

THE FIRST RAYS OF SUN

What to write about when you don't know what to write about . . .

Bear with me if I have shared this story with you already. In March of 2018, I organized a trip from Holy Cross to spend a few nights in New Orleans and then take a 5-night cruise to Mexico. This was shortly after my mom had passed away. On the final morning of the cruise, while we were still a few hours out at sea, I received notice that our flight home had been cancelled. A nor'easter in New York had virtually shut down all air travel. I was in a state of panic. I was responsible for a group of about 40 travelers who now had nowhere to go once we reached port. I was rather panicked as I sat in my cabin trying to figure out what our options might be. I gazed out the window just as the rising sun was breaking through a cloud. I don't know how or why, but I had an overwhelming feeling that my mom said to me, "Don't worry, you'll rise to the occasion and figure it out." I don't ever remember a single ray of sunshine being such a powerful moment. In the end, after about 6 hours of scrambling around, we had a solution of how everyone was to get home the next day (except Barbara and Steve Shipman, but that is another story for another day).

I usually get up early in the morning. I find it the most productive time of the day. Although I am not always a dynamo of efficiency, the passing time always feels alive and vibrant. While I prefer the longer days of summer, there is something exhilarating about watching the night sky slowly give way to the rising sun. Sometimes the colors are just beautiful.

A few days ago I was taken aback by the first rays of sun hitting the tips of the tallest trees. I don't know why it struck me as it did, but I was drawn into a simple but profound moment. It's as if the earth was being renewed in the goodness of God's grace as a new day dawned. I tried being philosophical by thinking it is those tallest branches that dare to reach the highest, that truly know the power of God. And then the Spirit told me to stop thinking and just enjoy this moment; not everything has to be a homily.

Perhaps for you it is the smile of your grandchild, the nudging of your faithful dog, or the twinkling of the evening stars. I pray God has given you simple moments like this that ground you deeply in his presence. Moments like this don't take away the woes of life, but somehow help to keep things in balance. Be filled with gratitude for blessings great and small.

LITURGY BYTES

Here Comes Lent



Ash Wednesday is late this year, March 2nd to be exact, bringing us to Easter on April 17th. With the cold and snowy January we have had, spring will happen on March 20th! Daylight is lasting longer each day, also showing us spring is on the horizon. In fact, the name Lent simply means “spring.” It is thought to have Germanic roots and seems likely to have been used to describe the season when the days began to lengthen, signifying new life and renewal. Over time, the word Lent came to be linked specifically to the Christian tradition of fasting before Easter.

Lent draws its inspiration from the 40 days Jesus spent in the desert. During this time, the Gospels tell us that Jesus fasted as he resisted Satan’s temptations before heading to Galilee to begin his public ministry. As Ash Wednesday draws near, many Catholics begin wondering what they will do for Lent or what they will give up for Lent. Either one is beneficial for each of us to consider. Lenten sacrifices are valuable if they help increase our reliance on Jesus and if the void we create by giving something up opens up space in our hearts for God to fill. Another aspect to consider for Lent which is helpful, is to commit to something additional in our lives like attending daily Mass during Lent, for example.

Perhaps a question to ponder for ourselves is, what other actions can we take to better ignite our faith this Lent? Why not seek the Lord in prayer by reading more Scripture, or serve our brothers and sisters in need by almsgiving, or make fasting a part of your everyday life? There is much food for thought for each of us as Lent 2022 draws near. Some of the changes in the Liturgy that we notice are the elimination of the Gloria and the Alleluia before the Gospel reading, as well as the change from green to purple with banners and vestments.

So, as we embrace Lent with the visible outward sign of ashes, it is important to reflect on the inner conversion that needs to take place within each of us!

ASHES & ASH WEDNESDAY



On **Wednesday, March 2nd**, countless Christians will receive ashes. This symbolizes the beginning of our **40 Day Journey through Lent**. As this significant day in the life of Christians arrives, we wonder **WHY ARE WE RECEIVING ASHES?** We must be careful not to judge others' intentions, but we are challenged to reflect on our own motives for being blessed with ashes.

- **Ashes have been considered a sign of penance.**
- **Christ is the beginning and the end of our life's journey.**
- **We are called to internal conversion and change of heart.**
- **We consciously are entering into the central mystery of our faith...
that the way to Resurrection is by way of the Cross.**

WHY RECEIVE ASHES? Ashes are meant to be an external sign of our interior desire to make these 40 days of Lent a special and sacred time. We begin Lent with ashes, reminding us of our need to die to anything that keeps us from growing in the love of God.

“Repent, and believe in the Gospel.”

7 AM, 9 AM Mass, 12 Noon, 4 PM, 5:30 PM & 7 PM.**

Children and Ashes...

Our 4:00 and 5:30 PM services will be more “child friendly.” These services will be shorter, with a homily geared to a child’s understanding. This will enable the children to enter into the spirit of Lent in a manner appropriate for their age.

Fast and Abstinence

All Catholics who have reached their fourteenth year are bound to abstain entirely from meat on Ash Wednesday and all the Fridays of Lent. All Catholics between the ages of eighteen and fifty-nine inclusive are also bound to observe the law of fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. This means limiting oneself to a single full meal and avoiding food between meals. Two other light meals, which together do not equal a full meal, may be taken during the day.



PARISH OUTREACH


Wish List

SOME WORDS FROM THE WEBMASTER...

JUST A LITTLE BIT ABOUT THIS WEBSITE'S NEW FEATURES!!!

May I welcome all of you today along with a statement that many parishioners & staff members have often heard me say. "A Website is a 'Living Entity'... It is never finished or completed... because it is constantly in the midst of updates, changes & growth." Having reiterated this, I hope that you enjoy using this Website as much as I have enjoyed creating it and daily enjoy updating it. With its future growth potential, this Website will excitedly offer to all of our Holy Cross Parish Parishioners as well as our welcomed new, Prospective Parishioners, many more possibilities in the sharing of parish information with all who navigate here.

I have taken great care in creating a Website in which "getting lost" while navigating its pages should be a "thing of the past." At the bottom of each Page there is a Question which asks... "Where Would You Like To Go Now?"... displaying direct links to widely used Webpages, and making it easier to navigate through the Website without having to always return to the Top Menu Bar. Please be sure to "scroll down" to the bottom of each page and surf it in its entirety in order to not "miss out" on any information that may be "lurking" beyond your screen's viewing area. Some Pages are lengthy and filled with an abundance of information as well as with "links to click" which will direct you elsewhere on the Website for quicker navigating. The Home Page is an example of this type of page.

The Home Page is the "Heart" of the Website and contains much information and "links" to other sources of information. It is comprised of Six Basic Sections: [1] General Parish Information, [2] the "Fast Track" Section to speed you to particular areas of the Website by asking you Questions, [3] "Church News," [4] "What's Happening" in the Parish, [5] "Parish & Seasonal Upcoming Events" of the Parish and [6] "Schedules" for various Parish Ministries. Should you take the time to routinely navigate this page from top to bottom... it would be like "reading" the weekly Bulletin from cover to cover. Doing this will keep you updated on the "pulse" of the Parish... give you "the scoop" on all the Parish news & activities... and will provide you with the "links" to the appropriate pages for more detailed information, all the while eliminating extensive searching. Always remember that if you had inadvertently misplaced or already discarded your Bulletin, you can find all of the same information on the Website since the Bulletin and the Website are always in "sync" with each other. If you already know the specific location that you wish to visit on the Website, you can use the traditional Menu Bar at the top of each page or the "E-Z" Navigation Page, which I describe in the next paragraph.

The "E-Z" Navigation Page is a very useful "Find and Go-To" feature that I developed specifically for the Parish Website since all of the Website Pages on this page are sorted by Parish Usage & Departmental Categories. I strongly encourage you to try using this page... It truly makes it "E-Z" to navigate and to find your desired page and information quickly. I also encourage you to "Subscribe" with your EMail to Holy Cross on the Home Page in order for you to be able to receive important urgent announcements & information, in the form of "email blasts" (never spam) from the parish in the future. I reiterate that you will never receive any spam from the Holy Cross Website. But most importantly, this will be just another way for the parish & staff members to inform you of important and useful parish information & events more quickly and easily by "keeping you in the loop" of detailed Parish situations.

Should you have any suggestions or ideas about incorporating any other useful Parish Information into the Website, please do not hesitate contacting the Parish Office with those suggestions. If your suggestions are within the capabilities of the Website Design Software, we will consider them to be implemented in future updates & design changes. Remember... this is a "growing" and "expanding" Website.

We always welcome your suggestions for a better "living" and vibrant Parish Website. We look forward to all of the days ahead that God graces us as true "family members" in this, our community of the Parish of the Holy Cross!


