

PICK AN EMOTION, ANY EMOTION...

I don't know about you, but on any given day there are reasons to experience pretty much any emotion under the sun (which may also include a storm cloud or two).

- When I watch the news, I get fearful.
- There are times when the new daily routines are just tiresome and lifeless.
- I'm grateful for the delightful summer days along with beautiful sunsets.
- If I go back to the news to try to calm my fears, I get angry.
- I take comfort when I feel my Mom cheering me on.
- When I realize how time is slipping by, I get sad.
- There are moments in ministry that are uplifting. For example, we are starting to plan for Confirmation in the fall and we have some creative ideas, which is energizing.
- When I think about the sacrifices and hardships that some folks are facing, it is heartbreaking.
- There is only so much tidying up around the house I can do.
- Phone calls and texts from friends are like bursts of sunshine.
- I'm exhausted.
- I'm having profound moments of peace and serenity in my prayer.

In short, it is an emotional whirlwind. I know I am not alone in feeling this.

I don't think any of us ever envisioned life would include what we are all dealing with. While I don't believe God is imposing this on us for any reason, I do believe he is offering insight into his grace. As much as we long for the way things were, we need to be open to embrace the things that are.

I recently read that the power of God's transformation is not so much found in dealing with something new. The real power is found in letting go of that which is old. I don't pretend for one moment to be delighting in this insight or living it well, but I do believe there is truth in it. While "former ways" can be safe and comforting, it is in newness of life that the Spirit most profoundly abounds. When we hear thoughts like this, we might conclude that they are geared towards saintly people who are spiritual superstars. Life is unmistakably saying, "No, we are all in this together." We need to be patient with ourselves as we grapple with everything. We need to be patient with one another who are each dealing with this in his or her own way. But beyond all of that, we need to trust in a loving and caring God who will lead us precisely where we need to be. We have to allow the emotional roller coaster we all experience to be part of an epic spiritual journey. That is where we will find our God. That is where we will find our peace.

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

Welcome to Holy Cross Religious Education

The Religious Education Office is planning ahead to the 2020-2021 Formation Year. We need your help so that we can adequately plan to meet the needs of our parish. If you have a child entering **First Grade in September you need to register**. If you have recently moved to our parish you need to register in the parish. Due to Covid-19, our program will be a mix of online and “home based” learning, depending on CDC guidelines. Please contact our office for more specific information.

- Religious Education classes will begin the week of October 19th, 2020.
- First time registration can be done online at www.pothc.org . Go to forms.
- Registration needs to be completed by August 15, 2020.
- Summer Office Hours: Monday – Friday 9:00-12:00 & 1:00-2:30
- If your child was not baptized at Holy Cross you need to send us a copy of your child’s Baptism Certificate. Please email it to hcreled@optonline.net .
- For those who are already part of our program, you need to re-register for the upcoming year. Please note that textbooks will not be distributed to your child without a registration form.

A detailed outline of our program is available online or at our office. However, there are a few important details to be noted.

- Children must successfully complete each grade level to proceed to the next.
- The Sacraments of Reconciliation, Eucharist, and Confirmation require a minimum of two years of preparation.

Most importantly, we need to work together. Faithful attendance at classes and parent workshops is essential. As comprehensive and informative as our program is, this is only one part of your child’s faith formation. The greatest thing you can do to nurture your faith and the faith of your child is to regularly be part of our Sunday Eucharist - whether in person or viewing our 11:30 AM live streamed Mass.



The Catechism of the Church states that parents have the first responsibility for the education of their children. We are privileged to work with you in this task. We thank you for your cooperation in allowing us to be part of your lives. We look forward to a fruitful year where everyone, young and old, continues to grow in understanding the gift of our faith.



LITURGY BYTES—Confirmation



The Sacrament of Confirmation is sometimes, unfortunately, referred to as the Sacrament of Graduation. It seems to mark the end of something in some people's eyes. You will notice in our weekly Sacrament reflections, I have chosen Confirmation to follow Baptism. Probably for most folks, Confirmation was received later on after we received First Holy Communion.

Over the years, depending on where you lived or what parish you were part of, Confirmation might have been received in 5th, 6th or 7th grade or even later on when reaching high school. You might ask, why such a variety of ages? This Sacrament has gone through many stages of study as to when is the appropriate time. The understanding of this Sacrament has also rotated from a Sacrament of maturity back to the completion of one's Baptism. For some of us, we might recall learning that Confirmation made us soldiers in Christ's army, or receiving Confirmation made us adults in the Church!

Another perspective about receiving Confirmation occurs for adults becoming Catholic through the RCIA process. These adults are baptized, confirmed, and receive Eucharist at the same time through the beautiful experience of the Easter Vigil. Notice that within the Liturgy, Confirmation occurs after they are baptized.

The connection to Baptism is most important because in the early days of the Church, Confirmation was not a Sacrament. When the numbers grew among those wishing to join the Church, the Bishops could not handle all the celebrations. The second anointing done at that time in Baptism was then **reserved for another time later** when the Bishop was available to get around to all the Churches.

The order of presbyters (priests) was established to serve the local Churches and

administer the Sacraments. Confirmation was then established as a separate Sacrament to be conferred by the Bishop. The Bishop was “**confirming**” what was already done at Baptism. Hence, we can see the connection between these two Sacraments. The Holy Spirit comes to the baptized and comes again in a different way at the time of Confirmation. Candidates for Confirmation re-affirm the promises made at Baptism and are anointed with the Sacred Chrism. Some choose to add a name or re-affirm the name given at the time of Baptism. They have now entered into a new and different relationship with the Lord. Because they are considered fully initiated Catholics, they may be sponsors or godparents for others, a privileged moment for many of us.

On the feast of Pentecost every year, adults who never received Confirmation as a young person are confirmed. People of all ages, who were baptized and received First Communion, are invited to complete their initiation. Usually during Lent, weekly classes are held for this group to refresh their knowledge and understanding of our Faith. Again, this wonderful celebration did not take place this year because of the pandemic. We look forward to next year and inviting those adults (over 18) who wish to receive Confirmation to contact us!

No matter the model, Confirmation does not mean the end of growth in faith. Reaching maturity and making a commitment to faith does not mean the end of a journey but the **beginning** of a new road to ever-maturing faith. Let us use our gifts to guide and encourage those who may not have completed their full initiation as a Catholic.


