## **A DIFFERENT MARCH FROM 2020**

Last year at this time we were in the midst of the first week of everything closing down. Those were frightening and unsettling days. Employees were figuring out how to work from home, parents were grappling with teaching their children how to attend school on a computer, and public Masses were no longer permitted. Watching the news was a scary undertaking. Last March felt like everything was on the verge of a great descent.

Although we are far from putting this saga behind us, we are in a better position. In different ways it feels as though an ascent has begun. Part of what leads us to be more hopeful and energized is that the sun now stays with us later and later each day. The calendar says spring has arrived, although cooler temperatures will likely hang in there with us for a bit longer. Even Holy Week offers us hope. There are a few limitations in what we are able to do, but the good news is we are simply able to gather together and bring to life our great celebrations. (See the schedule of Holy Week events for more detailed info.)

There are also some happy Church feast days this week that add to a spirit of life and activity. St. Patrick's Day and St. Joseph's day each bring a bit of celebration to this season of Lent. Although you might not be Irish or Italian, each tradition brings a little something for everyone to enjoy.

You may have noticed that some of our technology has been taken over by electronic gremlins the past two weeks. It has mostly impacted the folks who watch on Facebook at home, but we have had a few hiccups that were part of the 11:30 Mass as well. It is important that we continue the livestreaming for those who are not able to be here. On average, we have about 60 live viewers for the 11:30 Mass. By Sunday evening, the recording of Mass will get up to as many as 500 views. That number will increase even more by the end of the week. For some folks, the livestreaming is still a spiritual lifeline, so we will continue to use it. I am mindful that there are some distractions in the use of technology at Mass, and we are striving to minimize those moments. Thank you for your patience.

You may want to plan on arriving early for Mass the next two weekends. Although it is Palm Sunday and Easter, we will use the regular Sunday Mass schedule. We will have additional seating set up in the atrium, and ushers will assist in trying to accommodate as many people as possible. While I hope we do not need to turn anyone away, we do need to be mindful of our reduced capacity.

Continue to make the days of Lent as prayerful as you can. But also be mindful of the signs of life that surround us.



## LITURGY BYTES

### **Stations**

A very popular devotion in our Catholic tradition is the Stations of the Cross. This was always a welcome experience for me during my eight years in Catholic elementary school because we stopped schoolwork at 2 PM on the Fridays in Lent and gathered in the church for stations. As we moved up the chain to the upper grades, students were chosen to be readers, and some even got to join Father and the altar boys in the procession to each station. It was



not ending the school day early that made me happy on those Fridays, but the experience of this journey that touched my heart. Hence, that is why it is one of my favorite devotions. Through the pandemic, there have been virtual experiences of the Stations of the Cross on some websites. Fortunately, recent changes are seeing some in-person station services in our churches. Of course, you can watch it on our Diocesan TV station, CFN, too. We are additionally blessed to have outdoor stations right here on the church property. With these sunny, warmer days, consider spending time meditating on these wooden structures for something different in your prayer life. Having said all of the above, let us see where and how the stations began.

An ancient tradition has it that the Blessed Mother visited the sites of Jesus' suffering, death, and resurrection daily after He ascended into heaven. It did not take pilgrims very long to imitate her example and walk this road of Jesus' suffering and death. During the reign of Constantine, various churches and markers were set up at specific points on Jesus' path to Calvary. Travelers to the Holy Land visited these sacred sites for many centuries, sometimes bringing something back from a site to remember this journey. Traveling to the Holy Land was not always easy or even permitted because of religious tension and war. In lieu of traveling to these holy places, the Franciscans throughout Europe decided to create shrines and replicas in local towns. Their goal was to help the people enter into Jesus' passion without having to leave their hometowns. A little later on, in the 17<sup>th</sup> Century, the Franciscans replicated these holy places within churches. In 1731, Clement XII fixed the number of stations at 14. In these last few weeks of Lent, let us try the Stations of the Cross once again.

### **Homebound and Hospitalized**



Parish Outreach sends cards, on behalf of our parish, to those who are ill or hospitalized. Our homebound folks receive friendly telephone calls by Outreach volunteers to keep up the connection and to assess ways the parish can be present to these loved parishioners. At Advent and Easter time a volunteer will visit them and bring a gift from the parish community. Eucharistic Ministers are also available to bring communion to the homebound who desire it.

These are some of the ways Holy Cross reaches out to the homebound and hospitalized. Please help us by contacting Parish Outreach or a member of the Pastoral Team if you know of anyone we can serve in their time of need.

# 2<sup>nd</sup> Quarter Financial Highlights December 1, 2020 - February 28, 2021

#### Revenues:

- Collections this quarter were down by 14.5%. RAMR was down 24.9%. Yet, our Christmas collection was up 11.3% at a total of \$45,933 (\$4662 over last year). Overall collections for this quarter were down 10.6%.
- Religious Ed. was down 4%. Although our program has had a great response and we have had quite an increase in first grade students this year, we have been unable to have parties and activities that typically bring in a small revenue.
- Outreach was down 3.1% for this quarter but was still up 25.1% overall for this fiscal year. Parishioners continued to flood our doors with food donations and Christmas gift items along with generous monetary gifts.
- Program income, including fundraising, youth ministry, and senior club, was down almost 100%.
   However, their related expenses were also decreased. We have recently started a fundraiser for the spring called the "Spring Cash Fling."
- Overall income was down about 20% this quarter over last year. However, we received a large donation of \$25,000 made by one family, and we greatly appreciate the continued generosity of all our parishioners especially during this time when many have suffered the hardships of this year.

### Expenses:

- Religious Ed. expenses were down 21.7% this quarter over last year. We were careful to order only the necessary books and materials needed for our students, and again, with none of the typical winter parties (due to Covid) we had no expenses in this area.
- Outreach funds were used this quarter quite a bit more than in the past. With the abundance of generous donations that had come in through the year, gift cards were distributed for the holidays and more were purchased in February for an Easter distribution. Additionally, we have been able to assist individual families that have needed a helping hand during this time. Outreach spent \$4,178 this quarter over last year for this quarter.
- Snow removal this year posed quite an expense. We spent \$12,350 for this alone. We were grateful to have not had this much snow in the past few years and recognize that safety is our primary concern when winter weather presents itself.
- Total expenses this quarter were down 9.9% for the quarter.

### Projects:

- We replaced the main entry way with carpet tiles which are safer and a more desirable look than the metal boards that were coming up and in disrepair.
- Upgraded outdoor lighting for the Parish Outreach door

## Spring Cash Fling

For many years the Cash Calendar was a part of the Holy Cross routine. This fundraiser provided some additional financial support to the parish. In addition, many parishioners enjoyed participating in it. Unfortunately, it was one of the many parts of parish life that was lost to Covid. At this time, it is unlikely that we have enough parishioners attending Mass on a weekly basis to support a monthly drawing. And so, we introduce the "Spring Cash Fling." This is a similar idea, however it will be offered initially on a quarterly basis.

- \$10 per ticket
- Tickets are available for purchase through March, April, and May.
- Drawing will be held in May.

Because we anticipate smaller participation, there will be a different pay scale:

- \* 1 Prize @ \$250
- \* 2 Prizes @ \$100
- \* 10 Prizes @ \$50

- This formula was based upon selling 250 tickets @ \$10 each. If more than 250 tickets are sold, the number of prizes will be increased. (In the event the response is strong, we will resume a monthly drawing as soon as possible.)




