# I HOPE YOU STILL FEEL SMALL...

A few weeks ago, on the evening of December 13, a meteor shower passed through our area. I made the effort to be outside in the middle of that chilly night, and what a wonderful experience it was. First, I am amazed that meteorologists and astronomers can even predict when something like this is about to happen. Then I was delighted in the random and unpredictable flashes of light



that crossed the sky. It did not have the drama or flare of a fireworks display, but yet there was something exciting about it. You never knew when the next meteor would pass by. Many were barely even noticeable, just a slight streak of light. Even the biggest of the meteors lasted less than a second, but they were grand.

Experiences like this are both important and grounding. We need reminders that there is always something bigger than any of us at work. We need to have moments when we are not in control. All of us have responsibilities that need to be met. There are serious issues that need to be addressed in our world. But if we do not keep our place and role in perspective, life will become overwhelming and impossible. At times we need to be people of action. But we also need to have moments where we step back and be reminded that all of us stand in the shadow of a powerful and loving God. It's not always about who we are and what we do. Sometimes we must simply allow ourselves to be enveloped in a God whose embrace always goes beyond our finest efforts.

The busyness of life can make us lose sight of this reality, so God keeps sending reminders to keep us in balance. Sometimes it is a show that Mother Nature presents. Other times there is a human dimension to it. Who does not stop and embrace the joy of a newborn child? It's one of those experiences that breaks our normal routine and thought patterns. We stop and delight in the gift of that child. On Christmas we are reminded that at a moment in time, God came into the world in the form of a newborn child. Be as enthralled with Jesus as you would be with your own child. Allow that experience to change your outlook on life, at least for a few moments. Don't rush to get back to "what's gotta get done." Jesus can transform hearts and lead us to paths of life. Heaven knows our world needs that.


In her 2000 song "I Hope You Dance," Lee Ann Womack sings, "I hope you still feel small when you stand beside the ocean." She's onto something great here.

She offers a tremendous insight into our own spiritual journey. We need to stop, breathe, and allow God to be God. We need to understand we are but a small piece in the great story. None of this is meant to belittle us or make us feel useless or helpless. Rather it helps to define that relationship we share with God. Sometimes we are called to participate with the Spirit and do good and holy work. But there are other times we simply need to let God reveal his presence and feel humbled and blessed to share in it. The greatness of God will never be experienced if there is too much of us in the way. Without any shame, guilt, or embarrassment we need to understand that we play a small place in the great universe.

None of us deserves the gift of the Lord Jesus. He is not our reward for getting it all right. Rather, he is the one who calls us back to that holy path that each of us must walk. May this Christmas be a time to be reminded of that profound presence of the Lord.

# **LITURGY BYTES**

## <u>The Nativity</u>

St. Francis of Assisi is associated with creating the first nativity in the city of Greccio. The Franciscans quickly spread the practice of creating nativity scenes with live animals and actors. Living scenes remained popular. However, so the scene could remain for a longer period of time, stationary pieces were used to depict the birth of Jesus.

As this tradition spread to other regions throughout the world, the nativity scene adapted to local customs. In Francis' native Italy, the figures began to resemble folks from the local village and not biblical figures. By the 19<sup>th</sup> century Protestant churches, who initially rejected nativity scenes, began to accept them as the popularity spread through a wider Christian world.

Francis' original nativity was inspired by his trip in 1221 to the Holy Land and Jesus' traditional birthplace. He was deeply moved visiting the site where God became fully human. Hoping others would enjoy this spiritual experience, he encouraged believers to make pilgrimages to Bethlehem. When conflict among the powers vying for control of the Holy Land made the trip too dangerous, Francis decided to do the next best thing by bringing Bethlehem to the pilgrims!

The popularity of nativity scenes grew and grew and brought people to the possibility of building their own. Today, it is on display in village squares, in our homes and most especially in our houses of worship. We do this to remember and celebrate the birth of Jesus on Christmas.

### AN OUTREACH CHRISTMAS THANK YOU!

We were once again blessed with a tremendous response to our Christmas Angel project. Our Outreach families were so incredibly grateful for the gift cards for their families. As parents and family members, we can appreciate how good it is to provide for our children's needs. By enabling these moms and dads to do the same accomplishes so much more than just handing them a gift someone else has bought. They can now provide in a way they could not before.



This year we helped 43 families with clothing and toys for 101 individuals, including 57 children. We collected enough gift cards to provide each person with approximately \$25 for clothing needs and an additional \$25 per child for their toy requests. Also, each household received a supermarket card to help with their holiday meal. This means we collected and distributed over \$4900 in store gift cards and about \$2400 in supermarket cards.

Wishing you the peace, hope and joy of our Lord during this holy season of Christmas. Thank you to all who donated money, gift cards, gifts for the agencies we support and special donations. Your generosity has allowed us to continue serving those in need and bring hope during this challenging year. On behalf of all those we serve, THANK YOU! You are truly special ANGELS! #### Holy Cross - 1st Quarter Financial Highlights - September 1, 2021 – November 30, 2021

#### **Revenues:**

- Collections this quarter were up 12.4% as we took in \$144,644 in comparison to last year this quarter which was \$128,711. Our RAMR was up 26.9% taking in \$8,849 in contrast to last year this quarter at \$6,975. Overall collections for this year were up 12.1%.
- The "Fall Cash Fling" was our fall fundraiser. We profited \$1,505 for the 3 months it ran. We are appreciative to those who participated and for the extra income it brought in. Congratulations to the lucky winners of the Fall Cash Fling!
- Religious Ed. was up 13.1% this quarter over last year. Contributing to that were some Confirmation donations, and donations made from the very successful "Spooky Spectacular Halloween Party" that was held in October for our little ones. In Religious Ed. we currently have 872 students from the 568 families that are registered in our program for the 21-22 school year.
- Outreach was down .9% for this quarter. In dollars we took in \$8,614. In October there was an outpouring of kindness shown during the Respect Life Month "Diaper and Formula Drive." Those items were sent to the Life Center in Deer Park. In addition, we were able to distribute 36 baskets for Thanksgiving and had more folks offer to donate baskets than were needed. This once again reflects the overwhelming generosity of our parish community and your willingness to help our neighbors who are currently experiencing difficulties in various ways.
- Our "Seniors' Club" is back in full swing and regularly meeting twice per month in the atrium. Additionally, our "Stitchers" meet weekly on Tuesdays, and our Scripture Study group is here twice per month as well. It is great to see groups actively attending the programs that our parish offers throughout the week.
- Income generated through Baptisms, Weddings, Funerals, and Mass Intentions were all up again this quarter over last year at 22.9%. We have continued to have many new babies welcomed into our Catholic Faith and quite a few couples saying "I do."
- Our rental income, which is generated from the Verizon tower, once again brought in \$8,694 this quarter. Other substantial income included Votives, a donation from our Eagle Scout John Gemmell in the amount of \$369 which was a surplus from the expenses of his project, and other donations. All included we deposited \$29,916 from these items, an increase of 20.9% over last year this time.
- Diocesan Collections were down 15.2% for the quarter. Your generosity towards these worthy causes, no matter how big or small, is always greatly appreciated!
- Compared to the same time last year, overall income was up 14.2% this quarter. We offer our sincerest thanks to you, our generous parishioners, for your ongoing support and dedication to our parish.

#### Expenses:

- Salaries were down 9.4% this quarter. Contributing factors to this decrease include bookkeeping changes and decreased hours in some areas. Sadly, our staff said goodbye to Vincent Matula who is moving towards job opportunities that will further his career. We are thrilled to still see him at Mass on Sundays and wish him the very best.
- Religious Ed. expenses were down this quarter by 3.7%. Tricia and Mary did a fabulous job of utilizing materials and minimizing waste when purchasing supplies.
- Outreach expenses were up 83.1% this quarter over last year this time. We offered many additional programs this fall and were able to help clients once again with household bills. As always, we are happy to have the means to assist our friends who could use a helping hand at this time.
- Office expenses were 43.8% lower this quarter over last year, and building expenses were down 13.4%. Rectory expenses were down 33.6%. Good job turning off your lights Fr. Michael!
- Major repairs were down 26.1% for the quarter.
- Overall, this quarter in comparison to last year, expenses were down 4.2%.

### Marriage Statistics at Holy Cross:

- 2017: 18 (this was the highest number since 2009)
- 2018: 14
- 2019: 7 (an inexplicably low number for the year)
- 2020: 11
- 2021: 19
- 2022: 21 (additional arrangements are still being made)



Marriages at Holy Cross are on the increase. The pandemic caused many weddings to be rescheduled, but at this point we have caught up with all weddings that were impacted by the shutdown and related issues. I'm not sure what factors may be contributing to the increase.

There are two areas of parish life that are impacted by these higher numbers where we could use assistance. It's a happy problem. We love to have couples celebrate their marriages in the Church, but it means lots of helping hands are needed to make things run smoothly.

**Pre-Cana:** This is a required program for couples who wish to celebrate the Sacrament of Marriage in the Church. Married Pre-Cana Team Couples present different aspects of married life, followed by some questions for reflection. The goal is that it might spark conversation for each engaged couple to come to a deeper appreciation of their relationship. Engaged couples consistently report that this process is both helpful and energizing in understanding their relationship with each other.

Within the past two years we have adopted a new model for the structure of our parish Pre-Cana program. The entire program takes place in the course of one weekend. The first gathering is on Friday evening. Saturday is an all day undertaking which concludes with everyone attending the Saturday evening Mass.

**Wedding Rehearsals:** This is a practical component that allows those involved in the wedding celebration to be comfortable with the procession and logistics of the ceremony or Mass. In addition to walking everyone through the rehearsal, it is most helpful to have someone present on the day of the wedding to make sure everything is in good order.

If you have been blessed with a good marriage, would you consider sharing your experience with engaged couples? If you like the practical aspect of a wedding day, would you consider assisting with the rehearsals?

I have taken great care in creating a Website in which "getting lost" while navigating its pages should be a "thing of the past." At the bottom of each Page there is a Question which asks... "Where Would You Like To Go Now?"... showing direct links to frequently viewed Webpages and thereby making it easier to navigate through the Website without having to always return to the Top Menu Bar. <u>Please be</u> <u>sure to "scroll down" to the bottom of each page</u> and surf it in its entirety in order to not "miss out" on any information that may be "lurking" beyond your screen's viewing area. <u>Some Pages are lengthy and filled</u> with an abundance of information as well as with "links to click" which will direct you elsewhere on the Website for quicker navigating. The Home Page is an example of this type of page.

The <u>Home Page is the "Heart" of the Website</u> and contains much information and "links" to other sources of information. It is comprised of <u>Six Basic Sections</u>: [1] <u>General Parish Information</u>, [2] the "<u>Fast-Track" Section</u> to speed you to particular areas of the Website by asking you Questions, [3] "<u>Church News.</u>" [4] "<u>What's Happening</u>" in the Parish, [5] "<u>Parish & Seasonal Upcoming Events</u>" of the Parish & [6] "<u>Schedules</u>" for various Parish Ministries. <u>Should you take the time to routinely navigate this page from top to bottom... it would be like "reading" the weekly Bulletin from cover to cover</u>. Doing this will keep you updated on the "pulse" of the Parish... give you "the scoop" on all the Parish news & activities... and will provide you with the "links" to the appropriate pages for more detailed information, all the while eliminating extensive searching. (<u>Always remember that if you had inadvertently misplaced or already discarded your Bulletin, you can find all of the same information on the Website since the <u>Bulletin and the Website are both always in "sync" with each other.</u>) If you already know the specific location that you wish to visit on the Website, you can use the traditional Menu Bar at the top of each page or the "E-Z" Navigation Page, which I describe in the next paragraph.</u>

The <u>"E-Z" Navigation Page</u> is a very useful "<u>Find and Go-To</u>" feature that I developed specifically for the Parish Website since <u>all of the Website Pages on this page are sorted by Parish Usage &</u> <u>Departmental Categories</u>. I strongly encourage you to try using this page... It truly makes it "E-Z" to navigate and to find your desired page and information quickly. I also <u>encourage you to "Subscribe" with your EMail to Holy Cross on the Home Page</u> in order for you to be able to receive important urgent announcements & information, in the form of "email blasts" (never spam) from the parish in the future. I reiterate that you will never receive any spam from the Holy Cross Website. But most importantly, this will be just another way for the parish & staff members to inform you of important and useful parish information & events more quickly and easily by "keeping you in the loop" of detailed Parish situations.

Should you have any suggestions or ideas about incorporating any other useful Parish Information into the Website, please do not hesitate contacting the Parish Office with those suggestions. If your suggestions are within the capabilities of the Website Design Software, we will consider them to be implemented in future updates & design changes. We always welcome your suggestions for a better "living" and vibrant Parish Website.

#### Christmas 2021

To the People of God of the Diocese of Rockville Centre:

On December 1, 2019, Our Holy Father Pope Francis issued *Admirabile Signum*, an Apostolic Letter *On the Meaning and Importance of the Nativity Scene*. It is a beautiful reflection that I draw on every Christmas season and one which I urge you to read and pray.<sup>1</sup>

In it, the Holy Father reminds us that the simple act of arranging our Nativity set links us to the past, opens questions for the present, and orients the future. It is an act that has an existential impact.

Pope Francis says: "Setting up the Christmas creche in our homes helps us to relive the history of what took place in Bethlehem. Naturally, the Gospels remain our source for understanding and reflecting on the event. At the same time, its portrayal in the creche helps us to imagine the scene. It touches our hearts and makes us enter into salvation history as contemporaries of an event that is living and real in a broad gamut of historical and cultural contexts."

The beautiful scene of parents and grandparents setting up creches together with children and grandchildren is a powerful multi-dimensional experience of catechesis – the teaching and passing on of our Catholic faith and our belief in the Incarnation of Jesus Christ to the next generation.

Parents and grandparents have that wisdom of teaching children and grandchildren how to assemble and situate the creche, but at the same time, they also have the catechetical and relational sensitivity to let children and grandchildren make choices about where the shepherds, the sheep, the three kings are to be placed.

Children are encouraged to place the Holy Family – Mary, Joseph and the Prince of Peace – with their own hands into the center of the creche. How often children then enjoy, sometimes on their own and sometimes with brothers and sisters and family members, moving and interacting with the figurines. How often their biblical imaginations and souls are set on fire with God's love as they play with their family Nativity sets.

The Holy Father continues: "I would like now to reflect on the various elements of the nativity scene in order to appreciate their deeper meaning. First, there is the background of a starry sky wrapped in the darkness and silence of night. We represent this not only out of fidelity to the Gospel accounts, but also for its symbolic value. We can think of all those times in our lives when we have experienced the darkness of night. Yet even then, God does not abandon us, but is there to answer our crucial questions about the

meaning of life. Who am I? Where do I come from? Why was I born at this time in history? Why do I love? Why do I suffer? Why will I die? It was to answer these questions that God became man. His closeness brings light where there is darkness and shows the way to those dwelling in the shadow of suffering (cf. Luke 1:79)."

We can drift through life dodging and repressing these critical existential questions of life. We can live blindly and superficially.

Our Catholic belief in the unity of the Nativity and the Crucifixion, the Creche and the Cross, Bethlehem and Golgotha keeps our lives centered and focused on the things that really count in our short time on earth – the Last Things (Death, Judgment, Heaven and Hell) and a belief in the Eternal Joy of Heaven, our true home.

The Holy Father continues to press the existential questions: "The presence of the poor and the lowly in the nativity scene remind us that God became man for the sake of those who feel most in need of his love and who ask him to draw near to them. Jesus, 'gentle and humble in heart' (Matthew 11:29), was born in poverty and led a simple life in order to teach us to recognize what is essential and to act accordingly. The nativity scene clearly teaches that we cannot let ourselves be fooled by wealth and fleeting promises of happiness. We see Herod's palace in the background, closed and deaf to the tidings of joy. By being born in a manger, God himself launches the only true revolution that can give hope and dignity to the disinherited and the outcast: the revolution of love, the revolution of tenderness. From the manger, Jesus proclaims, in a meek yet powerful way, the need for sharing with the poor as the path to a more human and fraternal world in which no one is excluded or marginalized."

May our prayer, silent contemplation and creative family catechesis of the Nativity scene help us to be instruments of a Gospel revolution of humility, charity, mercy, tenderness, and solidarity with the sick, the poor and the suffering.

May our commitment to "holiness and mission" bless our contemplative Synodal listening and our Eucharistic Revival and Evangelization.
