

NATIONAL VOCATION AWARENESS WEEK



Weekly Reflection by Fr. Michael

This past week was National Vocation Awareness Week. Ideally, this article should have been written for last week's bulletin. Sometimes I'm a little bit behind with these things. The intent of the week is to pray for and discuss vocations to the priesthood, diaconate, and consecrated religious life. Allow me to share with you some of the pieces of the path that led me to my vocation.

I would not describe my home life as being overly religious. We certainly went to Mass every Sunday. As a small child, I remember praying with my mom before going to bed. The house was not filled with statues or religious art. We did not gather as a family to say prayers together. We didn't light candles or have buckets of holy water sitting around. However, in unspoken ways, I knew faith was important to my mother. She was left to raise four children by herself after my father died of a heart attack. Somehow, I knew she consistently asked for God's wisdom and strength to walk the path on which she found herself.

I was a good and faithful altar boy from fourth through eighth grade. There were some perks in doing this work. I attended a Catholic school, and when there was a funeral, we would be taken out of class to serve. In serving weddings, there was an occasional \$2 gratuity from the groom or best man. Even beyond these valuable benefits, I enjoyed being an altar boy. I liked watching all the little things the priest did in preparing for Mass and setting the altar. I thought it was interesting, although I did not have any burning desire to do those things myself.

What first drew me to start thinking about priesthood was the idea of preaching. It started around the seventh grade. I used to listen to the homilies, and quite honestly, I was often bored. I'm sure there were many fine homilies being offered, but they just didn't speak to the heart of my twelve or thirteen-year-old self. I sat there and imagined what I would say if I were in the pulpit. I don't know if it was divine grace or arrogance, but I remember thinking to myself, "I think I could do a better job than that." It was probably in the summer before eighth grade that I first said, "Maybe this is what I am supposed to do with my life."

I attended St. Pius X High School in Uniondale. At the time it was the Diocesan High School Seminary. While I had thought about priesthood, I was not gung-ho certain this was what I wanted to do. My primary attraction to the school was that it was small and felt safe. It would suit me well as I was a shy and nervous kid. Once there, I picked up on the energy of priesthood. I was impressed by the "holy roller" spirit of some of the students. I saw that the priests on the faculty all seemed happy and normal. I had a few memorable retreat and prayer experiences. During my four years there it became clear - this is the path I was called to walk.

I continued my way through the seminary system. I attended Cathedral College in Douglaston and the Seminary of the Immaculate Conception in Huntington. I was never a great student, and I always found academics difficult. But I pushed through and did what I needed to do. I was ordained at the age of twenty-seven (I looked fifteen.)

It was not until I was immersed in parish life that the fullness of priesthood came to life. Being in relationship with a community of faith brought abundant life to me as I served them. It is always the people of God that bring abundance of grace to my ministry. What a life of blessings it has been!

Pray for vocations.

Congress Must Act to Protect Religious Workers

A major staffing crisis is looming for religious ministries throughout the United States, unless Congress passes and the President signs the bi-partisan Religious Workforce Protection Act to alleviate a major backlog in processing Religious Worker Visa applications.

Under current law, foreign born religious workers are permitted to live and work in the United States for up to five years through the nonimmigrant religious worker (R-1) visa. During that time, they may apply for and receive permanent residency.

However, over the last five years Sens. Susan Collins (R-Maine) and Tim Kaine (D-Virginia) have repeatedly raised concerns with the State Department and Department of Homeland Security about the increasing backlog in processing these applications, forcing foreign born religious workers to leave after five years, for at least a year.

That backlog, they point out, is "costing churches, mosques, synagogues, and other religious organizations the beloved religious workers on whom their congregations, and the local communities that they serve, have grown to depend."

This is forcing departure of increasing numbers of Catholic priests, religious sisters and brothers, and others serving the Church throughout the United States, leaving parishes, hospitals, schools, and other ministries understaffed, and Catholics without access to sacraments and spiritual care.

The Religious Workforce Protection Act, sponsored by Sens. Collins, Kaine, and Jim Risch (R-Idaho), and a companion bill in the House of Representatives sponsored by Reps. Mike Carey (R-Ohio) and Richard Neal (D-Massachusetts), would empower the Department of Homeland Security to extend temporary R-1 nonimmigrant status for religious workers past five years, so they can remain in the country pending a decision on their permanent resident application.

The legislation is supported by religious leaders across a wide range of faith communities, including Catholic, Jewish, Evangelical, Episcopal, Muslim, and Hindu.

Please urge your U.S. Senators and Congressional Representative to support H.R. 2672 / S. 1298, the Religious Workforce Protection Act.


