A DAY OF JOY - ARE YOU SURE ABOUT THAT?

Traditionally the third Sunday of Advent is referred to as Gaudete Sunday, which means joyful Sunday. In the midst of this holy time of waiting, the invitation is to focus on the joy that is part of this season.

I try to be upbeat and positive in these columns. In general, I try to live my life with optimism and hope. Having said all that, these past few weeks have been rough. It might just be me, but the ominous forecasts for Covid in the near future are unsettling. I'm worried about how Christmas will unfold here at the parish. There are a number of parishioners who are dealing with major health issues. There are folks who are grieving, sad, frightened and just grappling to cope with everything that is going on. I was determined to write a hopeful or joyful message for this column, but I was really struggling.

Then, earlier in the week I was going through my email, and one of the messages suddenly left me teary eyed. It was from a young man who was a student when I was chaplain at St. John the Baptist High School. I did not know him well, but I recognized his name. Allow me to share with you some of what he wrote:

My wife and I have been attending church for the past two months, and we both truly feel at home. I was very hesitant to jump to a new parish considering I grew up in my home parish and continued doing so into my adulthood. However, when I walked through the doors two months ago and saw a friendly face, I knew God had put me here for a reason. The service, MUSIC, and your homily on 11/29 with "Embrace Trust" left an impact on my wife and me which allowed us to form a deep bond with the parish. I want to thank you and all of the church for making us feel truly welcome. We have all had a rough year, but I know my wife and I reintroducing ourselves to God and the community has been something we have dearly missed. Thank you.

Just when I was about to proclaim this "joyful Sunday" thing to be a hoax, the Spirit sneaks in the side door and smacks me in the back of the head. Even in the midst of great heartache and uncertainty, God still offers hope. I am reminded what a precious place Holy Cross is and to not take anything of what we do for granted. Even in the midst of dealing with Mass reservations, no opportunity for hospitality, and not doing anything like we used to, the Spirit is as work. I hope you can take a bit of joy from newcomers who have found Holy Cross to be a place of life. I pray you have a bit of pride in being part of this community. You may have to look harder and deeper, but joy does abound. Embrace Trust!

LITURGY BYTES

<u>Rejoice!</u>

This weekend we celebrate Gaudete (Rejoice) Sunday, the 3rd Sunday of Advent. You will notice that the priest's vestments are pink or rose colored, and we light the pink candle on the Advent wreath. The readings this weekend emphasize the joyous anticipation of the Lord's

coming! We continue to embrace trust in our God, along with patience and holy waiting as the celebration of the Nativity draws near.

Another Advent tradition, the Jesse Tree, has reminded me of what many of us are engaged in these days – tracing the roots of our ancestors, as witnessed by the popularity of Ancestors.com. The Jesse Tree symbol, pictured above, stems back to Medieval times. It was, and is, a way for Christians to look to the Hebrew Scriptures to see our God setting the stage for the birth of Jesus, long before it actually happened. Jesus was a real person, with a family tree and ancestors, like all of us.

The Jesse tree is named for Jesse, father of King David, from whose descendants Jesus was born 1000 years later. The Old Testament prophecy points to a Savior, or Messiah, to come from this very family tree as written by the prophet Isaiah: "A shoot shall come out of the stock of Jesse, and a branch shall grow out of his roots." (Isaiah 11:1)

The symbols on the Jesse Tree point to events and persons that stand out in our history of God and His people, leading up to Jesus' coming. They show us the unveiling of God's promise, bit by bit, as He reaches out over the centuries to invite His children to share ever more fully in friendship and life. The tree is adorned with symbols each day of Advent and in some parishes is placed in a conspicuous place in the church as a reminder of the ancestors of Jesus who waited for their Savior, as we do every Advent season. The following are some of the symbols used and their meanings:

Earth, Sun, and Moon – symbols of creation Tree and Snake – symbols of disobedience of Adam and Eve

Ark – symbol of Noah, who survived the flood through his obedience to God Torch – symbol of Abraham's faith in God **Ram** – symbol of Isaac, Abraham's son. Abraham trusted in God by offering to sacrifice his son. God spared Isaac, and a ram was provided for the offering. Ladder – symbol of Jacob, who dreamed of a ladder rising to heaven **Coat** – symbol of Joseph, sold into slavery by his brothers **Tablets** – symbol of Moses, chosen by God to lead the Israelites from Egypt and receive the law Sandals – symbol of Ruth, a woman of fidelity and piety who chose to remain with her mother-in-law, abandoning her own country and its pagan worship **Lamp** – symbol of Samuel, last of the judges of the Hebrew scriptures Stump – symbol of Jesse, shepherd of Bethlehem, David's father Star of David – also a symbol of Jesse **Crown** – symbol of David, who became king of Israel after Saul **Temple** – symbol of Solomon, David's successor, and builder of a lavish temple **Fish** – symbol of Jonah, who tried to escape God's calling by sailing away. After being swallowed by a fish for three days, he set out to do God's will. **Shell** – symbol of John the Baptist, who preached the coming of Jesus. To show that he was the promised one, he baptized Jesus in the Jordan. **Hammer** – symbol of Joseph, an honest, hardworking carpenter, destined to be the foster father of Jesus Lily – symbol of Mary, mother of the Savior Angel, Star and Manager – symbols of the birth of Jesus Christ **Cross** – symbol of Christ and reminder that our redemption is close at hand Jesse Tree Trayer Lord God. you have given us the example of these holy men and women. In their lives, they sought to give glory to you and to live in your grace. By the mystery of your love draw us ever closer to you. Strengthen us with your grace and raise our hearts and minds to heaven. Amen. Have a joyful, blessed, safe and healthy week! ~~~ Michele Hahn

BACKGROUND SCREENING UPDATE

The Office for the Protection of Children and Young People:

The Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People (The Charter) promulgated by the Bishops of the United States in 2002 outlines specific practices and guidelines providing standards of safety in parishes and dioceses throughout the United States. As directed in The Charter, the Diocese of Rockville Centre requires all employees, clergy, and volunteers to complete three requirements within thirty days of employment or volunteering:

- 1. Attend Protecting God's Children Program (Virtus)
- 2. Sign the Codes of Conduct
- 3. Complete a background screen application. The Diocese requires all those who remain in active ministry be rescreened at 5 yr. intervals. volunteers/employees.

A Word on Background Screening of Volunteers:

The Office for the Protection of Children and Young People (OFPCYP) has streamlined the volunteer application process enabling volunteers to complete the three safe environment requirements in one step. Individuals wishing to volunteer in a parish or school:

- 1. Register to attend a Protecting God's Children class and create a Virtus account on the Virtus website: <u>www.Virtus.org</u>
- 2. Electronically acknowledge the Diocesan Code of Conduct provided during the Virtus registration process.
- 3. Follow the instructions to complete the Sterling Volunteers background screening application offered during the Virtus registration process.

Active Volunteers:


If you are active in a parish ministry, have already attended Virtus and have been background screened you may be at – or beyond - the *5yr. rescreening requirement*. If this is the case, you will receive an email from *Sterling Volunteers* asking you to complete the background screening application on-line. You may access the background screening application by following the prompt in the email or logging into your Virtus account. *Please be aware-this is not a scam nor has your e-mail been hacked.* The OFPCYP has been working with your parish to update the Safe Environment records and noted it is time for you to be rescreened. You may also be prompted to electronically re-sign the Code of Conduct when you log into your Virtus account.

<u>Edit Your Virtus Account:</u>

To access your Virtus account: <u>www.Virtus.org</u> You will need your Username and Password. If you need assistance, please contact Virtus: 1-888-847-8870 or <u>helpdesk@virtus.org</u>. Once in your account, review your account information-particularly your e-mail address. If your account requires updating, please hit the TOOLBOX tab at the top of the screen. On the left side of your screen in the green column click "Update My Account." You will be able to make the necessary changes-please remember to hit the SAVE button at the bottom of the screen.
