Red Kite Breeding Report – Ken Sanderson

In recent reports I've announced new record figures and this one is no exception. We know of forty-four chicks that have fledged this summer, from twenty successful nests, beating last year's figure of forty-two. Sadly, there were six nests which failed with four of the failures due to the hailstorms and the cold, wet weather of May. Of the five garden nests reported in the last Newsletter, two were lost during that period, but the three remaining successful nests fledged seven chicks.

Only one day's ringing and tagging of red kite chicks was possible this year and this took place on the 16th June. The session went extremely well with four nests being visited. In total eleven chicks had leg rings fitted of which nine were big enough to wing tag. A really successful outcome. This year's right wing tag colour is red.

There were three very late nests discovered this year: One was in Spen Banks, near Sherburn Towers Farm, Rowlands Gill and another was a re-lay in the Harperley Nature Reserve, near Tantobie. The third nest found was north-east of Whitley Chapel and this brought the total of known nests in south-east Northumberland up to three. The youngsters in the nest at Spen Banks fledged in late July, as did the Whitley Chapel brood of three, but the chicks in the Harperley nest did not fledge until the fifth of August. Kite chicks

normally fledge by the end of June.

Unbeknown to us a juvenile kite was found grounded near Derwentcote Steel Furnace, Hamsterley Mill on June 22nd and was taken to Blyth Wildlife Rescue. It only came to our attention when the organisation posted an article on Facebook of the successful release of the bird into the wild following a month in rehab. The finder was a visitor to the area and had not been aware of the existence of FoRK.



So, in summary, it would appear that our kites are doing reasonably well and going from strength to strength. We now look forward to the autumn and winter roosts when numbers counted should reflect the successful breeding seasons of late.

Footnote: Also mentioned in the last Newsletter was the finding of two dead kites, early in the season, at or near active nests in Chopwell Wood and Spen Banks. Post-mortems on the birds showed nothing untoward and we are still awaiting toxicology reports. *Photo by Ian Burnell*

Resumption of Health Walks - Jackey Lockwood

Health Walks have resumed following the lifting by the Government of Covid-related restrictions. It has been sixteen months since our last led walk so it has been good to get out on our regular Monday afternoons once again. We have made a few minor changes to our routine: a Leader wearing a mask records the attendance on the register rather than passing the board and pen around; the pace of walks in the first few walks has been gradual with a shorter walk available for those who need to build up their fitness, stamina and confidence; and we allow for plenty of space for people to be in a group but also distanced.

July's two walks were in the Derwent Valley. There was a variety of wildlife recorded such as grey wagtail and mallard along the river, red kites and buzzard overhead and contact calls of blackcap and chiffchaff from the trees. A few flowers such as campion were still out. Refreshments were available at the Red Kite pub or Café Shrub for those who wanted to partake.

August's five walks were in Watergate Park and Washingwell Woods. There are plenty of paths to vary the route walked. Wildlife sightings were mostly focused around the lake. A pair of swans with four cygnets were there all month as were little grebe with chicks, black-headed gulls, mallard, tufted ducks, moorhen and coot. Swallows were seen overhead as was a sparrowhawk. Crows, magpies and wood pigeons were seen mainly around the farmland. The weather was very warm (except for the Bank holiday!) and the café was open for refreshments and socialising at the end of each walk.

The average number of walkers has risen slightly from 20 in July to 22 in August and the pace has picked up a little. We have a few new walkers who have joined us. The programme of Health Walks is on the FoRK website. I hope people continue to enjoy the fresh air and exercise in our open and accessible green spaces. Once again, I would like to take this opportunity to thank all of our trained Health Walk Leaders



without whom these walks would not happen, and the walkers themselves whose enthusiasm keeps us all going!
