



GROUNDED



Weekly Reflection by Fr. Michael

My very first group travel trip was in 2000. We visited what is known as the Canyonlands. We began in Phoenix, ended up in Vegas, and in between saw some of the most beautiful works that Mother Nature offers, including Monument Valley. For the Navajo people, this is sacred land. We asked our native guides if we could offer a prayer at one of the stops we made. They said yes, but I think they were a bit apprehensive about what would be done on their sacred land. I read aloud the passage from Exodus that we heard on Sunday. In that passage, God instructs Moses to take off his sandals and feel the holy ground upon which he stood. At the base of a massive sandstone monument, I invited the people in our group to do the same.

Taking off our shoes can give a vastly different perspective. Sometimes something as simple as a quarter inch of shoe leather can keep us insulated from a profound moment of grace. There is a common ground, that is rooted in God, that is offered to all of us to experience. It is difficult to describe, but once you have felt it, you know it is real. It is something universal. It is something eternal. This idea is introduced in the Exodus passage when God tells Moses to report to the people by saying, "I AM sent me to you." Admittedly, this is an awkward phrase that may give pause to understand what is being said. But it is not just random words, it is a profound truth. Later in John's Gospel, Jesus refines those words even more by saying, "I AM."

Normally, when we hear the words "I am," we expect them to be followed by some kind of modifier; I am an American, I am an electrician, I am a good bowler, etc. Once we start adding modifiers, we start narrowing the field and eliminating other possibilities. "I AM" is meant to put us in touch with something that has no boundaries or limitations. It is a reality that is meant to broaden our horizons, to dare to see as God sees. Embracing the phrase "I AM" moves us beyond our heads that like things to be understandable and well defined. It moves us into the heart, which can be frightening because there is always some element of mystery. But this is the only place we can encounter truth. This is the only place we can encounter God.

Back in Monument Valley most of the group took off their shoes. We felt the soft earth beneath our toes. We simply stood there and looked at the beauty that surrounded us. We were enveloped by a profound and, if you will, deafening silence. I don't know if it lasted 30 seconds or 5 minutes. Then one of the ladies in the group began to sing one verse of "Holy Ground." After that I offered a brief blessing. We put on our shoes and silently got back on the little trucks that were driving us through the valley. We were all looking at each other with the expression, "Was it just me, or did something powerful just happen." What a blessing it was; we were literally grounded, stood in silence, and we encountered the Lord.

I don't know if you are supposed to take off your shoes or not. But I do believe we are invited to share in the gift and power of God's holy presence. Lent affords us that opportunity to feel God's mercy, compassion, forgiveness and love. Use well these forty days. Allow yourself to be grounded in God and to know His joy.

Eat Simply...So Others May Simply Eat



EAT SIMPLY IDEAS

Here are some ideas to consider using for your family's participation in our Eat Simply program:

- If you give up sweets for Lent, donate the money saved so that we can purchase cookies and snacks for a family.
- **Discuss what a "simple meal" means in your household**. Is it soup and bread? Is it a peanut butter and jelly sandwich? Our simple meals can be a gourmet feast for some families struggling to make ends meet.
- Rather than having a Starbucks or Dunkin Donuts coffee, make your morning coffee at home. The money you donate can buy a can of coffee for a family.
- If you are ordering dinner, pick up food instead of using Door Dash / Uber Eats. (Many restaurants have curbside now.) Make a simple dessert for after dinner and donate what it would have cost had you ordered something in.
- **Try a plant-based meat alternative**. They aren't always a healthier option, but they are gentler on the earth.
- Use the Mercy Meatless Monday's program from the Sisters of Mercy of the Americas to choose alternatives to meat on Mondays and Fridays throughout Lent.



as we prepare our hearts and minds for the great gift of Holy Week.





"Let there be Light" Update

The majority of the work was completed successfully and on schedule this past week.

We are pleased with the results. There was minimal disruption to parish activities.





Our Worship Area and the church building are now 30 years old. Components of the original building have reached the end of their useful life, and we need to make some improvements. In October of 2024 the HVAC system was replaced. We are now facing a failure of the lighting system which leaves half of the Worship Area in darkness. It is not simply a matter of changing burned-out bulbs. We need new fixtures and a new control system. Additionally, gaining access to the lights mounted on our high ceilings is not a simple or inexpensive task.

We are grateful to all who have already generously contributed. This is an essential repair, and we deeply appreciate those who have helped in this undertaking.

This is the first major fundraising effort we have had to conduct in more than 15 years. We have been blessed with consistent and generous support by so many parishioners through the years.
