REWINDING THE CASSETTE

I recently heard that, sometime in the not-so-distant future, new cars will not be equipped with radios. (Ironically, I heard this on the radio while driving in my car.) You will plug in your device and get your favorite radio station from an app as well as whatever music you want to listen to. The car will still come with speakers, but the source of your programing will be your phone. I don't know about you, but stuff like this baffles my mind and makes me a bit nervous. I definitely missed the technology train.

During my time in the seminary and my early years of priesthood I acquired a number of cassette tapes on the scriptures and other aspects of spirituality. Some of the recordings are on CDs as well. I have certainly updated my library since then, but it is as if some of those old teachings became part of my spiritual foundation. Through the years there were times I wanted to listen to some of those classics. I had a "boom box" that served me well, but it eventually died. Much to my amazement, you can still buy a cassette/CD player on-line. I ordered one to keep me going. So, while most of the world is downloading apps and signing up for monthly subscriptions, I am still rewinding and then hitting the play button. Listening to vinyl has become trendy, so in my own way maybe I am creating my own craze!

It is important to broaden our horizons and keep up to date with things that are important to us. But it is also important to know what waters will quench our thirst and fill our souls. There is wisdom to be found in new insights as well as some of the tried and true places that have served us well through the ages.

This weekend's gospel is the beginning of the famous Sermon on the Mount, which is known as the beatitudes. Jesus tries explaining that being his disciple requires looking at life through a different set of lenses. The words are familiar, but they can take a lifetime to understand and begin to live out.

Every week in the bulletin you will see an advertisement for an ongoing fundraiser for the parish which at this time of year is called the "Winter Windfall." This is a variation of what used to be the Cash Calendar. Instead of having monthly drawings for cash, we now do it on a quarterly basis. We don't make a lot of money from it, but there are some parishioners who enjoy supporting the parish in this format. Last autumn the participation was low. We ended up giving away more money in prizes than we took in. We will monitor how the winter drawing goes. Needless to say, if this fundraiser starts costing us money, then we will need to offer other alternatives.

LITURGY BYTES

The Mass - Why We Do What We Do - Part 2

Last week we began taking another look at the Mass emphasizing the idea of ritual and how rituals are a big part of our everyday lives. This week we will begin with the gathering. The purpose of this rite is to bring us together into one body, ready to listen and break bread together. Most parishes have people at the entranceway welcoming or greeting you each week. In some parishes, this ministry is referred to as *Greeters*. Don't we do the same thing when guests arrive at our homes for dinner or a party? We greet them and welcome them at the door into our homes. It is the same here at the church. In fact, here at Holy Cross, the greeters are also our ushers who take up the collection at Mass.

One of the **first** things we do when entering the church is to bless ourselves with holy water. This ritual is a reminder of our baptisms when we were baptized with water and signed with the cross.

Second, before taking a seat, we genuflect on one knee to acknowledge the presence of Christ in the tabernacle. New to us here at Holy Cross is the tabernacle in a very visible place in the sanctuary.

Third, we take the posture of standing when Mass begins. Standing is the traditional posture of a Christian at prayer. It expresses our attentiveness to the Word of God and our readiness to carry it out. At most weekend Masses, we also sing together. What better way to gather than to unite our thoughts and our voices in common word, rhythm, and melody.

Fourth, the priest or presider reminds us again of our baptism with the sign of the cross and the greeting: "The Lord be with you." It is a warm, friendly greeting wishing us a good day or a goodbye. It is also a profound statement of faith. It is an ancient biblical greeting found in the Hebrew scriptures.



Fifth, we are asked to pause and recall our need for salvation in the Penitential Rite, followed by the Gloria, which is either recited or sung. The Gloria is omitted during the Advent and Lenten seasons. At the close of this first part of the Mass is the Opening Prayer, when we join our minds and hearts in prayer together, responding "Amen" at the conclusion.

Next week, we shall move into the storytelling part of Liturgy of the Word.
