USSR Hope To Do Better In Stuttgart

THE Soviet national team performed without brilliance in the last European Championships (1982, Athens) and won only six gold medals. It is obvious that this year's Championships in Stuttgart will be of great importance for us and we have ample reason to hope that we shall stage a better performance this time. But the preparations for Stuttgart should not be viewed in isolation because the continental championship, despite its great importance and complexity, is just one competition of the current Olympic cycle.

Two stages

The strategy of the Soviet athletes' preparation for the 24th Olympic Games envisages two stages. The end of the first will be marked by the participation in the second World Championships which are to be held in Rome in 1987, and the second — by the Olympics. Practice has shown that the composition of the national team usually changes by 75-80 percent between Olympic Games. That is why the main objective of the first stage is to form the core of the team for the World Championships which are certainly a match for the Olympic competitions from the viewpoint of their representative character and the level of results.

In 1985, along with the preparation for the European and World Cups, we engaged in an active search for young talent. This search was facilitated by the rather rich and intense calendar of international competitions. Along with the contests in Moscow and Canberra, Soviet athletes also took part in matches with teams from the Nordic countries, Italy, the GDR, the USA and Japan, as well as in the Grand Prix competitions.

It was only natural that the European Cup contest held in

Moscow in August should be the main competition for Soviet athletes in 1985. Most of them reached good form by that time, which enabled them to emerge victorious both in the men's and women's contests.

The national coaches did their utmost to keep their trainees' form at a sufficiently high level also for the World Cup competition staged in Canberra in October. This idea was behind the match with the US and Japanese squads in Tokyo in mid-September. It is a good time to say here that before this past year the Soviet athletes virtually never managed to keep good form till October (this largely explains our flops at the 1964 and 1968 Olympics in Tokyo and Mexico City). The Soviet athletes made a step forward in Canberra compared with the 1981 World Cup by taking second places behind the US men's team and the GDR women.

So, on the whole, the objectives which the Soviet team was set were reached, but we do have problems on the eve of the European Championships in Stuttgart. Here are just a few of them.

We are worried by the current situation in the group of middle and long distance and marathon runners and walkers. We have not scored a single victory in these events in the World Cup contests. Even Olga Bondarenko, who was certainly the strongest in the new women's 10,000m event, failed to

win top honours in Canberra. This group now accounts for 14 events in which athletes compete at the European and World Championships and the Olympic Games. Without victories in this group all the hopes for major successes in top-level international contests are futile. That is why the coaches of the runners will have to spare no effort in the remaining time to ensure that the male athletes participate in all running finals and women win medals.

Marina Zhironova, Vera Akimova, Elvira Barbashina, Olga Vladykina, Aleksandr Yevgenyev, Sergey Usov and Aleksandr Vasilyev made a good showing in sprint and hurdle races in 1985. Since all of them are young, I hope that they will register major successes in 1986. Our relay teams can and must improve their performances too.

In 1985 Soviet jumpers and pole vaulters scored great successes. The pole vaulters, led by Sergey Bubka who cleared six metres, have shown their class. Rudolf Povarnitsyn and Igor Paklin cleared 2.40m and 2.41m in the high jump. But they, like world title holder Gennadiy Avdeyenko, still lack consistency. A big group of women surpassed the marks of seven metres in the long jump and 1.90m in the high jump. Now our task is to make the most effective use of these reserves.

In Moscow and Canberra the greatest successes were achieved by the Soviet throwers. The results of Juri Tamm, Yuriy Sedykh, Georgiy Kolnootchenko, Sergey Smirnov, Natalya Kolenchukova, **Natalya Lisovskaya**, Galina Savinkova and Olga Gavrilova are high enough. The main thing for them now is to reach their best form by Stuttgart where they can vie for top honours.

Cram, Jones, Budd Top Ranked

BRITISH athletes have fared well in the authoritative annual world rankings published by our American colleagues, *Track & Field News*. Athletes are judged on three criteria which, in order of importance, are (1) honours won; (2) win-loss record; and (3) marks. Thus, consistency in major competitions is marked high... which explains why, for example, erratic **Rudolf Povarnitsyn** (USSR), who briefly held the world high jump record and ended up second on the performance year list, does not even feature in the top ten merit rankings for his event.

placed third were **Seb Coe** in the 800 and **Zola Budd** in the 3000. Rated fourth were **Cram** over 800 and **David Ottley** in the javelin; in fifth place came **Zola Budd** in the 1500 and triple jumper **John Herbert**, whose fine competitive record (1st European Cup, 3rd World University Games) was deserving of such recognition. On performance alone (17.41m) he ranked 'only' 15th on the year list. Other British athletes to make the top ten were **Charlie Spedding**, **Roald Bradstock**, **Todd Bennett**, **Nat Muir**, **Mark Holtom**, **Kirsty McDermott**, **Chris Boxer** and **Tessa Sanderson**.

Three Britons achieved top ranking: **Steve Cram** in the 1500, **Steve Jones** in the marathon and **Zola Budd** in the 5000. There was no disputing Cram's supremacy, for although **Said Aouita** eventually took the world record from him it was Cram who came out top in their only head-to-head. The compilers concede that choosing Jones over **Carlos Lopes** was one of their toughest decisions. "Lopes set the world record, but that was his only race, and he had little competition and some pacing help", they explain. "Jones was just a second off the world record and won two major races [London and Chicago]". Of Budd's number one ranking, they write: "Despite her sixth in the year's deepest race [Helsinki World Games], Budd did set the world record, and in an event without a major title to contest, that remains the major honour".

Fatima Whitbread, obviously, was ranked second in the javelin (to **Petra Felke**), while

The *Track & Field News* poll for the world's athletes of the year proved close. Said Aouita, the first man for 30 years to set world records at both 1500 and 5000, received 272 points from the voting panel, as against 258 for Steve Cram, who bagged world records at 1500 (defeating Aouita), mile and 2000 and handed 800 leader Joaquim Cruz a rare defeat. Next came Sergey Bubka, Willie Banks, Uwe Hohn, Ulf Timmermann, Carl Lewis (number one for the previous two years) and Steve Jones. The women's result was closer still, as Marita Koch (219) edged out fellow world record breaker Petra Felke (217), followed by Mary Slaney, Stefka Kostadinova, Heike

The Soviets' winning margin of nearly double in the women's match wasn't helped by events such as this one, of which there were a number. The only highlight for the British was that Helen Miles managed to stay reasonably close to her red vested opponents for around 40m before Slyusar and Nastoburko pulled well clear.

Winner of the 60m, Irina Slyusar was the first to show in the opening display of Soviet women's sprinting during the evening and with their bests far in advance of our girls' (Slyusar 22.59 and Zhirova 22.46), Phyllis Watt and Carmen Smart were never going to be in contention. Zhirova came past at the beginning of the second bend and passed her teammate for another Soviet one-two.

Globally, new standards (shown *) were posted by men at 55m, 60m, 400m, 1000yd, 50 and 60m hurdles, pole vault and triple jump; and by women at 60yd, 60m, 3000m, 50m hurdles and long jump.

Swift Hurdling In Czech Grand Prix

Three world-leading marks for 1986 and some excellent competition marked the first of this season's IAAF/Mobil Grand Prix events in Europe . . . the Pravda-Televizia-Slovnaft meeting in Bratislava, Czechoslovakia, on June 13th/14th.

Cornelia Oschkenat (GDR) and Yordanka Donkova (Bul) supplied the best race of the meeting in the 100H, with Donkova taking an early lead only to be caught by the taller East German on the run-in. The times of 12.50 and 12.51 for these two augur poorly for the survival of Grazyna Rabsztyń's world record of 12.36 this year. Donkova's teammate, Tsvetanka Khristova, produced a superb series in the discus, averaging 69.32m with a winning effort of 71.80 — a performance beaten this year only by Diane Sachse (GDR).

Tatana Kocembova's winning 400m effort of 49.83 was, like Oschkenat's hurdles and the 8:19.02 steeplechase by Mirosław Zerkowski (Pol), a 1986 world best at the time but she suffered the misfortune of having only two other Grand Prix qualified athletes in her race and thus was unable to score any Grand Prix points. Sabine Busch (GDR) was a good second in 50.43 although never on terms with the Czech. However, the 400 hurdles world record holder indicated from her flat run that the hurdles world record is there for the taking. Her 55.76 the night before was run in gale-like conditions.

Triple jumpers Aleksandr Yakovlev and Oleg Protsenko (USSR) saved their best efforts, 17.26 and 17.22m respectively, until the last round to edge out Bulgaria's Khristo Markov and the impressive Ukrainian Vladimir Inozemtsev, but it was noticeable that neither of the first two hit the board. Both can go well beyond 17.50 this year. In the high jump powerful Jan Zvara set a Czech record of 2.34m and had two good tries at 2.37.

Races beyond 800m were thin in quality, but the 800 was a classy affair. Rob Harrison fought from seventh to fifth in the last 150 after being very badly boxed in for the first 600. Moussa Fall of Senegal edged ahead of France's Philippe Collard in the last 50 for a comfortable win in 1:45.30. Steve Martin won a slow 1500, after Mark Rowland had perked things up with a 56.38 third lap, only to fade in the final straight.

Nice:

Another Victory For Cram

STEVE Cram returned to the scene of his world record 1500 triumph over Said Aouita and produced the fastest 800 time in the world so far this year with 1:43.62 — reports Mel Watman from Nice. The occasion was the Nikaja Meeting on July 15th and Cram exceeded his own expectations of a time in the region of 1:44.5. Near the back of the field in the early stages (as one of several useless pacemakers in this meeting blasted through 200 in 23.7), Cram worked his way through to fourth place by the bell, which he reached in a shade outside 51 seconds. Peter Elliott led along the back straight, pursued by the steadily improving Frenchman Philippe Collard and Cram, but when Cram swept past shortly before the 600 mark (1:17.4) the race for first place was over. The sight of Cram in full flight is one of the supreme experiences in present-day athletics, and the appreciative crowd rose to him as he winged his way to the third quickest time of his career. The ease and speed of his victory will have reinforced his growing feeling that he should bid for the 800/1500 double in the European Championships as well as the Commonwealth Games. Elliott, who partners Cram and Seb Coe in the 800 in Edinburgh, ran a good race too, being passed by Olympic bronze medallist Earl Jones only in the last 20m and clocking easily his fastest time of the season with 1:44.87. Indeed, Elliott has only once in his life bettered that . . . when he ran 1:43.98 in 1983.

Steve Ovett, returning to Nice for the first time since — at the age of 19 — he won the European Cup Final 800 in 1975, was also shaping up for an exceptional performance in preparation for the Games. With the bell reached in 6:47.6 and himself one of six men bunched together there was a distinct possibility that he could challenge his personal best of 7:41.3 for 3000m, set back in 1977. Not that the time was particularly important to Ovett; as always he was simply concerned about winning the race, and

it was looking good for him as he and Belgium's Vincent Rousseau led the field rounding the final bend. Suddenly Ovett was out of the contest . . . he had felt a twinge in his right buttock as he launched his finishing kick and took the instantaneous and surely prudent decision to drop out for fear of sustaining an injury which could cause him to miss the Games. He has experienced this particular problem a few times in recent years and although the cause is a mystery he has found that prompt treatment enables him to be back racing with the minimum of delay. Apart from that, Ovett declared he had felt great during the race and was happy with how his racing was progressing. Rousseau went on to win in 7:42.15, having covered the final kilometre in 2:28.

There was a Belgian success also in the steeplechase, a very classy event in which William Van Dijck produced his greatest masterpiece yet. Fourth at the bell behind Olympic champion Julius Korir, former UK record holder Graeme Fell and

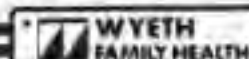

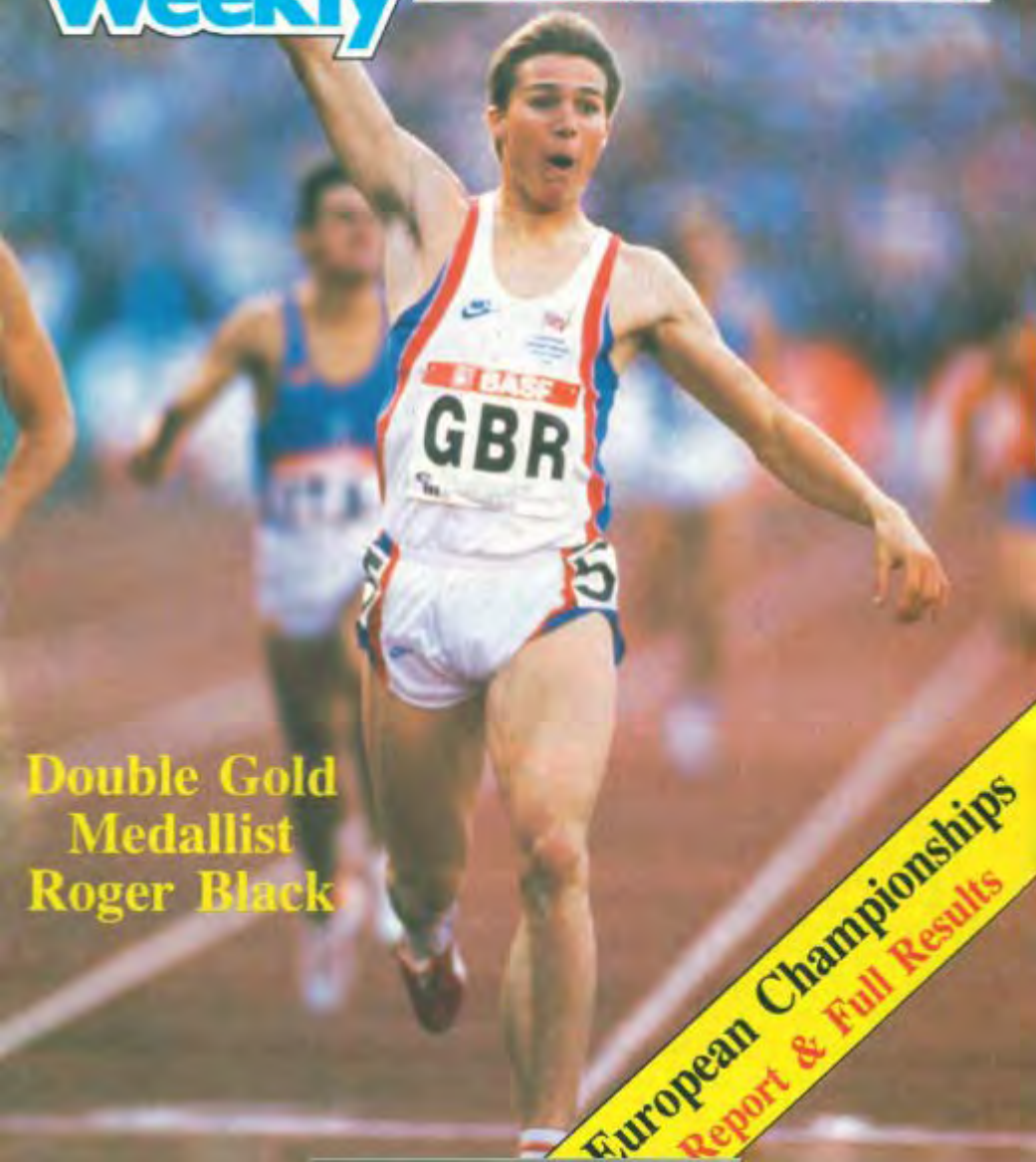

Long Jump

We have learnt in the last decade or so that in the main, East German female athletes simply don't make mistakes when it really matters. And in Stuttgart, for world record holder and world champion Heike Drechsler at least, it really mattered!

This year's European ranking lists showed a total of eight jumpers at 7.00m or beyond, but in a competition that at the top end never really became competitive, only Heike and current world number two Galina Chistyakova reached that mark; and with only one exception whatever the attractive Ukrainian offered so Heike matched with interest. Jumping ninth (Galina) and 11th respectively, their round by round comparisons read 6.90 — 6.97, 7.05 — 7.27 (the winning jump from a take-off only just on the board), 6.90 — 7.17, 7.09 — 7.05, 7.02 — 7.25 and 6.93 — 7.14. It was that conclusive.

So, at the tender age of 21, Heike Drechsler has a European title to add to the global crown she won in Helsinki as Fraulein Daute, and a say — for the time being — in two world records. Given that Marlies Gohr and Marita Koch are now 28 and 29, and have shown sure signs of improving with age since they burst onto the scene some ten years ago, it's frightening to think what last week's 'AW' cover girl might go on to achieve.

Shot

After being in and out of the programme like British middle distance runners at the height of the 'dodging' era the qualifying round was eventually cancelled, resulting in 17 athletes lining up for the first field final of the Championships. Although she has a 20.80m to her name this season, world champion Helena Fibingerova's failure to make the last eight came as no great surprise at the age of 37; and that doubtful honour also fell to world record holder and 1986 European list leader Natalya Lisovskaya, whose only valid effort of 18.95 was simply not good enough.

Winner of the 1983 European Junior Championships at both shot and discus, Heide Krieger now seems set to fill the gap vacated by Ilona Slupianek, for in that lady's style she put everything together in the opening round and launched what was to be her winning throw of 21.10m — a personal best, as she said, "in competition". Starting the day at only seventh on the 1986 rankings with 20.71m she backed her winner with 21.03 in the penultimate round, and her very solid series — which averaged 20.55 — was indication enough that she will probably be around for a long time to come.

Behind her, even in Lisovskaya's absence, there was plenty to enjoy as they vied for the minor placings. The Soviet number two, Natalya Akhremenko, held second at the 'split' with her second round 20.68, but the winner's compatriot, Ines Muller, threatened that twice before eventually overtaking in round five and collected the medal she would have been content with at the start of the day. Even though the competition was held in atrocious conditions, both Muller and Akhremenko said afterwards that the circle was perfect for throwing, but that was of little consolation for the British girls who were both well below the form they reached in Edinburgh.

Discus

Going into the competition Diana Sachse — world leader this year with 73.26, having improved from a 1985 best of 69.14 — world champion Martina Hellmann (then Optiz) and defending European champion Tsvetanka Khristova, had an advantage of some ten feet on the rest of the field on 1986 form; and in a contest that went, in the end, almost perfectly to form, they left the others way behind in an enthralling early evening's throwing.

As in the shot the qualifying round was abandoned, and the three main contenders found themselves throwing tenth (Hellmann), 12th (Sachse) and last (Khristova) in a field of 14. Their opening efforts were all used to get the feel of the circle — once again the umbrellas were up — but in round two things started to happen; with the Bulgarian hitting 67.60m to threaten Sachse's 68.34m lead, Hellman moved into the frame with her third effort of 67.68, but, after

Sachse's 67.60, found herself still in the bronze position as Khristova closed the round with 69.52... ultimately her best.

In the fourth round they bunched together between 66.70 and 67.00m, but then all improved on those marks as the competition drew to its conclusion. Hellmann hit 67.56 — still 12cm below her third round standard — in the fifth, but saw Sachse (70.54) and Khristova (69.20) both exceed her; though she nevertheless had the character to come back in the final round with her best of the competition of 68.26. With just one significant throw to follow, Miss Sachse — who defies the image of an archetypal Eastern Bloc thrower — put it beyond doubt with a heave of 71.36m, and as Khristova closed with 66.00 the East German, who finished only second to Martina Hellman in their National Championships, beamed with delight.

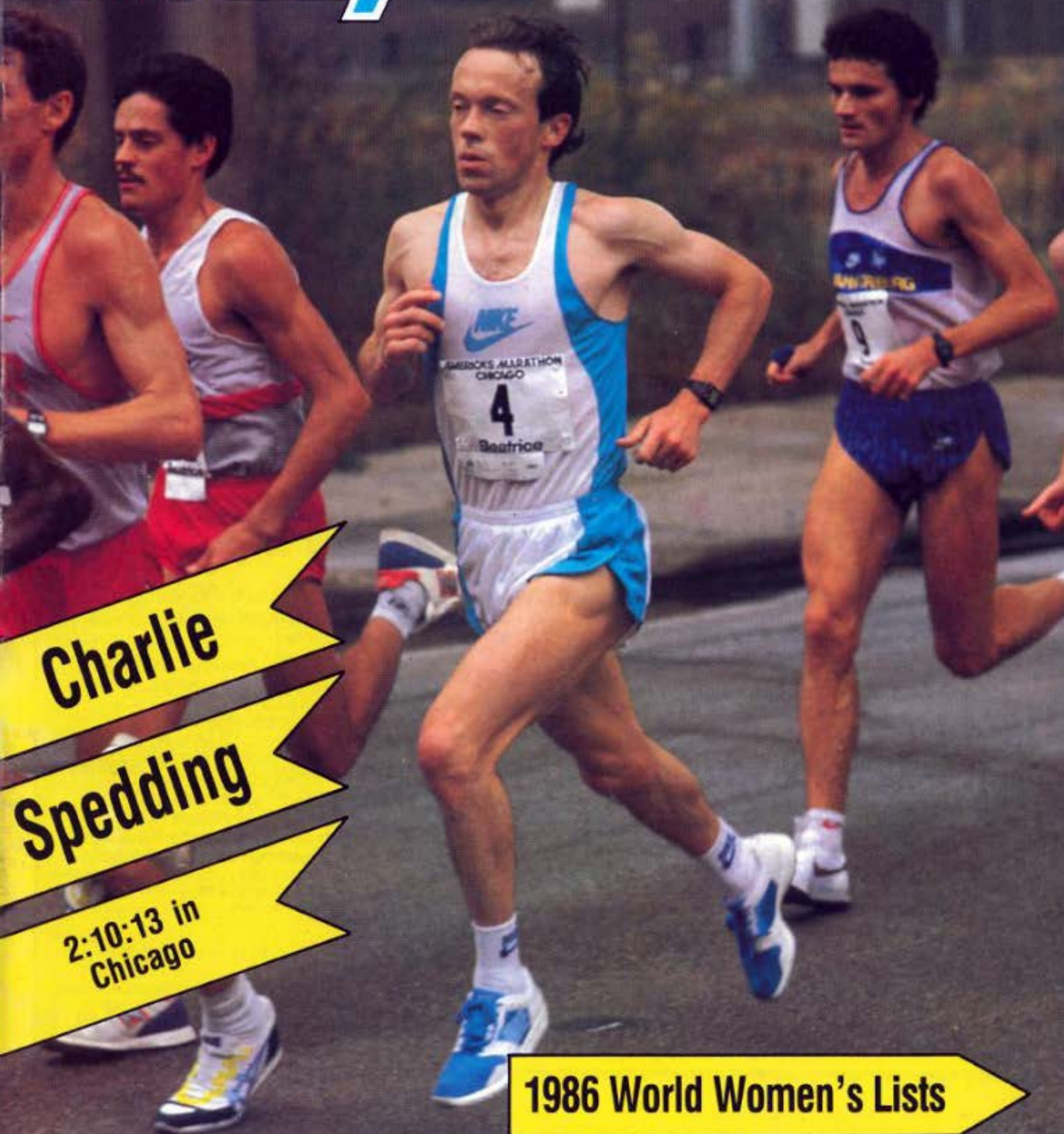
