It seems the first few days of school have been a positive experience for most of our families. It is a stressful time for kids, parents, teachers and everyone in between. Hopefully, new routines will quickly be established to help bring a bit of balance and peacefulness into everyone's life.

This past week we had our first parent meetings for our Religious Education program. There was an option to either attend in person or to view a video that Tricia Clarke, our Religious Education Coordinator, created for parents. LITURGY BYTES

Our Church



This past Monday, September 14th, we celebrated the Exaltation of the Holy Cross, the parish's feast day. As you look around the worship area, especially upward, you see that the roof stands on four columns in the form of a cross. The columns are shaped in tree-like patterns to echo the beautiful trees outside which are visible through the glass windows in the worship area. The tree-like columns are also meant to remind us of the "tree of the cross" on which Jesus gave His life for us.

The unique crucifix over the main altar symbolizes the heart of our Christian faith. It is a reminder of both Good Friday and Easter. The cross itself is clear acrylic to allow the light to pass through as a reminder that the wood of the cross has been transformed by the light of the Resurrection. You will notice that the figure of Christ is rising, and Jesus is gesturing with one hand upward toward the Father. The other hand has Jesus gesturing toward the Eucharist and the people who celebrate the Eucharist by living the Paschal mystery every day.

The white marble altar along with the marble ambo (pulpit) and marble lectern are the signs of worship. At these places, we proclaim the Word of the Lord. At the altar, we remember and celebrate Jesus' life-giving death and Resurrection in the ancient symbols of bread and wine which become for each of us the Body and Blood of Our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. Under the altar, encased in a diamond like pyramid is a stone from an area of Calvary in the Holy Land showing our connection to the Lord's cross and Resurrection. Each week, we go out from here empowered to bring joy and peace to our world.
