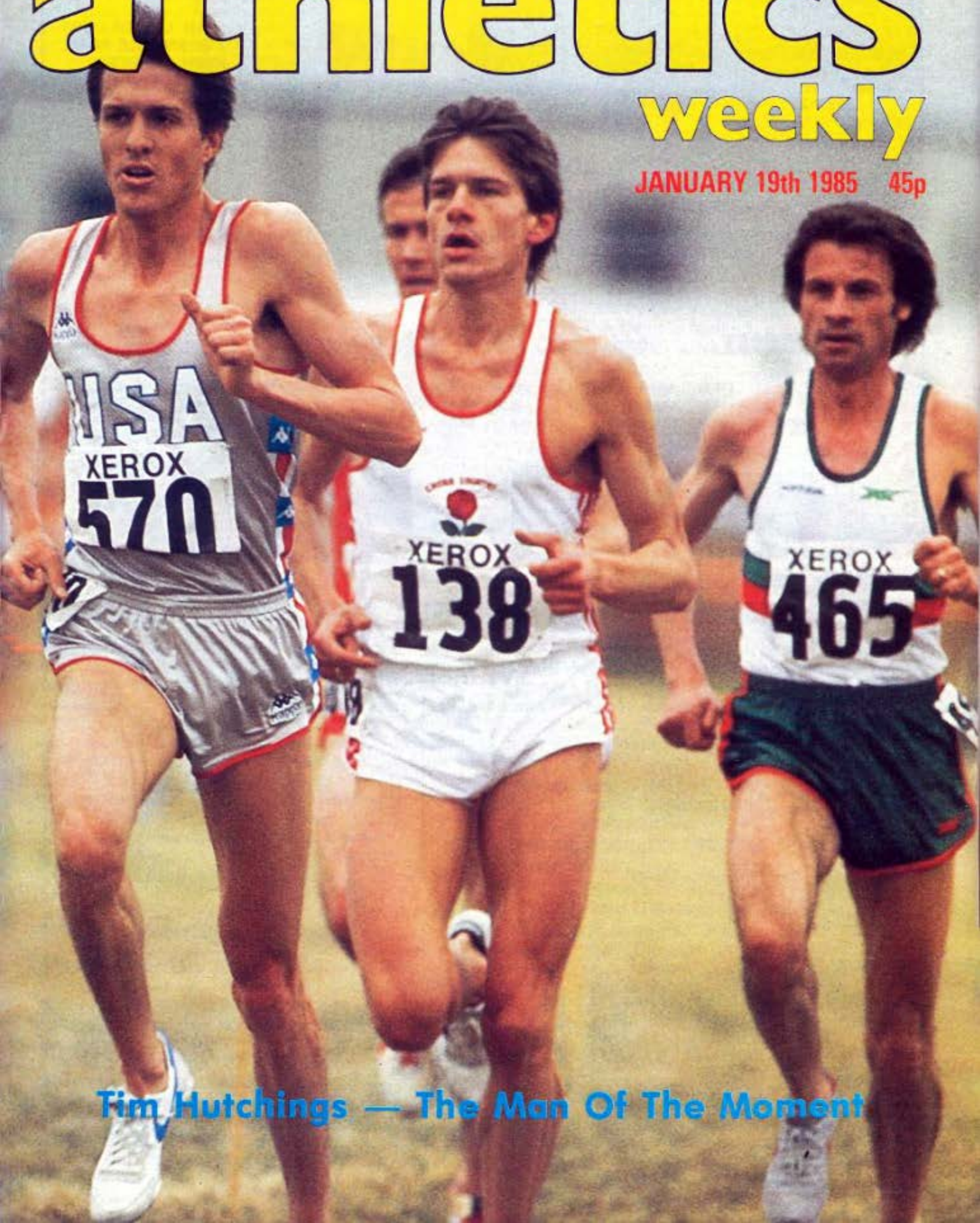

FOLLOWING the Arrow Cosford Games last weekend, several more British athletes were added to the team for the IAAF's inaugural World Indoor Games in Paris, making a total of 11 men and six women. 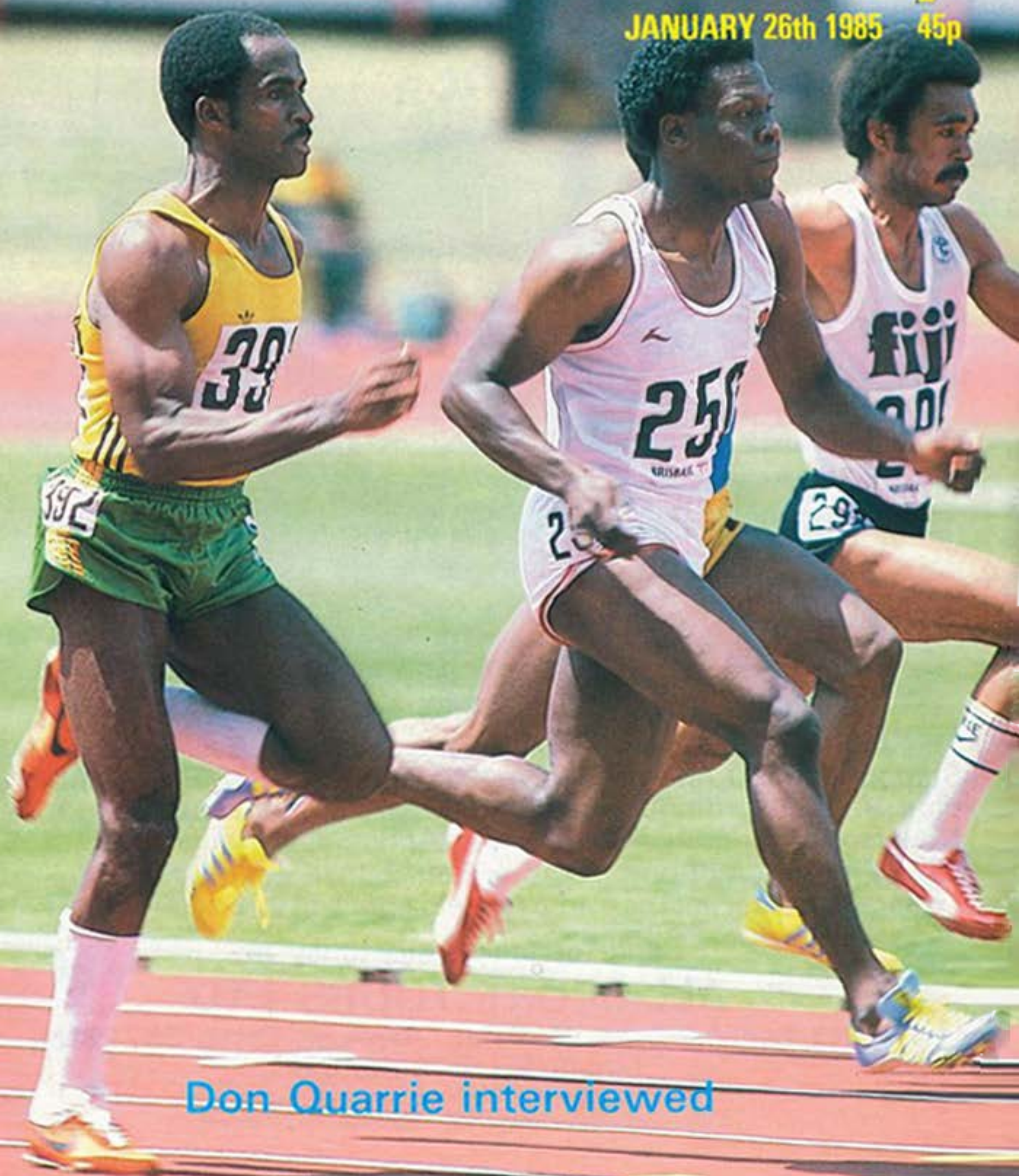

Two UK indoor bests in Paris

THE outstanding exploit of the IAAF's World Indoor Games in Paris last weekend was Thomas Schonlebe's world indoor 400m best. The young East German recorded a time of 45.60, with Todd Bennett registering a UK best of 45.97 in second place. Another UK best fell in the 200m, where Ade Mafe placed a close second to Aleksandr Yevgenyev (USSR) in 20.96. Other British second placers were Heather Oakes (personal best of 7.21 for 60m) and Jane Finch (2:04.71 800m), while Ikem Billy (indoor 800m pb of 1:48.28) and Jon Ridgeon (just 1/100th outside Mark Holtom's UK best of 7.69 in the 60m hurdles) picked up third places. BUBKA BROTHERS AT COSFORD

WORLD pole vault champion and record holder Sergey Bubka (USSR) and his elder brother, Vasily, respectively first (5.75m) and third (5.60) in Paris, will be competing in the Pearl Assurance AAA Indoor Championships at Cosford this weekend. They will be accompanied by Oleg Protsenko, the world's top ranked triple jumper in 1984 with 17.52m.

China will be well represented by a team which includes high jumper Cai Shu (best of 2.27m), long jumper Liu Yuhuang (8.14m), triple jumper Zou Zhenxian (17.34m), and — on the women's side — Ni Xiuling (1.89m high jump), Liao Wenfen (6.54m long jump) and Li Meisu (18.47m shot). Japan is sending Takao Sakamoto (2.30m high jump) and Atsushi Inaoka (2.26), Junichi Usui (8.10m long jump) and Yasushi Ueta (16.71m triple jump), while other overseas stars due to compete include sprinters, Mel Lattany (USA) and Ronald Desruelles (Bel), and Canada's 2.28m high jumper, Alain Metellus.

Most of the British athletes who distinguished themselves in Paris — including record breakers Ade Mafe and Todd Bennett — will be taking part, along with such Cosford Games successes as Mike McFarlane and Linsey Macdonald . . . and not forgetting Zola Budd, who makes her indoor debut in the 1500m.

The meeting starts on Friday evening (January 25th) at 7 pm and continues from 11 am (first track final at 2 pm) on Saturday. Extra seating is being provided and admission is guaranteed. The last few tickets available for the England v USA match (March 9th) will be on sale at Cosford.

MARY'S RECORD RETURN

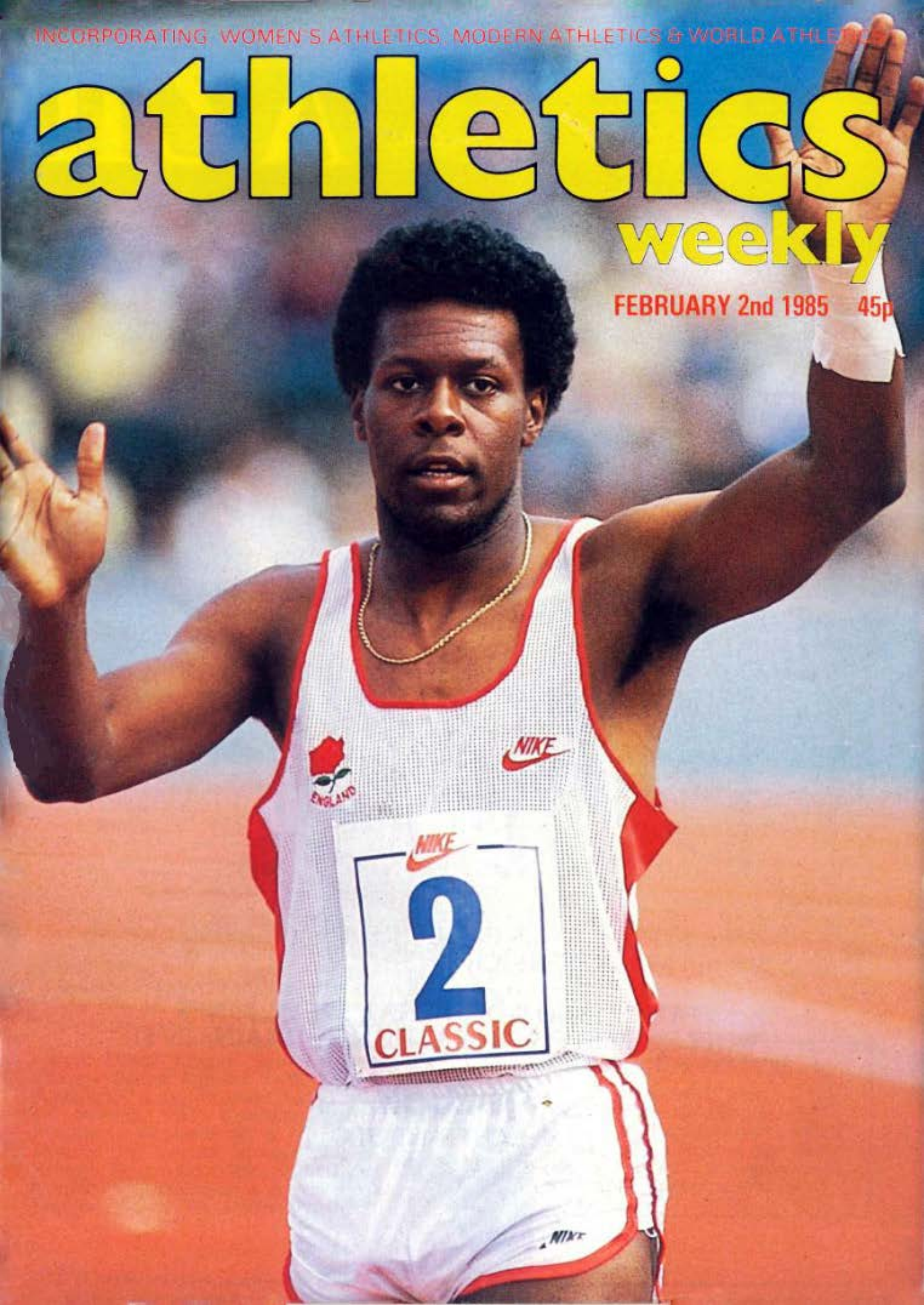
Newly married Mary Slaney (née Decker), racing for the first time since her Olympic debacle, smashed the world indoor best for 2000m with a time of 5:34.52 in Los Angeles last Friday. Jack Buckner won the two miles in 8:28.76 and Eamonn Coghlan took the mile in 3:56.34 ahead of Steve Scott (3:56.35) and John Walker (3:57.56), the latter running his 95th sub-four minute mile.

HIGH JUMP

Think of women's high jumping and Bulgaria, and the name that springs to mind is Lyudmila Andonova, who amazed everyone — not least herself — last summer with her world record leap of 2.07m. Left in the shadows by her illustrious compatriot's success has been Stefka Kostadinova, but this highly talented 19-year-old, who last August became the eighth woman ever to jump two metres, herself moved into the spotlight in Paris. Not only did she defeat a strong field, but she jumped flawlessly, incurring no failures at all at 1.80, 1.85, 1.90, 1.94 and 1.97. Disdaining anything so mundane as going just for a pb, she then proceeded to take three unavailing cracks at the world indoor record height of 2.04. Sweden's Susanne Lorentzon was also in formidable form, clearing her highest ever of 1.94 for second place. Debbie Marti, who was selected to partner Diana Davies, had to withdraw due to illness.

LONG JUMP

Helga Radtke, the fourth longest jumping female in history with 7.21m last summer, led from her opening leap of 6.74, and apart from a slight dip to 6.72 in the second round improved throughout the competition: to 6.81, 6.82, 6.86 and 6.88. The only rival to get within 40cm of her was Tatyana Rodionova, who reached 6.72 in the fifth round.

Italy's Giuliana Salce, who holds the world outdoor record of 12:42.33, produced the second fastest time ever indoors with 12:53.42. She led every inch of the way, stringing together kilometres of 4:16.66, 4:19.73 and 4:17.03 and finishing with a tremendous last 200m lap of 47.81. Yan Hong, the tiny Chinese who has clocked 21:40.3 for 5km and 45:39.5 for 10km, held second place from the seventh lap onwards, but she was pressed throughout by Canada's Ann Peel.

ALDERSHOT OUT IN FORCE

THE 22nd European Clubs CC Championships take place in Portugal this weekend, and from the team they are taking and with just four men to score, the reigning ECCU champions, Aldershot F&D, are looking to vastly improve on their fifth place of last year. Their first three men home in last year's 'National', Roger Hackney (2nd), Eddie Herridge (12th) and Bernie Ford (33rd!) lead the challenge, and with the 'new boy', Richard Partridge (11th at Newark for Birchfield), likely to be in the scoring four, they will surely be very hard to beat. Ian Logan, who ran so well in the 'National' at Luton two years ago, and Ray Keeney make up the team, and John Hood is travelling reserve.

Explaining the inclusion of **Martti Vainio**, the compilers state: "Our pick of Vainio — disqualified for steroids after winning LA silver — for the number four position (10,000) may upset some, raising thoughts that we condone drug abuse. Not so! But at this juncture we still feel that in our Rankings sense it is unfair to single out certain athletes when so many — and many of them quite possibly equally dirty — don't go through the same procedure". The latest move against Vainio by the Finnish Athletics Federation is stripping him of the Finnish 5000m record (13:16.02) he set in Oslo in June as that was after he proved positive in a drug test at the Rotterdam Marathon. The record reverts to 13:16.4 by **Lasse Viren** in 1972.

Whatever happened to Mick Morton?

Within 16 months of taking up athletics, **Mick Morton** caused quite a stir in 1977 by winning the National Youths Cross Country title by the biggest ever margin, and the following year in Glasgow he became the first Englishman since **Nick Rose** in 1971 to win the World Junior CC Championship. Long stride, vigorous arms, head down, the Blackburn runner drove powerfully through the mud and torrential rain while others flailed about. Revelling in the conditions, Mick was nearly 100m ahead by 4km and at the finish of the 7km race he was still over 70m to the good. Back in 20th place that day was Portugal's future

Olympic 5000m bronze medallist, **Antonio Leitao**, while 34th — after being second to Morton early on — was a Moroccan by the name of **Said Aoulta**

On the track in 1978 Morton ran 4:02.6 for the mile, 8:00.1 for 3000 and 13:54.2 for 5000 — tremendous running for an 18-year-old. In 1980 he improved to 13:41.07, as well as setting personal bests of 1:52.6 for 800 and 3:44.49 for 1500. He looked on course to fulfil his potential as a 5000m runner of the highest class. But hopes of competing in the 1982 European Championships and Commonwealth Games were dashed by injury... as were his ambitions of making the 1983 World Championships and 1984 Olympics.

The story of Mick Morton and his long and hopefully successful battle against injury was told in the BBC 2 series *A Will To Win* recently. After four years and five operations (the trouble being a trapped nerve in his left foot) we saw Mick line up for what he termed his Olympics — the first big race of his comeback, a mile at Blackburn in September 1984. "That was great", remarked his coach **Gerry Barnes** as he watched Mick lead past the bell in 3:02.9 and finish a splendid third in his fastest ever time of 4:01.4 behind David Lewis (4:00.0) and Alan Mottershead (4:00.7). He was back!

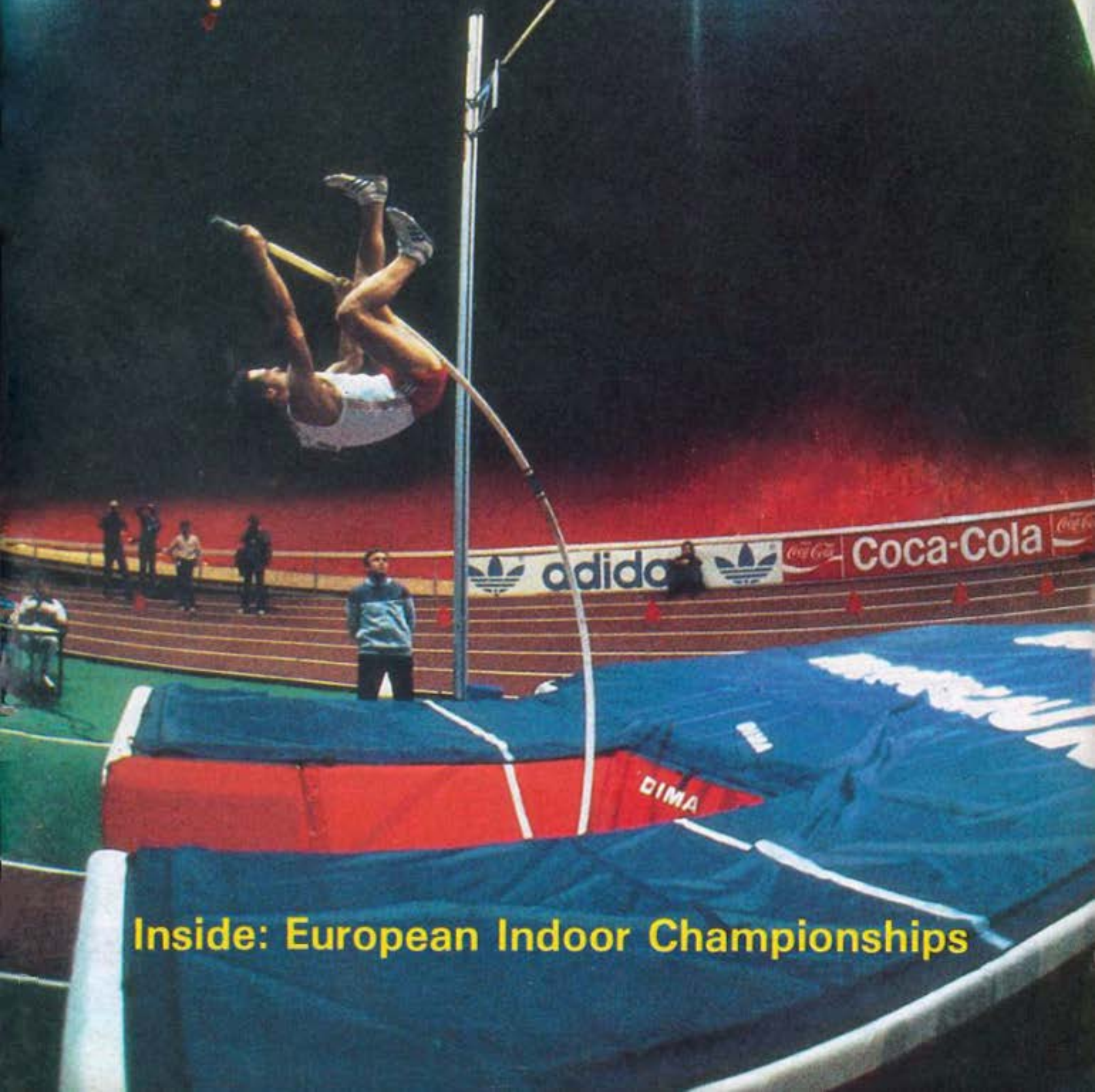

That jump put her in first place until Eva Murkova managed 6.99 in round three to place equal fourth on the all-time list. Chistyakova's winning leap of 7.02 came in round four. She placed third to Heike Drechsler and Radtke in the Prague meeting last August but has since improved her 100m best to 11.6 which has paid dividends. Dreschler was hampered by a slight injury and suffered her first defeat in any competition for almost two years.

Best Ever Cup Showing By Britain?

THE BIG challenge collectively for Britain's international athletes this season is the European Cup Final, to be staged in Moscow's Lenin Stadium on August 17th/18th. The signs are that Britain — if fielding the strongest possible team — could produce its best ever all-round performance in this tournament by placing third in both the men's and women's competitions behind the Soviet and GDR powerhouses. The best UK showing thus far came about in 1977 when the men finished fourth and the women third, and in 1981 when it was the men's turn to place third and the women fourth.

The statistics which follow provide an admittedly rough and ready guide to what might happen in Moscow; they represent the best marks made in 1984 by the top ranked athlete from each of the participating countries. The situation in 1985 could be very different (some of the athletes listed have retired, been suspended or are out injured; others will no doubt be supplanted by their national team colleagues), but the figures do give some indication of each team's strengths and weaknesses and point to the many absorbing individual clashes which could await us in Moscow.

The first two teams in each competition go on to the World Cup in Canberra (October 4th-6th), while other outstanding individuals can qualify for the Europe Select team.

Star Athletes of the Thirties

If you're in London and you're interested in an earlier era of athletics, then you have another three weeks to visit a fascinating display of photos, 'The Sporting Thirties', at the National Portrait Gallery, off Trafalgar Square. The exhibition, featuring sporting events and personalities of the 1930's, closes on May 19th. The athletics section contains pictures of such legendary figures of that decade as Sydney Wooderson, Lord Burghley, Don Finlay, Bob Tisdall (putting the shot!), Tom Hampson, Tom Green and Dorothy Odam (later Tyler).

Among the exhibits is a photo-feature from the June 17th 1939 issue of *Picture Post* on Wooderson. Headlined 'The Greatest Miler Ever', and incorporating a 24-frame action sequence, the article describes Sydney's training regimen under his coach, the equally great Albert Hill (1920 Olympic 800 and 1500m champion). As Wooderson worked in a City office from 10 am until 6 pm his morning exercise was limited to deep breathing exercises and a brisk walk. On four nights a week (Monday, Wednesday, Thursday, Saturday) he would have a track training session, starting with three slow laps as warm up. He would then practise starts and run any distance from 60 yd to a medium tempo 1¼ miles, paced by his brother Stanley. On Tuesday and Friday his training would consist of a brisk five miles walk, while on Sunday he would take a 15-20 miles 'tramp' in the country.

Wooderson was a true marvel whose reputation remains undimmed all these years later even though his best times nowadays would produce little excitement. Even Seb Coe and Steve Ovett cannot yet rival the 1.68/5'6" tall Blackheath Harrier . . . a man who set world records at 800m, 880yd and the mile and won the European 1500m title in the late thirties, lost what would surely have been his best athletic years during the war, and returned in 1946 to win the European 5000m title in the second fastest time on record. That was the end of his track career, but in 1948, aged 33, he captured the English cross country title over ten miles.

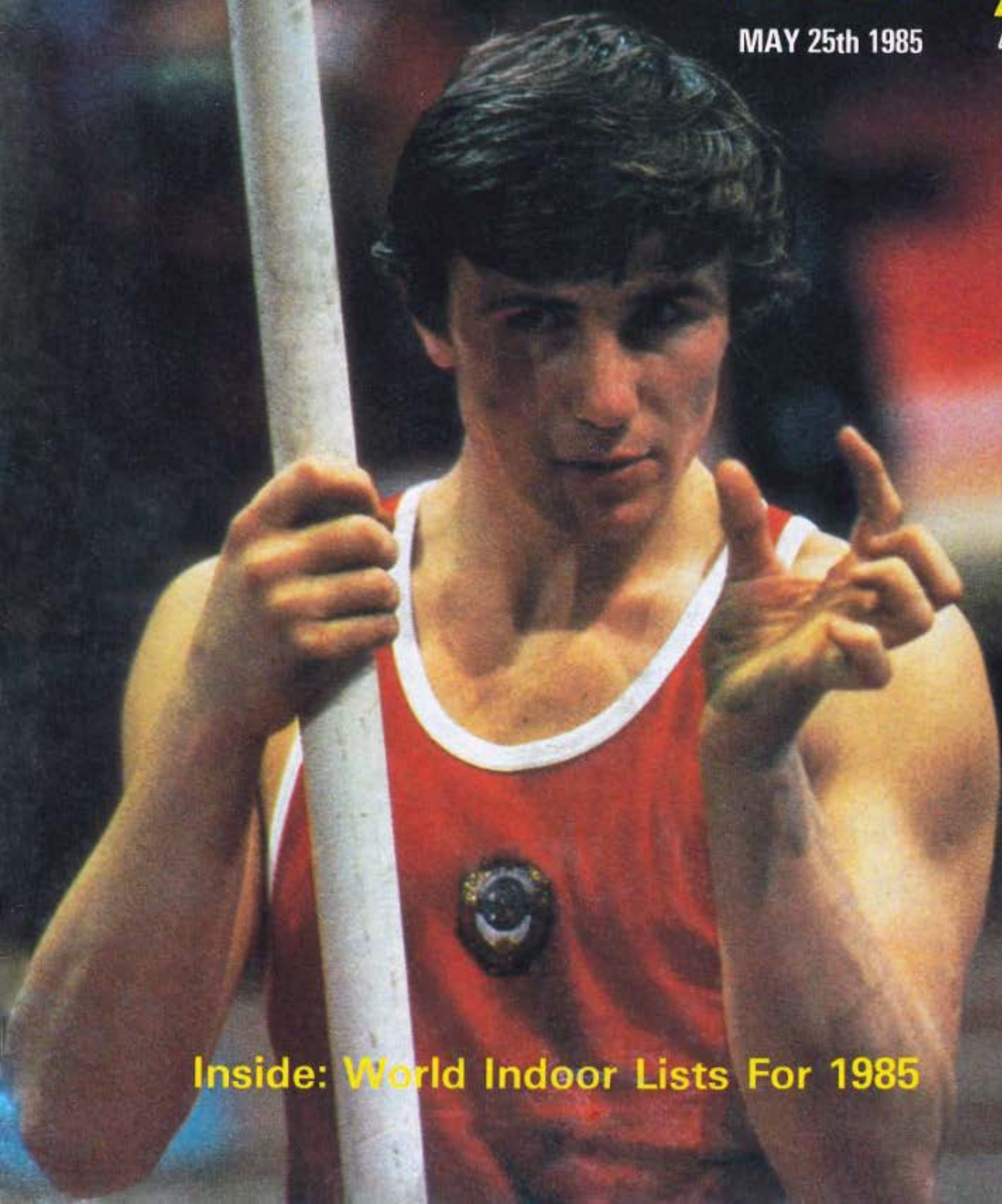

Grand Prix Boost For Todd Bennett

THE first of the IAAF/Mobil Grand Prix meetings to be held in Europe, the Znamenskiy Memorial in Moscow on June 8th, was marked by the expected overall surge in standards compared to the two American meetings with only one event — the 200 — failing to qualify for Grand Prix points.

Todd Bennett's first outdoor 400m of the season proved to be successful, although he had been apprehensive on hearing heats were to be run in the morning. In the event it may have proved to be a boon as a 46.76 heat took off the rough edges. In the final Todd went clear of the field at the 250m mark by two metres and just held off Vladimir Krylov, the Soviet champion, to win in his second best ever time of 45.49. The Russian ran a pb of 45.54 well clear of Harald Schmid.

The women's 1500 (which is not on this year's Grand Prix schedule of events) was held the next day when the weather had deteriorated to 9°C with blustery winds and continuous rain. Chris Boxer had been hoping for a fast time but the Soviet squad were looking for a slowly paced race. Hemmed in for the first lap (71.75) the Soviets got their wish, with Natalya Artyemova (winner of the 3000 the previous day in 8:46.74) showing herself to be the current best in the USSR with a final 800 in 2:04 to win in 4:08.60. Chris finished fourth in 4:11.28 after a last two laps of 2:06, dissatisfied with the time but pleased at beating a number of Russians who were quicker on paper.

Not surprisingly, the outstanding performances came in the field. In the hammer, it was literally in the field as safety now precludes Soviet hammer throwers from plying their trade inside the stadium. Just 53 onlookers stood in the rain to watch an extraordinary exhibition of throwing by Juri Tamm. His first (and worst) throw was 79.58m, which was followed by 80.68, 81.06, 80.28, 80.40 and 79.64. For Tamm, who heads the 1985 world rankings with 83.40, the competition was diminished by the absence of Yuriy Sedykh (resting) and Sergey Litvinov (in training for 1986!).

The long jump was won by Robert Emmiyan who went into the competition with a pb of 8.14m and successively leaped 8.15, 8.25, 8.27 and 8.30. The 20-year-old and his coach (1956 Olympic shot putter Vartan Ovsepyan) are looking for 8.50 later this year. The top woman performer was Olga Bondarenko, who ran the third fastest 10,000 of all time in 31:25.18 (15:36.37 at 5000), which was

virtually a solo performance achieved when the weather was at its worst. The attendance over two days was a mere 7000.

IAAF/Mobil Grand Prix

Richard Hyman reports from Prague

Both Bubka Brothers Attempt 5.95m

A CROWD OF 25,000 packed into the Rosicky Stadium in Prague on June 22nd to watch the best attended meeting in Czechoslovakia since the 1978 European Championships. This, the fourth of the IAAF/Mobil Grand Prix meetings, contained 14 qualifying events — one less than in Moscow — but in terms of atmosphere and quality of performance was the best of the GP series thus far.

After a run of disappointments recently, Sergey Bubka finally redeemed himself in winning the pole vault with a characteristically giant clearance at 5.80m. He needed it, as elder brother Vasiliy improved his personal best yet again (he had recently jumped 5.75) to 5.80. Both tried the world record height of 5.95, with Sergey getting close at his last attempt. The remarkably consistent Aleksandr Krupskiy was third with his sixth clearance of 5.70 this season, a mark also attained by Marian Kolasa. With local boy Frantisek Jansa getting close at that height, this proved to be one of the best pole vault competitions of all time.

Czechoslovakia's most famous athlete, Jarmila Kratochvilova, achieved the fastest 800m time of the year (1:56.57), and needed it as Romania's Ella Kovacs improved her pb by 1½ seconds to 1:56.92. Kovacs had attacked at 500, held off Kratochvilova until the last 80, and fought the world record holder the whole way. Almost unnoticed, Ana Quirot of Cuba became the first Caribbean athlete to duck below two minutes.

Britain was represented by Angela Tooby and Jane Shields (née Furniss) in the 3000, one of two events which failed to meet Grand Prix standards (the other was the men's 200), and they felt a little deflated on finding out that no Soviet runners were in the race. Angela finished a solid second behind Olympic champion Maricica Puica, while Jane found her first track race after road running quite difficult, but will improve as the season progresses.

Genowefa Blaszk handled Ellen Fiedler as easily as she had coped with Soviet opposition in the previous GP meeting and was rewarded with a Polish 400 hurdles record of 54.47. The discus saw

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Cram, whose friend Dave Roberts shouted out his time as he reached the bell. Within 25m of the start of the last lap Cram had moved past Khalifa and characteristically, with several of the greatest 1500m runners in the world behind him, had committed himself to a very long run for home. That early strike won him the race, for as he strode past the 1200m mark in 2:49.66 (55.8 for his third lap) he was at least six metres clear of Gonzalez and Aouita. Realising his mistake, the Moroccan tore into second place and set about reducing the deficit. However, as Cram was winging along the back straight at 13.13 100m pace he gained nothing.

Cram was still 5-6m up entering the final straight, but from then on Aouita closed with every stride. Unaware, until the last few metres, of what was happening behind him, Cram sailed on serenely as Aouita pulled out all the stops in frenzied pursuit. At the line just 4/100ths separated them. Cram had run his last lap in 53.4 (1:50.2 for the final 800), Aouita around 52.7 and 1:49.8. Superb also were Gonzalez, who smashed Jose Abascal's Spanish record, and a rejuvenated Scott who broke his own American native record of 3:31.96 by over a second. Cruz trailed in seventh.

Michel Jazy, France's former world record holder for the mile, was ecstatic when asked for his impressions. "I have watched the finest 1500m in history. It was fabulous. I never thought I would ever see two men under 3:30 in the same race. But I think Said Aouita committed a monumental error in staying so far behind Steve Cram. As for Steve Cram, one can have only admiration for such determination and courage. He ran the race like a great champion".

As if the 1500m didn't generate enough excitement, the 18,000 spectators were treated to the greatest pole vault duel in history. It should have been a three-way battle, but Thierry Vigneron didn't get any higher than his opening height of 5.65m, leaving Sergey Bubka and Pierre Quinon to fight it out alone. They too came in at 5.65 and after Quinon made 5.80 at the first attempt Bubka went instead for 5.85 which he cleared only at the third attempt and then only just as the bar shook. The advantage reverted to the Frenchman when he cleared a personal best of 5.90 at the third try, a height passed by Bubka, but the world champion struck back with a first time success at 5.95, the second highest clearance in history. This gripping contest ended with Quinon unavailingly attempting a world record equalling 6.00, while Bubka waited and went for 6.01.

It would probably be wise to ignore the times attributed to the 100m runners and 110m hurdlers. There appears to have been some faults with the electronic timing, for all the times were at least 0.20 faster than might reasonably have been expected, including the 11.18 100 awarded to Joan Baptiste. For instance Darwin Cook, beaten by

Ernie Obeng in the AAA Championships, was credited with 9.98 although the stadium display clock stopped at 10.21.

Jules Ladoumègue in 1930 and 1931 respectively), was the setting of another historic barrier-breaking performance when Sergey Bubka levered himself over a bar set at precisely six metres on July 13th — a favourite date for him as it was on that date in 1984 at Crystal Palace that he became the first to clear 5.90m. He entered the competition at 5.70m, clearing at the first attempt, and then decided to go for 6.00m, 6cm above his own world record. At the first attempt he knocked the bar down with his feet; at the second he brushed it off with his chest. But at the third, after changing to a harder pole and gripping at 5.12m, he was over to claim the fifth world outdoor record of his astonishing career. He did not attempt any higher. Bubka, whose wife Liliya is a gymnastics coach, dedicated the new record to his son Vitaliy, born just four days before. "Six metres is a landmark, but everyone will soon forget it and think about going higher", he said. "I'm already thinking of 6.20m".

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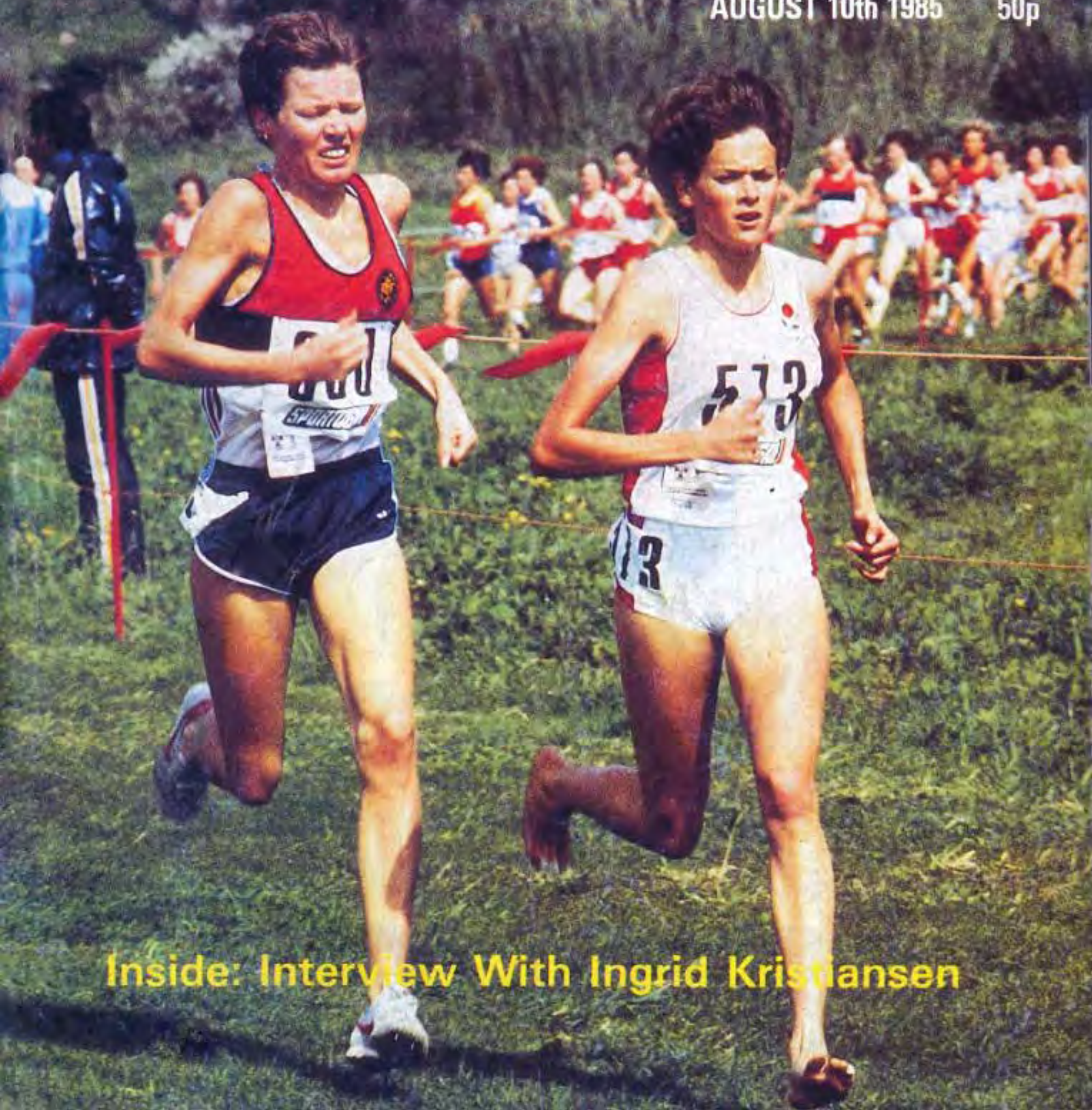

Hungarian Hat-Trick For Jarrow Arrow

WHEN Seb Coe broke three world records (1:42.33 800, 3:48.95 mile, 3:32.03 1500) in the space of 41 days in 1979, we wondered whether we would ever see the like again. Well, Steve Cram has surpassed even that remarkable achievement by setting three world records in just 19 days! Following hard upon his 3:29.67 1500 in Nice on July 16th and 3:46.31 mile in Oslo on July 27th, he broke John Walker's highly respected 2000m mark with a time of 4:51.39 in Budapest on August 4th . . . and this Friday evening (August 9th) at Gateshead he is shooting for Coe's world 1000m figures of 2:12.18 if the weather is reasonable.

Like Said Aouita in the Bislett Games 5000, it was touch and go whether Cram would be credited with a new world record. Walker's figures stood at 4:51.4 (hand timed) and as Cram finished the timing device superimposed on the television screen showed 4:51.40 and the trackside clock displayed 4:51.46. For several minutes the consensus was that that Cram had just missed the record, but scrutiny of the photo finish revealed his time to be 4:51.39. The previous European record stood at 4:52.20 by Thomas Wessinghage, while the UK record was held by Steve Ovett at

4:57.71. It was Cram's first ever race at the distance.

When Walker established his record, at Bislett in June 1976, he was towed through 400 in 60.1 and 800 in 1:58.6 before taking off alone at the halfway mark in 2:27.1. He reached 1200 in 2:56.3 and 1600 in 3:54.2 (passing the mile mark in an estimated 3:55.5) before blazing the last lap in 57.2.

Cram started much more quickly than the New Zealander. With James Mays setting the pace (58.06), closely followed by Rob Harrison and Mike Hillardt, Cram was fourth at 400 in around 59.0, and the second lap was a scorcher. Harrison moved ahead approaching 800, which he reached in 1:55.73, with Cram some three metres back in 1:56.1, having covered the second 400 in about 57.1. Harrison dropped out at 1000 (2:25.02), leaving Cram — like Walker — to run the second half of the race against the clock. That is not the sort of situation which Cram relishes, but he gave it everything as he swept past 1200 in 2:54.58 (58.48 lap) and 1600 in 3:53.92 (59.34 lap), now only just ahead of Walker's schedule. Passing the mile in a shade outside 3:55, he raised the tempo on the last circuit to finish with a 57.47 and another slice of middle distance history. His

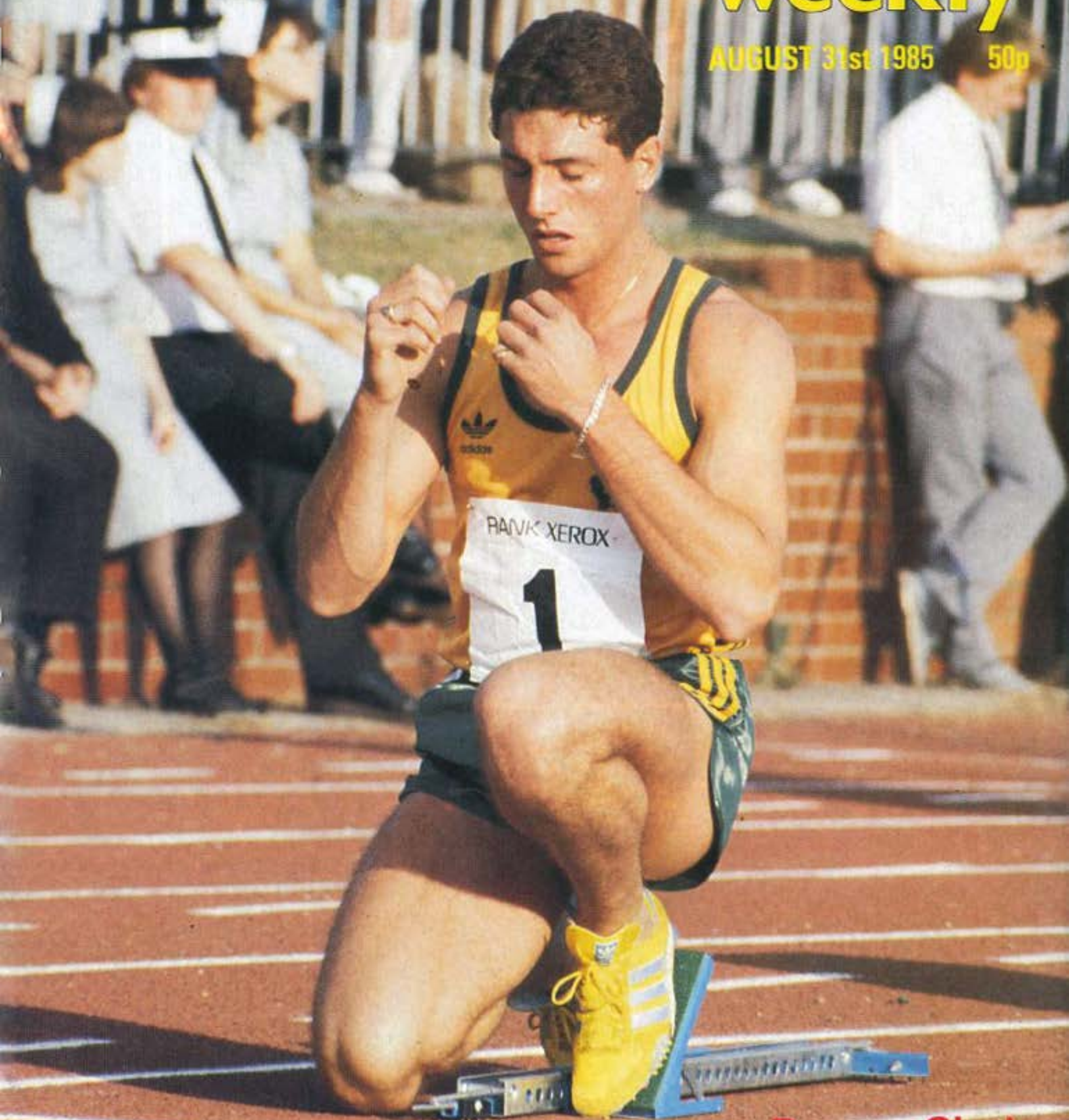

The biggest moment for the capacity 27,000 crowd came when Switzerland's own Pierre Deleze scored his second straight victory over Seb Coe. The Olympic champion looked easy as he was led through 400 in 54.8 and 800 in 1:52.9, and when he took over from Omer Khalifa at the bell in 2:36.58 and passed 1200 in 2:51.08 a time of around 3:30 appeared possible. However, Coe was unable to drop Deleze and was overtaken entering the finishing straight. Deleze set a Swiss 1500 record of 3:31.75, while Coe was only 0.18 outside his pb with 3:32.13 in his first race since the muscle spasm that affected him in the mile he lost to Deleze at Crystal Palace on August 2nd. "Overall I'm not too disappointed", said Coe. "I didn't have the kick coming off the final bend simply because extra pace at that speed comes from strength and I have been short of work".

Coe put up a good showing in defeat, but there was disappointment in the lacklustre form of Carl Lewis. Returning after a hamstring injury he opened his long delayed European tour with fourth place in the 100 and then scratched from the 200. However, another multiple Olympic gold medallist, Valerie Brisco-Hooks, displayed sensational form by defeating Marlies Gohr in the 100 and Marita Koch in the 200 with time of 11.01 and 21.98. Other sparkling performances included the world's fastest 400 hurdles time of the year (a pb of 47.63) by 19-year-old Danny Harris, and a 7.39m long jump by Heike Drechsler — also a 1985 world best and the third longest leap in history — with Jackie Joyner setting a US record of 7.24 in second place. Jackie's brother, Olympic triple jump champion Al Joyner, won the 110 hurdles 'B' race in 13.53 with Wilbert Greaves clocking his fastest ever time of 13.60 in second place. Leading results:

World 1500 Record For Aouita

SAID Aouita lost no time in making up for his disappointment at missing Steve Cram's world mile record. Two days later (August 23rd), in West Berlin's Olympic Stadium, the Moroccan relieved Cram of the world 1500m record instead! His time of 3:29.45 shaved 0.22 off Cram's Nice mark, on which occasion Aouita had finished second in 3:29.71. It was the fourth time a world 1500 record had been set in Berlin: Otto Peltzer (Ger) clocked 3:51.0 in 1926, Jack Lovelock (NZ) 3:47.8 in winning the 1936 Olympic title, and Werner Lueg (Ger) 3:43.0 in 1952. Aouita is only

the third man ever to hold the 1500 and 5000 world records simultaneously . . . Paavo Nurmi (Fin) held that distinction from 1924 to 1926 (3:52.6/14:28.2), and Gunder Hagg (Swe) between 1942 and 1947 (3:45.8 & 3:43.0/13:58.2). Sandor Iharos (Hun) set world records of 3:40.8, 13:50.8 and 13:40.6 in 1955 but did not actually hold the 1500 and 5000 records simultaneously.

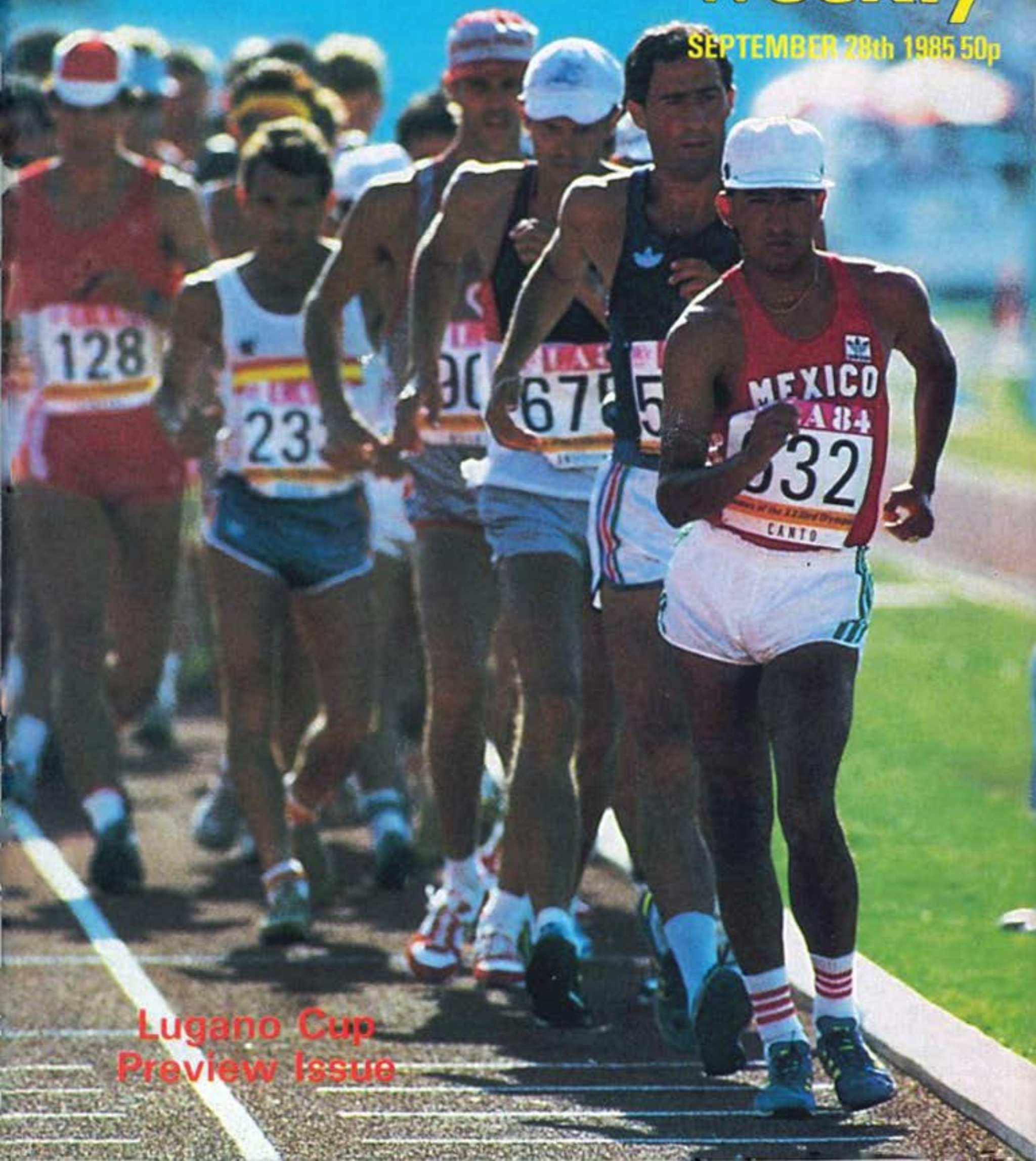
As in the Zurich mile, Frank O'Mara was chief pacemaker and he towed Aouita up to 1200m which the Irishman reached several metres up in the notable time of 2:48.48 before dropping out.

IAAF Mobil Grand Prix

Slaney Magnificent In Rome 3000m

But Grand Prix Final proves to be an anti-climax

THE FINAL of the IAAF/Mobil Grand Prix, watched by 58,000 spectators in Rome's Stadio Olimpico on September 7th, featured an attempt on his world pole vault record by Sergey Bubka and a great women's 3000 in which Mary Slaney clocked the second fastest ever time to outrun Maricica Puica and Zola Budd, both of whom went under 8½ minutes for the first time. Nevertheless, the absence, through injury or other reasons, of so many of the great stars who had participated in earlier rounds of the Grand Prix — among them Steve Cram, Said Aouita, Seb Coe, Joaquim Cruz, Alberto Cova, Carl Lewis, Uwe Hohn, Valerie Brisco-Hooks and Marlies Gohr — rendered the meeting something of an anti-climax. What should have been the Everest of the season, following earlier peaks scaled at Bislett and Zurich, turned out merely to be a foot hill.

Points mean money in the Grand Prix, and with double points on offer in Rome certain athletes stood to gain or lose substantial amounts. This emphasis on money prizes for results in an IAAF promotion shows just how much the sport has changed in the last year or two, and although the discussion of athletes' financial affairs is viewed

with distaste by some 'AW' readers, it has nevertheless become an integral part of the reporting of today's international athletics scene.

The situation was that the athlete with the highest accumulation of points in his or her individual event won \$10,000; the second placed athlete won \$7000, third \$4000, fourth \$3000, fifth \$2000 and sixth \$1000. Additionally, the overall Grand Prix winners (men and women) were awarded \$25,000 with \$15,000 for second, \$10,000 for third and \$5000 for fourth. That's a grand total of \$542,000 in prize money, distributed in accordance with IAAF rules via athletes' national governing bodies.

Prior to Rome, the leader in the men's Grand Prix was Said Aouita with 55 points, made up at 1500 and 5000m of four victories at nine points each, one second place (to Steve Cram in Nice) with seven points, and two world record bonuses at six points a time. However, a hamstring injury sustained three days before the Final when winning a 2000m race in Rieti in 4:54.02 cost the Moroccan dearly . . . \$34,500 in prize money to be precise. He was unable to participate in the 1500 as planned and Doug Padilla, who had

Viren, throughout the last lap. Puica passed Budd for second and challenged Slaney for the lead with 250 to go, but the American was having none of it. She just put her head down and went faster still. The penultimate 200 took 32.36, and Slaney completed the job with a tremendous final half lap of 29.59! She entered the finishing straight with a 3m advantage and ended the race a dozen metres be the good in 8:25.83, the second fastest time on record. Her previous US record stood at 8:29.69, which she set in Cologne 13 days earlier when disposing of Puica (8:30.32). The Romanian improved to 8:27.83 and Zola Budd — taking 64.8 for the last lap as compared to 61.95 by Slaney and 63.7 by Puica — smashed her Commonwealth record of 8:35.32 with a scintillating 8:28.83. How well Zola has peaked this year: she was in fantastic shape for the World Cross Country Championship, and although her early season form was indifferent she smashed one personal best after another during the important phase of the track campaign.

Romania's other Olympic track champion, Doina Melinte, has had some grand scraps over 800 with Jarmila Kratochvilova this summer, but on this occasion she was no match. Indeed, while the Czech world champion steamed to another triumph, Melinte had to settle for fourth place behind Milena Strnadova and Kirsty McDermott. The UK record holder failed to break two minutes for one of the few times this year, but this race must count as one of her best yet. It was slowish right from the start (even so Fita Lovin, a possible winner, lagged well behind and dropped out injured after 130m), and Kratochvilova led practically the whole way, past 400 in 60.34 and

600 in 90.78. The first four were clustered together until Kratochvilova took off in the finishing straight for a 7m winning margin in 1:59.09. The battle among the other three was intense, less than three metres covering them at the end, and Kirsty excelled herself by finishing third. She ran the first lap in around 60.8, the second in 59.4.

Another Briton to shine in the women's events was Judy Oakes, who not only came up with her best outdoor shot mark of the season (18.02m), but by placing fifth, ahead of Bulgaria's 19m-plus performer Svetla Mitkova, literally finished in the money. The two top performers of the season, world record holder Natalya Lisovskaya and world champion Helena Fibingerova, were soundly beaten by Mihaela Loghin, who was close to her best ever with 20.82.

The most pleasurable anticipated women's field event, the high jump, proved just a little disappointing even if six competitors did clear 1.90m or higher. Three of them — Sara Simeoni (who came so very close to clearing her best of the year), Debbie Brill and Susanne Lorentzon — went out with the bar at 1.95, leaving the field to unbeaten Svetla Kostadinova, Louise Ritter and Tamara Bykova, all of whom cleared without trouble. Bykova, the former world record holder, found 1.98 beyond her, but Kostadinova (first attempt) and Ritter (second) stayed in. The American was eliminated at 2.00, and for a while it looked as though the Bulgarian would be too, but on her final attempt she came through to clinch her 23rd consecutive victory of the season. Having cleared the second best ever height of 2.06 earlier in the summer and with 2.04 to her credit in Brussels and Rieti (three days before Rome), there had been hopes of a new world record from Kostadinova, but fatigue caught up with her and she failed to clear 2.05.

Elsewhere in the women's events it was America's night. Florence Griffith overhauled Alice Brown in a fast 100 (11.00 to 11.04) and the abundantly talented Jackie Joyner produced three long jumps superior to Galina Chistyakova's best of 6.83m. In the 400 hurdles Olympic silver medallist Judi Brown-King powered to a US record of 54.38, fastest ever by a Westerner, while in a close battle for second place Australian Debbie Flintoff got the better of Tonja Brown in 54.80 to shave 7/100ths off her Commonwealth record.

Americans won four of the seven women's events, and the success rate was even higher among the men: six out of nine. From a Grand Prix point of view the most significant victory was Doug Padilla's in the 5000 as it assured him of the overall title. The 28-year-old Mormon may have disappointed his supporters in the 1983 World Championships and 1984 Olympics, but on his day, and particularly in races which have been slow up to the bell, he is a very tough man to outkick. So it proved in Rome as he led

High Jump Record At Student Games

George Gandy reports from Kobe, Japan

'SPORT IN a steam bath' would be a fitting description for the 1985 World Student Games, held in Kobe, Japan, from August 29th to September 3rd. With temperatures in the west Japanese port zooming into the 30s (Celsius) and humidity levels reaching 80%, there were always going to be problems, especially for the endurance athletes. In the circumstances, the British squad of 15 generally acquitted themselves well against formidable opposition; with one gold, one silver and two bronze medals providing the tangible evidence of success.

The quality of opposition was soon clear as Martin Briggs, a promising heat winner in 50.43, could achieve only sixth place in his 400m hurdles semi, despite recording 49.91 in difficult gusty conditions. Linsey Macdonald too was in early action, but bowed out disappointingly in sixth place after qualifying for the 400 semis. Linsey still appears short of speed and clearly needs a good winter's work before her athletic rehabilitation will be complete.

The first victims of the environment in the British team were the 10,000m runners, Mark Scrutton and Bernadette Madigan. UK champion Scrutton looked in total control until well beyond halfway, but then folded badly as the pace increased very slightly. Suffering from a superficial burning sensation, surely due to overwhelming heat, he slumped to 12th in 29:49.45, which he himself described as "a

personal worst". After leading early in the women's event, Bernadette fell apart even more disastrously, finishing last in 38:16.13 in a state of collapse and requiring hours of medical attention to restore something like well-being. Hope that at least some could cope was provided by Dundee lassie Liz Lynch. Liz, in her first ever track 10,000m, stormed to fourth in a new Scottish record of 33:19.14. Obviously she had benefitted from experiencing similar conditions while studying at the University of Alabama. The high potential of this young lady was underlined a few days later when she defeated several with faster personal bests to place sixth in the 3000 in 9:09.71.

'Tactical' gold for McGeorge

Another sixth place went to Derrick Brown, who, having had to work hard chasing the long jump qualifying distance of 7.75, opened his account in the final with a solid 7.82. Unfortunately he then experienced increasing problems with a thigh strain, and as his approach accuracy deteriorated, was unable to improve. Britain finally hit the medal chart on the third day as Chris McGeorge raised spirits with a superb tactical victory in the 1500m and Judy Simpson hung on tenaciously to the bronze medal position in the heptathlon. McGeorge, who had prepared meticulously and specifically for this event throughout the summer, afterwards

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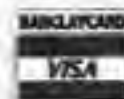

Koch Runs 47.60 400 In World Cup

And GDR — without her — set new sprint relay mark

MARITA KOCH achieved the sixteenth world record of her dazzling career when she smashed Jarmila Kratochvilova's 400m mark of 47.99 with the astonishing time of 47.60 last Sunday on the final day of the IAAF World Cup in Canberra. Her time at 200m en route was 22.4! On the first day of the competition she had won the 200 in 21.91 and contributed a 47.9 relay leg. But for the timetabling she would have run in the 4x100 relay also on Sunday; in her absence the GDR foursome of Silke Gladisch, Sabine Rieger, Ingrid Auerswald and Marlies Gohr still managed to smash the world record by 16/100ths with a time of 41.37. With victories in 12 of the 16 events the GDR team easily won the women's cup, thus speedily avenging the European Cup result when the USSR emerged victorious. There was a surprise in the javelin, though, where the previously undefeated Petra Felke was overtaken in the last round by Olga Gavrilova (USSR). Fatima Whitbread, representing Europe, finished a close third.

Britain's other representative, Dave Ottley, placed a good fourth in what was probably the last world class competition using the traditional men's javelin. Uwe Hohn brought an era to a close with a mighty throw of 96.96m, the best in the world this year. Other world best marks for 1985 were registered by Mike Franks (44.47) in a star-studded 400 and by the USA 4x100 relay team (38.10). Canada's Ben Johnson was a brilliant winner of the 100 in 10.00 to equal the Commonwealth record he set earlier in the season at altitude. Despite the disqualification of Kirk Baptiste for lane infringement after finishing first in the 200, the USA won the men's trophy — clinching success in the final event, a drama packed 4x400 relay.

Triple Success For Carl Lewis

CARL Lewis won three events in the USA v USSR v Japan match in Tokyo on September 21st/22nd, helping the Americans to a 114-104 victory in the men's match. However, the Soviet women were so dominant (117-50) that the USSR triumphed by a wide margin (221-164) on combined scores. Of the 37 events, 24 were won by Soviet athletes.

Before 30,000 spectators on the first day, Lewis beat Harvey Glance by a metre in 10.12 and then joined Glance, Kirk Baptiste and Calvin Smith in winning the 4 x 100 relay in 38.28. Next day, watched by 40,000, Lewis jumped 8.28m. "I had a difficult day", he commented. "It was cold and raining, but it was a good jump for me. I've only jumped once since April". A hamstring injury, sustained on May 18th, had plagued Lewis for most of the summer.

World record holder Willie Banks beat Oleg Protsenko with a triple jump of 17.10m, making up for his loss to Protsenko the last time they met in May. Sergey Bubka found 5.70m sufficed for victory in the pole vault. "I was in top condition, but the wind and the rain were just in the way", he said after missing at a world record 6.01. The only world record holder to be upset was Yuriy Sedykh, who finished second to countryman Juri

Tamm's 83.66m in the hammer. Igor Paklin had hoped to go close to his world high jump record of 2.41m, set in Kobe (Japan), but he said he was tired after returning to Moscow following the World Student Games and then coming back to Japan so soon. He won with a leap of 2.30m, while his world record predecessor Rudolf Povarnitsyn failed to clear his opening height of 2.15.

FINLAND: Hammer thrower took steroids

Another Finnish athlete has been caught using drugs. The latest culprit is Hannu Polvi, a 37-year-old hammer thrower whose sample in the Finnish Championships in Lahti in August was found to include traces of anabolic steroids. The test result was made public on September 12th.

In an open letter to the Finnish Press, Polvi surprisingly stated that his offence had been "partly intentional, a protest against the double standards in the sport". Polvi, who originally had used steroids to heal his injured knee some time ago, said he was "disgusted with the politicians in Finland taking control of the moral aspects in sports". He did not admit having done anything illegal — just having broken the rules of an organisation. Polvi, three-times national record holder in the late 1970s, finished third in Lahti with 68.82m. Having thrown his personal best of 74.74 in 1982, he was already on the brink of retirement anyway.

In the Finnish Championships all the medallists in every event (more than 100 athletes) were tested by the Finnish Federation. During the last 12 months, more than 300 track and field athletes have been tested in Finland, which has cost SUL (the Federation) some £30,000.

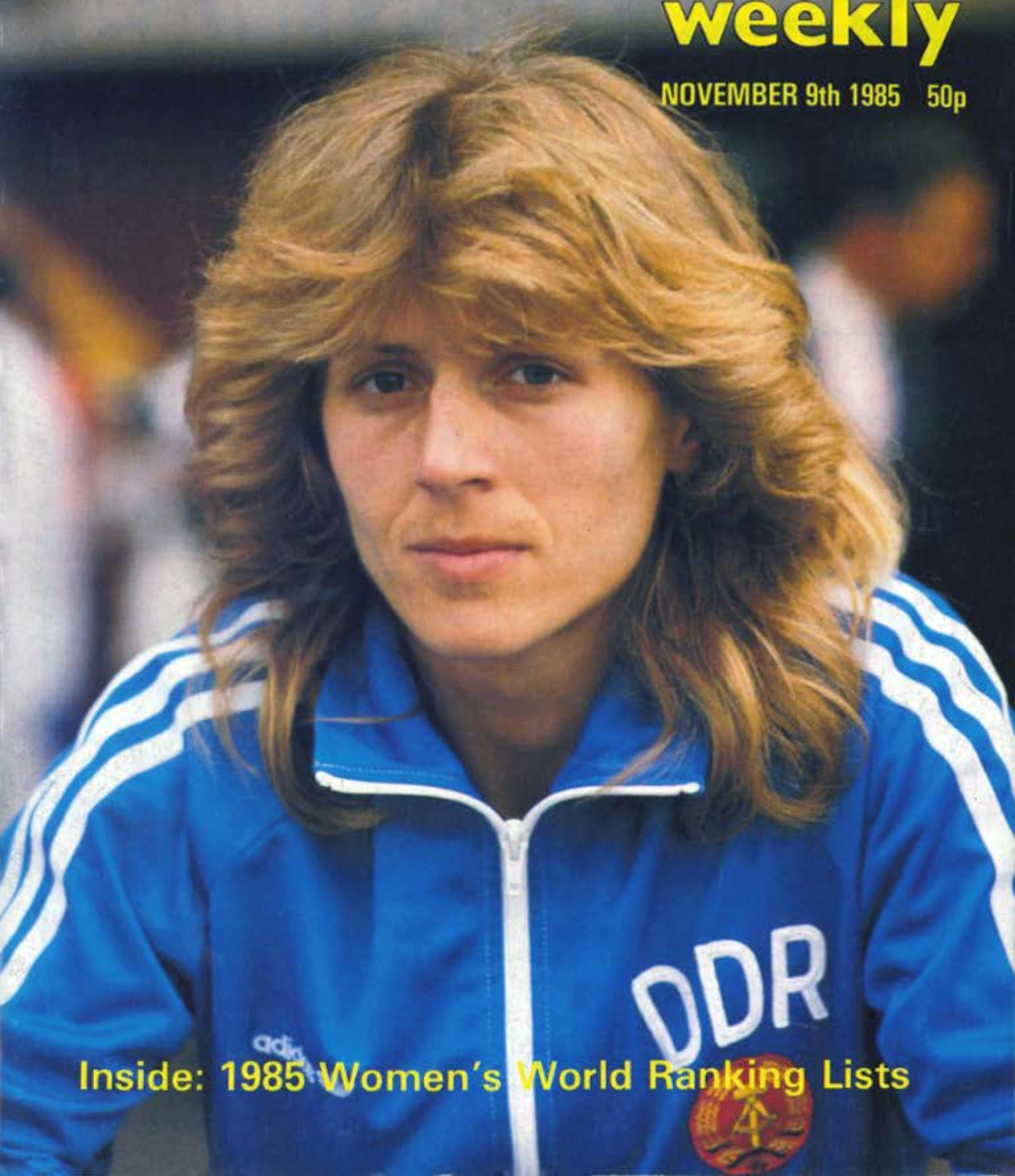
