# FIGHT MY BATTLES/SURROUNDED-Part 4

*by Father Michael*

This week's scripture readings beautifully weave themselves into our Lenten theme of Fight My Battles/Surrounded. Part of the gospel reading uses the images of darkness and light. There is one phrase in particular that is probably routinely dismissed because it sounds as though it goes against common sense: "the light came into the world, but people preferred darkness to light." I am convinced this passage touches a truth that is present in the lives of many people. All of us sooner or later face a challenge or situation that is difficult to deal with. Rather than mustering the strength to address what needs to be addressed we come up with clever ways of not dealing with it. Sometimes we try putting a band-aid on something that requires surgery. Sometimes we do nothing in hopes the problem will resolve itself. Sometimes we make ourselves too busy doing other things rather than addressing the more pressing issue. Whenever something like this happens, we are choosing darkness over the light of truth that needs to be faced. The anthem for these days is "Fight my Battles." Dare to stand in the face of that which is a challenge. It takes fortitude, courage, and faith to walk this less traveled road.

When this happens, there is a great paradox that unfolds. Yes, it takes our courage, efforts and desires to face the battles of our lives. But, in the end, the fruits that come from what we do are not our own accomplishments but are ultimately gifts from God. St. Paul says this week in his letter to the Ephesians, "for by grace you have been saved through faith, and this is not from you; it is the gift of God." That is why the words of our song for this season echo words of truth: "It may look like I'm surrounded (by the pain, brokenness, fears, etc. of my life) but I'm surrounded by You (the presence and grace of God)." It is a difficult path to walk but one that is ultimately about life. That is what we believe Jesus experienced in the desert.

This week we use the image of darkness and light. The small candles in front of the Lenten cross are the same candles that were used by our First Communion children when they celebrated the Sacrament of Reconciliation for the first time. The theme of their prayer was also darkness and light. Our lives are woven together and sooner or later they come to the cross. Allow the power of the cross to transform your life.

Lent may be more than half over, but it is not too late to embrace the invitation of these days. Continue to seek to understand the truth of your life and where you are in the journey. Allow the Lord to lead you to places that will ultimately fill you with his new life and hope.

By the way, enjoy the extra hour of sunlight later in the day as we move our clocks and "spring ahead." Early signs of spring often bring a dose of enthusiasm and joy with them.

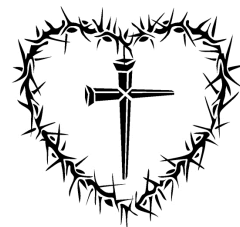

# LITURGY BYTES

## Meeting Jesus



Did anyone ever ask you if you ever met Jesus? Were you ever able to hear his voice calling you for supper? Have you shaken his hand or sat at his feet listening to him teach? For Catholics, the answer to these questions is YES.

We meet Jesus, hear his voice, shake his hand, listen to him teaching us when we join together at Mass. Naturally, we also dine with him as we eat his body and blood at the Eucharistic celebration either on Sunday or at weekday Mass.

We need things to see, to touch, to taste, and to smell. These all lead to that personal encounter with Jesus at Mass. The Liturgy and, in fact, all the Sacraments are done with “things” like bread, wine, water, fragrance, fire, fabrics, words, sounds, silence, gestures, space, movement, action, time, and light. The Sacraments of the Church give us physical, material moments, when we can truly meet Jesus Christ.

The Pope tells us that “in the Eucharist and in all the Sacraments we are guaranteed the possibility of encountering the Lord Jesus and of having the power of his Paschal Mystery reach us.” We do not have to guess or wonder when we celebrate the Eucharist that Jesus is there, truly present. He comes to us in very real ways, actually in multiple ways at Mass. At Mass, Jesus is present in his holy Word, in the Eucharist, and in the assembly of people gathered.

May I suggest some reflection on the meaning and how it plays out in our lives, as we continue to pray for and encourage those around us who have drifted away from this beautiful and nourishing gift of receiving Jesus at Mass each week.

Why do you think the Sacraments are not celebrated with words alone? Why is it important that the Sacraments be celebrated with concrete things like water, wine, bread, oil? Does it surprise you to learn that Jesus is present in other ways beyond the Eucharist? Pray about it!

## Eat Simply Recipe

During this Lenten Season, Eat Simply asks how you and your family will be uniting yourselves with our struggling neighbors and with the starving of the world. We encourage you to reflect, discuss and to decide how you will eat more basic meals during Lent as you participate in Eat Simply.

What is a “simple meal” in your house? Below is a recipe that is easy and quick and considered a “simple meal.” If you have a favorite “simple” recipe, perhaps you would like to share it, and we would be happy to share it in the bulletin and on the website.

### Healthy Veggie-Loaded Vegetable Soup — Ingredients

- 2 tablespoons Extra Virgin Olive Oil
- 1 Large Onion (diced)
- 4 cloves Garlic (minced)
- 3 Medium Carrots (diced)
- 3 stalks Celery (diced)
- 2 Medium Potatoes (peeled and diced, use Russet)
- 2 teaspoons Italian Seasoning
- 4 cups Vegetable Broth (+ 1 cup water, use Better Than Bouillon)
- 2 15-ounces cans Tomatoes (diced)
- 1 cup Corn Kernels (use frozen)
- 1 15-ounce can Kidney Beans (drained and rinsed)
- 1 Bay Leaf
- ¼ cup Fresh Parsley (chopped)
- 1 tablespoon Lemon Juice (freshly squeezed, or to taste)
- 1 ½ teaspoons Kosher Salt (or to taste + freshly ground black pepper)



### Directions

1. Heat oil in a large dutch oven over medium-low heat. Once hot, add onion and 1 tsp kosher salt and cook for 5 minutes, stirring often. Add garlic, carrots, celery, and potatoes and cook for 5 more minutes, stirring often. Add Italian seasoning and cook for 1 more minute.
2. Add broth, water, tomatoes, corn, beans, bay leaf, and several grinds of black pepper. Bring to a boil and then reduce the heat to low and simmer, covered, until the vegetables are tender, about 35 minutes.
3. Remove from heat and stir in parsley and lemon juice. Remove bay leaf and season to taste with salt and pepper. Serve hot with crusty bread. Enjoy!
