

SEEKING WISDOM

I'm writing this article early in the morning on Election Day; I do not yet know the results of the election.

It's remarkable how often the message of scripture hits home. Sometimes the timing of a particular passage is uncanny. I don't think I have ever reprinted one of Sunday's scripture passages in my column. But, as I began reading the scriptures in preparation for my homily, I was taken aback at how timely and appropriate these words are for where we find ourselves today. This is Sunday's first reading taken from the Book of Wisdom:

Resplendent and unfading is wisdom, and she is readily perceived by those who love her, and found by those who seek her. She hastens to make herself known in anticipation of their desire; whoever watches for her at dawn shall not be disappointed, for he shall find her sitting by his gate. For taking thought of wisdom is the perfection of prudence, and whoever for her sake keeps vigil shall quickly be free from care; because she makes her own rounds, seeking those worthy of her, and graciously appears to them in the ways, and meets them with all solicitude.

These ancient words speak of the mystery and great gift that is found in true wisdom. One temptation with scripture is wanting to apply the message to those who we feel ought to hear what is spoken. That's understandable. It is not unreasonable to desire wisdom for those we encounter and those who hold positions of leadership. However, we cannot take the gift of scripture and only interpret it in light of how we feel it is needed by others.

If we want to be sincere, then the question we need to grapple with is what is God saying <u>to me</u> in these words? What is the invitation being offered at this moment in my life?

There may be some chaos and emotion surrounding the outcome of the election. Whatever may happen, are we able to open our hearts to be people who seek a peaceful truth, even in the midst of confusion? We need to allow our faith to be a rock of security that will give us the strength to move forward no matter what surrounds us. Some may say these are politically turbulent times, and there is truth to that. For us, we look beyond that to see these times as being potentially rich in grace. We need to open ourselves to the wisdom of God that alone will bring us peace and hope.

Christmas Angels Coming Soon!

Next weekend, November 14th and 15th will be the first weekend of our Outreach Parish Christmas Project.

We are once again requesting **gift cards** to local stores (i.e., Kohl's, Target, Wal-Mart) to enable our families to purchase for themselves and their children the items they need.

As you may know, we have also helped the following agencies for the last several years and will continue to do so this Christmas:

Olsen's Rest Home is a neighborhood facility for frail elderly on Gibbs Pond Rd. Residents of the home have always been considered members of our parish community. Holy Cross ministers to our friends at Olsen's in a variety of ways during the year.

Mercy Haven is a provider of housing and other services for persons who are elderly, those living with mental illness, those families who are on limited income and those with special needs.

Pronto is a human service agency located in Brentwood helping people in need with food, clothing and other basic necessities. They assist approximately 500 families for the holidays each year.

Talbot House Chemical Dependency Crisis Center is a 24-hour voluntary, chemical dependence, crisis center licensed by the New York State Office of Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Services to provide short-term medically monitored inpatient withdrawal services to adult men and women who are in crisis. This facility provides nourishing meals, counseling, limited transportation, support groups, and referrals.

LITURGY BYTES

<u>The Rosary</u>

Even though we have moved into the month of November when we remember those who came before us, and realize the end of this Liturgical year is fast approaching, I would like to take a trip down memory lane and offer some memories and thoughts on one of the most beautiful prayers in our Catholic tradition – the Rosary. Have you noticed that both the Pope and the Bishops have recently stressed the importance of praying the Rosary which provides a great source of comfort and strength? There have been various groups praying the Rosary lately in person, both inside and outside and even virtually, especially during October, the month of the Rosary.

As a child, I recall one of the women in our parish, who was a member of the Rosary society, began a Rosary group for children. I think it was open to everyone in grade 3 and up on Wednesday afternoons at 4 PM in her home. She not only prayed with us, but she also taught us how to say the Rosary and encouraged us to try it on our own at home. She supplied us with rosary beads and offered incentive gifts for those who faithfully attended week by week. I remember receiving a statue of the Blessed Mother for one year of attendance. This is where it began for me to embrace this beautiful prayer, learn about the mysteries, and accomplish memorizing the prayers other than the Our Father, Hail Mary and Glory be to the Father that began and ended the Rosary. I am sure many of us today get the wording mixed up between the Apostles Creed we pray at the beginning of the Rosary and the Nicene Creed that we pray at Mass. Hang in there, you are not alone! Before we look at the Rosary as a meaningful prayer for our day, we should first review its history.

There is a familiar legend that St. Dominic received the Rosary from Our Lady. Historians believe that the Rosary developed over time stretching

from the 1100s to 1569, when Pope Pius V officially approved the devotion. Reflected in the legend is the historical truth of St. Dominic's great devotion to Our Lady and the key role played by his followers, the Dominican Order, in the promotion of the Rosary over the centuries. I can personally attest to this, since I was educated for twelve years by the Dominican Sisters who imparted St. Dominic's love of the Rosary and wore the 15 decades as part of their religious habit before us each day. Back to the history......it seems the Rosary developed out of the laity's desire to have a form of prayer similar to what was practiced by the monks, who prayed the psalter (the 150 psalms of the Bible). The faithful, especially those unable to read, began the practice of saying 150 Our Fathers in place of the psalms. Some even used a string of 150 beads to keep count. Another group, devoted to Mary, said 150 Ave Marias (only the Angel Gabriel's greeting to Mary, not the entire Hail Mary as we know it today), mixed with verses from the psalms. With time, mysteries from the life of Jesus were added to give those praying, material for contemplation and to keep Christ as the central focus of the devotion. The Rosary took its present form between the 14th and 15th centuries. A Carthusian monk divided the 150 Ave Marias into the 15 decades, with each decade preceded by the Our Father. As I mentioned earlier, Pius V approved the Rosary as a devotion, with the following additions: the Our Father to start each decade, meditating on the mysteries which recall the entire life of Our Lord, and finally adding the second part of the Hail Mary as we know the prayer today. For the next 400 years, the prayer remained unchanged. Much later on during the papacy of Pope St. John Paul II, the Luminous mysteries were added. We will pick up with some thoughts about the mysteries and prayers of the Rosary in my next column.

Honoring Veterans - Champions of America's Freedoms

As all freedoms, and especially religious freedom, are under assault around the world, we speak and pray on November 11 to honor the Americans who have served in all areas of the military in defense of liberty.

Veterans Day originated as "Armistice Day" on Nov. 11, 1919, the first anniversary of the signing of the armistice ending World War I on the "eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month" of 1918. Unlike Memorial Day that honors service members who died in service to their country, Veterans Day pays tribute to all American veterans living or dead - to give thanks for serving their country honorably during war or peacetime.

From WWI to the present post-9/11 conflicts, approximately 40 million have served in all branches of the military. Women have been approximately 9.1% of active members. These military men and women who protect the U.S. come from all walks of life and from every state.

Happening Now: 3 Killed in Knife Attack at Notre Dame Basilica, Nice, France

French bishops ordered a "death knell" to ring from every church of their country, as an act of mourning, after 3 people were hacked to death in Notre Dame Basilica in the southern Mediterranean city of Nice on Oct. 29th while they were preparing for Mass.

The Vatican Secretary of State, Cardinal Parolin, wrote, "Entrusting France to the protection of Our Lady," Pope Francis "wholeheartedly gives his apostolic blessing to all those affected by this tragedy." ⁽¹⁾

"... with this attack in Nice, it is freedom of religion (under attack)." said French Prime Minister Castex.⁽²⁾
