coming. Just as the disciples on the road grew jubilant as they recognized HIM in the breaking of the bread, we, too, soon (I pray) will be filled with many Resurrection moments as we recognize and realize He has been with us all along on this "road," here with us as we journey around each day in our homes and through our neighborhoods. We have truly lived the Paschal mystery of dying and rising with Christ Jesus. Onto the great 50 days of Easter, new growth, new life and the gift of receiving the body and blood of Jesus in the Eucharist. Keep the journey going, share the Good News; we need to do this for one another!
