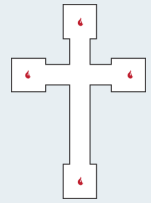

IN THE ONE, WE ARE ONE

Weekly Reflection by Fr. Michael



“In the One, We Are One”

This is the motto of our new Holy Father, Pope Leo XIV. Of course, the “One” he refers to is Christ. In other words, when we are united in the one Christ, we can truly be one with one another. Last Sunday he celebrated his Inaugural Mass. He was able to offer a homily which set a tone for his pontificate. He also shared in the great traditions that identify the power given to the new Shepherd of the Church.

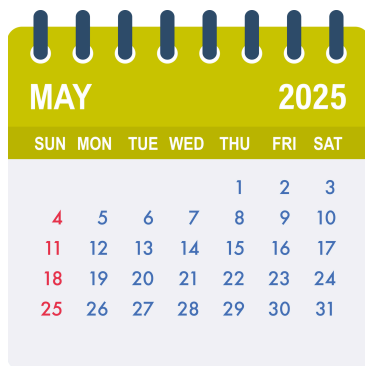


One of the rituals of the Inauguration Mass for the Pope is the presentation of the “fisherman’s ring.” This ring, which is unique to him, will be used throughout his pontificate to seal formal documents. The history of this ring is rooted in the gospel reading that we heard a few weeks ago. Jesus appears to the disciples after they have been unsuccessful in catching anything after a full night of fishing. At the urging of Jesus, they again lower their nets, and this time there is an abundant catch of fish. He is leading them to understand a new kind of fishing that he is inviting them to. The true work of the fisherman is to seek the souls of those who are lost and alone. After they experience the abundant catch that comes about through this miracle, Jesus shares a meal with them. At the end of the meal, he asks Peter three times if he loves him. Three times Peter affirms his love, and Jesus sends him forth to love and care for the sheep. It was this gospel that was used at the Pope’s Mass. It provides a beautiful model for the work that needs to be done.

Based on this gospel, his homily expressed two hopes for the Church. First, that we may be united. There is so much division and discord in our world. What a powerful witness it would be if the Church became a model that a diverse and universal people can share a common vision and desire. We must build on a foundation of recognizing that Christ is the common bond in which we find our strength. He calls us to be a “leaven for harmony.”

The second hope he expressed is that we are a people who mirror God’s love. To love another person cannot be seen as a task or something a person is mandated to do. The love that we give needs to be rooted in the understanding of the love we have come to know in God. We can only give away that which we have already received. For Peter, he never experienced shame or punishment for having denied Jesus. He only received his command to move forward to feed and tend the sheep of the flock. True love never isolates us. It opens ourselves to others, in particular to see their pain and brokenness. It is with this perspective that we are called to live our lives.

As we await to see exactly how Pope Leo lives out the call he has been given, may we stand with him in allowing the power of Christ to make us one and for Christ’s love to dwell in our hearts.

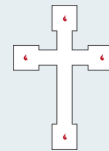
Read scriptural accounts of hope. (Paul speaks of hope many times, as do the psalms.)

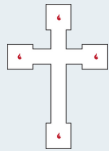

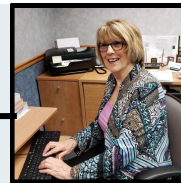

LECTIONARY VS. BIBLE

LITURGY BYTES *by Michele Hall*



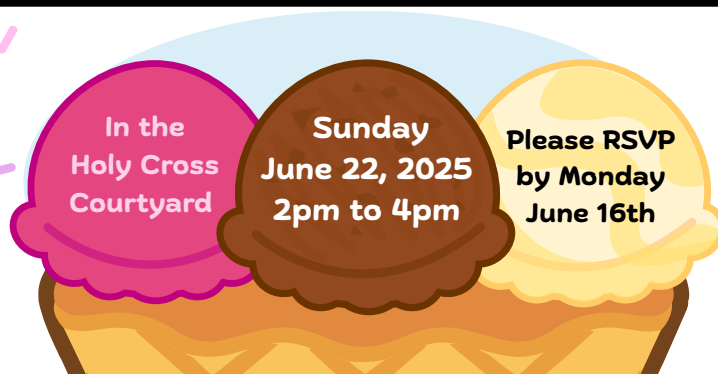
I am fairly certain that only our Lectors know that the Scriptures we hear at Mass come from a special book known as the Lectionary. The Church rotates the readings each year. The Sunday readings follow a three-year cycle: Year A, Year B and Year C. The weekday readings follow a two-year cycle: Year 1 (the odd years) and Year II (the even years). The Gospels are assigned as follows: Year A we hear Matthew, Year B we hear Mark, and Year C we hear Luke. The Gospel of John is always read during the Easter season and partly in Year B since Mark's Gospel is shorter than the others. On solemnities, feasts, and memorials of saints, they each have their own special readings. The book that contains all these readings, arranged according to the liturgy, is called the Lectionary. Keep in mind the Lectionary does not contain all of the Old and New Testament readings.

The very early Church did not have the Bible as we know it. During the time of the Apostles, the Christians gathered for the Eucharist would read from the Jewish Scriptures (the Old Testament) and listen to the testimonies of eyewitnesses to the life and preaching of Jesus. The testimonies were either given in person or read from the letters of Paul or another Apostle which were circulated among the Christian communities. After the Gospels were written, they were read aloud. The various New Testament writings were collected, though it took time for everyone to agree on what was considered inspired Scripture. A general agreement arose by the middle of the 2nd century AD, and by the 5th century the list of accepted books of the Bible was universally accepted. Each week at the Eucharistic celebration, the Scriptures were read in order, picking up each time where the reading left off. Gradually, certain parts of the Bible were designated for certain times of the year. These passages would be marked in the margins of the Bible, or a list would be inserted in the front. Sections were indicated by first and last word since there were no chapter or verse designations yet--those came during the 13th– 16th centuries. Eventually, these special books called Lectionaries were prepared with the readings listed in the order they were read during the year. Lectionaries were in use by the 7th century. Naturally, adaptations have been made over the centuries.

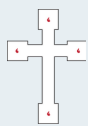

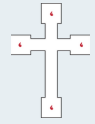

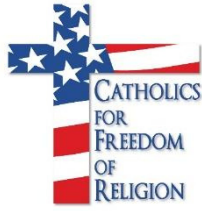

Eucharistic Revival and Freedom of Religion

A Vibrant Example of Religious Freedom

Freedom to Worship - Freedom to Assemble - Freedom to Evangelize

What a living, vibrant example of the effects of religious freedom in the USA! Catholics in America are drawing close to the conclusion of the three year Eucharistic Revival based on the encouragement from Pope Francis and the support of America's Catholic bishops. Begun on Corpus Christi in 2022, the revival will conclude on Corpus Christi of 2025. The aim of the entire Eucharistic Revival is to inspire, educate and unite Catholics through a clearer understanding and dedication to Jesus in the Eucharist.

The first year of the Eucharistic Revival focused on Eucharistic renewal at the diocesan level.

The second year renewed each parish's Eucharistic devotion. The third year, ending on June 22, 2025, Corpus Christi Sunday, is focused on organizing missionary outreach to continue the growth of devotion to the Eucharist. Individuals and groups, inspired by the Revival, are called to learn and evangelize in the work of renewing the world through Eucharistic devotion.

In 2024 the Revival organized Eucharistic processions spanning the United States with prayer, adoration and masses. The processions culminated at the National Eucharistic Convention in Indianapolis. The inspiration from the 2024 processions is reflected in local and national processions in 2025. A Eucharistic procession will begin on May 18, 2025 in Indianapolis, travel through Texas and end in Los Angeles on Corpus Christi weekend. Other processions and Eucharistic Revival Celebrations listed on the USCCB's website will take place in Rockville Centre, NY, New Hampshire, Pasadena and Camino de California and all will end with the celebration of Corpus Christi Sunday.

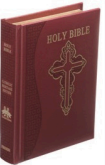
