USA: THE FLYING NUN

Among the more remarkable marathon performances of the year was a 2:51:01 clocking in the Sacramento International Marathon on December 4th by Sister Marion Irvine, a 54-year-old nun! The following week, at Huntsville, Alabama, Paul Gompers (19) recorded a world junior best of 2:15:28, while 14-year-old Wesley Paul (who, under British rules, would not be permitted to take part in a marathon race) was timed at 2:41:31. Lisa Martin of Australia won the women's section at Huntsville in a national record of 2:32:22, second fastest debut ever.

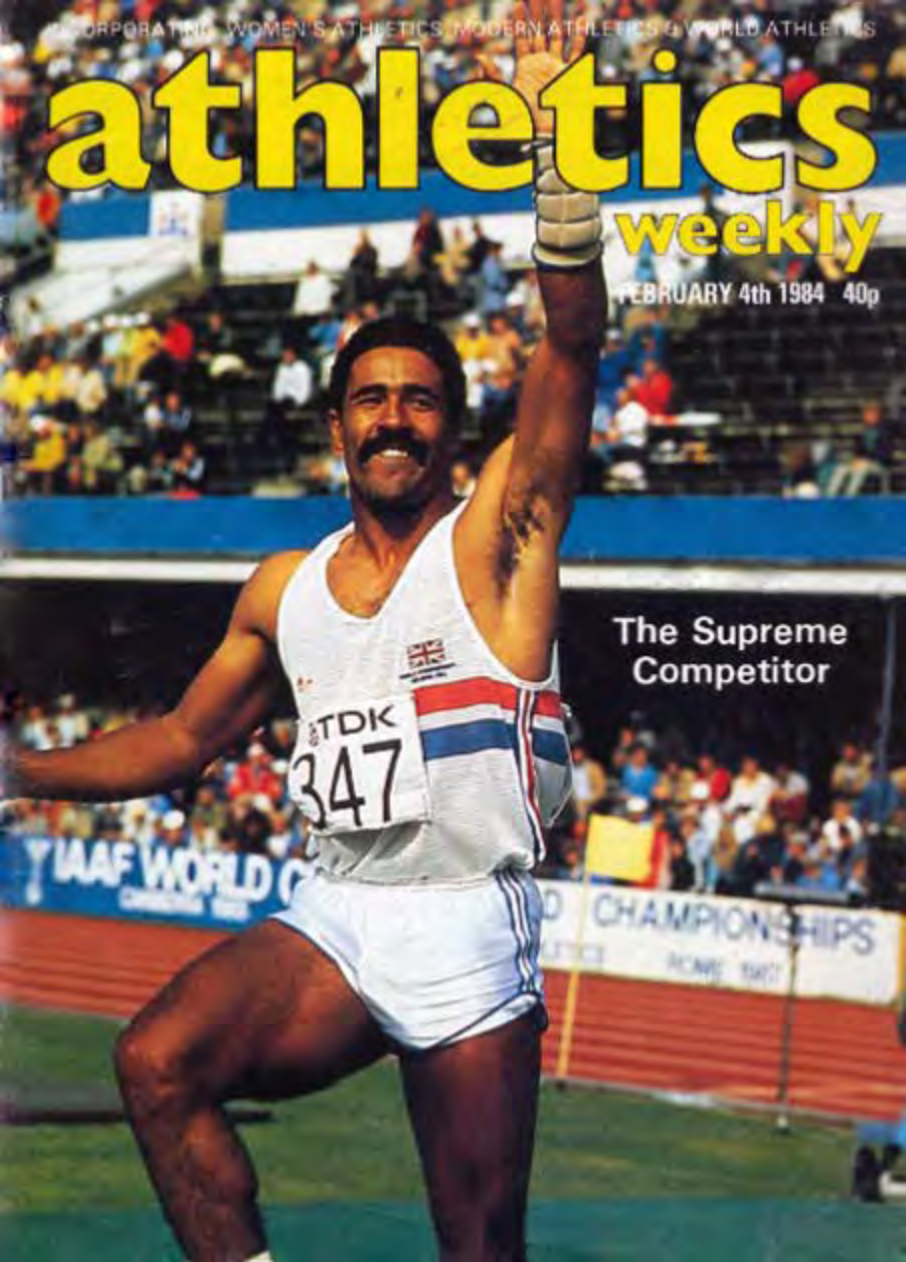

OLYMPICS DIMINISHED BY BOYCOTT

THE DECISION of the Soviet Union and its followers not to attend the Los Angeles Games represents a crushing, and possibly fatal, blow to the Olympic movement, for this summer's Games will be diminished to an even greater degree than were the Moscow Olympics four years ago by the boycott of the USA, Germany and many others. Within a week of the announcement on May 8th that the USSR would be boycotting Los Angeles, the GDR, Bulgaria and Czechoslovakia followed suit, with every likelihood of the rest of Eastern Europe (except for Romania) joining them. Vietnam, Laos, Mongolia and Afghanistan have pulled out too, which won't make much difference to the athletics events, but the probability of withdrawal by such countries within the Soviet sphere of influence as Cuba and Ethiopia will be a further blow.

For years the Olympics have limped from one dreadful crisis to another — the slaying of students in Mexico City, the massacre of Israelis in Munich, the African walkout from Montreal, the American inspired boycott of Moscow.

It may be poetic justice that the Americans, having done their best to ruin the Moscow Olympics, are getting a taste of their own medicine — but in reality we are all losers. The Olympics are one of mankind's better ideas, a rare opportunity for people of all nations to get together for sporting competition and in the process learn a little more about each other and their ways. However the Games have grown so large and provide such an opportunity for political and commercial opportunism that their future must be in doubt.

From the athletics point of view it is a relief that the IAAF have instituted their own independent World Championships, and they should give urgent consideration to the viability of holding these Championships every two years rather than every four — perhaps swapping the less vital World Cup in order to do so. Certainly the 1984 Olympics will, in many events, fall far short of a true world championship meeting; indeed, for the first time, there will be as many potential medallists absent as will be present.

Take the 1983 World Championships results as a guide. Just about every country in the world took part, including the Chinese People's Republic (which will be making its Olympic debut in LA), and athletes from the Eastern bloc collected 28 medals out of the 72 available in the men's events (16 out of 24 in the field events) and no fewer than 34 — if we don't count Romania — out of 51 in the women's events.

Here's a further indication of how an Eastern absence would affect the results, in this case from a British standpoint, in Helsinki, British athletes won two gold medals (Steve Cram and Daley Thompson), two silver (Fatima Whitbread and

the women's 4 x 100) and three bronze (Colin Reitz, the men's 4 x 400 and Kathy Cook in the 200). The splendid achievements of Cram, Thompson and Whitbread would have remained the same with or without Soviet bloc participation, but say the proposed Olympic boycott had been in operation in Helsinki. Not only would the British women's 4 x 100 team have been promoted to the gold — but so too would Shirley Strong, whose 5th place in the 100 hurdles was behind four Eastern Europeans. The bronze medals of Reitz, the 4 x 400 squad and Kathy Cook would have been upgraded to silver, but that's not all. Britain would have collected eight silvers all told through Wendy Sly in the 1500 (actually placed 5th), Sue Morley (7th), Bev Kinch (5th) and Meg Ritchie (8th). Bronze medals would have gone to Wendy Sly in the 3000 (placed 5th) and Venissa Head (10th).

The effect of the boycott in LA will vary enormously from event to event. On the one hand, the men's 1500 will scarcely be affected concerning the fight for medals, whereas medals in the women's shot will be profoundly devalued. But what a tragedy that the Games will be deprived of such athletes as Werner Schildhauer, Waldemar Cierpinski (who would have been seeking a third marathon title), Sergey Bubka, Zdzislaw Hoffman, Imrich Bugar, Sergey Litvinov and Yuriy Sedykh, Detlef Michel, Marlies Gohr, Martina Koch, Jarmila Kratochvilova, Tatyana Kazankina, Bettine Jahn, Tamara Bykova, Heike Dauts, Helena Fibingerova, Ramona Neubert and Sabina Paetz ... and so many more. The events in Los Angeles will still constitute a very high class athletics meeting — but it won't compare with last year's World Championships.

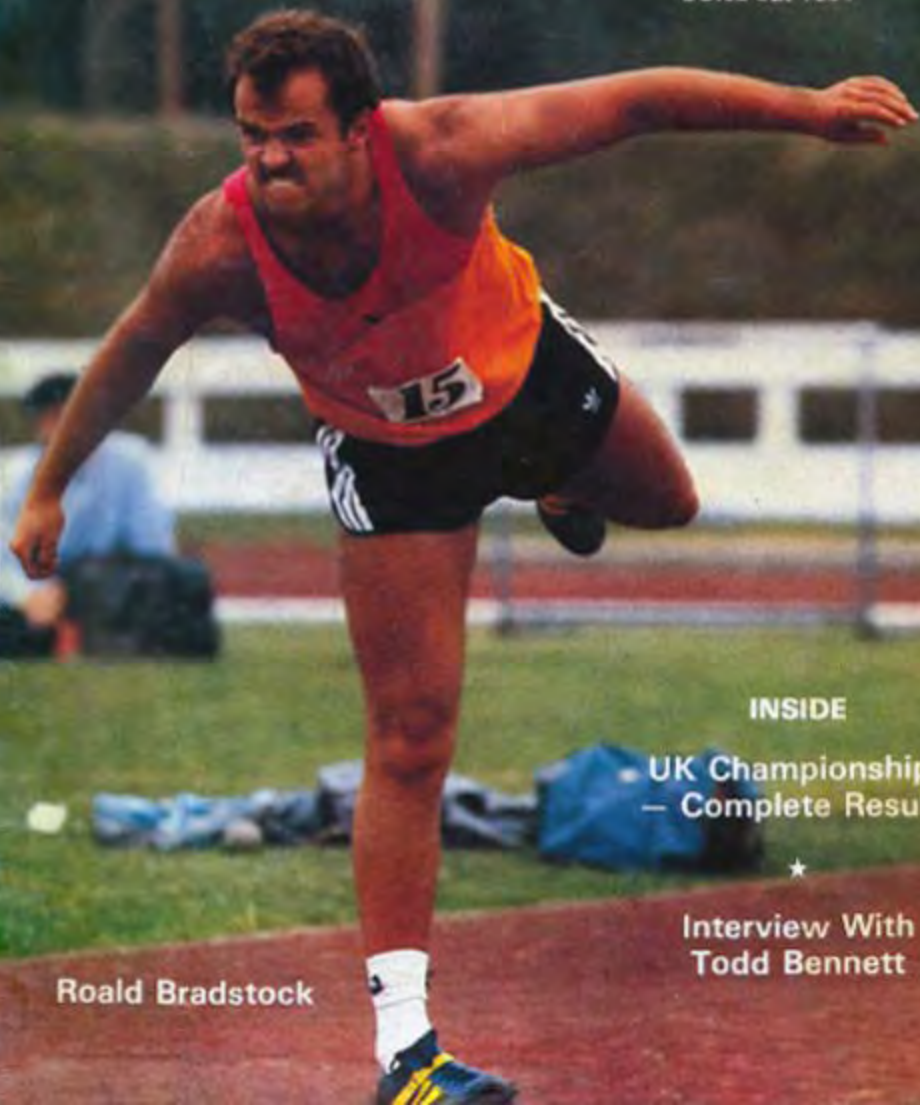



Aouita Must Choose: Will It Be 1500 or 5000?

WHEN the Moroccan, Said Aouita, set a national 5000 record of 13:34.8 in Italy on May 13th, it was confirmation that for a 1500 runner of proven speed (1:44.38 for 800) his endurance factor was quite impressive. His next race at 5000, precisely one month later in Florence, reverberated around the world — for the World Championships 1500 bronze medalist became the second fastest man in history (to Dave Moorcroft's 13:00.41) with the stupendous time of 13:04.78. Steeplechaser Boguslaw Maminiski was the early pace-maker, covering the first two kilometres in 2:35.6 and 2:38.4. After seven laps Aouita and Ethiopia's Wodajo Bulti were out on their own, passing 3000 (2:38.2 third kilometre) in 7:52.2 — two seconds down on Moorcroft's corresponding time. The 4000 mark was reached in 10:34.0 (2:41.8), and it was during that fourth kilometre that any realistic chance of a world record slipped away. Moorcroft's time had been 10:28.7. A 35.8 last lap enabled Aouita to pull comfortably clear of Bulti and complete the final kilometre in 2:30.8. Now Aouita must choose between the 1500 and 5000 at Los Angeles; it's not possible to double. The other highlight of the Florence meeting was the 800, in which Italy's new athletics hero, European indoor champion Donato Sabia, clocked 1:43.68 ahead of Rob Druppers and Alberto Juantorena to establish himself among the Olympic medal contenders.

SEDYKH ... 86.34m!

YURIY SEDYKH has been denied his chance of joining the Olympic immortals who have won three gold medals in the same event, but he may have gained a small amount of consolation by reclaiming the world hammer record in, of all unlikely places, Cork (Ireland) on July 3rd. The record stood to the credit of USSR colleague Sergey Litvinov at 84.14m until Sedykh took his first throw at the Cork City Sports ... it thudded to earth at the astonishing distance of 86.34! Litvinov, throwing first (he fouled his opener), responded with his longest ever throw of 85.14, followed by 84.84, 83.74 and two fouls. That worked out as an average for his three valid throws of 84.57 — beyond his old world record — but it was still no match for the 29-year-old master, Sedykh, who averaged 84.99 for five throws! His series: 86.34, 85.98, 85.16, 84.16, 83.30, foul. A more than casually interested spectator of these remarkable proceedings was Commonwealth record holder Martin Girvan who, despite an admirably consistent series himself (75.74, 75.26, 73.26, —, 73.08, 73.48), finished over ten metres behind the winner.

For the second time in a couple of days Peter Elliott was beaten, this time over a mile. He ran 3:55.73, just 2/100ths away from his best, but was held at bay by Graham Williamson (3:55.13) — the fastest mile by a Briton this year, until Seb Coe was timed in 3:54.6 at Haringey the following evening.

Cram's First 1500

STEVE CRAM will run his first 1500 of the year, for England against Poland and Hungary, at Birmingham on Sunday (July 15th). He is partnered by Jack Buckner. One of his main challengers for the Olympic 1500 title, Steve Ovett, competes in the 800 alongside Garry Cook — an event in which James Mays (USA) is among the guests. Dave Moorcroft is giving the Peugeot Talbot Games a miss in order to concentrate on the 3000 at this meeting, the second race of his current 'comeback' leading up to the Olympic 5000. His England partner is Richard Callan.

Other track highlights should include a 400 involving Phil Brown, Todd Bennett, Mike Paul (Tri) and Mark Rowe (US); a testing run-out for the probable Olympic squad of Kris Akabusi, Cook, Bennett and Brown against an American/Trinidadian combination of Paul, Rowe, David Patrick and Mike Solomon; and a steeplechase in which Colin Reitz renews rivalry with the Pole, Boguslaw Maminski and Krzysztof Wesolowski, both of whom have bettered 8:17 this season. Pick of the field events could be the triple jump which brings together world champion Zdzislaw Hoffman (Pol), Robert Cannon (US), Bela Bakosi (Hun) and England's Eric McCalla and Aston Moore.

At Crystal Palace, July 13th

Sensational vaulting by Bubka – 5.90m!

A WORLD record, a world best, a UK all-comers' record, a UK national record, the return of Allan Wells and a worrying result for Steve Cram were the leading factors that emerged from the Peugeot/Talbot Games at Crystal Palace on July 13th. The national press predictably wear their usual 'whole hog' on Zola Budd's fantastic effort in the 2000m, and indeed her world best was certainly one of the greatest women's feats ever witnessed in this country, but Sergey Bubka's amazing 5.90 leap in the pole vault was surely one of the greatest ever athletic performances and merited more than the scant coverage it received.

On a night when field events, forever at a disadvantage, almost stole the limelight from the track, 20-year-old Bubka added two centimetres to his already brilliant mark of 5.88m set earlier in the season, and in doing so rekindled the burning question, when are we going to see that first six metre jump? It could well have been witnessed at Crystal Palace had Bubka's attempt at 5.90 been one at the 'magic' six, for the margin by which he cleared the bar was phenomenal, although it was reported that the uprights could go no higher than 5.95! But as good as he may have been throughout the competition, with amazing first

time clearances at 5.50 and 5.70, he couldn't quite manage the extra centimetres at 5.92, contriving to dislodge the bar with each ascent. The highpoint of each of these jumps was way above the height of the bar though, and it surely can't be long before this young man, who was only seventh in the European Junior Champs in 1981, makes further history by clearing six metres.

Bubka's jump was, without saying, an all-comers' record, and erased the fairly soft 5.62 by Billy Olson from 1982, which has withstood numerous attempts; but if I may be permitted to hold fire on the amazing Miss Budd's exploits for a few lines more, another all-comers' mark which fell to the small Soviet team came in the hammer, where the recognised 'master' of the event, Yuriy Sedykh, heaved two mighty throws in the first two rounds, registering 85.04 and 85.60, to decimate the old mark of 81.54 by his compatriot, Sergey Litvinov. Only Sedykh himself has thrown further than his 85.60 with the 86.34 in Cork three weeks ago, which is awaiting ratification as a

world mark, and he followed these up by registering 85.32 and 82.96 with later throws. How demoralising it could have been for Martin Girvan to have the competition sealed in the opening round, but he had already opened with 77.16 before Sedykh entered the circle and himself produced an excellent series which indicated there must surely be a medal chance in LA should he be able to hold top form. Young David Smith, controversially overlooked for Olympic selection, produced three throws over 70m, culminating in a personal best 74.30 in the fifth round, third best by a Briton this year.

But back to Zola. It seems that the wall-like 18-year-old wonder girl can't put a foot wrong, and she certainly didn't in this 2000m which constituted her last race prior to the Olympic 3000m. It was certainly her toughest track race to date, and she responded remarkably well to the pressure of a top class field by leading the pack round the opening two laps despite being 10 to 15m adrift of the pacemaker, Jill Haworth from the States, who notched up splits of 65.81 and 2:12.75 (Budd 2:13.5) by 800. Zola's biggest challenge was undoubtedly going to be from Chris Boxer and Chris Benning, who only a week previous had battled out that UK record 1500m at Gateshead. When Zola took to the front just before the kilometre (2:47.19), Benning and Boxer covered and the three of them quickly drew clear of the rest, with the exception of Yvonne Murray who was certainly giving it a go.

Zola was obviously trying to break the two CB's, but they were hanging on for grim death and the position wasn't to change despite Zola's relentless pace for the next lap and a half. Still they were together when they took the bell in 4:29.0, but Chris Benning was struggling to keep up, and as they went down the back straight, Chris Boxer moved into second as Zola wound it up even more. Only a stride separated the two as they entered the home straight and it looked for one moment as though Chris was going to get the better of her Aldershot clubmate, but, proving that she has a kick as well as the ability to maintain a world class pace, Zola pushed again and was two strides clear at the line following a 31.7 final 200. It was a remarkable run from both girls, and Zola was rewarded by breaking Maricica Puica's world mark of 5:33.5 with 5:33.15; but, as ever, official records elude her as the IAAF don't officially recognise this distance for women. It has been a hectic season for Zola, but she has managed to maintain her world class form throughout. She now has the daunting task of facing Mary Decker in the Olympic 3000 to maintain her unbeaten track record following confirmation that the double world champion will be contesting that distance in Los Angeles.

Allan Wells and Steve Cram were two Olympians who have had question marks over their form this year. For Wells, his 100m was the first big test he had faced since his winter season

'down under' as he has been plagued by hamstring trouble all season. For Cram, the calf injury he sustained at the AAA Champs was more recent, but potentially more problematical. Wells came through with flying colours though, as, following two false starts, the first of which came from the Olympic champion himself, he blasted out of the blocks to an almost two metre lead at halfway. "Scorch marks could be seen in his lane" was the comment from my illustrious editor, Mr. Warman, but that really did sum it up as although Donovan Reid produced a very strong finish, he had no chance of passing Wells, who even looked round and eased up two or three strides out. Wells' time was his fastest legal clocking of the year, and he said afterwards, "I'm happy, but I'm sure it was half a veterans race out there!", commenting on the experience of competitors such as himself, 1976 Olympic champion, Hazel Crawford, and Steve Williams. He added, "I'm getting a wee bit more confident, but I think I've still got a wee bit of trouble with the hamstring. But I think this proves I can run through it".

Cram in trouble

It wasn't the same success story for Steve Cram though, running in the 1000m to test out that injured calf. He tallied home a dejected last after leading through the bell (1:21.74) following the disappearance of early pacemaker, David Barlow. Cram kept the lead until 230m from home, when James Mays, Chris McGeorge and a very well placed Steve Crabb went past. As the field rounded the bend, so Cram just got further and further behind, but in stark contrast the other lanky blond, Crabb, pounced in the straight and went past Mays 50m out to take a great win to add to his third behind Overt in the Oslo 1500 a few weeks ago. It was a great win by Crabb who was always well placed, but Cram said after the race that he wasn't so much affected by his injury as the lack of training leading up to this race: "I was dead at the bell; it was not there at all".

Another success story came in the high jump, although for someone who, as yet, still isn't going to LA. Geoff Parsons gave the selectors the best reason yet why they should add him to the Olympic team before it is too late when he scaled the UK record height of 2.26 to place second to 1976 Olympic champion, Jacek Wszola, and push his Olympic Trials conqueror, Mark Naylor, back into fourth. In fairness, Mark himself jumped well, getting over 2.20 first time, but he may have made a mistake in passing at 2.23 in favour of the record height which Parsons cleared first time, as he had done with all his other heights. In the past, Geoff has sometimes given the impression that he was 'lazy' in his jumping, seemingly expecting to clear the bar as a matter of course, but here he was, the most determined young man in the field, and I hope the selectors can see fit to add his name to the Olympic team before it is too late.

SPAIN: Watch Sanchez at 400

Antonio Sanchez, who has run 45.76 for 400 this year, broke the Spanish record for 200 with 20.67 in Madrid on June 21st. He beat Cuba's Tomas Gonzalez after making up a lot of ground in the last 80m. He is only 20 and could soon develop into a 44 second 400 performer. At the national championships in Barcelona the following week he took the 200 in a windy 20.73 and contributed a 44.6 relay anchor. Jose-Luis Gonzalez set a Spanish 3000 record of 7:45.44 in a solo effort at Zaragoza on June 3rd, covering the kilometres in 2:33.2, 2:39.0 and 2:33.3, to destroy a good field which included Colin Reitz, Gonzalez, later a close second to Steve Ovett in Oslo, said after that race (3:34.61 1500): "I prefer not to go to Los Angeles as the favourite for the gold because there will not be so much pressure. I know that if I am among the leaders with 300m left I will be very dangerous".

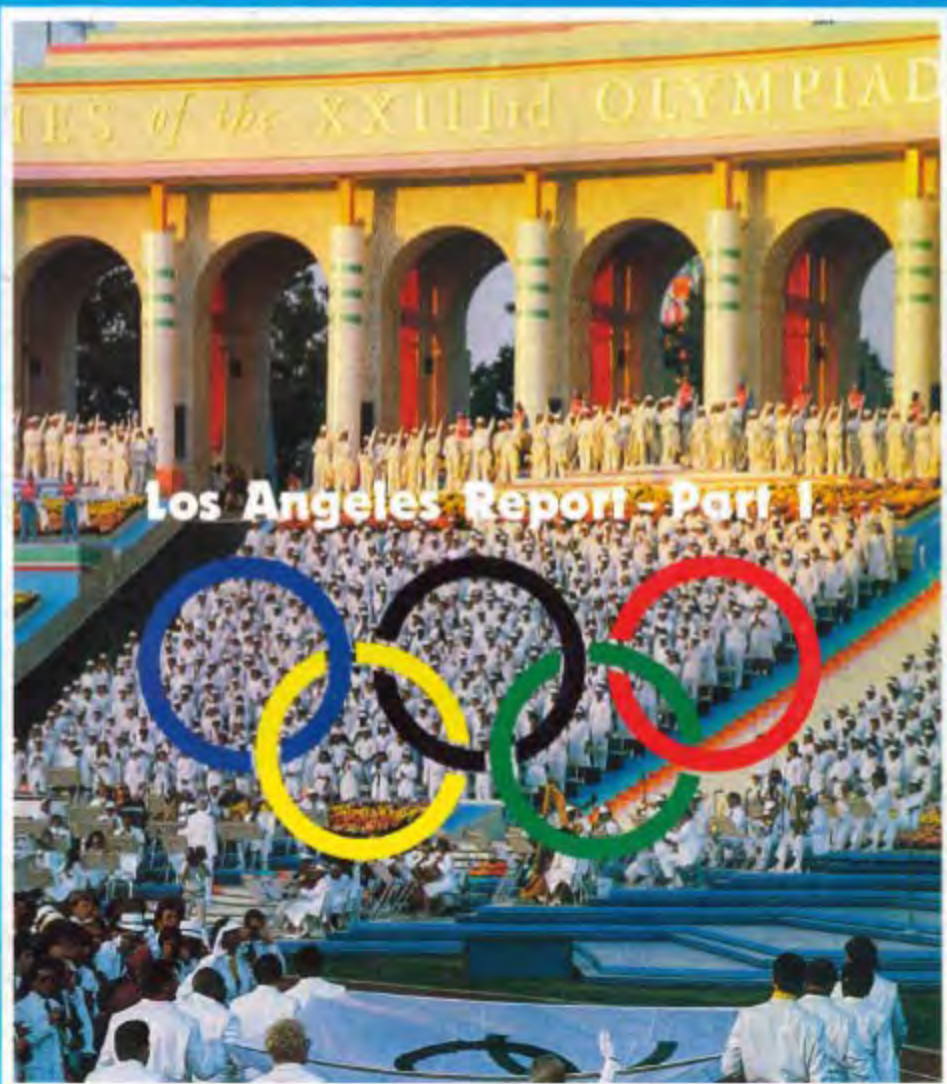

Tiainen holds off German threat as Riehm gets his medal at last

HAMMER: Final

It's possible that the Soviet throwers would have swept the medals as they did in the last two Olympics, and that Yuriy Sedykh might well have won a third consecutive title. But, as bronze medallist Klaus Ploghaus put it, "I regret the Russians not being there, but you have to look forward, not dwell on the fact".

The winner, Juha Tiainen put it this way, "Of course it's not the same, but three weeks ago I competed with the Eastern bloc athletes in East Berlin and I beat them all, even Sergey Litvinov, last year's world champion. Of course I'm glad I won, except that it is not quite the same without the Eastern bloc countries, I would have got a medal, but maybe not a gold medal".

Tiainen, a consistent 80m thrower this year, was always confident of winning even though his first throw was a poor 70.56 and his second wasn't much better at 72.64. At the end of two rounds he was only 6th with Ploghaus the leader on 75.96. All came good on the Finn's third attempt; it thudded down at 78.08. That proved to be the winner, although it was a close call as Karl-Hans Riehm's immediate response went 77.98. That stood up for second place, causing the former world record holder to declare: "I'm happy to win the silver medal — I've been waiting 18 years for this".

The competition turned out to be acutely disappointing for the British throwers. None of them made the 'cut' for three further trials, Bob Weir coming closest with his third round 72.62, which placed him 9th. Martin Girvan finished 10th with 72.32, and Matt Mileham didn't register a distance at all as he fouled his first throw of around 71m and netted the next two.

Medallists all blast their ways into world all-time top ten. Brisco-Hooks lays foundation for golden treble

WOMEN'S 400 METRES: Final

When the Eastern European boycott was first announced it looked as though the 400 might become a relatively soft event with a time of just inside 50 seconds sufficing to win. That estimate had to be revised when, in the US Trials, Chandra Cheeseborough (49.28) and Valerie Brisco-Hooks (49.79) both broke the American record. In the event, Brisco-Hooks took the Olympic title in a scintillating 48.83 — second only to Marita Koch's 48.26 this year and good for 4th on the world all-time list. Cheeseborough, runner-up in 49.05, became the sixth fastest woman ever, Kathy Cook — bronze medallist with a superb Commonwealth record of 49.42 — rose to 10th on that all-time list.

Kathy, drawn in lane 6 and sandwiched between Brisco-Hooks (5) and Cheeseborough (7), ran like the wind along the back straight to establish a clear lead, but the Americans' superior strength told in the later stages. Around the final turn first Brisco-Hooks and then Cheeseborough moved past, Brisco-Hooks entering the finishing straight with a 3m lead over her compatriot with Kathy a close and determined third. Those positions remained the same to the end. Canada's Marita Payne, previous holder of the Commonwealth record at 50.06, finished well to beat Lillie Leatherwood for 4th in 49.91. The American third siring was, in fact, the only finalist not to set a lifetime best. In last place Ruth Waihera set an excellent Kenyan record of 51.56.

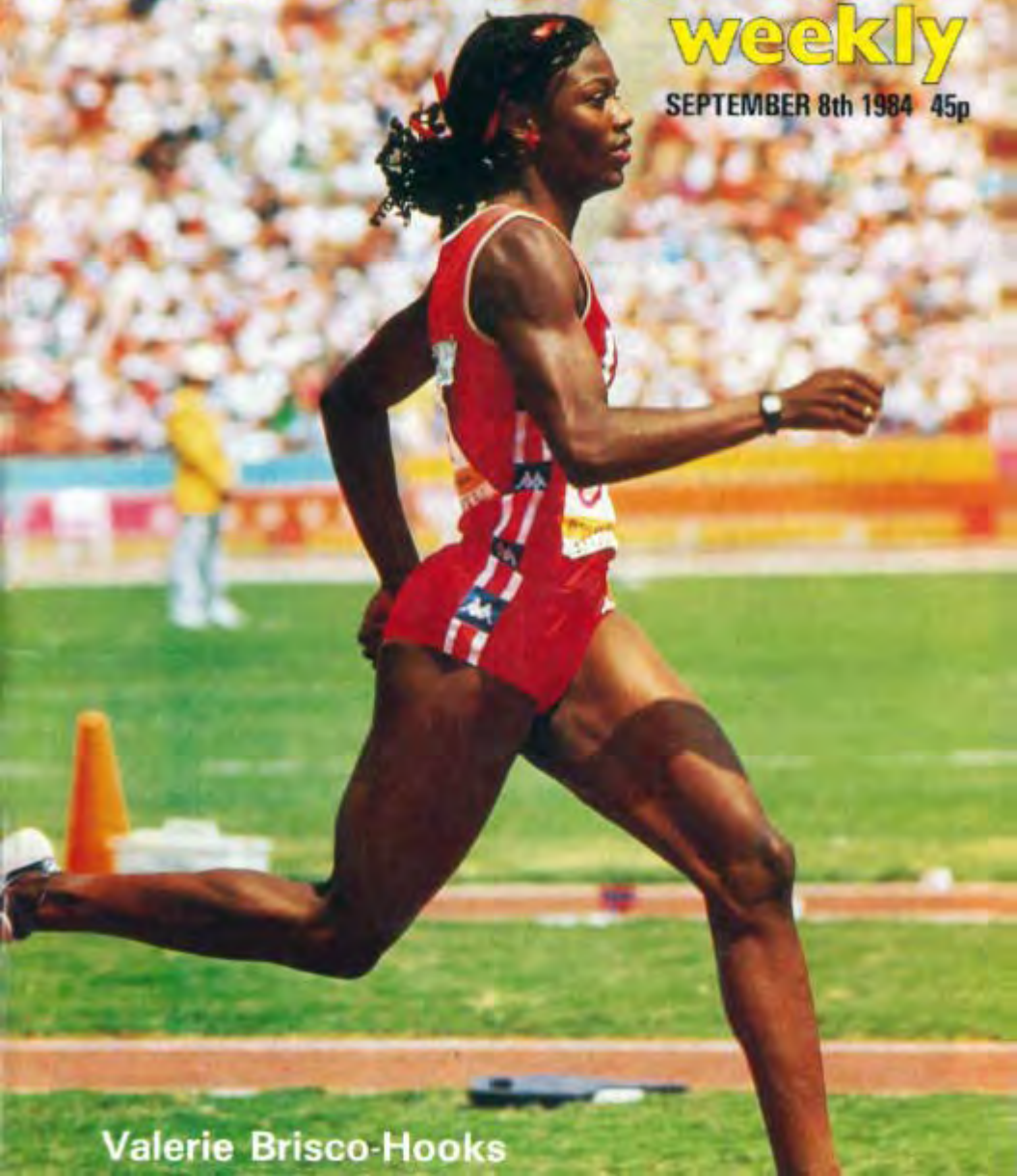

Americans stars of the show

August 17th, West Berlin

The Americans gave the 41,000 home fans value for money at the ISTAF meeting in Berlin's Olympic Stadium, writes David Martin. Star of the night was Greg Foster with a 1984 world best of 13.16 in the high hurdles, inches ahead of his Olympic conqueror, Roger Kingdom, whose time of 13.17 was a personal best. Full marks too to Evelyn Ashford, who after a 10.92 heat won the 100 final — slowing up and holding her right leg — in 10.94. Ed Moses, admitting to feeling very tired, strolled to a 48.49 hurdles victory, while exciting long and triple jumps saw crowd participation lift Larry Myricks and Mike Conley to leaps of 8.32m and 17.44m.

Olympic champions Alozo Babers, Dietmar Mogenburg, Juha Tiainen and Benita Fitzgerald-Brown won their events, but other gold medallists fared less well. Ulrike Meyfarth, suffering from post-LA celebrations, was unable to jump higher than 1.85m and wound up third on countback; Claudia Losch was well beaten by Helena Fibingerova; and Arto Harkonen managed only 80.06m for eighth in the javelin, one position behind Dave Ottley. With Colin Reitz and Graeme Fell also way below their best it was left to Fatima Whitbread to give the many British servicemen in the stadium something to cheer about; she won her event with a throw of 66.52m.

There was a sensational start to the first track event, the women's 100m hurdles, writes David Martin. After one false start Lucyna Kalek got away like a gazelle, leaving Candy Young, Marjen

Olhjelager and Edith Oker still in their blocks. They obviously thought Kalek had a 'flier' as they never got past the first hurdle, while the Pole ran on to a 1984 world best of 12.43. The time was officially confirmed although the race was later re-run without third placed Sabine Everts participating. Kalek recorded 'only' 12.69 to win again, by a 7m margin. The withdrawal of Evelyn Ashford from the meeting with a leg injury brought disapproval from the crowd; but when Ed Moses arrived in the stadium he received a rapturous ovation from the 20,000 spectators. However, five minutes before the race he became a victim of stomach and bowel complaints and looked really distraught. It was inevitable he would not start and again the Germans gave vent to their feelings. Moses later put the illness down to the time-change and the demanding programme he has undertaken in the last month.

Soviet Athletes Dominate Friendship Games

Andras Szego reports on East Europe's 'Alternative Olympics'

THE track and field portion of the "Friendship Games", promoted by the countries of the socialist camp which failed to attend the Los Angeles Olympics but also supported by many others, was split into two parts. The men's events were staged on August 17th/18th in Moscow's Lenin Stadium, the hub of the 1980 Olympics, while the women's events were held from August 17th to 19th at the Rosicky Stadium in Prague.

A total of 29 countries were represented in Moscow, and of the 24 gold medals, 16 were won by the superbly prepared Soviet hosts. The attendance was close to 100,000 on both days. By contrast, the spectators in Prague totalled 33,700. The USSR won eight golds, the GDR six and Bulgaria three.

In Moscow, the 20km walk kicked off the first day of competition, and the organisers rescheduled the start for 30 minutes earlier than originally planned, so that the walkers would not have to suffer from the anticipated heat. But the precaution proved unnecessary. The temperature was merely 17°C, and Sergey Protisin (1:21:57) led the USSR to a clean sweep of the medals — the first of four.

Dual Olympic champion Yuriy Sedykh literally swept to a gold in the hammer. Prior to each of his six throws, all of which were longer than the best of runner-up Igo Nikulin (82.56) or bronze medalist Sergey Litvinov (81.30), the fastidiously tidy Sedykh swept the ring clean with his personalised brush and then let rip. But his fourth round 85.60 nonetheless fell short of the world record, much to the disappointment of the fans, who were filling the stands to the hilt by this time. The rest of his series was: 84.44, 83.10, 83.38, 83.88 and 84.84. Behind the Soviet trio, Imre Szitas was fourth with a new Hungarian record of 77.32.

In the post-competition interview, Sedykh was uneasy and the questions came haltingly — some too pat, others too technical — until somebody chanced to ask why he had shaved off his moustache. At this, the grinning half-and-chain great quipped: "I was beginning to have too many imitators".

The air was completely still, with not a single leaf showing the slightest tremor, and this utter lack of any wind spread despair among the javelin throwers. But it did not bother the GDR's new world record holder, Uwe Hohn, five of whose mighty throws landed beyond the 90m mark. He won in a canter with 94.44, and compatriot Detlef Michel sneaked the silver with his last round 88.32.

In the 100m, favourite Osvaldo Lara (10.17) had a flying start, and his two Cuban compatriots

followed in his wake, but Hungary's vastly-improved Attila Kovacs (10.18) came on strong from 50m, by-passing both and appearing to catch Lara on the line. Kovacs' time was a new Hungarian record. European record holder Marian Woronin, hampered by a tendon injury, was eliminated in the heats in 10.66.

Viktor Markin, the 1980 Olympic champion, was a winner all the way in the 400m in a fast 44.78, while in a tactical 10,000m the possessor of the biggest kick was Valeriy Abramov (27:55.1) who got the gold in front of two Ethiopians. The hosts triumphed again in the 4 x 100 relay (38.32) and the 50km walk through Andrey Perlov (3:43.06).

Sergey Bubka's form finally dipped. He could not get past the 5.70m mark and was held to a silver by Konstantin Volkov (5.80). In the long jump Konstantin Semykin broke the Soviet record with 8.38 to pip the Cuban Jaime Jefferson to the gold by 1cm, while only GDR runner-up Udo Beyer (21.60) prevented a Soviet clean sweep in the shot. Sergey Kasnauskas (21.64) won, with 1980 Olympic champion Vladimir Klyachyov (21.38) getting the bronze and Janis Bojars (21.48) fourth place.

On the second day the balding Cuban hero of Montreal, Alberto Juantorena, received mighty applause as he lined up for the 800m final. He responded by going out on his own on the second lap, but was caught at the tape by Poland's Ryszard Ostrowski. Both were timed at 1:45.68 and each got a gold.

The hosts nearly pulled off a triple in the 400m hurdles. Aleksandr Vasilyev (48.68) was the winner and Vladimir Budko was a strong runner-up in the European Junior record time of 48.74, but 1980 Moscow silver-medallist Vasily Arkhipenko tired and was beaten for the bronze by the Bulgarian, Tomia Tomov.

The 1980 Olympic arch-rivals, gold medallist Thomas Munkelt and runner-up Alejandro Casanas got all the attention and applause when the eight qualifiers lined up for the 110m hurdles final. Both had achieved better times this year than Hungary's up-and-coming Gyorgy Bakos' 13.49 national record. But Bakos emerged the winner. He took the lead from the fourth hurdle, and won in 13.52, while still going away from the field. Munkelt (13.64) was pipped for the silver by Vyacheslav Litsinov and Casanas — already beaten — fell at the last hurdle.

The high jump was disappointing but the triple jump spawned a truly world-class competition. In this, the USSR's Oleg Protzenko (17.46) and Aleksandr Yakovlyev (17.41), and Bulgarian teenager Hristo Markov (17.29) collected the medals. In the decathlon, Grigoriy Degtyarov (8523 points) came from behind to triumph in front of Torsten Voss (8450), while in the 4 x 400m relay the hosts' Viktor Markin overcame an 8m deficit against the GDR's Jens Carlowitz to win in 3:00.16.

Mafe: 20.57 In Tokyo

THERE were two British winners in the eight-sided match in Tokyo on September 14th — Steve Cram in the 1500 and Tim Hutchings in the 5000 — but the finest performance came from Ade Mafe who, in finishing second only a metre down on Olympic silver medallist Kirk Baptiste, reduced his UK Junior 200m record to 20.57. That's getting quite close to the world (20.22 by Dwayne Evans) and European (20.37 by Jurgen Evers) Junior records, and Ade is still a Junior next year. Cram outkicked Andreas Busse in 3:47.12, while Hutchings scored his most notable victory to date in beating Dmitriy Dmitriyev and Werner Schildhauer in 13:40.20. The British team which excelled to finish third overall behind the GDR and USSR, picked up other second places through Todd Bennett (45.72 400), Graeme Fell (8:38.17 steeplechase), the men's relay teams (39.23/3:02.20) and Diana Davies (1.92m high jump). 6 Metre Vault Is Close

August 31st, Rome

The relentless rate of progress in pole vaulting can be gauged from the result at the Golden Gala in Rome. It was at the corresponding meeting last year that Thierry Vigneron set a world record of 5.83m... this time the Frenchman cleared 5.91, yet didn't win the competition! That distinction went to Sergey Bubka, the world champion, at the fabulous height of 5.94.

Watched by an enthralled crowd of 52,000, the contest began in earnest with the bar at 5.50. Vigneron entered at that height and cleared first time; Bubka came in at 5.60 but needed two tries. A cat and mouse game ensued: Vigneron went for 5.70 and cleared at the second attempt (Aleksandr Krupskiy making it first time) but Bubka elected to sit out that height and the next two (5.75 and 5.78). He returned to the fray at 5.81, registered one failure and reserved his remaining shots for the next height (5.84) which he cleared right away. Vigneron brushed his way over at the second, and with both men passing at 5.87 the battle recommenced at the world record height of 5.91

— a centimetre above the mark set by Bubka at Crystal Palace on July 13th.

Both missed at the first attempt but second time around the Frenchman, bronze medallist in LA, cleared. The bar rattled but stayed put. His previous best had been 5.84. His Soviet rival cannily decided to try his luck at 5.94 instead and, at the first attempt, went clear! Vigneron's latest reign as world record holder had lasted barely 15 minutes. However, while Bubka called it a night (it was almost midnight by then) Vigneron went on to take three unsuccessful cracks at 5.97. European champion Krupskiy was third at 5.70. He ambitiously passed all heights prior to 5.84 and chalked up one failure there and two at 5.87. Bubka said after the six-hour contest: "I don't know if we will beat this record this year, but 6 metres has to be seriously considered for next year".

Another great jumping display was provided by world record holder Ludmila Andonova who cleared 2.02m at the second attempt (failing at 2.05) to defeat her predecessor Tamara Bykova (1.98, failing at 2.02). The Bulgarian, who thus exceeded 2 metres for the fourth time this year, said: "My knee hurt, but I could not let down the public. I was sorry not to have competed against Simoni. They told me she is not well, and I send her my best wishes".

Track highlights included a 10.93 100 by Evelyn Ashford to complete a momentous European tour, and brilliant hurdling from Tonic Campbell (13.29), Ed Moses (48.01 five metres clear of Harald Schmid) and Lucyna Kales (12.49). Romania's Olympic winners Doina Melinte, seventh in the 800, and Maricica Puica, second in the 3000, were well beaten. Britain's star of the night was Jack Buckner who, 10m clear at the bell, produced a 56.5 last lap to win the 3000 in 7:46.06. Tim Hutchings clocked a pb of 3:38.06 for fourth place in a close fought 1500.

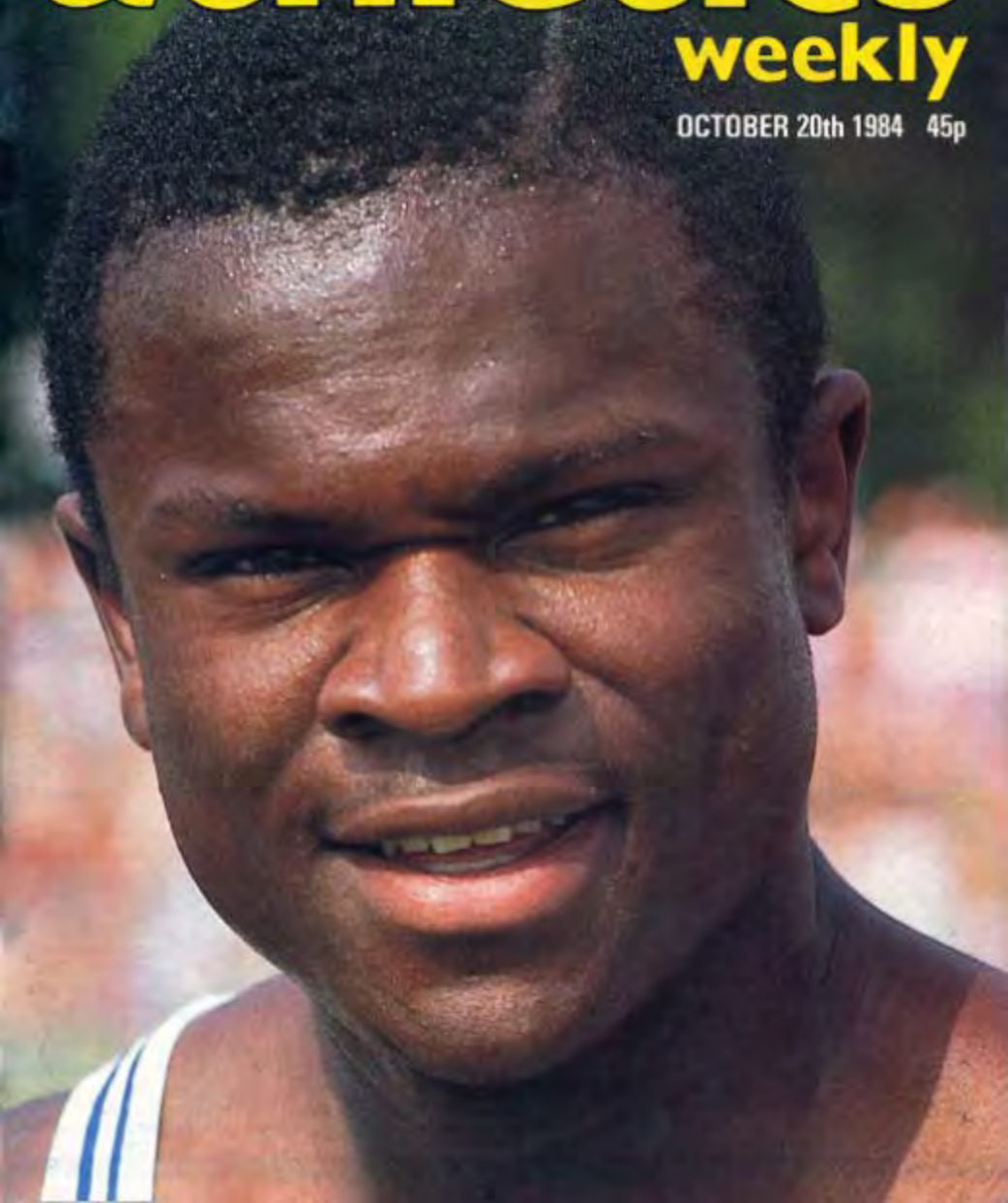

Weak Americans well beaten in Tokyo

Ade Mafe sets another Junior 200m record

THE HIGH note on which the season was expected to end with the only post-Olympic team meeting between the triumphant United States and the boycotting East Germans and Soviets diminished to a 'raspberry' for the Americans, when they fielded a lamentably weak squad for the fourth Eight Nations Meeting in Tokyo on September 14th. The men failed to score in the 800 and 4x400, Tom Thaxton ('who?', you might well ask) failed to register a height in the pole vault and they were also absent from the women's 400m. All of which tempered the fine performance by the British team in finishing third behind East Germany and the Soviet Union. The Americans would have needed to win those four events to catch the British, and it could have been worse if Carl Lewis and Kirk Baptiste had not come into the team late, after what were termed as 'negotiations' by one American official.

Steve Cram and Tim Hutchings were the only winners for the British team, which was also lacking several of the original squad, through injury or fatigue from the long season. But the string of second places, headed by Ade Mafe's second UK Junior record in the 200m, and Diana Davies' (nee Elliott) 1.92m high jump, put Britain firmly into third place in the tournament, which began with a non-scoring exhibition of hammer throwing. And who better to put on an exhibition than Yuri Sedykh, whose first three throws, culminating in the furthest, 84.60m, were all longer than last year's world record, 82.000 Japanese apparatus prominently, and that set the tone for the following six hours of competition in the warm and humid conditions which prevailed in the 1964 Olympic Stadium.

The legendary politeness of the Japanese went even further than the bounds of Sedykh's hammer throwing. "Now, we'd like to start the 10,000 metres", said the young woman announcer, who

spent most of the afternoon showering 'congratulations' on the competitors. The women, in the first 10,000m in an international match, did not respond any better than the men did three hours later. In fact, any time up to the last lap of both races, the announcer could have called for the competitors to start racing. For a lot of the track events, and particularly the women's 10,000m, were marked by a reluctance for fast races, which we feared, unjustifiably, in the Olympic Games.

Overseas News & Results

Olga Bondarenko of the Soviet Union didn't do justice to her world record of 31:13.78, being content to follow two novices for the distance on the track — Angela Tooby and Ulrike Bruns. Almost a year since her emergence as winner of the national road '10K', Angela's lack of international experience manifested itself when she led, albeit reluctantly, for 9000m. A slight raise in pace by Bondarenko was sufficient to drop Angela, but the Russian then moved out to tempt Bruns alongside, and Angela caught them again. But Bruns is a much better 3000m runner than either of the other two, and she just sped away on the last lap, leaving most of the onlookers agreeing with the sprinters' philosophy that long distance track races are boring. Bruns, however, collected eight points with her 32:46.08, Bondarenko was second in 32:48:50, and Angela who flew on to the United States for a short season of road racing, opened her 10km track account with 32:58.07; a time that she can only improve on.

Andreas Busse has been losing to British milers for so long that he probably couldn't believe it when he had the opportunity to take the lead from

How Caroline's experimental gamble paid off

Eileen Battersby profiles Ireland's first female track Olympic finalist

ON BECOMING the first female Irish athlete to reach an Olympic track final, Dubliner Caroline O'Shea was proclaimed an overnight sensation in her native country. However, the Irish athletics fraternity considered it merely fitting that the 23-year-old, who had promised so much for so long, should finally reveal some of that immense natural talent — that had delivered an effortless 53.24 at 17 — in the rarified atmosphere of the Los Angeles Coliseum. Those intervening six years have produced a handful of races, a litany of injuries and many disappointments. When referring to her late qualifying with a national record just two weeks before the team's departure for the States, in only her fourth ever 800m, she remarked: "I didn't feel pleased as much as relieved, at last something had gone right".

After a relatively injury-free winter's training, Caroline felt optimistic about securing the Olympic 400m qualifying standard, despite a persistent throat infection, but, lethargic form, culminating in an indifferent 400m in the Westathletic Representative Meeting, resulted in a serious rethink: "I couldn't break 55 seconds... I felt dreadful!" Returning from Lisbon, the

NEW SHOE DEPT

Dublin County Championships offered a 200m or an 800m. "As I was going so badly over 400m, I decided 200m could prove a real disaster!", so she opted for the 800m which she had run only twice previously, in 1982, and won in a convincing, if unspectacular, 2:05.0. Already invited for the 400m at the Cork International Meeting (where Yuriy Sedykh would set new world hammer figures of 86.34m), she reckoned on repeating the 800m experiment instead — on the basis of her Dublin run: "I thought I could get down to 2:02-ish... though I wasn't sure of actually getting the exact time, but at that stage I had nothing to lose". Well placed at the bell in 58 seconds, Caroline chased home the visiting Soviet stars Irina Podyalovskaya and Lyubov Gurina, who ran 1:58.46 and 1:58.88 respectively — while the Irish girl took third place with 2:00.70, clear of Shireen Bailey and Kirsty McDermott. *En*
