BELATED LABOR DAY THOUGHTS

A phrase I have used numerous times over the past six months is “this _____ has been a _____ like no other.” I have filled in the blank with Lent, Holy Week, Easter, Pentecost, First Communion, summer, etc. I now add Labor Day to that list. I am writing this article on Labor Day itself. I am reflecting upon how the nature of many people’s jobs has changed significantly through this crisis.

Certainly the work of Health Care workers took on heroic dimensions during these days. Many folks who may have considered their work to be somewhat ordinary now found themselves with distinction as being “essential workers.” Transit employees, cashiers, sanitation workers suddenly found themselves working under very demanding conditions. For those in law enforcement, the work became even more difficult. The job description for many changed overnight; ask anyone involved in education. For many people, they had to adjust and turn their dining room tables into their new offices. Sadly, some people’s jobs vanished in a heartbeat and are not rushing back anytime soon. We look at our own work and the work of others in a different light because of all that has happened.

Allow me to once again express my gratitude to the Pastoral Team and Staff here at Holy Cross. Some parishes shut down various parts of their operations once the crisis hit. All aspects of our parish life continued even through the worst of the days; Religious Education, Parish Outreach, and even our office all continued to do what needed to be done. (There were some parts of parish life that we were prohibited from doing, like baptisms and public Masses). I am very proud of and grateful for the efforts and commitment of those who work here at Holy Cross. One of the reasons we were able to continue our work was because of the financial support of so many generous parishioners. In the midst of difficult times, blessings abounded.

The passing of life often leads us to places we never would have imagined nor would we have chosen on our own. When I was in the seminary, there was no training for ministering to the victims of terrorism (9/11) or how to maintain parish ministry via Facebook and the internet. How many parents of young children ever anticipated having to manage family life in the midst of a pandemic? But this moment in time has brought us to these new realities. Yes, there are reasons to complain and lament our situation. But there are also opportunities to trust and be embraced by our loving God like never before. We continue to journey together in the hope that we will walk with God who continues to bring us life.

WHAT IS RCIA?

The *Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA)* is the process by which adults are initiated into the Catholic Church.

WHO CAN PARTICIPATE?

RCIA is open to:

- all those who are unbaptized and express a desire to learn about the Catholic faith;
- all those who are baptized in another Christian denomination and wish to explore membership in the Catholic Church;
- Catholics who have been baptized but have not celebrated the Sacraments of Holy Eucharist and/or Confirmation.

WHAT CAN ONE EXPECT AT RCIA?

Individuals who go through the *RCIA* process can expect:

- to know themselves and God better,
- to be supported in prayer by the entire parish community, and
- to understand Catholic teachings and practices more clearly.

All that is required is a desire to grow and learn.

LITURGY BYTES

Our Beautiful Worship Space



COVID-19 has brought some new faces into our praying community, because of our live-streaming of weekday and Sunday 11:30 Masses. Some new faces are fairly local to this area of Long Island and others live farther away. Whatever the case, we welcome each of you and are happy you have joined us for the most beautiful prayer of the Mass.

Some folks have asked about our unique church, or worship area, as we call it, so I would like to give you a little history. St. Joseph's Church in Ronkonkoma, a/k/a "the Mother Church of the Ronkonkomas," was one of the largest parishes in the Diocese of Rockville Centre, serving at one point 16,000 families. The diocese sought to establish smaller faith communities in this growing area of Suffolk County, and so in 1988, three new parishes were established: Holy Cross, Nesconset; St. Elizabeth Ann Seton, Lake Ronkonkoma; and Resurrection, Farmingville. Even with these three new parishes, St. Joseph's has still maintained between five and six thousand families. The buildings for these three new communities took a few years to be constructed. Holy Cross was the last one to open at its present location here on Old Nichols Road.

As you enter the church, (the worship area), the first thing you encounter is the baptismal font with the flowing waters. Today, unfortunately, the font is kept covered because of the guidelines imposed by COVID-19. The living water that Christ offers us is beautifully symbolized by the flowing water of our font.

Each time we come for Mass, we should mark ourselves with this baptismal water as a reminder of what began for us at our Baptism. *We all look forward to the day when it will be safe to uncover this beautiful symbol of our faith.*

Standing by the font is the Paschal candle which reminds us that we are invited to share in the light of Christ. Parents know well this symbol, as they are presented with a smaller version at their child's Baptism being reminded to keep the light of Christ shining in the life of their newly baptized baby.

Another reminder takes place at the Easter Vigil, when we hear this prayer offered: "May all who are buried with Christ in the death of Baptism rise also with Him to the newness of life." At funerals, I am sure many of us recall these beautiful words as the baptismal water is sprinkled on the casket at the door of the church.

Something also to point out in this area of the church, is that the font is at the base of one of the columns which supports the roof. On the front of this column is the ambry, which houses the sacred oils blessed each Holy Thursday by the bishop. These oils consist of: the sacred chrism used for Baptism, Confirmation, the ordination of priests and bishops, and for altars and churches at the time of their dedication; the oil of the sick used for the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick; and the oil of the catechumens used for the unbaptized - sacred symbols used at special moments in the life of the people of God!

Next week, we will continue on our tour with the many interesting facets of our worship area. On your next visit to the church, why not look more closely at the items mentioned above.


