We love each other because he loved us first."1 John 4:20 NLT 2026 - What will it hold?



Either way, in our household, we're most likely to hurkle-durkle on a Saturday morning. If you don't know, it's a 200-year-old Scottish term meaning 'to lounge in bed long after it's time to get up'.

Another similarly pleasing and pleasurable word is 'coorie'. It's also an old Scot's word meaning to 'nestle or to snuggle'. However, to coorie means much more than this today. 





I'll be honest - I struggle with Christmas.

MOANER For many, it's the jolliest time of the year. The lights go up (sometimes as early as September!), carols start in the shops, and everyone seems to be smiling.

Yet behind those twinkling lights and cheerful adverts, there's often something else - stress, worry, and a quiet longing for it all to be over.

Every year I try to join in, to smile and nod at mince pie parties and pretend I'm feeling festive. But flashing lights and inflatable reindeer don't fill me with joy. Instead, they bring back memories - some happy, some painful - and I find myself feeling out of step with the world.

Gardens and houses start to look like B&Q's display aisles, and the adverts shout that it's "the most wonderful time of the year" while many people struggle with debt, loneliness, or grief.

What troubles me most is how easily we forget what this season is truly about. Amid the hustle and plastic tinsel, the name of Jesus is often left out altogether. Yet He is the heart of Christmas - not the gift wrap, not the blinking lights, not the shopping lists.

Just Jesus - born in a manger, bringing light into a weary world.

So yes, I might mutter "bah humbug" now and then. I might hide from the tinsel and wait for January. But maybe, even for people like me, there's a quieter Christmas to be found - not in the noise, but in the stillness. In a candle's glow. In a carol sung softly. In the simple truth that God came close.



When the trees are dragged to the kerb in their bagged grief, Christmas will be "over" for another year. **But Christ - the reason for it all - remains**.

THE 'JESUS SAVES' STONE

The Mystery of the "Jesus Saves" Stone

If you've ever travelled the lonely road over the Dava Moor you'll have seen it: a big white boulder by the roadside with two words splashed in red paint - "JESUS SAVES."

It has been there for decades, long enough to become part of the landscape. Some say it was first painted by a missionary who had come home from Africa. Others tell the tale of a travelling salesman who got stuck in a snowdrift, prayed for help, and was rescued by a local farmer. In gratitude, he left his mark on the stone.



Whatever the truth, the message has survived. From time to time folk change it, or the paint fades, but before long someone quietly restores the words. No one ever seems to admit to doing it, but there is clearly a "guardian of the stone."

For cyclists, walkers, and motorists alike, the Jesus Saves Stone has become a kind of landmark a sign that you're crossing the high moor, with the purple heather stretching away to the hills. It's simple, it's bold, and it's part of the story of the Dava.

Like it or loathe it, you can't really miss it.

A MOMENT TO REMEMBER



I would like to share a few reflections prompted by the picture that appeared on the cover of the September issue of *EPIC* magazine. It stirred up a memory that has stayed close to me for many years. When the former Elgin High Church had a walking group, one of our most memorable outings was to the Isle of Rum. We spent a wonderful day climbing the chain of hills known as the Rum Cuillins. By late afternoon, we were contentedly sitting in the heather with a cup of coffee, looking down towards our accommodation at Kinloch

Castle and thinking of an easy stroll back.

Yet one last hill stood a little apart to the north, and among our number was a particularly competitive fellow, Mr Fred Chapman. With a grin and a challenge, he decided we must race to the top - and so off we went. Halfway up we paused for breath. Fred sat with the hillside rising behind him, while I faced into the slope, changing the film in my camera.

Suddenly he shouted, "Look! Behind you!" I turned, and there, only a short distance away, a magnificent golden eagle rose from the heather, its great wings unfolding into the sky. By the time my hands stopped fumbling with the camera, it was already soaring high above us.

The etching in *EPIC* was exactly what we saw that day. I have recalled that moment many times over in the years since - a brief encounter that sits among the very finest of all the sights I have been blessed to witness in more than seventy years roaming the Scottish hills: mountain, bird, and wild freedom together.

I truly believe that such moments of wonder draw us nearer to our Creator, and to the beautiful world He has placed in our care.

ON EAGLE'S WINGS

The hymn **On Eagle's Wings** was written in 1979 by Father Michael Joncas, a Catholic priest and composer from Minnesota. He wrote it after the sudden death of a friend's father, intending it as a song of comfort and reassurance.

Its words draw from Scripture - especially Psalm 91, Exodus 19, and Isaiah 40 - and speak of God's care and protection: lifting us up, guarding, and carrying us as an eagle carries its young.

- Psalm 91 ("You who dwell in the shelter of the Lord ...")
- Exodus 19:4 ("I bore you on eagles' wings and brought you to myself")
- **Isaiah 40:31** ("They that hope in the Lord will renew their strength, they will soar as with eagles' wings ...")

Since then, On Eagle's Wings has become one of the most loved modern hymns, sung in many different churches and often chosen for funerals and services of remembrance.

Its message is simple yet powerful. Even in times of sorrow, we are safe in God's hands.

ABOUT THE SONG

My Sweet Lord - George Harrison

George Harrison's song "My Sweet Lord" (1970) became one of the best-loved pieces of popular music to speak openly about Faith. Written after the break-up

of The Beatles, the song is a heartfelt prayer - not to fame or success, but to God.

The repeated phrase "My Sweet Lord" is striking in its simplicity. Harrison longed

The repeated phrase "**My Sweet Lord**" is striking in its simplicity. Harrison longed not just to know about God but to experience His presence personally. The words "hallelujah" run through the song, and towards the end he weaves in the Hindu chant "Hare Krishna," reflecting his interest in Indian spirituality. Harrison explained that he wanted people to feel that praising God, whether in Christian or Eastern language, was pointing to the same reality.

For Christians, the song reminds us of Psalm 34:8: "Taste and see that the Lord is good."

Faith is not only ideas and doctrines but a relationship with the living God. The yearning in Harrison's music captures something we all recognise - the desire to draw near to the One who made us and loves us.

Perhaps that is why "My Sweet Lord" continues to touch people. Beneath the different words and styles of worship lies the same deep cry: "Come close, Lord - I want to see You."

ACORN

Then Jesus said, "Whoever has ears to hear and eyes to see" - Mark 4:9

People saw Jesus' miracles and heard His teachings, but many didn't understand or accept them. Their hearts were closed off, even though the truth was right in front of them.

In that context:

"Eyes to see" = the ability to recognise spiritual truth.

"Ears to hear" = the willingness to truly listen and respond to God's message.

In Acorn, we practice noticing in other words seeing what God is doing in the person and through the person.

Jesus was challenging people to wake up spiritually – to really see and hear in a way that leads to change, faith and understanding.

Jesus still challenges us today to really see and hear through our Acorn experiences.
