Looking ahead in '88

Why Jamie Henderson's taking one step at a time

BLASTING ON THE BOARDS

The indoor season gets underway this weekend with the Omron games at Cosford. MEL WATMAN looks forward to the action...

"The indoor season, which gets into its stride with the Omron Games at Cosford this weekend, has long provided a platform for up-and-coming athletes to make their mark.

No doubt this winter will again see a number of men and women proudly wearing their national colours for the first time.

They will be following in an honoured tradition, for Linford Christie, Roger Black, Seb Coe, Jack Buckner, Alan Pascoe, Sonia Lannaman and Bev Kinch are among those who represented Britain indoors, before they ever graduated to the outdoor team.

Previously unheralded athletes can take the opportunity to catch the eye of the selectors while the experienced campaigner can make good use of the indoor season.

Sprinters, high hurdlers, jumpers and shot putters, in particular, welcome the chance to perform at full blast at a time of year when it's normally impractical to do so outdoors.

Just look at the exploits of Ben Johnson, Carl Lewis, Marlies Göhr and Greg Foster, to name just a few, whose indoor appearances not only break up the long, dreary slog of heavy winter training but also provide a useful benchmark to assess their current form.

Of course, not every athlete who shines indoors does likewise outdoors. Todd Bennett ran better indoors last year, winning the European 400m title, than he did during the summer, and Geoff Parsons' UK indoor record of 2.30m is two centimetres higher than his corresponding outdoor mark.

Bennett, however, plans to completely miss this season's indoor programme, despite admitting that indoors is his forte.

"Obviously I think indoors is very important but I will not be doing any this year because of the Olympic Games.

"If you do the indoors, you have to change your training and miss out a lot of the background work needed for the summer.

"The Olympics is what I am aiming for this year. I will give indoors a miss like I did in 1984 before the Los Angeles Olympics."

One athlete with Olympic aspirations who nevertheless is also planning a serious assault on the indoor circuit is Jamie Henderson, second in the 60m at the national indoor championships last season.

He said: "The indoor season is important to me because my races are built around getting the first 60 metres right.

"The indoor 60 metres season is just one step in building up for the 100 metres in the summer.

"It is highly unlikely that I'll be running at the Omron games, at Cosford, because in recent weeks I've missed out on speed work because of an ankle injury."

Wembley spectacular

The 1988 indoor season will be of particular significance because it is the first time since the Wembley spectaculars of more than 20 years ago that an international indoor meeting will be staged somewhere other than Cosford.

The RAF hangar at Cosford, near Wolverhampton, continues to be the venue for this weekend's Omron Games, the Pearl Assurance National Championships on January 22/23 and the Kodak Classic (incorporating an England v USA men's match) on March 12.

But the Dairy Crest Games (UK v France) on February 6 will be held at the exciting new facility at Kelvin Hall in Glasgow. The arena, which boasts a four-lane 200m track and spectator accommodation for 5000 is, according to Tom McKean "the best thing to happen in Scottish athletics for years."

Britain's team for the climax of the winter season, the European Indoor Championships in Budapest, March 5/6 – to be staged on a five-lane 200m track with room for 7000 spectators – will have to meet some tough standards to be considered for selection.

The qualifying marks set by the European AA include 5.50m for the pole vault, 7.80m for the

long jump, 18.70m for the shot, 23.70 for the women's 200m, 53.60 for 400m and 6.50m for the long jump – all superior to anything achieved by British athletes during the 1987 indoor season.

A unique situation existed in 1987, the first year there has been both World Indoor and World Outdoor Championships, and it was quite striking that so many athletes excelled in both meetings – held six months apart.

Six golds

Six athletes struck gold in both Indianapolis and Rome: Ben Johnson (6.41, 60m; 9.83, 100m), Sergey Bubka (5.85m, pole vault each time), Sabina Busch (51.66, 400m, 53.62, 400m hurdles), Tatyana Samolenko (3000m in 8:46.52 and 8:38.73), Steffka Kostadinova (high jumps of 2.05m and 2.09m) and **Natalya Lisovskaya (shot puts of 20.52m and 21.24m).**

Another 17 athletes, plus Samolenko in the 1500m, were medallists in both meetings... Jose Luis Barbosa (800m), Igor Paklin (high jump), Gennadiy Avdeyenko (high jump), Thierry Vigneron (pole vault), Giovanni Evangelisti (long jump), Mike Conley (triple jump), Werner Günthor (shot), Jozef Pribilinec (walk), Heike Dreschler (sprint and long jump), Merlene Ottey (200m), Christine Wachtel (800m), Doina Melinte (1500m), Marica Puica (3000m), Cornelia Oschkenat (hurdles), Ginka Zagorcheva (hurdles), Susanne Beyer (high jump) and Yelena Belevskaya (long jump).

One should note also that five other world champions crowned in Rome – Thomas Schönlebe, Greg Foster, Patrik Sjöberg, Carl Lewis and Signin Wodars – are also holders of world indoor records.

Likewise, many of Britain's most successful athletes last summer were in action at the National Indoor Championships in January.

Jamie Henderson was second in the 60m, Linford Christie and John Regis first and second in the 200m, Tony Morrell first in the 800m, Adrian Passey and Jack Buckner first and third in the 3000m. Jon Ridgeon, Colin Jackson and Nigel Walker were the first three in the hurdles, Eric McCalla was second (first Briton) in the triple jump, Sally Gunnell was first in the 200m and second to Lesley-Ann Skeels in the hurdles, Kirsty Wade and Yvonne Murray were first and second in the 1500m, and Judy Oakes won the shot.

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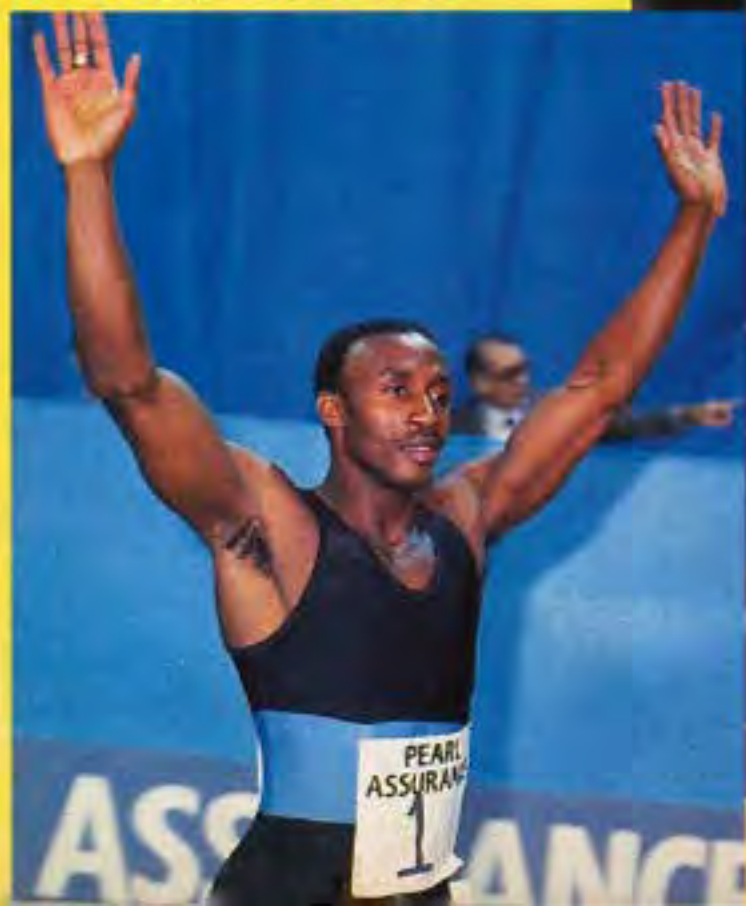

WORLD RECORD FOR DRUPPERS... EAST GERMANS EXCEL AGAIN...
NEW THREAT TO BUBKA?... ELLIOTT SECOND AGAIN...

WORLD BRIEFING

WATCH out for Flying Dutchman Rob Druppers having his best year since 1983 — when he took the world 800m silver medal — after storming to a world indoor 1000 metre record in The Hague on February 20.

The 25 year old's 2:16.62 clocking (splits: 200 — 26.6; 400 — 53.5; 600 — 1:21.0; 800 — 1:49.5) was a 1.38 advance on the old mark set by Igor Lotaryov (USSR) last year.

On the same day in East Berlin, double world champion Silke Moller-Gladisch missed Marita Koch's 50 metre European record by 1/100th, winning in 6.12.

A week earlier in Vienna, her 18 year old compatriot Sven Matthes, the European junior 100m bronze medalist, also narrowly missed out on a European record, his 60m time of 6.53 being just 2/100ths short of Marian Woronin's mark.

Soviet pole vaulter Radion Gataulin gave further warning in Los Angeles on February 19 that he might knock fellow countryman and world champion Sergey Bubka off the highest perch in athletics this year.

The 1.93 metre tall 22 year old cleared 5.86m for victory — but failed at six metres — 3cm above Bubka's world indoor record. Gataulin heads this year's rankings with an earlier 5.90m.

At the same meeting, Peter Elliott was second to Marcus O'Sullivan at one mile for the third consecutive week, having broken the UK records in both previous races.

This time, he could only manage 4:01.42, being outsprinted by the Irishman's 4:01.33. World 1500m champion Abdi Bile, well below his Rome sharpness was a close third.

On the roads Liz McColgan made it three wins out of three on her US tour with a comfortable 32:02 10km victory in Miami on February 21. Kirsty Wade was third in 32:31.

The same day in Tokyo — Ingrid Kristiansen also cruised home to win the Ohme 10km in 31:38.

Closer to home in Sardinia — Gateshead trial winners, Eamonn Martin and Angela Tooby, both showed sparkling form to win their respective road races over 11.1 km and 4.4km respectively.

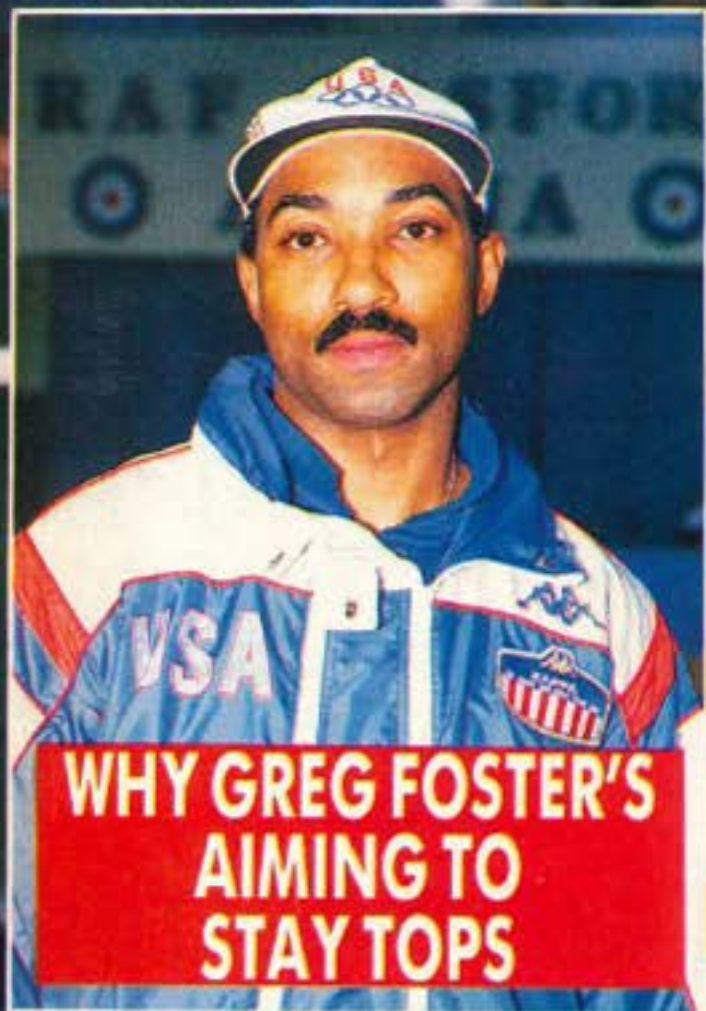

EAST Germany's **Anke Behmer** is shaping up as the main challenger to Jackie Joyner-Kersey for the Olympic heptathlon title in Seoul. For the second time this winter she has produced a world indoor pentathlon best score of 4995.

On the first occasion, Behmer clocked 5.21 for 60m hurdles, high jumped 1.78m, put the shot 14.94m, long jumped 6.80m and ran 800m in 2:07.72. At her second attempt, in the same Senftenberg arena three weeks later, her marks were 8.27, 1.83m, 14.95m, 6.66m and 2:08.03.

Another impressive display of versatility was provided in Auckland recently by **Chantal Beaugeant** of France. She ran up a heptathlon score of 6242 points (beating Romania's Liliane Nastase, 6102) in a competition which was packed into just one hour! Her individual performances were: 13.56 hurdles, 1.72m high jump, 14.01m shot, 24.63 200, 6.13m long jump 47.32m javelin and 2:13.90 800.

Also in Auckland, world javelin record holder **Jan Zelezny** (Cze) showed fine early form by throwing 83.38m. His world record with the new style javelin stands at 87.66.

One week before his narrow defeat in the European Indoor Champs, **Jon Ridgeon** recorded his best ever 60m hurdles time of 7.56 (4/100ths outside Colin Jackson's UK record) in Budapest... well ahead of Ales Haffer, the Czech who ran such an inspired race to pip him for the title.

Peter Elliott, who twice lowered the UK indoor mile record (to 3:57.63 and then 3:53.70) in the USA, returned to Europe to win a couple of races in Spain. He clocked 3:41.26 for 1500 in Valencia and 3:58.45 for the mile in Zaragoza.

Elliott won't receive official credit for it, but he was inside Graham Williamson's UK indoor 1500 record of 3:38.28 on the way to that 3:53.70 mile in New Jersey. A single watch caught him at 3:37.9 as he passed the 1500 marker.

Inshman **Marcus O'Sullivan**, winner of the race in 3:50.94, was credited with 3:35.4 — the fastest ever indoors — but the unofficial nature of the timing precludes recognition. Romania's **Doina Melinte** was officially timed at 4:02.3 for 1500, a European record, en-route to her world record mile of 4:18.86 at the same East Rutherford meeting on February 13. **Kirsty Wade** passed in 4:07.6 on the way to her 4:27.17 mile.

China has produced its first world-class woman marathoner in **Zhao Youfeng**, who finished a minute ahead of Holland's Carla Beurskens at Nagoya (Japan) in the Asian record time of 2:27.56, an improvement of over four minutes on the previous Chinese record.

Clockings of 11.9 were achieved by Mark Spoores (Chester Le Street), Christopher Erskine (Tower Hamlets), Jamie Brown (Bristol) and Geoffrey Anderson (Middlesbrough).

The joint favourites for the girls' title, Katharine Merry (Rugby) and Renata Chinyou (Haslemere) both qualified with 13.1 and 12.6 respectively. But fastest girl was Christie Anderson of Blacklyne Comprehensive, who ran a wind-assisted 12.5 at Whitley Bay.

The North and South Semi Finals take place at Edinburgh and Enfield on July 2, with the Grand Final for the eight surviving boys and girls at the McVies Challenge Invitation Meeting at Crystal Palace on August 25.

WORLD BRIEFING

GALINA Chistyakova will be credited with two world record long jump performances in Leningrad on June 11. Following leaps of 7.21, 7.38 and 7.21 she equaled the listed world record of 7.45 (shared by Heike Drechsler and Jackie Joyner-Kersey) in the fourth round, the wind reading being 1.0m/sec behind her. She fouled at around 7.50 in the fifth round and produced the new world record figures of 7.52 (+1.4m wind) on her final attempt. Four other Soviet jumpers exceeded seven metres, led by Yelena Byelovskaya at 7.36.

However, look for an early reply by the dispossessed **Drechsler**. Although she has so far jumped 'only' 7.18 outdoors this year, the East German is in fine sprint form. Competing in Dresden, she missed her fastest ever 100m time by just a hundredth with a commanding 10.92 victory over world champion Silke Möller and former world record holder Marlies Göhr (both 11.06) on June 11, and next day in Karl-Marx-Stadt she sped to a 21.99 200 win over Göhr (22.28). Filled in her ambition to become the first woman to leap 7.50m, Drechsler will be even more anxious to blaze the trail at 7.60m and further.

Aleksandr Markin only just won the race in which he had Stephane Constant's European 110m hurdles record of 13.20 in Leningrad on June 11. Inches behind at the finish was Vladimir Shishkin in 13.21 with another Soviet athlete, Sergey Uslov, third in 13.27. Conditions were perfect; it was warm, there was a 1.8m/sec tail wind, and the local runners were well acquainted with the starter's short hold.

On the subject of sprint hurdling, ignore that sensational 10.05 reported earlier from the USA for Jamaica's **Andrew Parker**. Apparently the performance never happened, for the race in question (at Austin on May 7) was won by Keith Talley in 13.47w. Another correction: **Julie Rocheleau** of Canada set a Commonwealth 100m hurdles record of 12.80, not 12.78, at Provo on May 27.

Sergey Butka may have raised the world pole vault record yet again, to 6.05m in Bratislava on June 9, but his young Soviet colleague **Rodion Gataulin** still believes he can overtake him to become the world's number one. In Leningrad on June 11 Gataulin won with 5.85 and went close to clearing 6.00.

In Leningrad the next day Soviet sprint star **Vitaly Savin** (10.39 last year) stormed to a 10.15 100m victory into a 1.3m/sec wind. **Aslita Yurchenko** defeated world champion Olga Bryzgina in the 400 (49.79 to 50.00); and **Yury Sedykh** - seeking a third Olympic hammer title this year - threw 83.12m to beat world champion Sergey Litvinov, who has an 84.04 performance to his credit this season.

Content to follow a stride behind Liz McColgan (66.86 at 400, 2:13.21 at 800, 3:02.33 at the bell), Wade launched her strike with 150 to go and pulled clear of two world class Soviets to win in 4:05.33, her last lap taking 62.8. "It was nice to win today because the Russians are of a pretty good standard," she said, "but I am not pulling up any trees because I realise I have still got a lot of work to do. I am never confident at the best of times".

Angela Tooby was untroubled in winning the 3000 in 8:50.10. Taking the lead after four laps, she was shadowed by guesting Jill Hunter until the bell, at which point Tooby began to pull well clear. Hunter faded from second to fourth in the final 50m but her reward for a gritty run was a personal best of 8:52.70—her previous fastest having been 9:05.13.

Linda Keough ran another strong finishing 400 to become only the ninth British woman ever to crack 52 sec; Elaine McLaughlin excelled herself in the 400 hurdles by splitting the Soviet pair in a time (56.35) which was only just outside her recent best; and Chris Cahill produced her fastest 800 (2:00.28) for three years in a race won by world 1500/3000 champion Tatyana Samolenko. Cahill, who reached the bell in 58.9 and 600 in 89.1, tried to get past the pacesetter Tatyana Grebenchuk on the inside early in the finishing straight... just as Samolenko spurred past on the outside. Dawn Gandy reduced her best time to 2:01.87.

Sally Gunnell did well to finish second in the 100 hurdles, even if she was no match for Lyudmila Narozhilenko (12.62 recently), while there was some fine high jumping by Diana Davies (1.92m) and Janet Boyle (1.89), an event which saw both Olga Turchak and Lyudmila Avdeyenko clear 1.95.

Three records were broken during the match. World record holder Natalya Lisovskaya set an all-comers mark of 21.73m with the shot, and Yelena Nikolayeva smashed the European 5000m walk record with 21:08.65, setting all-comers figures of 12:32.37 for 3000m en route.

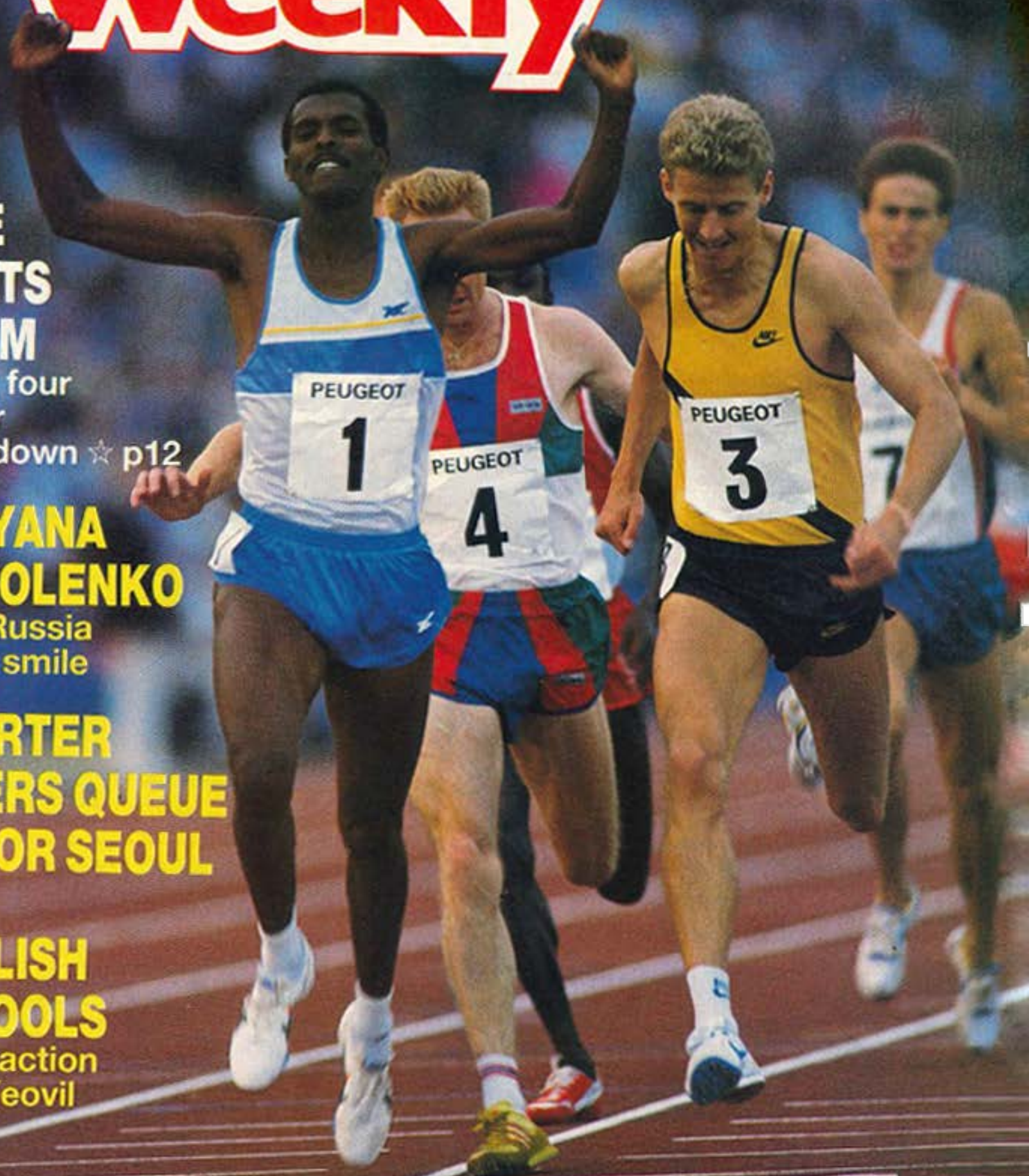

THE recent Dream Mile in Oslo ranks as the greatest ever mile race for depth. Steve Cram's winning time of 3:48.85 (the third fastest of his career) didn't break any records, but Jena-Peter Herold's GDR record of 3:49.22 equalled Seb Coe's 'world record' third place time and Abdi Bile's Somali record of 3:48.40 was the fastest ever clocked by a fourth place finisher... as was Steve Scott's 3:50.09 in fifth place, Jim Spivey's 3:50.57 in sixth, Steve Crabb's 3:52.26 in seventh, Kip Cheruiyot's 3:52.39 in eighth, John Walker's 3:52.48 in ninth and Joseph Chesire's 3:53.09 as tenth and last finisher!

With Peter Elliott (3:49.20), Herold and Bile all breaking 3:50 for the first time, the number of athletes who have ducked under that magical time has risen to 17. Scott has broken that barrier eight times, but Cram has now narrowed the gap with seven such marks.

Records tumble in field events

THE East Germans completed the first phase of their Olympic preparations with a match at Neubrandenburg on July 9/10 in which they overwhelmed their Italian opponents. Little more will be heard from most of the GDR's top athletes, as they re-enter training camps, until much later in the summer.

Gabriele Reinsch's astonishing new world discus record of 76.80m captured the headlines, but not to be overlooked were yet another world junior record in the same event by Ilke Wyludda (72.24m) and a national long jump record of 7.48m by Heike Drechsler — the second longest jump ever and just four centimetres short of Galina Chistyakova's pending world record.

Great long jumping also in the Soviet Championships at Tallinn, where the victory of Leonid Voloshin (22) was a major surprise. Previously an 8.16m performer, he leapt 8.46 to move into third place on the 1988 world list behind Larry Myricks and Carl Lewis. Only six men have ever jumped farther. Voloshin's better known compatriot, European record holder Robert Emman, is currently injured.

Natalya Lisovskaya, the favourite to win the women's shot in Seoul, produced the second longest put in history with 22.55m, a mere 6cm short of her world record. An outstanding remainder competition saw both Jur Tamm (world leader this year at 84.16m) and Igor Nikulin (threw 82.34, Tamm taking the title by virtue of a superior second best throw).

Another Soviet athlete in sparkling form is Nadezhda Olizarenko, the 1980 Olympic and 1986 European 800m champion. She will be 35 in November but shows no signs of slowing up. Indeed, her 1:56.0 800 at Kharkov is her fastest time since setting a world record of 1:53.43 eight years ago and clearly she is in the running to win back her title in Seoul.

Yelena Nikolayeva, who set a European 5000m walk record of 21:08.65 in Portsmouth last month, clocked 43:36.5 for 10,000m at Fana in Norway to shatter the listed world track record of 43:52.1 by China's Chen Yading. At the same meeting, Alexey Porshin set a European 20,000m track walking record of 1:19:22.5, the previous best being 1:20:36.7 by Norway's Erling Andersen.

An even more remarkable exploit, this time on the road, was accomplished by Australia's Kerry Saxby at Värnamo in Sweden. In a 20km race won by Axel Noack (GDR) in 1:22:27, she finished 16th in a barrier-breaking 1:29:40! The previous fastest by a woman was her own 1:32:51 from last year. Saxby's new mark is only six seconds slower than when Keri Matthews won the 1984 Olympic title.

McKean's nerve put on trial

TOM McKean's crushing defeat by Said Aouita and David Sharpe may be just the rude awakening he needs if his Olympic ambitions are not to go the same way as his World Championships hopes.

"I learnt a lot from it for the trials which is the important one," said McKean, after the much publicised 1000m showdown he had requested with Aouita at the Miller Lite IAC International in Edinburgh flizzed out into an easy victory for the Moroccan and a lacklustre third place for the Scot.

McKean put a brave face on it afterwards, claiming his only disappointment was that he could not pick up the pace quickly enough, but nevertheless it is worrying that he never even seemed interested in going with Aouita, who was following pacemaker Peter Stubbs, or had the kick to hold off Sharpe down the home straight.

Aouita was the only one to stick with Australian Stubbs and going through 800 in 1:50.5 after Stubbs had dropped out, Aouita was some 25 metres clear, covering the last 400m in an untroubled 56.21.

Bottle

Sharpe afterwards admitted regretting not having 'the bottle' to go with the pace, fearing at the time that he couldn't keep it up for 1000m, but said he couldn't understand why McKean had seemed loathe to stay in touch with Aouita.

"He seemed happy to go for second but he was breathing really hard and I knew I could pass him," said Sharpe, claiming he now has the psychological edge over the Scot for this weekend's Olympic trials. McKean, not surprisingly, disputes the point saying he is confident Sharpe will not be able to notch up his first ever 800m victory over him.

SAID Aouita still the master as Tom McKean learns vital lesson. JULIE STOTT reports from the Miller Lite IAC International in Edinburgh.

McKean did his best to quash any doubts about his form and his coach Tommy Boyle insisted the season doesn't start until the Trials.

But it is hoped the defeat – his first in only four races this summer – will serve a good tactical lesson for this weekend and more importantly for Seoul.

Aouita did his usual disappearing act after the race, declining a post-race press conference, and simply sent a message that will send a chill down Britain's middle distance men – he confirmed he will be running both 800 and 1500 at the Olympics. Aouita being Aouita though, don't be too sure until he gets to the starting line.

Probably the second most anticipated race of the meeting and the one that gave the crowd the biggest buzz was the first clash of the season of Britain's top three high hurdlers of 1988.

Despite a world class line-up that

included the fastest man ever over 110m hurdles, Renaldo Nehemiah, and the surprise third member of America's Olympic trio, Arthur Blake, the race turned into purely a domestic battle. Colin Jackson took the honours in 13.21 – it would have been a new UK record had it not been for a – 3.31 wind reading – Tony Jarrett second (13.35, which puts him among the world's top ten this year) and a very pleasing third for Jon Ridgeon (13.45).

The World Championship silver medalist had only just returned to training after almost seven weeks out completely with a virus and before the race, had said he would be happy with 13.5 or 13.6.

"I have to expect that I will be beaten for a few weeks and have got to show the strength of character to deal with that. I shall just be concentrating on my own performances, but nine weeks to the Games should be more than enough," said

Ridgeon.

Not too much should be read into the apparently notable scalp of American, Blake, in the results. The 21-year-old, runner-up to Ridgeon in the World Student Games and to Jackson in a memorable Peugeot Games battle a few weeks ago, had not expected to run particularly well, saying before the race that he was suffering the after effects of the American Trials and tiredness from travelling.

"Tonight is nothing too serious. I just intend to run several meets and make sure I don't lose race sharpness before going home to train for Seoul," said Blake who had almost abandoned the 1988 season at one stage because of a persistent hamstring injury.

Rivals

Unford Christie also had the chance to take on one of his Olympic rivals, Dennis Mitchell, although a few hours before the race the American knew nothing of their meeting and it is debatable how well prepared he was for the 110m handicap clash.

Mitchell was disappointed that Christie was only doing the handicap race after originally saying he would run the 100m as well. "I was looking to take him on but he bailed out," said Mitchell, runner-up to Carl Lewis in the American Trials.

But unbeknown to Mitchell at the time, the 100m had lost its Grand Prix status after both Christie and Calvin Smith withdrew and so two heats of the 110m handicap, followed by a final, was laid on instead.

Christie, off scratch, was looking to break the 11.0 seconds set by legendary professional sprinter George McNeill way back in 1971. In

his heat his 10.92 was denied the record because of a + 3.59m/sec wind and again in the final when he clocked 10.86, but he could only finish fourth, giving away seven metres to winner, Scot David Clark.

Mitchell, who looked almost disinterested in his heat, perked up in the final to finish sixth in 10.99.

The gusting wind that played havoc with all the athletes' performances and times, looked to be the only thing that stopped Romanian Paula Ivan denying Mary Slaney of the world's fastest outdoor best of the year over a mile.

It was disappointing that flu prevented Yvonne Murray taking on the World Student Games champion and Ivan was left to run a gutsy solo victory in 4:25.80 – just over four seconds outside Slaney's time. She was never challenged but her time served as a warning to Murray whom she had earlier admitted is seen by the Romanians as the biggest threat over 3000m in Seoul. Ivan definitely plans to run 1500m in Seoul and probably the 3000m as well.

Also sending a timely message was shot putter Judy Oakes who, inspired either by competing against the world record holder Natalya Lisovskaya of the Soviet Union or by her row with the British hierarchy, smashed her UK record with a put of 19.26m, for second place. Oakes has missed four international meetings this season because of a dispute over pay and it

was good to see her back in action (the meeting was not an AAA promotion) and performing better than ever.

Also in superb shape is Sally Gunnell who hopes to do both 100m hurdles and 400m hurdles in Seoul. At Edinburgh she looked impressive in recording 12.80 over 100m hurdles – had it not been for the illegal wind reading, it would have been a new national record.

But while there was joy for Oakes, Gunnell and Liz McColgan, whose relentless running programme found little opposition in the 3000m, there was disaster for Olympic javelin champion Tessa Sanderson.

injections

Cortisone injections earlier in the week had failed to stamp out her Achilles injury problem and Sanderson withdrew, in tears, during the competition and with her Olympic hopes now in jeopardy.

There's no such cloud on the horizon of America's Butch Reynolds' Olympic dream, who looks destined to break the 20-year-old 400m world record sooner rather than later. An easy victory in 45.26 confirmed that his recent injury worries are now in the past.

Also back on the Olympic trail is Jack Buckner, but going off scratch along with Dave Moorcroft in a handicap mile was always going to be too much and hopes of a repeat of last year's thrilling handicap never materialised.

Can Fatima and Tessa Petra-fy Felke?

Defending Olympic champion Tessa Sanderson and World Champion Fatima Whitbread look all set to have a classic confrontation with world record holder in the javelin, Petra Felke.

In the other women's field events, the East look set to dominate.

Women's throws

Javelin

If the tabloids have their way, East Germany's world record holder, Petra Felke, should skate it; for Fatima and Tessa will be too busy slinging their spears at each other to bother with the competition!

Although no love is lost between our two javelin queens, they could help each other by combining to double the pressure on the world record holder. That would be great for British athletics but is unlikely to please the muck-rakers as much as a contretemps between the two rivals.

The trouble is, both have been out of sorts recently and although tremendously talented and past masters at rising to the big occasion, we face an anxious wait to see how much training has been lost. Fatima may have suffered more for she was certainly out of action longer, glandular fever taking its inevitable toll as well as a recurrence of a shoulder injury.

But she was close to 70 metres at Crystal Palace on August 28 and the smile was not simply because she beat Tessa by 34 centimetres. Not a lot more could be enough to clinch that elusive Olympic gold and with another three weeks to perfect the build up, she has a great chance.

And of the two Britons, it is logical to assume that Fatima, having suffered the agonies of missing a trio of golds in Los Angeles (bronze), Helsinki (silver) and Edinburgh (silver), probably wants to win more. But that would be to relegate Tessa to the ranks of ordinary competitor which is an insult to her unquenchable thirst for success.

Although she pulled up during the McVities Challenge with a twinge from her tender Achilles, the reigning champion will probably be in better shape than her challenger – a factor which could make predictions extremely difficult, notwithstanding the Felke factor.

Fatima has thrown further but Tessa has won more of their personal collisions when it has mattered. It could not be more intriguingly poised if Hollywood had been promoting it.

But it is far from a two-horse race; on the contrary, Felke is the favourite in many people's book and there is also her compatriot, Silke Renk, who has thrown exactly 71 metres.

Finland's Tiina Lilak, best-known for that last minute missile she hurled to the world title before her own adoring audience in 1983 – condemning Fatima to one of her fits of tears – is coming back from her own injury-induced disappointments and we all know what she can do when it matters.

East Germany has two women who have thrown beyond 68 metres in Beate Koch and Susanne Jung while Greece's great heroine, Anna Verouli, who has plumbed the depths of drug abuse since scaling

the emotion-charged heights of a European championship gold in Athens in 1982, is also on the comeback trail, having received the customary slap on the wrists.

But Felke with her formidable 78.14 in Jena on June 3 is the one to beat – although that may be beyond anyone in Seoul. More likely it is going to be won in 73 or 74 metres and quite a few girls are capable of that.

Fatima with her victories in Stuttgart (for the 1988 European championship) and Rome (for the 1987 world title) has the recent big occasion form to clinch the greatest prize of all while Tessa has the history and the hunger. But those lost training sessions might just have tilted it Felke's way.

Shot

Just as the women's javelin is sure to have us on the edge of our seats, the other women's throws are exactly that – other women's throws. With no real contender in the discus and the splendid Judy Oakes still a couple of metres short of the Incredible Hulkesses of Eastern Europe, most interest could be on China's chances of winning her first Olympic medal.

Li Meisu amazed not a few pundits by putting the shot 21.76m in Guangzhou on June 5 to take her place behind the Soviet Union's overwhelming favourite, Natalya Lisovskaya, on the 1988 rankings.

The 29-year-old has been around a while and came fifth in Los Angeles but her modest 17.96 was

beaten by Oakes who came fourth. Although she has smashed countless Asian records, her form in major championships raises a doubt about her temperament – something that cost China's previous great golden hope, Zhu Jianhua, dearly in the high jump.

In Rome she only placed seventh and she did not qualify for Helsinki. But she has suddenly found an extra metre and cannot be discounted. Chinese women seemed to have found something for not far behind is Huang Zhihong, who threw 21.28m on the same day.

In Rome Lisovskaya only scraped home, albeit with a championship record of 21.24, ahead of East German find, Kathrin Neimke, but both Ines Muller and Heike Hartwig have surpassed her 21.06 this year.

Muller, 29, was a humble eighth in her only previous Olympics in Moscow but took silver in Stuttgart (European Championships) and bronze in Rome and will be a formidable presence in Seoul.

But Lisovskaya, a massive 1.86m 100kg giant, won world titles both indoors and out last year and after coming fifth in Helsinki in 1983, has gone on to dominate the event, breaking the world record at regular intervals. Her only failure was in Stuttgart where she finished a disappointing ninth.

Just in case she does falter again, the Soviet Union has other mighty throwers in Natalya Akhrimenko (21.73 this year and a bronze in Stuttgart) and Valentina Fedyushina (21.08).

Czechoslovakia's Sona Vasickova is another who has crossed the

20 metre line this summer, something Olympic champion, Claudia Losch of West Germany, just managed to do in Los Angeles – a rare feat for a Westerner.

Oakes has yet to manage it but at 5'4" and 1.63kg, she is probably the best pound for pound thrower around and deserves not only a better deal from the British Board but more media recognition for her excellent efforts.

Moved to protest over her insulting subventions, the 30-year-old Croydon Harrier won her case and came back to break the British record three times, putting it up to 19.36 in Gateshead. She has also added to her 'other' trophy cabinet by winning the British women's weightlifting championships in the 82.5kg class.

Judy will be joined by Myrtle Augée, who finished second in the trial with 17.82m and Yvonne Hanson-Nortey who had already qualified. None of them travels with much hope of a medal but at least they are travelling – which is more than the unfortunate Venissa Head is doing in the discus.

The experienced Cardiff athlete, who has threatened to quit the sport in disgust at the continued cold-shouldering of her event by the authorities, made a mess of the trial and failed to qualify for Seoul – in spite of being our best performer for years.

Discus

As if the East Germans did not have enough top discus throwers, they have now produced like Wyludda, who broke the world junior record in Berlin recently and is now fourth on this year's rankings. But the older guard are not

standing still: Gabrielle Reinsch broke the world senior record three weeks later with a massive 76.80m while European champion, Diana Gansky, has thrown 72.94m.

Principal challenger to a GDR clean sweep looks to be Romania's Daniela Costian who has a 73.84 to her name – a couple of metres ahead of the nearest Russian. But the West won't get a look in.

The 1936 women's discus winner, Gisela Mauermayer, the world record holder, a modest, 22-year-old six foot blonde, was hailed as the perfect example of Aryan womanhood at 'Hitler's Olympics'. She gave the Nazi salute on the victory rostrum and later joined the Nazi party.

1956 discus champion, Czech, Olga Fikotova gained more acclaim for her romance and marriage to US hammer gold medalist, Hal Connolly, than her own gold medal. They were feted for improving East-West relations at the time and they eventually settled in California with Olga going on to compete in the next four Olympics, placing seventh, twelfth, sixth and sixteenth.

Russian Tamara Press, women's shot put champion of 1960 and 1964, also took discus gold at the latter games. However rather suspiciously, both Tamara and her sister Irina (pentathlon winner in 1964) announced their retirements immediately sex tests were introduced in 1966.

IVANENKO OUTWIGGLES WEIGEL

Men's
50km Walk

The medal positions of last year's World Championships were reversed as Rome bronze medallist Vyacheslav Ivanenko of the USSR defeated East Germans Ronald Weigel and World champion Hartwig Gauder.

In one of the closest major championship 50km walks ever, the 27-year-old teacher recorded the second fastest time in history with 3:38:28, just 11 seconds off Weigel's world record and a personal best by three minutes.

It also smashed nearly nine minutes off the Olympic record set by Mexico's Raul Gonzalez at Los Angeles.

Behind him, Weigel the 1983 World champion duplicated the silver he had earlier taken in the 20km walk, clocking 3:38:55.

Bronze medallist Gauder, the Olympic champion of 1980, broke the 3:40 for the first time

in his career with 3:39:45.

While the event was predictably dominated by Eastern Europeans, Britain's two representatives were nevertheless close to their finest form. National record holder and Sheffield greengrocer Les Morton ducked under the four hour barrier for the second time in his career, clocking 3:59:30, for 27th position. Following him home in 28th was Paul Blagg at 4:00:07. The 28-year-old policeman had been the first Briton to beat four hours, when 19th at last year's World Championships.

Morton was pleased with his time. He had been on course for the British record until the 42km mark, when he began to tire and finished a minute off the record.

He believed that the acclimatisation in his garage had helped.

"I have done alright and I am pleased with my time and being first Briton home. The conditions were not as bad as I expected because it was a reasonably cool day," he said.

WORLD champion Martina Hellmann discovered her best form when it really mattered to capture the Olympic title.

Hellmann's compatriot Gabrielle Reinsch who had shattered the world record with a stunning 76.80m in July was red hot favourite for gold.

However Hellmann was always in command. She opened with 71.48m to take the lead and advanced this to a season's best of 72.30m in the fourth, just 62cm short of her personal best. The only realistic challenge came from fellow East German Diana Gansky with 71.80m.

Reinsch had a nightmare of a final. She could only finish seventh with a best of 67.26m in third spot behind Hellmann and Gansky was Bulgarian Tsve-tanka Khristova at 71.60m.

Britain's Jackie McKernan who was in Seoul more for experience than for any great expectations could only finish ninth in her qualifying group.

Six of the best from Natalya

PART of the Soviet success in track and field must lie in having such a huge population to draw from. And when they've got an athlete of the proportions of Natalya Lisovskaya, they can't go all that far wrong. However, they graft on to basic size and strength, tremendous speed, skill and conditioning.

Strength

If you add together the weights of distance runners Olga Bondarenko and Tatyana Samolenko you're still a couple of kilograms short of Lisovskaya, who tips the scales at 100kg.

That gives her a tremendous advantage, as does her height - at 1.86m, she's comparable with her male counterparts.

Perhaps it's no surprise that British record holder Judy Oakes - whose stat's are 1.63m/81kg - can't even make the final.

Never mind the three Shredded Wheat, Lisovskaya must

eat a box and a half for breakfast - or at least Samolenko's and Bondarenko's as well as her own - to get her strength.

Every throw of Lisovskaya's in the final would have won her the gold medal. Her best throw, her last, won with 22.24, while

her worst, 21.11, was still four centimetres ahead of silver medallist Kathrin Neimke.

Neimke won that medal only with her last throw. Until then, Chinese Li Meisu - one of three Chinese in the final - held second with puts of 20.72 and 21.06 before Neimke overtook her by a single centimetre in the final round.

Out of the top nine, three were East Germans, three Chinese, two Russians and one West German, showing where the concentration of power currently lies.

Lisa bounces back

AFTER missing most of 1987 because of a mystery virus, Lisa York bounced back this year in magnificent style.

But the 18-year-old Leicester Contintarian who was a convincing winner of the women's AAA junior 1500m title is not surprised by her success.

"I have always been there or thereabouts in the big events, and having missed so much last year, I was determined to do better," she said.

During the summer, Lisa improved her 800m pb to 2:07.3, and 1500m pb to 4:22.8. She was unlucky not to win selection for the World Juniors, but aims to make amends next year. "I want to go to the European Juniors in Yugoslavia and win a medal in the 1500m."

Lisa has been coached by John Price since she joined Leicester Contintarian as a nine-year-old. Her father, Chris, has also played a major role in her development. "Without his support and encouragement I wouldn't be running now," she said. Before this year, Lisa had never won a major title, despite some close battles in the English Schools

Championships. She has competed in several internationals, including runs at 3000m. Lisa views her career so far as part of a long term plan.

"The whole idea was to become a top class international, and so I was encouraged by John not to do too much, too early."

John is very impressed by Lisa's comeback this year, but feels there is still a lot to catch up on. He said: "She's lost on the endurance side, so we're now putting a lot of emphasis on that."

Accordingly Lisa is now putting in a few extra miles, including a ten miller every Sunday. This winter, she plans to run cross country and possibly indoors as well, to build up for the challenges of the track next summer.

In the long term Lisa has one definite ambition.

"I want to be able to compete against the best of Eastern Europe and give them a run for their money!"

Lisa can certainly take a lot of encouragement from the performances of Yvonne Murray and Liz McColgan in Seoul.

THE only woman over 7,000 points, gold medalist Joyner-Kersey is the easy winner. John and Behmer follow with next medals and bests. Beaugeant comes next with fourth best mark, despite not finishing the Olympics. She also beat Olympic fourth placed Shubenkova before the Games.
