

## **Away We Go with Lent**

Our Mardi Gras celebration was a great success last Sunday. In spite of dreadful weather and heavy downpours, well over 150 parishioners were part of the festivities. The younger children enjoyed making masks and playing games. We showed a few short videos that provided some history and background to Mardi Gras. And, everyone enjoyed a bowl or two of ice cream. Our gratitude to all who helped. A special thank you to members of our Youth Group who assisted in many ways throughout the day.

I was reading a bulletin from another parish that was also having a Mardi Gras celebration. But, I noticed they had a \$10 cover charge for both adults and children. (I don't know all the details, but perhaps theirs was more elaborate with food and entertainment.) There are times when there may be financial obligations that require us to ask for your help, but not every gathering needs to be a fundraiser. I am happy that we have the ability and the mindset to simply offer an afternoon like this free of charge for our families. We had to spend a few dollars for this event, but it is more important to have opportunities like this to gather as a community and share happy moments with fellow parishioners.

I have begun my annual round of home visitations to our Level 7 classes in our Religious Education program. I enjoy meeting with the students. Most of our time is spent in answering questions they have. While it is logistically complicated to work out all of the visits, it is a worthwhile endeavor and I welcome this opportunity to spend time with the kids. I learned a lesson this week. There are both a Louis Court and a Louis Place in Nesconset. Only one of them is where one of our classes takes place. Guess which one I found?

Making these home visits prompts me to once again make my little Public Service Announcement. Imagine there is a first responder trying to find your home in an emergency. How visible is your house number, particularly at night? Sometimes finding the right house is a bit more of a hide and seek project than it should be.

The morning Mass now begins at 9:05. Our space in the chapel is cozy, so it is noticeable when there are many latecomers. We had a "chat" with those who attend daily Mass and decided to try building in a little cushion of time to help minimize any distractions.

The offices are closed on Monday in observance of the Presidents' Day holiday. There will be no morning Mass on Monday.

May these days of Lent be holy and prayerful for you.

## PARISH OUTREACH

### EAT SIMPLY ... SO OTHERS MAY SIMPLY EAT

As we enter the season of Lent we are reminded that our 40 day journey provides the opportunity to evaluate our relationship with the Lord, with our neighbors and with the world. Prayer, fasting and works of charity are activities we employ to assist us in improving these aspects of our daily life.

For the last twenty-seven years, we at Holy Cross have embraced a special Lenten Parish Project, EAT SIMPLY SO OTHERS MAY SIMPLY EAT. EAT SIMPLY is a voluntary way for us to be involved in consciously sacrificing better meals for simpler meals during Lent. Our joint effort to EAT MORE SIMPLY SO OTHERS MAY SIMPLY EAT unites us in a special way with one another and also with those who are struggling on Long Island.



We encourage you not only to participate in this program, but also to discuss it at the dinner table with your children and family members. Many of us are not consciously aware of the number of people that are in need and hungry right here in our own area. During 2017, our Outreach pantry served approximately 100 people each month.

The Lenten envelopes marked **EAT SIMPLY...SO OTHERS MAY SIMPLY EAT**, will be available throughout the weekends of Lent. We suggest that you place the envelope in a prominent place in your kitchen as a reminder of how you and your family will be uniting yourselves with our struggling neighbors and with the starving of the world. We encourage you to reflect, discuss and to decide how you will eat more basic meals during Lent.

Each weekend or whenever you choose during Lent, you may place your envelope in the basket on the pillar by the Altar or in the collection basket. The monies donated will be used to feed those who are struggling in our local area. We are continually grateful for the very generous response of our parishioners of Holy Cross in donating money, food and supermarket gift cards, which allows us to meet their needs.

### **Our Journey through Lent**

As we journey through Lent, each of us is called to focus more deeply on prayer, fasting, and alms-giving (acts of charity). How many of the following activities will be part of your Lenten plan?



**Eat Simply... So Others May Simply Eat:** Our special parish Lenten project - an invitation to families to eat simpler meals together during Lent, and then contribute the monetary savings for our struggling neighbors.

**Operation Rice Bowl**: A Lenten project for children in our Religious Education Program, in which they save their coins during Lent to donate to Catholic Relief Services for the good work they do throughout the world.

**Divine Mercy in the Chapel:** Four Fridays during Lent: February 23, March 2,9,16, 2018 at 3:00 PM. A time to reflect on the mercy of God and offer our prayers for our loved ones.

**Eucharistic Adoration with Benediction:** Four Fridays during Lent: February 23, March 2,9,16, 2018 at 4:00 PM. Come and sit in the presence of Christ, before the Blessed Sacrament, and offer up your prayers.

Stations of the Cross Video: Four Fridays during Lent: February 23, March 2, 9, 16, 2018 at 6:00 PM. Meditate on the passion and death of Jesus as you make the Way of the Cross.

**Parish Soup Supper:** Thursday, March 8, 2018, 6:30 PM. An opportunity to come together as a parish family and share a simple meal.

**Prayer Service with Reconciliation:** Tuesday, March 13, 2018, 7:00 PM. An evening of prayer followed by the opportunity to celebrate the Sacrament of Penance.



- Give up Starbucks, McDonald's, etc. and use the money you would spend for some worthwhile cause.
- Turn off the car radio and use that time for prayer or reflection.
- Renew your New Year's resolution.
- Participate in our "Eat Simply" program.
- Take 5 minutes before bedtime to review your day: ask for forgiveness for the times you messed up, and say "thank you" for the blessings of the day.
- Say a prayer at the family dinner table for those who have little to eat.
- Make a short visit/bring a small meal to someone who is homebound.
- Attend Mass during the week.
- Bring extra food to Parish Outreach.
- Get up a little early to spend five minutes praying.
- Pray the Stations of the Cross.
- · Fast from gossiping.
- Offer a helping hand without being asked.
- Re-read Sunday's Gospel and take five minutes to reflect on it.
- Give up an unhealthy habit, like smoking.
- Choose your words carefully, to avoid being hurtful or judgmental.

**LENT 2018** 

#### Dear Friends:

As we look to the future we are aware that we continue to face difficulties both here on Long Island and in our country at large. Whether they involve the opioid epidemic, gang violence, racism, or any other threat, a deep trust and reliance on the Risen Christ is necessary for us to advance and make progress in dealing with these problems.

In order to better welcome the Resurrected Jesus into our hearts, a solid Lenten spirituality grounded in prayer, fasting and almsgiving for the needs of the Church and the World is essential.

On Wednesday, April 4, 2018 we will commemorate the 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the tragic death of Dr. Martin Luther King. Our commemoration of this anniversary falls appropriately between Easter Sunday (April 1) and Divine Mercy Sunday (April 8).

I would ask that during the Lenten season we all prepare for this historic anniversary by dedicating dimensions of our Lenten prayer, fasting and almsgiving to the pursuit of racial harmony and comprehensive immigration reform grounded in the principles of the sanctity of human life and the dignity of the human person.

By aligning our Lent in solidarity with our African American and Hispanic brothers and sisters and the injustices they have suffered and are suffering, we dream and act with Dr. King and his clarion call for justice in our land.

We dream and act in a way that treasures the African American legacy of contribution in this country. We dream and act in a way that not only welcomes our Hispanic brothers and sisters but expresses our deep appreciation for their gifts and leadership in the Church and in American society, and we advocate together for comprehensive immigration reform.<sup>1</sup>

We also think and pray globally this Lent as we remember the people in North Korea, Jerusalem and every country in the Middle East, Bangladesh, Haiti, Venezuela, South Sudan, Somalia, Burundi, The Democratic Republic of the Congo, The Central African Republic, Nigeria and every war-torn and poverty-stricken area of the World.

We remember the poor, the homeless, the unemployed, those who suffer with mental illness, chronic physical illness and pain. We remember the hundreds of thousands of unborn children whose innocent lives are taken every year through abortion and the terrible toll this takes on individuals, families and our entire society.

We remember the addicted and particularly those who suffer opioid addiction, those ensnared in the culture of death of gangs, drug trade, human trafficking, and their victims -- who are often children -- at the borders, those who suffer violations of religious liberty and the sanctity of human life, those who suffer from the trauma of sexual abuse and all forms of abuse, harassment or cyberbullying, those in the midst of a family or marital crisis, those who grieve the loss of a child, a spouse, a friend, a loved one. We remember the painful crosses that our elderly carry and we give thanks for the wisdom and prayer that they model for us.

And, of course, we remember our servicemen and women overseas and their families back home, and our first responders here. We remember our Veterans and their sacrifices.<sup>2</sup>

As we prepare for the Easter Vigil Fire and for Easter Sunday, we ask the Holy Spirit to guide and refresh us during this Season of Lent. So often the cycles and seasons of life can become routine and stale. When applied specifically to Lent, we may find ourselves doing the same things each year, which results in them becoming commonplace and no longer a challenge.

A frequent theme for Lent is "giving something up". Many times this takes the form of refraining from junk food or sweets. This is a good challenge, but it is important to remember that Lent should not be just a time for losing weight; fasting without prayer is just dieting. Additionally, food is not all that we "consume".

All the things we allow into our senses are important to examine. What we watch, what we listen to are just as important as what we eat. One thing we consume in great quantities is social media.

Like all technology, do we use our social media for good or do we become consumed by it? Social media can help us connect with people and provide us important and relevant information but it can also be used to waste valuable time or to engage in angry, critical arguments.

During Lent may I suggest that we do an examination of conscience in regard to our use of social media? Can we intentionally leverage every dimension of our presence on a range of social media platforms to pursue *dramatic missionary growth* on Long Island?

We may do that by giving testimony on Facebook to a positive experience of a Catholic parish, a Catholic Bible Study or a Catholic school. We may post an image on Pinterest or Periscope of a parish activity or Holy Hour experience that was particularly meaningful. We might establish a link on our platform to the *Long Island Catholic*.

We might witness on a social media platform as a married couple or family about the value of the Sacrament of Penance to family forgiveness and unity as we encourage other families we know to participate in *Reconciliation Monday* on Monday, March 26, 2018.

Our dedicated priests, who are both humble penitents and compassionate confessors, will be available in the confessionals of all our parishes in the Diocese of Rockville Centre on March 26<sup>th</sup> from 3:00PM – 9:00PM. Please note that the Archdiocese of New York and the Diocese of Brooklyn join us in this effort so if you are working in Manhattan or Brooklyn that day you could easily go to confession at a nearby parish.

We can also use our social media platforms to follow Catholics who put forth holy and wholesome content that can enrich us spiritually and intellectually. We can follow the Diocese of Rockville Centre, the Office of Vocations, Catholic Charities, and so many more. Additionally we can follow Pope Francis and the Vatican, Bishop Robert Barron's *Word on Fire* and other social media with inspiring and motivating Catholic content.

Related to social media, we may tend to "binge watch" videos whether through YouTube or streaming services. This content in and of itself might not be bad, but does it always lift us spiritually? Telecare can aid us in prayers like the Rosary or Divine Mercy Chaplet as well as its inspiring programming.

Additionally, the Augustine Institute has started a new initiative called FORMED. This is an app that has many eBooks we can put on our Kindles and iPads, lectures and talks we can listen to on our phones during our commutes to work and school, and Catholic movies and presentations that we can stream online, almost like a Catholic Netflix.

Many of our parishes on Long Island have already invested in FORMED and are strategizing about how best to have a higher percentage of parishioners to be actively "formed" by the excellent content.

Finally, outside of the realm of media, something that always nourishes and enriches us is the Sacraments. Frequent reception of the Eucharist and the Sacrament of Reconciliation help re-center and reorder us. May this Lent be a source of *dramatic missionary growth* both in our lives and for our great Diocese and beyond.
