Rose Burzlaff, 95, of DeWitt, Iowa, died Friday, December 29, 2017, at Clarissa C. Cook Hospice House in Bettendorf.

Rose Elizabeth Rathmann was born January 13, 1922, to Herman and Florence (Bunce) Rathmann near Grand Mound, Iowa. At the age of 2, she was taken in by an Uncle and Aunt, William and Nettie Paarmann Rathmann of Welton, to be raised as their own daughter. She graduated from High School in 1940. Rose married Walter H. Burzlaff on July 12, 1941, at Grace Lutheran Church in DeWitt. The couple resided and farmed in the Delmar area until relocating to Limon, Colorado, where they ran a KOA campground from 1970-76. They then retired to Colorado Springs where Rose worked for Weight Watchers for 30 years. Walter preceded Rose in death in 2002, and she moved back to DeWitt that year.

Rose was a member of Grace Lutheran Church, DeWitt, where she was confirmed in 1936. After raising 5 boys, Rose enjoyed having time to crochet and sew.

She is survived by her sons, Bill of Davenport, Bob of Knoxville, Dick of Quartzsite, Arizona, and Mark (Elaine) of Mooresville, North Carolina; 13 grand-children; several great-grandchildren and great-great-grandchildren; siblings, Walter (Chris) Rathmann, and Beverly (Delbert) Wulf; many nieces and nephews. In addition to her husband, Walter, she was preceded in death by a son, Randy (Cindy); 8 brothers and sisters; and a granddaughter, Robyn.



Karl "Opa" Maass, 87, of DeWitt, Iowa, passed away unexpectedly on Sunday, December 31, 2017, at Grand Haven Retirement Community in Eldridge, surrounded by his loving family.

Karl Georg Wilhelm Maass was born October 26, 1930, in Kiel, Germany, the only child of Georg and Kathe (Hauschild) Maass. He attended school in his home town until wartime threats forced the children of the area to relocate to youth camps in the countryside. The family later moved to Schmalstede where he became

friends with Freddy Freese (Grete's brother) and became like a member of their family. They played soccer together for many years. Upon finishing school, he served a masonry apprenticeship in Kiel and then followed Freddy to the United States in 1953, with hopes of job opportunities. He first worked for Pappy and Mel Larsen, masons in DeWitt. In 1955, when Grete came to visit her family, Karl picked her up at the harbor in New York and the rest is history. Karl and Grete were united in marriage on April 20, 1956, at Grace Lutheran Church, DeWitt in a German ceremony officiated by the Rev. Theodore Hinck. In 1962 he established Maass Masonry. The couple resided in DeWitt all of their lives together where they raised their three children. She preceded him in death on January 20, 2016, after 59 years of marriage.

Opa was very passionate about the things that mattered most to him: his German heritage, soccer, puzzles, his grandchildren and great-grandsons, and masonry. He had many strengths, and his weakness he turned into a strength by embracing sobriety "one day at a time" and helping countless others do the same. He was especially proud to have been involved in founding the DeWitt Alcoholics Anonymous group in 1975. Karl celebrated 42 years of sobriety this year. For 36 years he supported inmates in recovery at Ft. Madison Penitentiary on a monthly basis, for which he received the Governor's Volunteer Award. Karl proudly taught his masonry skills to his son and grandson, Claus and Andy, who later took over the business. Their masonry legacy can be seen throughout the DeWitt area, from the cross at Grace Camp to the Hausbarn in Lincoln Park. He was blessed with 25 years of retirement in good health, enjoying endless cups of coffee, watching German soccer, papercutting, his wife's home cooking, and countless trips to Germany with his children and grandchildren.

Patricia Alice Schrage was born August 23, 1940, to the late Oliver and Alice (Bahrke) Zahn in Oconto Falls, Wisconsin. She was baptized on September 15, 1940, at Immanuel Lutheran Church, Gillett, Wisconsin. It was at Immanuel that she married her dear friend, Richard F. Schrage on August 7, 1965.

She was a retired Lutheran teacher/administrator who served Missouri Synod Lutheran Congregations in Michigan, Illinois, Indiana and Iowa. Her undergraduate work was done at The University of Michigan and Concordia Lutheran University in St. Paul, Minnesota, and Seward, Nebraska, and graduate work at Western Illinois University. Pat was charter member of Park View Lutheran Church and cofounder/administrator of Share and Care Christian Preschool in Park View. She retired in 1990 following 30 years of teaching. She served her church's denomination on the district level as teacher conference chairperson and secretary, evangelism committee member and as Early Childhood Consultant assisting a number of congregations to begin Early Childhood Centers. Pat was also a member of Delta Kappa Gamma-Alpha Eta Chapter, Bettendorf Christian Women's Club, served ten years as youth chairperson for the American Red cross and was awarded the title of "Outstanding Teaching Of The Year" for 1975. Following retirement, Pat served as a substitute teacher at the Rock Island Arsenal Child Development Center and as a substitute librarian for the Scott County Library System.

Pat's greatest joy came from Bible reading, teaching precious students, being a prayer warrior, writing poetry, biking, traveling

and spending time with her precious spouse in befriending others and leading Bible study and Prayer Services together with him at Grace Lutheran Church in DeWitt where she was a member.

In addition to her husband, Dick, a sister, Mary L. Ward as well as nieces and nephews survive Pat.

WHAT IS LENT?

Lent is a season of preparation leading up to Easter. It is the forty days plus the six Sundays before Easter. For centuries, it has been observed as a special time of self examination and penitence. Lent is a time for concentration on fundamental values and priorities, and is not a time for self punishment. Throughout Lent, the worship services of the church take on a simpler tone, appropriate to this season. Banners are removed from the church. Crosses showing the risen Christ are veiled. The word "Alleluia" is not used in the words of the liturgy or hymns. These practices help the worshipping community to mark this season of renewal as a special time in the church year. Lent is a time to draw closer to the Triune God and see it is He who gives the most.

OBSERVING LENT

The custom is to mark the season of Lent by giving up some things and taking on others. Both can serve to mark the season as a holy time of preparation. Some examples of things people give up for Lent include sweets, meat for all or some meals, and alcohol. In most cases, giving up something for Lent can be made more meaningful by using the money or time for another purpose. For example, meal times on fast days could be spent in prayer. Another example is that if you give up meat during Lent, the extra money that would go to LCMS Lutheran World Relief or your local food pantry. Some things added during Lent are daily Bible reading, fasting on Fridays, times of prayer, increasing our financial offerings, attending extra worship services, taking a Bible course of study related in some way to spirituality.

Note that the season of Lent is forty days plus the six Sundays. This is because Sundays are celebrations of Jesus' resurrection and are always an appropriate day to lessen the restrictions of Lent. So that if you have, for example, given up chocolate for Lent, you could indulge in a weekly candy bar on Sunday.

Lent is also an especially appropriate time for confession. While confession to a pastor is not required to receive God's forgiveness, it can be a meaningful rite of reconciliation to God.

SPECIAL DAYS & SERVICES

Shrove Tuesday - This is actually the day before Lent begins. The day is named for the "shriving" or confessing that was traditional on this day before beginning Lent. This day is also known as Mardi Gras, or "Fat Tuesday" because it was a time for eating the things from which one would abstain during Lent.

Ash Wednesday - The first day of Lent is marked with a special liturgy. The theme for the day, though not for all of Lent, is that we stand as sinners condemned to die, but for God's grace. This is symbolized by the imposition of ashes on the forehead, with the words, "You are dust and to dust you shall return". In the Old Testament, ashes were a sign of penitence (feeling regretful at offenses) and mourning.

Ash Wednesday is one of two days of special observance (the other being Good Friday) for which fasting is recommended. While this usually refers going without food for the entire day, this practice is not practical for all persons, including, but not limited to, diabetics. Use your own discretion in determining how you can best observe this day.

Palm Sunday - This Sunday before Easter is the last Sunday in Lent. The day commemorates Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem with a blessing of palms and a procession in which the whole congregation carries palms. The day is also marked by reading the story of Jesus' passion (the word used to describe Jesus' death comes from "suffering," which is one old meaning of passion). Some of the Palm Sunday palms are kept and used to make the Ash Wednesday ashes for the next year.

Maundy Thursday - This is the Thursday in Holy Week (the week leading up to Easter). The day is a time for remembering The Last

Supper. The name comes from the Latin word "Mandatum" for "commandment" as Jesus said, "I give you a new commandment; that you love one another." At the conclusion of this service, altars are stripped of any ornamentation and crosses are removed or veiled to mark the solemnness of the occasion.

In the German it is known as "Grundonnerstag" or Green Thursday. While it may have several meanings, the more common meaning that has come down to Lutherans in America has been the newly confirmed receiving their first communion.

Good Friday - The Friday in Holy Week is a time for remembering Jesus death. Traditionally there is a Good Friday service at noon as Jesus hung on the cross from noon until 3 P.M. There may also be an evening service. This is the second day of special observance for which fasting is recommended. One should use discretion in decided how best to observe this day. There is no celebration of Communion from Maundy Thursday until the Easter Vigil on late Saturday or early Sunday. However, it is customary in many churches to give out the elements of communion blessed during the Maundy Thursday service.

The Easter Vigil - This service is appropriate from after sunset on Holy Saturday until sunrise Easter morning. This was the traditional time of baptism in the early centuries of Christianity. This service begins in darkness and a new fire is lit, from which the Christ candle is lighted. It signifies the light of Christ coming into the world anew at the resurrection. This service ends the season of Lent and begins the joy of the Easter season.
