

WELLSPRING OF LIFE

When I was in the seminary I once made a retreat during the winter break that was a bit on the rustic side. It was in a cabin on a mountain near Ellenville, NY. It was affectionately known as "Fred's Mountain." The cabin was owned by Msgr. Fred Schaefer. Although he was not on the seminary faculty, he often worked with the seminary. Every year he offered this guided retreat to about a half dozen seminarians. The only access to the cabin was via snowmobile. It had no electricity; oil lamps and flashlights were our only source of light. Wood stoves provided the only heat. Water had to be brought in from a well.

My chore for the week was water patrol—call me Gunga Din. Twice a day I had to bring in multiple 5-gallon buckets of water that were needed throughout the day for washing, cooking and flushing. This was my first experience of having to deal with a well. It was a hole in the ground about three feet wide. Although it was winter, the water was not frozen as there was constant movement to it. I would dip a smaller bucket into the hole and slowly fill my fleet of empty larger buckets. No sooner had I taken a bucket of water out, the water returned to the same level. The water never overflowed, but the level never decreased. It was a remarkable experience of taking and having it immediately replace itself.

This is not a complaint. But this was one of the busiest and craziest weeks I have had at Holy Cross. As I write this column, six funerals have already been scheduled and the seventh is on its way. We booked seven appointments with new couples who would like to get married here. About the same number of inquiries came in for baptisms. Throw in a home visit or two, a Holy Day, daily Mass, and the usual desk full of paperwork, and it came out to be a rather remarkable week.

I suppose I could come up with a list of reasons why I could feel overwhelmed and exhausted, but I can't. As one pastoral need came in after another, it was like the Holy Spirit was there to provide the focus and compassion I needed. I also needed the help of others on the Pastoral Team and Staff to point me in the right direction at the right time. But, as one thing followed another, I just felt the grace of the Lord giving me the strength I needed to minister to the needs before me. I can't help but think of that well in the middle of winter. The supply of water remained ever abundant. God's grace and strength remains ever abundant.

I suppose at one point I may need to put my feet up and take a breather. But, for the moment, the Lord is providing what I need to do the work in front of me. There is no reason to how blessed we are. We simply take in what is offered, share it with others, and be filled with gratitude for that which sustains us.

LITURGY BYTES

The Sign of the Cross

We do it all the time, you might say, when you think of the Sign of the Cross! We do it before all prayers, perhaps before you eat and before bedtime. Take a moment and think about how often you make the sign of the cross each day!



One thing I do when I am flying is to bless myself upon take off and when we land. I have noticed others on a plane doing likewise. This action does not mean that we are suspicious or scared, but we are entrusting ourselves completely to God and also being grateful that we landed safely.


So, what are we exactly doing when we make the sign of the Cross? First, there is the action of doing it, and also the words which are a way of calling upon God. When we call upon God, and call upon that beautiful name of Jesus, we're present with him. In Matthew's Gospel, we read Jesus' words: "For where two or three are gathered in my name, there am I in the midst of them." The Mass for us is the greatest presence of God on earth. It is the real presence of God on earth. When we begin Mass with the sign of the Cross, we are actually gathering in His name, and He is with us.

When we make the sign of the cross, we remind ourselves of several things: (a) We are identifying and reaffirming our Baptism in Jesus. When we were baptized, original sin was taken away. We were also made part of the family of God, the Church. (b) We call upon God by name. In the early pagan cultures, each temple had a god that they called upon which was kept by the temple priest and a few others who had access to that name. We all are privileged to have access to our God. God is inviting us into a relationship. No longer are we alone. No longer do we need to feel abandoned in the world with all of our problems. God invites us into communion with Him which we experience through the Eucharist that we receive --- the real Presence.

So, the next time you begin a prayer, or at the beginning of Mass, carefully pray those words: "In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen"



Dress a Girl Around the World was presented to me at a Deanery meeting in August of 2021. I don't know why this ministry struck a chord with me, much to my mother's dismay, I do not even sew. I just had a feeling that it would fit here, and we could offer our talent in a unique way. We kicked off in October of 2021, and I admit I was a little unprepared for the great response at the first meeting. I was also amazed at the support shown by this parish from the beginning. Our first meetings, we were still finding our way, trying to be organized, trying to be good stewards to the yards and yards of donated fabric, creating beautiful dresses and enjoying each other and the experience. I can honestly say, there has been a steep learning curve on my part. I can also say that, almost a year later, we are better organized, our "Cut-Ups" are creating and packaging beautiful dresses monthly, our "Stitch-Ups" have completed 200 plus dresses, and we are having a great time doing it!

Of course, this could not be possible without a tremendous amount of support and teamwork. I am grateful for all the wonderful women who have come to our monthly "Cut-Ups" session. If you have stopped by once or every month, you are part of this. Thank you! Thank you to all who donated yards and yards of beautiful fabric to create the dresses. This could not have been accomplished without you. Of course, to all those who have picked up a kit, prayed for the young girl who will receive the dress, and created in my opinion the most beautiful little girl dresses, a special thank-you to you.

I also would like to thank Mary Ann Viscusi, Donna Akuntius, Gerri Schreiber, Ceil Muscarello and Barbara Shipman who are the "boots on the ground" at meetings. The DAG leadership team brings their love and knowledge of sewing and their kind and generous hearts to each meeting and make each meeting possible. Thank you for all that you do.

Last week at Mass, Father Michael blessed all the dresses made in the last year. The first stop on their journey before reaching their final destination will be at St. Mark's in Shoreham where they will then be transported to Friar Suppliers, an organization that provides food and other resources to convents and friaries to the Franciscans of Renewal Community. Their mission also

takes them to Haiti. This trip is focused on creating, building, and improving the living conditions of those in desperate need. The dresses created here at Holy Cross will be part of that mission.

At the end of their journey, these 202 dresses will be given to girls in need and at risk in the world. These dresses could be their first new dress ever. My hope is that each girl who receives one of the dresses we have created will feel the extraordinary amount of love in which it was made. I pray that each dress brings with it a sense of dignity and self-worth. To some, it is just a dress, but it really signifies so much more.

My deepest gratitude to all who made this first year of Dress a Girl Around the World a huge success. I look forward to what our next year can be and what we can do to shine a little light in a young girl's life.
