

BETWEEN THE TIMES



Weekly Reflection by Fr. Michael

Palm Sunday is always a challenging day. The spirit of the day begins joyfully as Jesus enters Jerusalem to the praise of many. However, the day quickly takes on a more somber tone with the proclamation of the Passion Story. It is a hard day in terms of hearing the physical suffering Jesus had to endure. But it also makes a connection to the suffering and crosses that are present in our own lives as well as around the world. The title of today's article is the title of a song that will be introduced at some of the Masses this weekend. This song will also play an important role in our liturgy on Good Friday.

In this song there is a significant detail in the spiritual journey that is named. Our Christian nature calls us to be people of hope. We claim the victory and life that Jesus won for us in the resurrection. Well, if all that is true, then life should be a stroll of always rejoicing in the blessings that abound in our lives. But we all know this is not realistic. There are times when life seems to get derailed. There are moments of fear, loneliness, struggle, and doubt that touch all of our lives. When that happens, we know the emotions that surround turmoil are real and they can run deep. That doesn't mean we abandon our faith and run away. We still turn to the cross as a source of hope, but the fullness of what it offers may not yet dispel our suffering. We find ourselves between the life and presence of God we long for, while facing the pain and sorrow of our situation. We are between two distant places. In the midst of this we might raise the question, "What do we do between the times?"

It is not only suffering in our own life. In too many corners of the world there are injustices, brokenness, and violence. Too many people live with fear and pain in their lives. For some people, "between the times" feels like a way of life. Rarely are there ways to fast forward ourselves through the challenges of life. Rather we need to allow the journey to unfold. What is that path we are to walk? Jesus teaches it to us in a beautiful and profound way. It is all that we are to celebrate in the coming days. The celebrations of Holy Week are more than a list of required prayers and rituals we must get through. Holy Week is the pattern of the great Paschal Mystery Jesus taught us, that is, his dying and rising. We can make real connections to our own life when we dare to allow the power of the Spirit to lead and guide us.

For most people, the in between time is not a happy place to be. It lacks security and predictability. But in between is often the place where the Spirit can abound. Think of how many saints were able to flourish, minister to others, and rejoice in the place where God brought them. Their success was not in bringing people to a destination but rather allowing them to encounter God exactly where they were. We can experience God in precisely the same way, and we can allow others to know that same gift. When you are in between, don't give in to despair; allow the void to be the place we touch the face of God.

May these most holy days be a source of life and hope for you.

"We Remember, We Celebrate, We Believe"

Triduum







As we celebrate Palm Sunday and Jesus' entry into Jerusalem, we want to call attention to the end of the week known as Holy Week and focus on the Triduum, the great days of Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and the Easter Vigil.

As everyone is busy preparing for their Easter celebration with family and friends, the Church too is busy preparing for the most important feast in the liturgical year – EASTER – celebrating the resurrection of Our Lord Jesus from the dead. Even though we move from the "red" color of Palm Sunday back to the purple of Lent, then to the white of Holy Thursday, the red on Good Friday, and finally the introduction of white and gold for Easter and a church full of flowers, it is important to walk slowly through embracing the story of those final moments of Jesus on earth. As sacred as these days are, they are not days of obligation (except for Easter Sunday). Celebrating Jesus' dying and rising for our salvation during the Triduum is not merely about obligation. Obligation is relatively easy. Participating in the Triduum is about love: certainly, the love God showed for us hanging on the cross, but also our love for God. Love is much harder than obligation. It requires more from us, and the stakes are higher. This love should compel each of us to join in these celebrations. Our liturgies help us to grow from feeling obliged to attend to understanding liturgy as an expression of love for God.

So, let us join one another at one or all three of these beautiful celebrations of love. Join with your parish family this year and feel the love of God around you. Our services are at 8 PM on Holy Thursday for the Mass of the Lord's Supper, at 3 PM on Good Friday, and at 8 PM on Holy Saturday known as the Easter Vigil. The prayers, the music and the message will touch your heart.

Have a prayerful, loving, and peaceful week ahead!

Practice of Faith

(Excerpt from "At Home with the Word 2025")

Palm Sunday has the only Mass of the year in which two Gospel accounts are proclaimed. The liturgy begins with the faithful holding palm branches and the Gospel proclamation of Jesus' joyful entry into Jerusalem, as the crowds sang, "Hosanna!" In the Liturgy of the Word, the Gospel account details Jesus' arrest, trial, conviction, torture, crucifixion, and death on the cross.

Walk and pray the stations of the cross this week, reflecting on your Lenten journey and the sacrifice Jesus made for us.

Adorn your prayer space at home with a red cloth, palm branches, and a crucifix.

Holy Week offers the opportunity to walk alongside our Lord from the garden to the cross. Approach these days as a week-long retreat. Make the necessary arrangements to participate fully in the liturgies of Holy Week and to prayerfully accompany our Lord.

The Lord God is my help, therefore I am not disgraced; I have set my face like flint, knowing that I shall not be put to shame.



The Stations of the Cross



Begin by asking, "God, what is one way that I can become a-better-version-of-myself this week?" Use the Stations of the Cross as a way to deepen that reflection.

As you approach each Station, first genuflect and pray "We adore you o Christ and praise you. Because by your holy cross you have redeemed the world." If in a group, the leader says the first sentence and the group continues with the second.

THE FIRST STATION: JESUS IS CONDEMNED TO DEATH

Scripture: Mark 15:1-5, 15 And as soon as it was morning the chief priests, with the elders and scribes, and the whole council held a consultation; and they bound Jesus and led him away and delivered him to Pilate. And Pilate asked him, "Are you the King of the Jews?" And he answered him, "You have said so." And the chief priests accused him of many things. And Pilate again asked him, "Have you no answer to make? See how many charges they bring against you." But Jesus made no further answer, so that Pilate wondered. So Pilate, wishing to satisfy the crowd, released for them Barab'bas; and having scourged Jesus, he delivered him to be crucified.

THE SECOND STATION: JESUS CARRIES THE CROSS

Scripture: John 19:6, 15-17 When the chief priests and the officers saw him, they cried out, "Crucify him, crucify him!" Pilate said to them, "Take him yourselves and crucify him, for I find no crime in him." They cried out, "Away with him, away with him, crucify him!" Pilate said to them, "Shall I crucify your King?" The chief priests answered, "We have no king but Caesar." Then he handed him over to them to be crucified. So they took Jesus, and he went out, bearing his own cross, to the place called the place of a skull, which is called in Hebrew Gol'gotha.

THE THIRD STATION: JESUS FALLS FOR THE FIRST TIME

Scripture: John 19:1-3

Then Pilate took Jesus and had him scourged. And the soldiers wove a crown out of thorns and placed it on his head, and clothed him in a purple cloak, and they came to him and said,"Hail, King of the Jews!" And they struck him repeatedly.

THE FOURTH STATION: JESUS MEETS HIS MOTHER

Scripture: John 19: 25-27

So the soldiers did this. But standing by the cross of Jesus were his mother, and his mother's sister, Mary the wife of Clopas, and Mary Mag'dalene. When Jesus saw his mother, and the disciple whom he loved standing near, he said to his mother, "Woman, behold, you son!" Then he said to the disciple, "Behold, your mother!" And from that hour the disciple took her to his own home.

THE FIFTH STATION: SIMON HELPS JESUS CARRY HIS CROSS

Scripture: Mark 15:21

And they compelled a passer-by, Simon of Cyre'ne, who was coming in from the country, the father of Alexander and Rufus, to carry his cross.

THE SIXTH STATION: VERONICA WIPES THE FACE OF JESUS

Scripture: Isaiah 53:2-3

He had no form or comeliness that we should look at him, and no beauty that we should desire him. He was despised and rejected by men; a man of sorrows, and acquainted with grief and as one from whom men hide their faces he was despised, and we esteemed him not.

THE SEVENTH STATION: JESUS FALLS A SECOND TIME

Scripture: Romans 8:31-39

If God is for us, who can be against us? God who did not spare his own Son but handed him over for us all, how will he not also give us everything else along with him? What will separate us from the love of Christ? Will anguish, or distress, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or peril, or the sword? No, in all these things we conquer overwhelmingly through him who has loved us. For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor present things, nor future things, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor any other creature will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord.

THE EIGHTH STATION: JESUS MEETS THE WOMEN OF JERUSALEM

Scripture: Luke 23:27-31 And there followed him a great multitude of the people, and of women who bewailed and lamented him. But Jesus turning to them said, "Daughters of Jerusalem, do not weep for me, but weep for yourselves and for your children. For behold, the days are coming when they will say, 'Blessed are the barren, and the wombs that never bore, and the breasts that never gave suck!' Then they will begin to say to the mountains, 'Fall on us'; and to the hills, 'Cover us.' For if they do this when the wood is green, what will happen when it is dry?"

THE NINTH STATION: JESUS FALLS A THIRD TIME

Scripture: Psalm 38

I am overwhelmed by a burden beyond my strength. I am stooped and deeply bowed; all day I go about mourning. My heart shudders, my strength forsakes me; the very light of my eyes has failed. Friends and companions shun my pain; my neighbors stand far off. Those who seek my life lay snares for me; they seek my misfortune, they speak of ruin; they plot treachery all the day. I am very near to falling; my pain is with me always. Come quickly to help me, my Lord and my salvation.

THE TENTH STATION: JESUS IS STRIPPED OF HIS GARMENTS

Scripture: John 19:23-24

When the soldiers had crucified Jesus they took his garments and made four parts, one for each soldier; also his tunic. But the tunic was without seam, woven from top to bottom; so they said to one another, "Let us not tear it, but cast lots for it to see whose it shall be." This was to fulfill the scripture, "They parted my garments among them, and for my clothing they cast lots."

THE ELEVENTH STATION: JESUS IS NAILED TO THE CROSS

Scripture: Luke 23:33-34

And when they came to the place which is called The Skull, there they crucified him, and the criminals, one on the right and one on the left. And Jesus said, "Father, forgive them; for they know not what they do." And they cast lots to divide his garments.

THE TWELFTH STATION: JESUS DIES ON THE CROSS

Scripture: Luke 23:44-46

It was now about the sixth hour, and there was darkness over the whole land until the ninth hour, while the sun's light failed; and the curtain of the temple was torn in two. Then Jesus, crying with a loud voice, said, "Father, into thy hands I commit my spirit!" And having said this he breathed his last.

THE THIRTEENTH STATION: JESUS' BODY IS REMOVED FROM THE CROSS

Scripture: John 20:38-42 Now there was a virtuous and righteous man named Joseph who went to Pilate and asked for the body of Jesus. Pilate permitted it. So Joseph came and took his body. Nicodemus also came. They took the body of Jesus and bound it with burial cloths along with spices, according to the Jewish burial custom.

THE FOURTEENTH STATION: JESUS IS LAID IN THE TOMB

Scripture: Matthew 27:57-60

And Joseph took the body, and wrapped it in a clean linen shroud, and laid it in his own new tomb, which he had hewn in the rock; and he rolled a great stone to the door of the tomb, and departed.

"Let there be Light" Update

This undertaking began mid-March and we are already enjoying the benefits of the project. We are pleased with the results. There was minimal disruption to parish activities during the installation. This was a necessary improvement that will meet our needs for years to come.





Our Worship Area and the church building are now 30 years old. Components of the original building have reached the end of their useful life, and we need to make some improvements. In October of 2024 the HVAC system was replaced. We are now facing a failure of the lighting system which leaves half of the Worship Area in darkness. It is not simply a matter of changing burned-out bulbs. We need new fixtures and a new control system. Additionally, gaining access to the lights mounted on our high ceilings is not a simple or inexpensive task.

We are grateful to all who have already generously contributed. This is an essential repair, and we deeply appreciate those who have helped in this undertaking.

This is the first major fundraising effort we have had to conduct in more than 15 years. We have been blessed with consistent and generous support by so many parishioners through the years.
