# **TO THE RESCUE**

### by Father Michael

When I was a little kid, my favorite show was *Emergency*. I looked forward to a new episode every Saturday night. It depicted paramedics in Los Angeles responding to a variety of calls. At the time this was cutting edge television. It was created by Jack Webb who was also responsible for shows like Dragnet and Adam-12. These were the first shows based on real-life situations. As a young boy, there was something attractive about the drama that was portrayed. As time moved on I came to the conclusion that as heroic as it was to be the one to chase down bad guys or rescue someone in distress, I did not have the abilities or temperament for that to be my life's work.

But as life unfolded I came to the realization that part of what I was called to do involves a rescue of one sort or another. I'm not so much talking about a physical emergency, but more of a spiritual emergency. Throughout my journey and formation process to priesthood, I was blessed with encountering good and holy people who helped me through difficult times. They also taught me well what it means to be a minister of the Lord. I have had the privilege of having profound and defining experiences on retreat. As precious as these gifts are to receive, even more so is the realization that I am now called to be the one to bring those experiences to others.

On a personal level there is something humbling and profound when I find myself in the situation to be the one to lead someone through a spiritual crisis. To be a minister of the sacraments is a grace-filled moment. It's not like I become the magic answer man, but rather try to allow the presence, compassion and wisdom of Christ to be at work in what I do and say.

While I always try to use my gifts well, it certainly goes beyond me. For many people Holy Cross has become a place of holy ground. There are many who were here from the very first days of the parish. The parish is now old enough to have people who were baptized here, to also now be married here. Holy Cross has woven itself deeply into the hearts of many people. And we are just one small part of a much larger universal Church.

Beyond any single priest or parish community, the presence of God's grace is a gift beyond measure. The Lord has the ability to reach deeply into the hearts of all people and bring life and hope, often out of the darkest moments of life. I don't know if depicting the work of ministry would ever be a successful TV show. But the lived experience of being in ministry reminds us that the Spirit can empower us to do heroic work. May we be grateful for those blessings we have received and be willing to share those blessings with those we meet.

# HERE COMES THE BRIDE

## (Lots and Lots of Brides) by Father Michael

### Marriage Statistics at Holy Cross:

- 2017: 18 (this was the highest number since 2009)
- 2018: 14
- 2019: 7 (an inexplicably low number for the year)
- 2020: 11
- 2021: 19
- 2022: 21 (additional arrangements are still being made)



Marriages at Holy Cross are on the increase. The pandemic caused many weddings to be rescheduled, but at this point we have caught up with all weddings that were impacted by the shutdown and related issues. I'm not sure what factors may be contributing to the increase.

There are two areas of parish life that are impacted by these higher numbers where we could use assistance. It's a happy problem. We love to have couples celebrate their marriages in the Church, but it means lots of helping hands are needed to make things run smoothly.

**Pre-Cana:** This is a required program for couples who wish to celebrate the Sacrament of Marriage in the Church. Married Pre-Cana Team Couples present different aspects of married life, followed by some questions for reflection. The goal is that it might spark conversation for each engaged couple to come to a deeper appreciation of their relationship. Engaged couples consistently report that this process is both helpful and energizing in understanding their relationship with each other.

Within the past two years we have adopted a new model for the structure of our parish Pre-Cana program. The entire program takes place in the course of one weekend. The first gathering is on Friday evening. Saturday is an all day undertaking which concludes with everyone attending the Saturday evening Mass.

**Wedding Rehearsals:** This is a practical component that allows those involved in the wedding celebration to be comfortable with the procession and logistics of the ceremony or Mass. In addition to walking everyone through the rehearsal, it is most helpful to have someone present on the day of the wedding to make sure everything is in good order.

If you have been blessed with a good marriage, would you consider sharing your experience with engaged couples? If you like the practical aspect of a wedding day, would you consider assisting with the rehearsals?



# LITURGY BYTES

## Church Seasons

Even though it is only November, the Church's year end is fast approaching. In order to help us celebrate and understand more fully the entire mystery of Jesus Christ from his Incarnation, birth, until he ascended into heaven, the day of Pentecost, and the expectation of his return in glory, we look to the liturgical calendar and the change of seasons within that special calendar. The Church's liturgical year consists of six seasons: Advent, Christmas, Lent, Triduum, Easter, Ordinary Time. The Liturgical Year



In a few weeks we will begin the season of Advent – the four weeks of preparation for the celebration of Jesus' birth. Next up is the Christmas season, not just one day, but a few weeks of recalling the birth of Our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. Then for a few weeks we have "winter" Ordinary Time, leading us right into Ash Wednesday and the solemn season of Lent which covers a six-week period. During holy week, we recall the suffering, death, and resurrection of Jesus within the Sacred Triduum (a three-day season) leading right into the great feast of Easter which we celebrate for fifty days in many joyful ways. At the conclusion of the Great 50 Days is Pentecost, referred to as the birthday of the Church with the sending forth of the Holy Spirit upon the Apostles and Mary. Then for two consecutive weeks we have Trinity Sunday and Corpus Christi solemnities that return us back to Ordinary time, part two, wherein we consider the fullness of Jesus' teachings and works among his people.

The mystery of Christ, unfolded through the cycle of the year, calls us to live his mystery in our own lives. This call is best illustrated in the lives of Mary and the saints, celebrated by the Church throughout the year.

So there it is in a nutshell, another year awaiting us to grow in our Faith!

e all depend on workers in America's meatprocessing plants and animal-feeding operations, who are essential to the food supply chain. Many of them are immigrants facing language barriers that leave them at a disadvantage when they advocate for safe working conditions, just wages, and fair treatment from employers. The Rural Community Workers Alliance (RCWA) in Missouri helps these essential workers by advocating on their behalf for safe working conditions and by promoting gatherings to address racial divisions in the community as a way to help immigrants and nonimmigrants discover similarities and share their experiences.


The COVID-19 pandemic revealed working conditions at a pork-processing plant that placed workers at risk of infection due to shoulder-to-shoulder work areas and a lack of protective gear. Workers brought their concerns to RCWA and ultimately filed a lawsuit demanding that the company follow health and safety guidelines established by the federal government. Even before the court ruled on the lawsuit, the company took action to protect workers by installing protective barriers, sanitizing stations, providing masks, and conducting temperature checks. When you support CCHD's mission of working on the margins, you help groups such as RCWA advocate for the health and safety of the essential workers that we all depend upon.

For many years the Cash Calendar was a part of the Holy Cross routine. This fundraiser provided some additional financial support to the parish. In addition, many parishioners enjoyed participating in it. Unfortunately, it was one of the many parts of parish life that was lost to COVID. At this time, it is unlikely that we have enough parishioners attending Mass on a weekly basis to support a monthly drawing. And so, we introduce the "*Fall Cash Fling.*" This is a similar idea, however it will be offered initially on a quarterly basis.

Because we anticipate smaller participation, there will be a different pay scale:


