

SACRED MOMENTS

The past few weeks we have had an unusually high number of funerals, and so I have been dealing with many grieving families. In many instances the person who died had lived a full life. In other circumstances the person died at a young age or unexpectedly. Burying a loved one is a defining task of life. Families want to get it "right" when they are burying their husband or wife, mother or father, grandparent, sibling, or even a child. They want to experience actions and rituals that are meaningful, respectful, and celebrate the spirit of the one who died. In moments like this, many turn to the Church.

We will always do our best to extend the compassion and kindness of Christ, but a foundation of faith can make such a difference at a time like this. I don't want to sound judgmental, but it comes across whether or not someone is coming from a faith perspective. Faith becomes a solid point of reference. There can be great comfort in knowing that a loved one is sharing in the Paschal mystery of Christ. That mystery of dying and rising cannot realistically be taught at the time of death. It needs to be something that is already part of a person's life. They can now tap into that belief in the Risen Christ which becomes a font of hope and strength.

One of the many privileges of priesthood is being able to journey with people at important moments like this. Several times this week I was touched in seeing the outpouring of love families showed for their loved one. One beautiful moment in the funeral ritual is placing the pall (large white cloth) over the casket at the beginning of Mass. There are times when you can tell the family is doing this with great love and kindness, knowing they are dressing their loved one for the last time. There were moments in this past week that the faith of family members became an inspiration for me. The best of the human spirit can shine forth when it is woven into the gift of faith. Never take for granted the power of Christ Jesus. It can bring about hope and life even in the midst of death. How blessed we are to share in such a gift.

On a completely different note, by this weekend we should have completed a few repairs and maintenance issues with our parking lot. It was time for it to be sealed and restriped. We also made a wide curb cut near the circle to make it easier for wheelchairs, walkers, and funeral processions to access the courtyard. The cost of these improvements was about \$15,000. Because so many continue to contribute to the RAMR fund (Renovation and Major Repairs), we had the funds to do this work without dipping into our operational account or seeking additional donations. Thank you for your generous support.

The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick will be offered after the 9:30 Mass on September 4th.

LITURGY BYTES

Praying with Body, Mind & Voice

In the celebration of Mass, we raise our hearts and minds to God. We are creatures of body as well as spirit, so our prayer is not confined to our minds and hearts. It is also expressed by our bodies. When our bodies are engaged in prayer, we pray with our whole person. Believe it or not, using our entire being in prayer helps us to pray with greater attentiveness.



Both postures and gestures have meaning and will enhance our participation in the Mass. Let us take a moment to look more closely at a few of the gestures and postures we engage in at Mass.

Standing – a definite sign of respect and honor. We do this at the beginning and end of Mass, as well as for the Gospel reading. The Bishops in our country also chose the posture of standing for the reception of Holy Communion.

Kneeling – in the early Church, kneeling signified penance. In the Middle Ages, kneeling signified homage and adoration. We certainly know this as we kneel before the presence of Christ in the Tabernacle. Again, our Bishops chose kneeling for the entire Eucharistic Prayer.

Sitting – is the posture for listening and meditation. We sit for the Readings prior to the Gospel and after Communion, as well as the homily. This posture should be attentive rather than one of rest.

Genuflecting – is done as a sign of adoration. Some people make the sign of the Cross as they bend their knees. Traditionally, as Catholics we should genuflect on entering and leaving the Church when the Tabernacle, with the Blessed Sacrament, is present in the Sanctuary. You will notice the priest genuflecting during the Consecration and right before Communion.

Singing – has both an individual and communal dimension. As we lend our voices to sing prayer responses and hymns, we all are lending our voices in praise and thanksgiving to our God.

The next time at Mass, think about some of the above "things" we do and how important they are to our full and active participation at Mass.

Thank you so much for the 200 dresses for our little friends in Haiti! Each creation is beautiful and unique—the children will love them!


