A warm welcome to all, with another edition of Galley Radio, where we cover some of the events that have happened during the Summer session. The end of May was a busy time, as can be seen from the following snippets, but in general we have been very active throughout the summer.

A FINE DAY OUT

May 22nd saw the second of our walks in Edinburgh. This time we met by the Water of Leith Visitor Centre before heading on to the Union Canal to cross the Slateford Aqueduct. At Kingsknowe, we cut down in to Colinton Dell to follow the Water of Leith back towards our starting point.



The photo shows our group stopped at the Craiglockhart Grotto. Built some time in the 1830's by Dr. Alexander Monro, its interior was originally elaborately decorated with shells. Climbing back up on to the Union Canal we headed along the towpath towards Edinburgh city centre. Originally named the Edinburgh and Glasgow Union Canal in 1822, it runs 31 miles from the Lochrin Basin in Edinburgh to Falkirk and was primarily used for coal

transport. With the advent of the Edinburgh to Glasgow railway opening in 1842, the canal gradually fell in to decline and was closed to commercial traffic in 1933.

Unfortunately, we lost one of our members on the route, as his desire for refreshment was greater and he ended up in the Athletic Arms (more commonly called "The Diggers", due to its proximity to the nearby Dalry cemetery). The main body of the group made it to Bennetts Bar for a brief refreshment before heading to the Golf Tavern on the Meadows for some much needed lunch. Thanks again to all who participated.

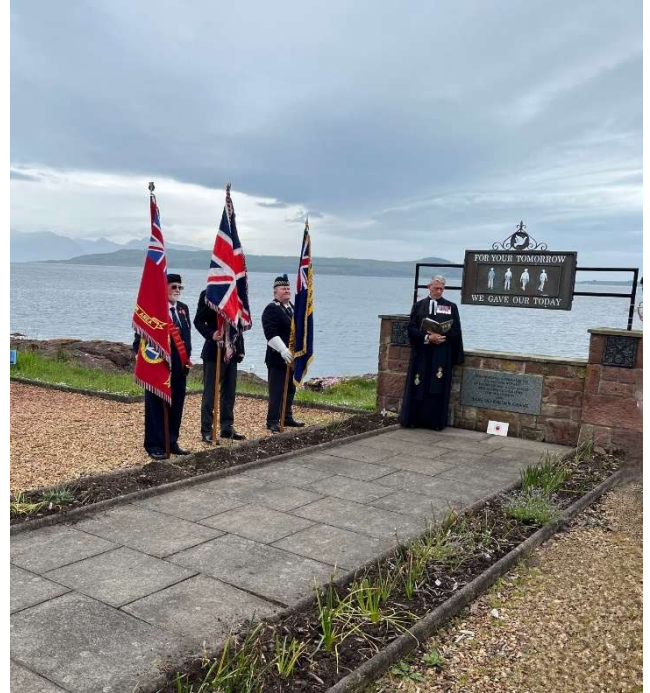

ONE OF THE FEW

30th May saw the return to the Isle of Cumbrae to pay our respects with a service and wreath laying ceremony at the Allied Services Memorial at Sheriff's Port on the west side of the island. It is one of the few memorials dedicated to include the Merchant Navy along with the Army, Royal Navy and Royal Air Force.



The ranks of Merchant Navy representatives were swelled, as there were three members from the Glasgow branch, three from Edinburgh & Forth branch as well as an ex-BP colleague from Arran and our good friend, John Mortimer, bearing the MN Standard.

STRIKE A LIGHT



Whilst on the subject of the Cumbraes, we move south from Great Cumbrae in the Firth of Clyde to Little Cumbrae. As a mostly uninhabited island, Wee Cumbrae was once the hunting ground reserved for kings and lords, including King Robert II and his mother Marjorie, the daughter of Robert the Bruce. The island is also the final resting place of the 7th Century Saint Bey and home to Scotland's second lighthouse.

The original lighthouse was the second ever constructed in Scotland in 1757. Built by James Ewing, it was coal-powered and positioned in the very middle of the island at the highest point, on what is called Lighthouse Hill. Sailors, unfortunately, complained that the light was frequently obscured.

The more traditional lighthouse was designed and built in 1793 by Thomas Smith on behalf of the Commissioners of the Northern Lights, with the original oil lamps being replaced by Argand Lamps in 1826. It also had the first foghorn installed in Britain in 1865. The tower was refurbished in 1956 and solar power installed in 1974.

Lighthouse keepers and their families lived on the island until the 1977 when the last functioning lighthouse was automated. It was decommissioned in 1997 and a light on a tower close to the former generator house is now in operation.

WELL FIRED

The question is always asked, "What did the Romans do for us?" Well, it seems that they had an organised fire service for a start. One of the many interesting facts gleaned at the Museum of Scottish Fire Heritage at McDonald Road Fire Station, where Dave Ferries (QSFM) gave an evening talk on the history of fire-fighting entitled "Through Smoke and Time".

After one of our recent meetings, the discussion had turned to our fire-fighting training. Several who had attended courses at McDonald Road Fire Station in Edinburgh remembered the heat and the degree of realism the Brigade were trying to portray in the mock-up of the ship they had on site.



When the opportunity arose to be able to visit the site again, four stalwart members went along to attend the superb talk. The bonus was being able to visit the museum "after hours" to see the collection of historic artifacts.

It certainly made you wonder, "How on earth did they manage to fight fires with THAT?"

One of our members, David Reid recalls his time during fire-fighting courses.....

BAPTISM OF FIRE

A few of us recently visited McDonald Road Fire Station for a historical talk on the history of the Scottish Fire Fighting Service. Now, many if not most of us have been here in the past. To simulate realistic fire-fighting conditions in a ship a somewhat novel approach was thought up and in 1966 a section of a ship was constructed at McDonald Road Fire Station in Edinburgh by Messrs. Henry Robb Limited, Shipbuilders, Leith. This shore bound vessel was built not only to train fire brigade personnel, but also members of the British Merchant Navy, who cannot call on a fire brigade's help to fight fires on their ships at sea and who are well beyond the aid of outside assistance. This intense training greatly added to the experience of members of both Services.



Of all fires, it is generally agreed by fire officers that those which take place on board ship are amongst the most difficult to fight. Almost all ship fires are, in effect, basement fires and have to be approached from above, through the heat and smoke. As this type of fire is about the most difficult to be tackled by professional fire fighters, how

then must the untrained Merchant Navy officer or seaman feel when confronted with a fire situation at sea, who has no access to help from professional fire fighters.

In view of the number of fires which take place at sea and which, unfortunately, can cost human lives, it was to be hoped that many shipping companies would send their staff for training at this new fire school. Courses were developed and run for the benefit of those who had command as well as for persons with the physical responsibility for fighting fire and for fire prevention. Certainly, something had to be done to cut back on the appalling fire loss figures both in monetary terms and human lives.

MERCHANT NAVY DAY

Thursday 3rd September is Merchant Navy Day and the branch will once again be holding a memorial service at the Scottish Merchant Navy Memorial, opposite the Malmaison Hotel in Leith at 11.00.

Parking will be limited, so best get down there for around 10.30 if looking to participate, or even just as an onlooker.

After the event, branch members and selected participants will be invited to the Vine Trust Barge at the east end of the Albert Dock, beside the Fingal.

Pass the word to MN friends and colleagues.

What started out as shipboard fire training for companies that were interested in this for their personnel, soon became mandatory when the Government body, the MNTB, realised the effectiveness and necessity for the Safety of Life at Sea.

I first attended McDonald Road on 31st August 1970 when I was a new Deck Cadet at Leith Nautical College. Thankfully and happily this one day of theoretical and practical fire-fighting left me blissfully unaware of what was come down the line. To gain my first Certificate of Competency I had to again visit the Station. From the 8th January 1974 to the 11th, I was subjected to 4 days of what could only be described as Hell. Searing Heat, fire, boiling steam, thick cloying smoke whilst wearing badly fitting fire suits and heavy SCBA. All under the control of the highly experienced fire officers. Health & Safety didn't exist and we came to know them as "The Psychopaths." Ultimately, we couldn't be trained by better instructors. I was awarded my Fire Fighting Training Certificate.

Little did I realise the real necessity of this training when only a few months later I was making the lifeboats ready for evacuation before fighting a severe engine and boiler room fire on a BP Tanker in the Red Sea. My first of 4 serious onboard fires during my seagoing time. I returned to the Station in 1999 as Master for specialised training in Command and Control and also for the control and suppression of fire onboard Gas Tankers. McDonald Road was the first of its type for the training of British Merchant Seaman but others followed, South Tyneside, Warsash, Fleetwood. I attended ST in 2009 for the 4 day Advanced Firefighting and again in 2016 for a 2 day updating Proficiency in prevention and fire-fighting.

On our visit for the talk and visit to the museum I was looking forward to seeing the old ship again, little knowing that during the reconstruction of the Station in 2017 it was demolished.
