



# IN THE BEGINNING



# Weekly Reflection by Fr. Michael

One of the options for readings on Christmas Day is the prologue from John's Gospel. The gift of Jesus is a profound new beginning. We hear the very first words that say, "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God. And the Word was God." It is no coincidence that "in the beginning" is chosen. Those words mirror the very first words from the creation story from Genesis. The nature of God is new life. It's no wonder that God's Son came into the world as a newborn child. The essence of God is the offer of salvation. It's no wonder that the resurrection story begins at an empty tomb. These stories from scripture are not only historical record from the past, but rather the presentation of a great story that we are privileged to share in to this very day.

The promise of a new beginning is always a gift. It's not as though all our headaches and heartaches miraculously go away, but it does give a sense of a new opportunity. Where in your life and in your heart do you need the gift of the Lord Jesus to dwell? In what way does this Christmas day allow you to be renewed in the life and hope offered by our God? There will always be reasons why we may feel unworthy or identify improvements we need to make. None of this negates our ability to experience God. As we hear in the infancy narrative, people from many nations and from all directions came to share in the gift of Jesus. None of them were refused because of who they were or where they came from. Jesus not only touches the pain and sadness in our own lives, he offers hope and comfort to our broken and fragile world.

As joyous as the day is, remember it is only the first step in a great journey. Jesus doesn't remain a small helpless child; he grows. As time goes by, he comes to understand the path his Father has asked him to walk. Jesus brings a message of joy and hope, especially to those who are poor, ill, and looked down upon by the rest of society. Jesus demands that we look at life in a different way. We must grow with the Lord. Jesus extends to us the commandment of love with the expectation that we are to live by that law and be bearers of that gift to one another. Whether we are sitting in our homes, driving down the highway, or watching the evening news, we are a people who are called to look at life through the lens of love. Let us also be mindful of all the corners of the world and all the issues we face where the love of Christ is so desperately needed. At the very least we cannot neglect those who are suffering. May the gift of Jesus bring hope to all.

May the joy of this Christmas day touch your heart and the hearts of your loved ones.

May the promise of this day be felt across our globe.

May we become a people who strive to live and become the gift of love that we receive.

This year we were once again blessed with a tremendous response to our Christmas Angel Program. Our struggling households were incredibly grateful for the gift cards for their families. As parents and family members, we can appreciate how good it is to provide for our children's needs. Enabling these moms and dads to do the same accomplishes so much more than just handing them a gift someone else has bought. They can now provide in a way they could not provide before.

This year we helped 39 families with clothing and toys, including 44 children. We collected enough gift cards to provide each person with approximately \$25 for clothing needs and an additional \$25 per child for their toy requests. Also, each household received supermarket cards to help with their holiday meal. This means, due to your generosity, we collected and distributed over \$4300 in store cards and \$2,100 in supermarket cards.

Thank you so much for bringing the Light of Jesus' Birth to those who struggle each day. You are truly special Angels! Christ is born again every time we choose to give to another, walk with another or empower another.

In addition, the parish also provided gifts to the following agencies:

149 Gifts to our friends at Olsen's Rest Home (socks, hairbrushes, and tissues)
A \$25 Target gift card for each resident at Mercy Haven

198 Gifts for teenagers at Pronto in Bay Shore (footballs, soccer balls, baseballs and baseball mitts, plus sweatshirts and sweatpants)

A \$25 Target gift card for each resident at Talbot House

This is a phenomenal effort that requires many volunteers to accomplish. An excessively big "THANK YOU" to our angel cutter, Pauline Fanuele, our dedicated pantry stocking teams, to all our weekly sorting elves, our volunteer gift deliverers, and those who generously donated money, gift cards and special donations which helped us and our families so much. The words "thank you" cannot capture or express my appreciation for all the support and help I had for this project, but I must say a deep heartfelt "thank you" to you all. I feel grateful and blessed to be part of such a generous, faithful community.





Christmas Readings Isaiah 9:1-6 Titus 2:11-14

Luke 2:1-14

The readings for Christmas invite us to adore the Lord Jesus.


Know that "God is with us" and spend time this week with Him in silent prayer. Meditate on His name, "God-Hero." How is Jesus the hero of your life?

Pray the ancient prayer of lectio divina. Using the Bible or a prayer app, read or listen to the Gospel twice. Imagine being in Bethlehem on Christmas night long ago. You see Joseph and Mary struggling to find shelter. Mary is showing the stress of labor. Perhaps you are a shepherd tending your flock and you behold a bright star shattering the darkness. Follow the star to the manger and adore the Messiah and Lord. Speak tenderly to him and let his heart speak to yours.

Follow the example of Mary and Joseph by sharing the radiance of Jesus with strangers. Hold a door open, let someone into your lane of traffic, treat service workers with kindness.





### Christmas 2025

To the People of God of the Diocese of Rockville Centre:

### Merry Christmas!

Throughout this year, we have marked many significant milestones in the life of the Church leading us to the Lord's Nativity and this holy season of Christmas, most especially the passing of Pope Francis at Easter and the election of Pope Leo XIV in May.

What a gift it has been to walk these months with our new Holy Father, to learn from his teaching, and witness his example.

On October 4<sup>th</sup>, the Memorial of Saint Francis of Assisi, Pope Leo released his first Apostolic Exhortation, *Dilexit Te - I Have Loved You*. It is a profound meditation on love for the poor and speaks powerfully to the mystery of the Lord's Birth and the grace of this season.

The Holy Father reminds us: "The Gospel shows us that poverty marked every aspect of Jesus' life. From the moment he entered the world, Jesus knew the bitter experience of rejection. The Evangelist Luke tells how Joseph and Mary, who was about to give birth, arrived in Bethlehem, and then adds, poignantly, that 'there was no place for them in the inn' (*Lk* 2:7). Jesus was born in humble surroundings and laid in a manger; then, to save him from being killed, they fled to Egypt (cf. *Mt* 2:13-15). At the dawn of his public ministry, after announcing in the synagogue of Nazareth that the year of grace which would bring joy to the poor was fulfilled in him, he was driven out of town (cf. *Lk* 4:14-30). He died as an outcast, led out of Jerusalem to be crucified (cf. *Mk* 15:22). Indeed, that is how Jesus' poverty is best described: he experienced the same exclusion that is the lot of the poor, the outcast of society. Jesus is a manifestation of this *privilegium pauperum*. He presented himself to the world not only as a poor Messiah, but also as the Messiah of and for the poor." (n. 19)

Before these words of Pope Leo, we recall the wonderful truth: Christ became poor so that we who are poor might become rich (cf. 2 Cor. 8:9). This is the good news of Christmas. We are not alone. We are not left to ourselves. A Savior has come - Christ the Lord.

As we celebrate the Christmas season, we remember with Pope Leo that "Christian holiness often flourishes in the most forgotten and wounded places of humanity." (n. 76)

How beautifully the followers of Christ have responded to the cry of the poor and looked with love upon the most vulnerable among us. As we rejoice in Christ's Birth, we renew our commitment to love others as he has loved us.

On Sunday, December 28<sup>th</sup> at the Cathedral of Saint Agnes, on the Feast of the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph, we will conclude our Jubilee Year of Hope.

We thank both Pope Francis and Pope Leo XIV for igniting hope within our families, the global mission of the Church, and the human family, and we contemplate the light and grace that radiates from the refugee Holy Family (73) and that radiates to every family.

Our Catholic biblical and sacramental worship, especially at the Catholic Mass, focuses and ignites both our global mission to the poor (n. 42) and our humble openness to being evangelized by the poor (n. 102), the treasures of our Church (n. 38).


Merry Christmas and Happy New Year to you and your families!

# Statement on Immigration from the United States Council of Catholic Bishops

As pastors, we the bishops of the United States are bound to our people by ties of communion and compassion in Our Lord Jesus Christ. We are disturbed when we see among our people a climate of fear and anxiety around questions of profiling and immigration enforcement. We are saddened by the state of contemporary debate and the vilification of immigrants. We are concerned about the conditions in detention centers and the lack of access to pastoral care. We lament that some immigrants in the United States have arbitrarily lost their legal status. We are troubled by threats against the sanctity of houses of worship and the special nature of hospitals and schools. We are grieved when we meet parents who fear being detained when taking their children to school and when we try to console family members who have already been separated from their loved ones.

Despite obstacles and prejudices, generations of immigrants have made enormous contributions to the well-being of our nation. We as Catholic bishops love our country and pray for its peace and prosperity. For this very reason, we feel compelled now in this environment to raise our voices in defense of Godgiven human dignity.

<u>Catholic teaching</u> exhorts nations to recognize the fundamental dignity of all persons, including immigrants. We bishops advocate for a meaningful reform of our nation's immigration laws and procedures. Human dignity and national security are not in conflict. Both are possible if people of good will work together.

We recognize that nations have a responsibility to regulate their borders and establish a just and orderly immigration system for the sake of the common good. Without such processes, immigrants face the risk of trafficking and other forms of exploitation. Safe and legal pathways serve as an antidote to such risks.

The Church's teaching rests on the foundational concern for the human person, as created in the image and likeness of God (Genesis 1:27). As pastors, we look to Sacred Scripture and the example of the Lord Himself, where we find the wisdom of God's compassion. The priority of the Lord, as the Prophets remind us, is for those who are most vulnerable: the widow, the orphan, the poor, and the stranger (Zechariah 7:10). In the Lord Jesus, we see the One who became poor for our sake (2 Corinthians 8:9), we see the Good Samaritan who lifts us from the dust (Luke 10:30–37), and we see the One who is found in the least of these (Matthew 25). The Church's concern for neighbor and our concern here for immigrants is a response to the Lord's command to love as He has loved us (John 13:34).

To our immigrant brothers and sisters, we stand with you in your suffering, since, when one member suffers, all suffer (cf. 1 Corinthians 12:26). You are not alone!

We note with gratitude that so many of our clergy, consecrated religious, and lay faithful already <u>accompany and assist immigrants</u> in meeting their basic human needs. We urge all people of good will to continue and expand such efforts

We oppose the indiscriminate mass deportation of people. We pray for an end to dehumanizing rhetoric and violence, whether directed at immigrants or at law enforcement. We pray that the Lord may guide the leaders of our nation, and we are grateful for past and present opportunities to dialogue with public and elected officials. In this dialogue, we will continue to advocate for meaningful immigration reform.

As disciples of the Lord, we remain <u>men and women of hope</u>, and hope does not disappoint! (cf. Romans 5:5)

May the mantle of Our Lady of Guadalupe enfold us all in her maternal and loving care and draw us ever closer to the heart of Christ.
