



A NEW OIL STOCK



Weekly Reflection by Fr. Michael

No, I am not making recommendations for your retirement portfolio. I have no clue whether you should be buying or selling Exxon stock. I am talking about a different kind of oil stock. In the church world, an oil stock is a small cylindrical metal container that holds the Oil of the Sick that is used in the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick. It has a screw-on cap that is removed when using the stock. It is about the size of a small stack of quarters. I have been using the same oil stock for many years.

Two weeks ago when I was in Albuquerque visiting a friend, I stopped into a number of gift shops. I stumbled upon what looked like an oil stock. I'm sure they were not selling liturgical items; it must have some other use. What caught my eye was the symbol on the lid of this small container. It is an Indian design called "the Man in the Maze." Actually, this is an inaccurate title. It is not a maze that is depicted, but rather a labyrinth. A maze is a series of paths that intersect with one another, and a decision must be made as to which way to go. Some of the paths are dead ends. A labyrinth is a single winding path that has no dead ends or wrong turns. As long as you keep moving forward, you will reach the center.



I thought there to be a strong correlation to this ancient symbol and the Anointing of the Sick. Be it an unexpected set-back in someone's health or, in fact, someone nearing the end of their journey, it seems to be an appropriate symbol. The journey for all moves forward. The sacraments remind us we are never alone. God walks with us even in sickness and in death.

There is a great phrase in the world of spirituality, "everything belongs." When we look at our lives, all of us have moments and memories we would like to remove. There are some things we regret, some things that embarrass us, and some tragedies we wish we did not have to endure. We wish we could have a "do-over." As much as we may dread these painful moments, they were probably necessary. There was some lesson we had to learn or some cross we had to embrace. We encounter God in the brokenness of our journey. Our lives are not straight lines of success and victory, but rather winding paths of joy and sorrow.

While I am not throwing out my old oil stock, I look forward to using the new one. It is a reminder of the great journey that all of us are on and how our God journeys with us. When we are reminded of that, the road is always a place of life. (Remember, we celebrate the Anointing of the Sick on the first Sunday of the month, after the 9:30 Mass.)

OCTOBER – MONTH OF THE ROSARY



LITURGY BYTES by Michele Hall



This feast came into practice in 1913 by Saint Pius X and is celebrated on October 7th. Originally, the feast was in honor of Our Lady of Victory as a thank-you to God for the Christian defeat of the Turks. This victory was attributed to praying the rosary. Pope Gregory XIII changed the name to the feast of the Holy Rosary.

The development of the rosary has a long history. The first practice of this prayer was developed by saying 150 Our Fathers in imitation of the 150 Psalms. Then a practice of praying 150 Hail Marys developed. A mystery of Jesus' life was attached to each Hail Mary. Keep in mind that Mary's giving of the rosary to Saint Dominic is recognized as a legend even though the development of this prayer owes much to the followers of Saint Dominic. In the 16th century, the rosary was developed to consist of 15 mysteries: joyful, sorrowful, and glorious. Much later on, in 2002, Pope John Paul II added the Mysteries of Light to the rosary.

The purpose of the rosary is to help us meditate on the mysteries of our salvation. One pope called it a compendium of the Gospel. The main focus is on Jesus, his birth, life, death, and resurrection. The Our Fathers remind us that Jesus' Father is the initiator of salvation. The Hail Marys remind us to join with Mary in contemplating these mysteries. In addition, they also make us aware that Mary was, and is, very closely joined with her Son in all the mysteries of his earthly and heavenly existence. Let us not forget, the Glory be to the Father, which reminds us that the purpose of all life is the glory of the Trinity.

The rosary is a simple prayer filled with the repetition of words which is a help in contemplating the mysteries. We do sense that Jesus and Mary are with us in the joys and sorrows of life. We grow in hope that God will bring us to share in the glory of His Son and our Blessed Lady!

The annual Respect Life collection will be taken up on the weekend of October 5/6, 2024.


