



REPENT AND BELIEVE IN THE GOSPEL



Weekly Reflection by Fr. Michael

These were the words used on Wednesday when ashes were imposed. We expect to hear this call to repent as we begin Lent. But it sounds like such an ominous and unpleasant undertaking. We often equate repenting with having to confess our sins and then undergo some kind of a conversion. Yes, there is truth to some of that. But it is not meant to be a miserable and painful experience. Perhaps a better way to look at it is the need to change the direction or course of some part of our lives. If we are honest, there are some paths we walk which ultimately do not bring about life or reflect the message of the gospel. The issues will vary, but some of those paths may be connected to the direction of a relationship, use of time, care of self, attitudes towards others, to name a few. Wouldn't it be wonderful if we could curb behavior that is not productive? What a gift it would be if we could grow in focus, kindness, patience and wisdom.

The key to unlock the path of repentance is found in the second half of that phrase, "believe in the Gospel." The gospel really is good news. Sadly, some have come to see it as a book of prohibitions and punishments. It is a book of life. It is a book that opens to us the wonder and mercy of our loving God. When we come to understand the message of the gospel, it is one of a God who made us and loves us unconditionally. It is a story that speaks of God's endless mercy to forgive and begin again. It is a story of healing and new life. It is a story about God's ability to transform all things, even death into life. Use well the days of Lent. It can be a rich gift when we allow the loving hand of God to touch our lives and renew our hearts.

It was a joy for me to announce at the Masses last weekend that my term as Pastor at Holy Cross has been extended by one year. I am grateful to Bishop Barres in allowing me to continue to minister here. I am deeply appreciative to the many who have expressed their affirmation and support. Together we will continue to do good things for this parish community.

I will share a few thoughts about our experience at the Religious Education Congress in California. Words fail to fully encompass the richness and wonder of a weekend like this. It certainly was engaging, inspiring, affirming and uplifting. But it goes even beyond that. I believe the best way to reflect the gifts that we received is to bring them to life here in our community. I foresee in the coming weeks the introduction of some of what we experienced. Some of it may be in music, or environment, or tone of prayer. The greatest moments were when we were gathered in the large arena and united in prayer and committed to our desire to bring the gospel to life. You don't have to travel to the West Coast to experience that. In various ways we will help to foster those moments here in our sacred space. It is wonderful to continue to grow in appreciating the many ways we can celebrate and live out our faith. I'm grateful to all those who made the journey. And, along the way, we had a lot of fun as well.

GOD'S WORD



LITURGY BYTES by Michele Hall



As we enter the Season of Lent, let us spend a few moments reflecting on the first part of the Mass known as the **Liturgy of the Word**. Here are some ideas to help us engage in hearing God's Word at Mass. I am hoping to put them into practice for myself this Lent.

Rather than running into Mass five minutes before it begins, why not try to come a little earlier. This would give us a chance to catch our breath, quiet ourselves and enter into a prayerful posture to receive God's Word with great attention. Sometimes it takes a few times to prepare ourselves in this way. Do not be discouraged, keep trying each week.

As we have heard many times, it was the Second Vatican Council's Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy that invited us into full, conscious, and active participation at all times during the Mass, not just when we are responding to prayers. The Word of God is proclaimed not just read. The Word of God is living and takes on a different tenor when lifted off the page and delivered with faith to the Church assembled. God's Word is beyond the words on the paper. Thinking back to some part of what we heard at Mass should be our goal during the days following Sunday. Is it possible to integrate its meaning into our own lives? Yes, but it does take some work. Perhaps making this a goal as a Lenten practice this year would deepen our understanding and love of God's Word in our lives.

Come, O Word of God, who is light and mercy for the world. Speak your truth, reveal your beauty, infuse your joy. Jesus, who is "Word Made Flesh," teach us and love us into a holy embrace, with God who is Triune and with one another. May your word save us and inspire us to draw others to you. Amen.

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

It is no coincidence that the global inauguration of our 2025 Jubilee Year of Hope occurred on the Solemnity of the Holy Family. The Jubilee Year of Hope in this 2025 Lenten season runs through the family and fidelity to the splendors of the liberating and objective truths of Christ and the Catholic Church on Marriage and the Family.

Lenten prayer, fasting and almsgiving lead individual family members to Christ's light of conversion and repentance. Conversion and repentance, in turn, open families to a family spirit and daily chemistry animated by the Holy Spirit. Family patterns ensnared in the ruts of sin become family patterns transformed by the grooves of grace, humility, charity and the seven gifts of the Holy Spirit. The Jubilee Year of Hope runs through every family experiencing Christ's Cross: grief, tragedy, crisis, tension, alienation and transition.

Pope Francis emphasized: "All of us have received the gift and task of bringing hope wherever hope has been lost, lives broken, promises unkept, dreams shattered and hearts overwhelmed by adversity. We are called to bring hope to the weary who have no strength to carry on, the lonely oppressed by the bitterness of failure, and all those who are broken-hearted. To bring hope to the interminable, dreary days of prisoners, to the cold and dismal lodging of the poor, and to all those places descrated by war and violence. To bring hope there, to sow hope there."

The Holy Family was a refugee family and they are deeply present today to every struggling refugee family in the world to rekindle their hope. The Lenten season of the Jubilee Year of Hope reminds us that while all families are imperfect and have their problems and challenges, all families are called to grow together in holiness and a missionary spirit.

And so we heed the powerful words of St. Paul as they apply to our daily family life: "Put on, as God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, heartfelt compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness and patience, bearing with one another and forgiving one another...Let the peace of Christ control your hearts...Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly." (Colossians 3:12-17)

Our Lady invites us to have a pondering heart as we contemplate God's providential design in the past, present and future of our families, especially as we begin this Lenten season in the Jubilee Year of Hope. In unity with the Holy Family, our own families are called to transform the world and history with Christ's love and the mission of mercy of the Church which He Himself founded.

In the 2025 Jubilee Year of Hope, the Church presents us with the canonizations of soon-to-be Saint Carlo Acutis (1991-2006) and Saint Piergiorgio Frassati (1900-1924). As children, teenagers and young adults, they helped Christ transform their own families with their faith and their holiness as they helped Christ transform the Church and the world to this day. Together, they are asking every young Catholic to do the same in their time, in their place and in their own family.

The 2025 Jubilee Year of Hope is a time for us and our extended families to cast the nets of Eucharistic charity throughout Long Island, understanding that the Eucharist is a "Fountain of Charity" -- a Fountain of the spiritual and corporal works of mercy, a Fountain of the Gospel of Life and a Fountain of every dimension of Catholic Social Justice teaching.

As the Successor of the Apostles on Long Island, I want to thank every Catholic family on Long Island and beyond for being Lights of Christ's Hope and Lights of Catholic evangelization to the world.

However, memory abilities are known to change across the lifespan. Because memory is so central to everyday life, people are often interested in learning how to implement strategies and/or activities that might serve to improve memory performance. Eat Simply...So Others May Simply Eat



Lent offers us a unique period of time to evaluate our life journey as a follower of Christ. We are encouraged to assess if this journey has led us to an improved understanding and deepening of our relationship with our Lord, with our neighbors, and with our brothers and sisters of the world community.

For the last 33 years, we at Holy Cross have embraced our Lenten Project "Eat Simply So Others May Simply Eat" as a way to raise our consciousness to the significant needs of our struggling friends. We willingly sacrifice larger or better meals for simpler meals during Lent. Our joint effort to "EAT MORE SIMPLY SO OTHERS MAY SIMPLY EAT" unites us in a special way with one another and also with those who are struggling on Long Island.

We encourage you not only to participate in this program, but also to discuss it at the dinner table with your children and family members. Many of us are not consciously aware of the number of people that are struggling and hungry right here in our own area. <u>During 2024</u>, our <u>Outreach pantry served an average of 116 people each month.</u>

The Lenten envelopes marked, EAT SIMPLY...SO OTHERS MAY SIMPLY EAT, will be available throughout the weekends of Lent. We suggest that you place the envelope in a prominent place in your kitchen as a reminder of how you and your family will be uniting yourselves with our struggling neighbors and with those facing food insecurity in the world. We encourage you to reflect, discuss and to decide how you will eat more basic meals during Lent. Perhaps you have a favorite simple recipe to share. We'd be happy to put it in the bulletin for fellow parishioners to try.

Each weekend or whenever you choose during Lent, you may place your envelope in the basket on the pillar by the altar or in the collection basket. The monies donated will be used to help those who come to Parish Outreach for assistance. We are continually grateful for the very generous response of our parishioners of Holy Cross in donating money, food, and supermarket gift cards which enables us to meet their needs.
