

## PRAYERS FOR YOU, PRAYERS FOR ME, PRAYERS FOR ALL

If all goes well, I will be away this weekend on retreat. I will hold you in my heart as I spend this time in prayer. The events of the past few months have drawn us closer together. I am very mindful of the struggles and crosses some of you bear on a daily basis. I am mindful of over half our regular congregation who are not yet back for the Sunday Eucharist.

Please hold me in your prayers as well. I cannot help but believe that the energy and focus that I have received these past months is rooted deeply in those who have been praying for me. Our journey continues together. May we continue to support each other and allow the power of God's Spirit to bring us his life and his hope.

A few weeks ago in the on-line bulletin, I wrote about a spiritual suggestion that I heard. I would like to repeat that message as I have found it abundantly helpful. Spend no more than one hour a day watching the news, using social media, or immersing oneself in the midst of political discussion. Within one hour we can learn all the current events and breaking news that we need to know. Spending hours hearing the same message repeated does little to help us grow or to change the circumstances we hear about. The extra time that we might have been devoting to media saturation can be spent in prayer, in deepening relationships and pursuing activity that is creative and prolific.

I know it sounds like a cliché and the kind of thing you would expect a priest to say, but we truly need to unite ourselves in prayer. There will always be the temptation to present an agenda to the Lord with our fingers crossed hoping that God follows our advice. I don't know how fruitful or realistic that approach is. I find simplicity and silence is better than dumping a truckload of thoughts and strategies on God's doorstep. To simply hold in your heart someone who you know is in pain can be an experience of communion. To hold in your heart someone with whom you struggle with can be a moment of grace. May we allow the mysterious and transforming love of our God to touch all of our hearts.

On a different note, allow me to share with you a bittersweet development about an important part of parish life. We are in a time of transition regarding leadership within our Parish Outreach program. MaryAnne McCulloch has been serving in our parish for 28 years. It was her intention to retire last spring, and then all heck broke loose. With great dedication, MaryAnne kept our Parish Outreach office open even during the worst of the crisis. Now that things have calmed down, we are able to address the future of this ministry. We are happy to announce that we have hired Mrs. Kelley Mowat who will continue this work. We are delighted with the enthusiasm she brings. The two will work together over the coming weeks to provide for a seamless transition. More information will be forthcoming.

\$148 per person. Includes: Hampton Jitney Bus, Lunch, Boat Ride, and Bridge Walk.



At Advent and Easter time a volunteer will visit them and bring a gift from the parish community. Eucharistic Ministers

are also available to bring communion to the homebound who desire it.

*Civilize It* is about making room in your heart for those with whom you disagree. We are called to recognize that each one of us is a beloved child of God and to respond in love to that reality. *Civilize It* is a nonpartisan call to focus on the dignity of all people, even when we disagree, and to put faith in action by bearing witness to a better way forward.

Take the pledge below as an individual, family, or community. Anyone and everyone can commit together to honoring human dignity through civil conversation.

#### I pledge:

#### Civility

To recognize the human dignity of those with whom I disagree, treat others with respect, and rise above attacks when directed at me.

#### Clarity

To root my political viewpoints in the Gospel and a well <u>formed conscience</u>, which involves prayer, conversation, study and listening. I will stand up for my convictions and speak out when I witness language that disparages others' dignity, while also listening and seeking to understand others' experiences.

#### Compassion

To encounter others with a tone and posture which affirms that I honor the dignity of others and invites others to do the same. I will presume others' best intentions and listen to their stories with empathy. I will strive to understand before seeking to be understood.
