

On occasion, it is probably a good thing to change up our daily routines. Most of us are not likely to choose to do this too often. But, then every once in a while, Mother Nature comes along and says it's time for a change whether you want it or not. That's what happened last Saturday as all of us found ourselves sitting at home watching 20+ inches of snow fall around us.

I'm sure the responses to moments like this are tremendously varied. For some it is an occasion to make a pot of home-made soup, light a few candles, and enjoy a quiet day. I suppose those with children find the possibilities could be many: joy at being able to play outside in the snow, pent up energy inside the house waiting for the weather to clear, or maybe an opportunity for some unscheduled family time. ## **LITURGY BYTES**

### "Lord I Am Not Worthy"

The above captioned words are familiar as we say them each week at Mass. You might be asking, where do these words come from? Actually, it is a powerful and true faith story that appears in the Gospels, in both Matthew and Luke.




It is the story of the Roman Centurion who has heard of Jesus and his great deeds. The Centurion seeks out Jesus to help him because his servant is paralyzed and in pain. Jesus agrees and offers to come to the Centurion's home to cure the servant. It is here that the Centurion utters these immensely powerful words: "Lord, I am not worthy to have you come under my roof; but only speak the word, and my servant will be healed."

The Centurion was a Gentile and was considered ineligible for the promises the Lord made to the Israelites, the Chosen people. However, the Centurion had faith that Jesus could heal his servant. He even called Jesus "Lord." Because of this, Jesus was willing to go to his house, even though it was forbidden and, according to Jewish standards, would make Jesus unclean. In the end, this story speaks of great faith and about what Jesus would do to bring health, wholeness, and salvation.

It is not a surprise that the Church would put these words of the Centurion in our mouths as we prepare to receive the gift of the Eucharist at Mass. Keep in mind that this revised translation of the Roman Missal is not emphasizing our "unworthiness." Truly, none of us is worthy of so great a gift as the Eucharist. It is not on merit that we are admitted to this great banquet. Rather, *it is our faith in Jesus*—the same faith as had by the Centurion! God's grace given in the sacrament of the Eucharist is a free gift. We need only respond and accept this gift. The full response of the Centurion helps us to recognize that Christ's promise of health, wholeness, and salvation is ours if we accept the invitation. That promise is fulfilled in the Eucharist!



## JUST SOME WORDS FROM THE WEBMASTER!!! THE PARISH WEBSITE... AND "JUST A LITTLE BIT ABOUT IT"

May I Welcome all of you today along with a statement that many parishioners & staff members have often heard me say. "A Website is a 'Living Entity'... It is never finished or completed... because it is constantly in the midst of updates, changes & growth." Having reiterated this, I hope that you enjoy using this Website as much as I have enjoyed creating it and daily enjoy updating it. With its future growth potential, this Website will excitedly offer to all of our Holy Cross Parish Parishioners as well as our welcomed new, Prospective Parishioners, many more possibilities in the sharing of parish information with all who navigate here.

I have taken great care in creating a Website in which "getting lost" while navigating its pages should be a "thing of the past." At the bottom of each Page there is a Question which asks... "Where Would You Like To Go Now?"... showing direct links to frequently viewed Webpages and thereby making it easier to navigate through the Website without having to always return to the Top Menu Bar. Please be sure to "scroll down" to the bottom of each page and surf it in its entirety in order to not "miss out" on any information that may be "lurking" beyond your screen's viewing area. Some Pages are lengthy and filled with an abundance of information as well as with "links to click" which will direct you elsewhere on the Website for quicker navigating. The Home Page is an example of this type of page.

The <u>Home Page is the "Heart" of the Website</u> and contains much information and "links" to other sources of information. It is comprised of <u>Six Basic Sections</u>: [1] <u>General Parish Information</u>, [2] the "<u>Fast-Track" Section</u> to speed you to particular areas of the Website by asking you Questions, [3] "<u>Church News</u>," [4] "<u>What's Happening</u>" in the Parish, [5] "<u>Parish & Seasonal Upcoming Events</u>" of the Parish & [6] "<u>Schedules</u>" for various Parish Ministries. Should you take the time to routinely navigate this page from top to bottom... it would be like "reading" the weekly Bulletin from cover to cover. Doing this will keep you updated on the "pulse" of the Parish... give you "the scoop" on all the Parish news & activities... and will provide you with the "links" to the appropriate pages for more detailed information, all the while eliminating extensive searching. (Always remember that if you had inadvertently misplaced or already discarded your Bulletin, you can find all of the same information on the Website since the Bulletin and the Website are both always in "sync" with each other.) If you already know the specific location that you wish to visit on the Website, you can use the traditional Menu Bar at the top of each page or the "E-Z" Navigation Page, which I describe in the next paragraph.

The "E-Z" Navigation Page is a very useful "Find and Go-To" feature that I developed specifically for the Parish Website since all of the Website Pages on this page are sorted by Parish Usage & Departmental Categories. I strongly encourage you to try using this page... It truly makes it "E-Z" to navigate and to find your desired page and information quickly. I also encourage you to "Subscribe" with your EMail to Holy Cross on the Home Page in order for you to be able to receive important urgent announcements & information, in the form of "email blasts" (never spam) from the parish in the future. I reiterate that you will never receive any spam from the Holy Cross Website. But most importantly, this will be just another way for the parish & staff members to inform you of important and useful parish information & events more quickly and easily by "keeping you in the loop" of detailed Parish situations.

Should you have any suggestions or ideas about incorporating any other useful Parish Information into the Website, please do not hesitate contacting the Parish Office with those suggestions. If your suggestions are within the capabilities of the Website Design Software, we will consider them to be implemented in future updates & design changes. We always welcome your suggestions for a better "living" and vibrant Parish Website.

## Winter Windfall

For many years the Cash Calendar was a part of the Holy Cross routine. This fundraiser provided some additional financial support to the parish. In addition, many parishioners enjoyed participating in it. Unfortunately, it was one of the many parts of parish life that was lost to COVID. At this time, it is unlikely that we have enough parishioners attending Mass on a weekly basis to support a monthly drawing. And so, we introduce the "Winter Windfall." This is a similar idea, however it will be offered initially on a quarterly basis.
