ADVENT CONTINUES

This is the longest Advent we can have. As Christmas falls on a Sunday this year that means the fourth week of Advent is a full week. We still have a full two weeks until we celebrate the birth of the Lord. May these days allow you to complete whatever preparations you need to do, but may it also be a spirit-filled time that lends itself to reflection and prayer. This third Sunday of the season is "Gaudete Sunday," which is meant to be a time of joy in the midst of the season of waiting.

This Wednesday we were serving as an annex station to the North Pole. The distribution of gift cards and presents took place. It is heartening to see how many people were touched by your generosity. In addition to the gifts themselves, moments like this are also reminders that people are not alone. Many people willingly share in their journey to offer a helping hand. A gift of hope is always a precious gift. Thank you for all you do to bring that gift to people within our community.

Last Sunday I attended the tree lighting service sponsored by the Nesconset Chamber of Commerce. Santa arrived for the festivities earlier than expected which threw the schedule of events out of order. But by 4:30 I blessed the tree and the switch was thrown. Although it was chilly, it could have been a much colder experience. It was a fun, little hometown gathering that I was happy to be at for the festivities.

The fiscal year for the Church operates on an academic calendar. The new fiscal year always begins on September 1st. It takes a while for us to summarize the concluding year and submit a report to the Diocese for review before the final reconciliation is complete. All of that was finalized this week. For the fiscal year that ended on August 31st, Holy Cross concluded with a surplus of \$17,000. This is a remarkable statement of your generosity and of our efforts to use well your gifts. Attendance is down about 15 - 20% of what it was pre-pandemic. In spite of having fewer people, the financial support has remained strong. We are indeed blessed. Not every parish is in this situation.

There are a few significant issues we will need to look at in the coming year. Our HVAC system is likely coming to the end of its life and will need to be replaced. There are other major repairs that need to be addressed. Have you noticed the colonnade in the courtyard is getting severely discolored and in places is beginning to flake apart? We are still trying to evaluate and prioritize what needs to be done. If any of you have an expertise in a particular area that would be helpful for this discussion, I would love to hear from you.

Wait with joy as we anticipate once again the gift of the Lord Jesus.



Advent Bits & Pieces



In addition to the change of color in the church and the Advent wreath adorning the left side of the Sanctuary here at Holy Cross, there are a few other interesting tidbits about this special season.

A popular tradition during the Advent season is the Jesse Tree. This tree, named for the father of David, is one that is decorated throughout the Advent season with symbols of biblical people who are historically associated with or came before the birth of Jesus. It includes people like Abraham, Noah, Moses, Mary, Joseph and John the Baptist, to name a few. These folks are represented by symbols associated with them in Scripture and hung on the tree as Jesus' ancestors who waited for the birth of their Savior.

Another tradition to look for is in the third week of Advent when the color changes to pink. It is referred to as Gaudete Sunday which means joy. The third candle on the Advent wreath, which is pink, is lit this week. Rose colored vestments are worn, and the Scriptures all relate to John the Baptist. A sense of the nearness of Christmas forms in our hearts and minds even more. We are joyful that Christmas is almost here!

Last, but not least, our Lady plays a very important role in the Advent season. We have her feast day December 8th—the Immaculate Conception—and on December 12th we honor her under the title of Our Lady of Guadalupe, the patroness of the Americas. She is mentioned in Scripture from the moment of her "Yes." She always points toward her Son, but Advent is an excellent time for us to also see the relationship of Mary with her Son. So, as the weeks are flying by, let us pray: Come Lord Jesus, we need you!

A special thank you to all those who signed up to create a basket but did not get the chance. The response to sign up was so great that we could not accommodate everyone. Next year we hope to



The December Dilemma 2022: Celebrating Religious Holidays in **Public Schools**

December holidays are always a challenge and educators often receive confusing advice about how to treat religious holidays. The last decades of increased diversity in our schools have challenged public schools to deal creatively and sensitively with student populations representing many faiths and beliefs, secular and religious. Happily, research reveals that celebrating Christmas and other holidays in the classroom brings children and teachers closer together, builds community links, and improves pupils' learning. (1)

A good way to deal with the December Dilemma is to begin the season with a focus on an often ignored holiday: Bill of Rights Day, December 15th. It was established to commemorate the adoption of the Bill of Rights to the U.S. Constitution on December 15, 1791. Beginning the season with activities around the Bill of Rights offers an opportunity for students to reflect on the civic values of rights, responsibility, and respect that all Americans share as citizens, no matter their religious or secular beliefs.

Senior fellow at the Freedom Forum, Charles Haynes, recommends that before planning holiday activities in public schools, choral directors, teachers, and administrators should ask themselves three simple questions:

- "1. *Do we have a clear educational purpose?* Under the First Amendment, learning about religious holidays is an appropriate educational goal - devotionally celebrating is not.
- 2. Will any student or parent be made to feel like an outsider by the concert, lesson or activity? Most parents and students are fine with learning about religious traditionsas long as the approach is academic, not devotional.
- 3. *Is our overall curriculum balanced and fair?* December shouldn't be the only time sacred music is in the curriculum. Students should learn about religious music from various world traditions at other times in the school year." (2)

Let your December explode with joy as you anticipate the Birth of the Christ Child with a manger on your lawn, Christmas lights on your bushes, a glowing tree in your window, a magnet on your car, a lapel pin on your coat, a donation to the local soup kitchen, a gift under your church's Giving Tree and an enthusiastic "Merry Christmas" greeting for all.
