

LORD, I AM NOT WORTHY

On Saturday morning I received a call on my cell phone. It was from a woman asking if I could go and anoint her mother-in-law. Saturday was already a packed day; there was a funeral, a wedding, Holy Hour, and then the usual confessions and 5:00 Mass. I asked if her death was imminent. The woman said that although she was declining, she did not think it was urgent. I said I would go immediately after the evening Mass.

I arrived at the house at 6:30. The woman was in a hospital bed in the family room of the house. Her husband, children, and grandchildren filled the home. She was unconscious but seemed to be comfortable. The family gathered around. I offered the Prayers for the Anointing of the Sick which includes the laying on of hands and anointing her forehead and hands. That was followed by the Commendation of the Dying. The prayer concludes with a final blessing. After that I offered a few words to the family recognizing that they were sharing in a beautiful but difficult task, journeying with someone to the end of this life. No sooner had I finished, when one of the granddaughters announced, "I think she has passed." In amazement we all looked at her, and in fact she was no longer breathing. Within a minute of receiving the sacrament, she passed away.

It was a moment of disbelief for all. Everyone in the family came forward to give a final embrace and kiss. Amid the tears was a silence that spoke volumes. Never before in 34 years of priestly ministry have I experienced someone dying so close to having received the sacrament. It was a remarkable moment for all.

There are times when priesthood has its challenges. Administrative duties can be taxing. Sometimes it is lonely. Wearing many hats can be exhausting. But then there are times like this that are just filled with wonder and awe. As a priest, there are moments when people allow you into very deep and personal moments in their lives. It is humbling to receive such levels of openness and trust. It is equally humbling to recognize that at that moment, I am the bearer of Christ's grace and presence.

Walking away from a moment of death is a grounding experience. I drove home in silence. I sat at a red light watching the cross traffic moving back and forth, thinking how all the little journeys we make, while necessary, are really quite trivial. I got home, made myself some dinner and quickly fell asleep on the couch. It was a fruitful day "in the vineyard." I was feeling very blessed recognizing what a rich gift I have been given. There are times when God calls us to moments of holiness that make us stand in awe of a gracious God.

LITURGY BYTES

Happy New Year!

It might seem like I am rushing the season and heading to 2023. Fortunately, I am not. Even though, as we look around, we notice Christmas decorations, holiday sales no matter where we go. Some houses are even decorated outside already for Christmas.

This year as a Church we will go from Thanksgiving right into the season of Advent, for the Advent season begins Thanksgiving weekend. On Thanksgiving morning, we will see the fall colors of flowers and mums on the altar and then that weekend, the purple will adorn the Church and sanctuary reminding us of that great time of waiting. Advent also marks the beginning of our liturgical year and so the "happy new year" greeting above!

Advent is a sacred season for a two-fold preparation: first, we as the Church ready ourselves for the second coming of Christ; and secondly, the Church prepares for a festive celebration of the birth of Jesus. The words *ready, wait and anticipation* have always surrounded Advent. My question today is, what do we anticipate?



The readings of Advent paint a poetic image of the lived justice and peace that will flourish in the Kingdom of God at the end of time. While Advent is marked by silence, stillness, and contemplation, we should realize that action is also necessary and needed. We should be doing acts of justice and mercy. It seems easier at this time of the year because we are engaged in widespread giving and generosity to our sisters and brothers, especially those in need. First and foremost, we all need to get our spiritual homes in order. We do see Advent as a season of penance but not the same as the season of Lent. Penitential doesn't mean an absence of joy. Also, signs like darkness and light guide both Advent and Christmas. How will they touch us this year?
