





### A DAY OF JOY



# Weekly Reflection by Fr. Michael

The third Sunday of Advent is traditionally known as Gaudete Sunday. It is one of only two days in the Church year when the color of the vestments is rose. The focus on the day is meant to be joy in the midst of the season of waiting. But our lived experience doesn't always coincide with the liturgical calendar. Allow me to share with you some of what happened on the second Sunday of Advent.

As sometimes happens, there was a convergence of several events that created a busy, but abundantly life-giving weekend. I was able to host a parish family for dinner on Saturday evening, which is something I enjoy doing. I was called to anoint a parishioner who is in Stony Brook hospital. We busily distributed all the pre-ordered Christmas wreaths and other items as well as sold a few extra ones. We welcomed three baptism families at the 9:30 Mass. In between Masses I offered a blessing to a couple who have been married sixty years. I was pleased with the way my homily came together. An endless array of gifts cards and presents were dropped off as part of our Outreach Christmas Program. Outreach volunteers put on Santa hats and sorted and organized all the gifts. It was a whirlwind of a day.

On Sunday night as I relaxed at the house, I felt filled by a wave of peace and contentment. This was a weekend in which I believe we touched the hearts of many people. Be it through the prayers of the Church or a spirit of welcome and generosity on the part of many parishioners, we created an environment where good and holy things could take place. I went to bed happy.

There is one thing that happened on Friday that may have enhanced my perspective on everything that was to happen in the following days. I went into the city to meet my niece, her husband, and my grandniece who were visiting from Florida. Whenever I go to the city, I stop at St. Francis Church on 31st Street. Often, that is where I celebrate the Sacrament of Reconciliation. In the midst of my conversation with the priest he said three simple words that exploded with life. He said, "You are good." Franciscans have the ability to say the simplest of things with authenticity and power. I'm still good, even though I have sinned. At that moment it was not the priest who was offering that message, it was God. It was a moment of grace. I'm still delighting in what happened in the celebration of that sacrament.

I'm not trying to be a Pollyanna. I know there are some people who find themselves in the midst of challenging circumstances and have heavy burdens on their hearts. Yet the Lord can transform all things. There is wisdom in the Church's invitation to "prepare the way." What can we do to allow God's life to touch our hearts? Perhaps, is it Reconciliation or time in silent reflection? Perhaps it is letting go of hurt or resentment. Joy is not reserved for a few lucky chosen ones. It is a gift offered to all of us. May we allow this season to open our hearts with new life.

As the pink candle in the Advent wreath is lit this week, we are reminded that Advent is a season of rejoicing as the coming of Christ is anticipated. The Third Sunday of Advent is called Gaudete Sunday (gaudete, meaning "rejoice"), and the prayers and readings call us to be joyful.

Make time for prayerful rejoicing. Attend an Advent lessons and carols service. Check your parish bulletin or local Catholic college for opportunities.



From December 16 to 24, Las posadas (from Spanish meaning "the inns"), a widely observed Advent tradition, celebrates Christian hospitality. The posadas symbolize Mary and Joseph's difficult search for a place to stay where Jesus could be born. Through the celebration we are reminded that by welcoming the poor and needy, we also welcome Jesus.

The "O" Antiphons are traditionally sung or recited to introduce the canticle of Mary (the Magnificat) at evening prayer from December 17 to December 23, but they can be easily incorporated into any aspect of daily Advent prayer. Based on Ísaiah's prophesies, the antiphons echo ancient titles given to the long-awaited Messiah. Reflect daily on the "O" Antiphons this week. These invocations keep us focused on the One whose coming we are joyfully expecting in the midst of the commercialism of Christmas.

# LITURGY BYTES by Michele Hall



Here we are on the 3rd Sunday of Advent when the rose or pink candle is lit on the Advent wreath. You will notice the 3rd banner has been hung in the sanctuary with the word JOY on it. This reflects the name of this day, known as Gaudete Sunday, which means simply to REJOICE. The priest and deacon also don their rose-colored vestments for the weekend Masses.

This week provides a break midway through the season and signifies the nearness of the Lord's coming at Christmas. While the season of Advent has us focusing on the coming of Jesus in three ways - His first, His present and His final one - Gaudete Sunday focuses on rejoicing in the Lord. Even the Holy Father tells us it is the SUNDAY OF JOY. That should be our focus and not on all we still have not done for Christmas. He also added that we should think about all the good things life has given us. This is great advice to embrace.

#### A Prayer of Rejoicing

Heavenly Father, this third week of Advent, let us remember that the good news of Jesus' birth brings us great joy this Christmas season. Our joy is not dependent on what is going on in our lives, in our world, or the people that we are with. It does not depend on the gifts we give or the gifts we find under the tree. No earthly thing can ever give us complete joy. Our joy comes from you. That joy that flooded the hearts of the shepherds, the angels, the wise men, the hosts of heaven, and Mary and Joseph is the joy that still has the power to overwhelm our hearts with rejoicing. Flood our hearts with joy this Advent season as we reflect on the good news of Jesus' birth. In Jesus' name, we pray. Amen.

This year we were once again blessed with a tremendous response to our Christmas Angel Program. Our struggling households were incredibly grateful for the gift cards for their families. As parents and family members, we can appreciate how good it is to provide for our children's needs. Enabling these moms and dads to do the same accomplishes so much more than just handing them a gift someone else has bought. They can now provide in a way they could not provide before.

This year we helped forty families with clothing and toys, including forty-five children. We collected enough gift cards to provide each person with approximately \$25 for clothing needs and an additional \$25 per child for their toy requests. Also, each household received supermarket cards to help with their holiday meal. This means, due to your generosity, we collected and distributed over \$4300 in store cards and \$1,500 in supermarket cards.

Thank you so much for bringing the Light of Jesus' Birth to those who struggle each day. You are truly special Angels! Christ is born again every time we choose to give to another, walk with another or empower another.


