## **NOVEMBER IS NIFTY**

Well, I don't know how nifty it really is, but I needed a title for the article. It has been a while since I have used this column to update you on practical stuff happening within the parish. So here are a few tidbits to keep you informed.

A couple of months back I announced that we needed to replace part of an air conditioning unit that controls the atrium. At that time, I announced it would be a \$15,000 repair. The more homework we did and the more people we talked to, it became clear that the wiser thing to do was not to replace one component of a 25-year old system, but rather replace the whole system for that part of the building. That is what we ended up doing. The price tag was a hefty one, \$38,000, but it seemed like the right decision. The project is now complete and all is working well with our new, energy efficient system.

While I never like to write a check for that much, the good news is that we could easily cover that cost through the money that has slowly been growing in our Major Repair and Renovation piggy bank. Because of the consistent generosity of so many parishioners, we were able to absorb that major expense without having to undertake special fundraising efforts. In spite of all the challenges that surround us with the pandemic, we are still doing relatively well financially. Thank you to all who are able to maintain your support. We also understand that for some families these are challenging times.

Efforts are underway to replace our website. The current format provides essential information. It was an important part of our communication structure during the height of the Covid crisis. But it is time for an update and fresh look. I find this kind of project to be very tedious and confusing. But, thankfully, there are those who can sort their way through these technological waters and make sense of things I don't understand. I will let you know when we will be unveiling the new website.

Work continues on the housing project on the tract of land adjacent to our parking lot. You can clearly see the progress they are making from the entrance of the property on Smithtown Blvd. I don't know exactly how close the development will come to our property. Our property line is essentially the edge of our parking lot; we do not own the woods beyond that point. I suspect they will fully develop the land, and aside from a small buffer, we will clearly see the new homes that will be built. I can hear the excavation equipment getting closer, so I think we will know the answer to that question within the next few weeks.

Continue to pray for our Nation. Continue to pray that we gain control over the Coronavirus.

There are only ten days until Thanksgiving. Start peeling those potatoes.



**Donations of money or supermarket gift cards** will also be greatly appreciated and very necessary to help defray the expenses of this program.





### **LITURGY BYTES**

### Rosary – part 2

Picking up from last week's column, today we will look at the Mysteries of the Rosary in more detail. The mysteries were designed to help focus our prayer on the life, ministry, and passion of Our Lord. Pius XII described the rosary prayer as "the compendium of the entire Gospel."

The mysteries emerged, at least the first three sets which consist of the Joyful, the Sorrowful, and the Glorious mysteries, in the sixteenth century. The Luminous or the mysteries of Light were added by Pope St. John Paul II in 2002.

The addition of the Luminous mysteries received much attention even in the secular press. In USA today on October 17, 2002 an article was featured that actually taught people how to pray the rosary. A visual graphic provided a diagram of the rosary. It offered clear instructions on how to pray the rosary, explaining which prayer should be said with each bead. A surprise for us who thought this kind of information would only be available in the rear of our parish church on a book rack! You might be wondering, *what led to this instruction?* 


Pope St. John Paul II published an Apostolic Letter on the Most Holy Rosary. The letter announced the Year of the Rosary and called on Catholics to renew their devotion to this traditional prayer. However, what really grabbed everyone's attention was the addition of a whole new set of mysteries for contemplation in the rosary known as the Luminous mysteries. The Pope suggested that reflection on the mysteries of Christ's public ministry would help Catholics enter more fully into the life of Jesus through the rosary. These new mysteries are Christ's baptism, the wedding feast at Cana, the proclamation of the kingdom, the Transfiguration, and the institution of the Eucharist.

I am sure we all can agree that reflecting on the above mysteries really makes sense because it helps us see Jesus' time on earth as an adult. These are easy and familiar Gospel moments we have heard at Mass on numerous occasions. The Luminous mysteries fill in the gap between the final Joyful mystery, the finding of the Child Jesus in the Temple and Jesus' adult life.

Not to leave out the other mysteries, here they are! The Joyful mysteries: the Annunciation, the Visitation, the Nativity, the Presentation, and the Finding in the Temple. The Sorrowful mysteries: the agony in the Garden, the scourging of Jesus at the pillar, the crowning with thorns, the carrying of the cross, the crucifixion of Our Lord. The Glorious mysteries: the Resurrection, the Ascension, the descent of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost, the Assumption of Mary, the coronation of Mary Queen of heaven and earth.

The repetition of this prayer is meant to lead us into a restful and contemplative mood. The gentle repetition of the words helps us to enter into the silence of our hearts, where the Spirit dwells. Do not fret the distractions that often pop up in our prayer. Simply return to where you left off. It is that easy! In conclusion, please keep in mind that we are reminded of the realness, humanness, and accessibility of our loving God each time we pray the rosary. Why not try it during Advent as a preparation for Christmas? Specific information and words to the prayers of the rosary are listed on the internet on many web sites. Have a safe, healthy, and blessed week.
