

the 'packages' that are being developed, strictly designed to be attractive to the apeciator and television viewer, could well bring about changes in the very fabric of the sport. Time honoured events like the shot put and long jump could well be relegated to inter-club competitions or Area Championships and never grace the more celebrated and lucrative telegenic spectaculars No. Mrs. Worthington, there is no 'athletics career' in women's shot putting, so don't put your daughter in the circle.

Of course, the diminuition of certain field events is already well under way. Out of 25 IAAF Permit Meetings in 1983 only five included a women's shot put, and one of those was in China. Thirteen had a 100m hurdles and 19 a short sprint. The worst supported men's event was the hammer, closely followed by the discus and shot. Yet there were 20 men's high jumps and 22 pole vaults. And these meetings are run by men almost entirely for men, a point that Marea Hartman missed in her cogent and crudite pieces in the News of the World. Of the 477 events in those Permit Meetings, 68% were for men. In the three British meetings the ratio was almost identical.

Standards aren't improving either. In 1984 the top ten in British women's shot putting included javelin thrower Fatima Whitbread and heptathlete Judy Simpson, as well as the Veteran, Janis Kerr, and there was an alarming gap of 1.69m between fourth and fifth. The tenth best put was 14.37, only 0.67 better than it was eight years ago. In the men's event the situation is worse. In 1974 the tenth best putter achieved 16.47, the exact distance achieved by the 11th ranked man of 1983, the hammer thrower, Shaun Pickering.

But these are mere statistics. What many athletes in these events feel - in fact, know - is that they are the poor relations of track and field and that events like the shot put and the long jump are in Catch 22: they desperately need charismatic figures like Willie Banks and Geoff Capes to bring them out of the doldrums, but they are in too much of a desperate state for anyone to be attracted towards working at them.

Of course there is the other side of the coin. The most attractive events to the public are those where they know, almost as soon as the athlete. whether success or failure has been achieved the track events, the high jump, the pole vault and to a lesser extent the longer throws. In the shot and in the horizontal jumps the most exciting moments come when distances are shown on the scoreboards, which must detract from the events themselves. They are difficult to present, especially in programmes which are traditionally overcrowded. Mike Winch, at what proved to be the last of the Coca-Cola Meetings, put a special commentator in the p.a. box to cover the field events, but still had two or three going on at the same time and a track event every five minutes with a liberal number of presentations. Yet field events, with the right ingredients, can enthrall the

public as was proved back in 1981 when those great Soviet hammer throwers, Sedykh and Litvinov, came to Gateshead and gave a superb and memorable exhibition of their art. Our promoters do not seem to have learnt the lesson of that day, which was that it is better to stage a number of field events for at least an hour before the track commences.

There are dangerous paths upon which we can embark which could see the eventual demise of some of our traditional field events. What is now required is some careful thinking and planning to ensure that Mrs. Worthington can put her daughter in the circle with the knowledge that she will attract some attention, if not too many dollary.





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

Best Ever Cup Showing By Britain?

THE BIG challenge collectively for Britam's international athietes this season is the European Cup Final, to be staged in Moscow's Lenin Stadium on August 17th/18th. The signs are that Britain — if fielding the atrongest possible team — could produce its best ever all-round performance in this tournament by placing third in both the men's and women's competitions behind the Soviet and GDR powerhouses. The best UK showing thus far came about in 1977 when the men finished fourth and the women third, and in 1981 when it was the men's turn to place third and the women fourth.

The statistics which follow provide an admittedly rough and ready guide to what might happen in Moscow; they represent the best marks made in 1984 by the top ranked athlete from each of the participating countries. The situation in 1985 could be very different mone of the athletes listed have retired, been suspended or are out injured; others will no doubt be supplanted by their national team colleagues), but the figures do give some indication of each team's strengths and weaknesses and point to the many absorbing individual clashes which rould await us in Moscow.

The first two teams in each competition go on to the World Cup in Camberra (October 4th-6th), while other outstanding individuals can qualify for the Europe Select team.

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

Grand Prix Boost For Todd Bennett

THE first of the IAAF/Mobil Grand Prix meetings to be held in Europe, the Znamenskiy Memorial in Moscow on June 8th, was marked by the expected overall surge in standards compared to the two American meetings with only one event—the 200—failing to qualify for Grand Prix.

Todd Bennett's first outdoor 400m of the season proved to be successful, although he had been apprehensive on hearing heats were to be run in the morning. virtually a solo performance achieved when the weather was at its worst. The attendance over two days was a mere 7000.



Northern Championships

Derrick Brown Notches A Windy 7.95m

HUDDERSFIELD-BASED international Derrick Brown was awarded the Kingston-upon-Hull Coronation Trophy for the best field even performance, when the Northern Counties Championships were decided at the Moorways Athletics Stadium, Derby, on June 15th. In pleasant, suony weather, the 21-year-old Longwood Harrier made the most of the prevailing wind to smash the three-year-old record be, himself, set up at Hull, with all six jumps.

The record stood at 7.45m, and Brown, who is arriving hard to be Britain's number one, put together one of the best series of marks yet recorded by a British athlete in this country. He opened with 7.79m and followed with 7.73, 7.49, 7.59, 7.95 and 7.85, his best mark having a following wind of 3.30m/s. Brown had not intended to do the long jump, merely the sprints to sharpen his 'take-off' speed, but deleat in the 100m by Middlesbrough's bubbling 19-year-old Vince Jones by one scuth, resulted in his change of heart and he ended with the trophy the size of the VA Cup.

Jones, an instrument technician from Teesside, looked good winning the 100m from former champion Mark Towers of Sale and Brown, but after taking his 200m heat, he pulled out with a damaged shin. Haringey's Paul Dunn made the most of Inter-Counties champion Jones' absence from the 200, and scored in 21.7 at the tail end of the programme.

The field events, however, overshadowed the track performances, with five new meeting records — in the high jump, pole vault, long

jump, hammer and javelin.

Sale Harrier Phil McDonnell had an intriguing battle with defending champion and record holder. Alex Kruger of Liverpool Pembroke and both went over the 7tt barrier in the Championahips for the first time. Kruger added four centimetres to his own record with a clearance of 2.15m, but McDonnell did even better with a new CBP of 2.18m to take the title. Clubmate Andy Ashurur also hit the high spots with a new mark of 5.20m in the visib.

The record-breaking spree was triggered off from the first event when UK champion Dave Smith from Hull Spartan broke his own 12-month-old Northern Counties bear of 70.62m with a hammer opener of 71.40m. He threw even further before the competition ended, coming out the winner with 72.34. Smith, broad as a barndoor at 6.44 and 18.55 stones is cager to be the mumber one in Bruain and is well pleased with his

He not only raised the CBP of 71.32m set by Dave Sorrell ten years earlier at Blackburn, but improved his own best to 76.78m. 24 hours later at Coventry, he moved up to 77.16m and won again.

The only new track record was set by Wakefield's Alan Slack in the 400m. Liverpool's Mark Thomass was faster in the heats, but when it came to the final, Slack, running blind, outside him, left him trailing with a pleasing 46.3, by one second.

Two of the longest-standing marks in the book — Bob Birrell's 14.4 hurdles from 1961 and Arthur Rowe's shot mark of 18,81m from 1962 — remained unfouched. Gieen MacDonald of Bolton won the 'highs' in 15.0 into the wind from Loods City's Mark Johnson, whits Ian Lindley took the shot for the eighth successive year, with 16,00m.

Young Andy Abrahams of Gateshead, who was quite content to stroll through his heat of the 400m hurdles in 58.0, opened up in the final and his time of 52.3 gave him three-tenths to spare over the defending champion, Dave McCutcheon from Liverpool. The 3000m steeplechase crown went to Blackburn's Peter Banks for the first time, after recent wins in Northern League Division Two competition for his club. Craig Roberts from Kendal led at one stage, but Banks timed his effort better and pipped him by 9:04.9 to 9:06.7.

For excitement, the 5000m was the best race on the card and Stretford's international Karl Harrison successfully defended the title he won at Middlesbrough 12 months earlier. But it was only in the final straight on the last lap that the redhaired Harrison managed to edge in front of the up-and-coming Hallamshire. Harrier Thackery, who did most of the spade-work. The early leader was David Lowes from Chester-le-Street, but he was swallowed up by the chasing pack after the first mile or so. Thackery took over in front with eight laps to run and had to withstand pressure from young Cumbrian Paul Taylor, Martin McLoughlin and others. Gary Nagel looked dangerous and was still in contention with Thackery and Harrison at the bell, but down the back straight, however, they shook off the Tynesider and fought out the duel for the title. Harrison would not be denied in that final sprint, and edged clear by 1.2 seconds in

The 800 was also a thriller, with Frodaham's Colin Walker showing considerable resolve over the last lap to withstand a stern challenge from Middlesbrough's Tony Morrell. The winner

GDR: Amazing debut by Busch

Sabine Busch, the eighth fastest 400m flat runner of all-time at 49.24, opened her career as a 400m hurdler at Jena on June 12th . . with a 400m hurdler at Jena on June 12th . . with a GDR record of 53.82! Only two women have ever run faster. Margarita Ponomaryova (now Chronova) and Marina Stepanova of the USSR with 53.18 and 53.67 respectively. In her second attempt, in the GDR v USSR match in Erfurt, she clocked 53.93 and might have broken the world record had she not made mistakes at the last two barriers. If any woman is to break 53 seconds Sabine Busch — with her tremendous flat speed — is the one most likely to succeed.

That match (the USSR won the men's encounter 111-101, the GDR the women's 88-67) threw up any number of brilliant performances. On the first day (June 22nd) torrential rain flooded the track and yet Thomas Schonlebe set a GDR 400 record of 44-62. Ulf Timmermann shaped up as a potential shot world record breaker with a put of 22.08m (he has done 22.15 indoors), there was great javelin throwing by Uwe Hohn (96.90m) and Petra Felke (whose 74.94m has been bettered only by her own two recent world breaking (hrows), and Heike Drechsler won an epic long jump duel with Galina Chistyakova, 7 33 to 7.27m. Second day highlights included a world Junior triple jump record of 17.50m (wind: +0.Jm) by Volker Mat, a superb hammer

throwing display by Yuriy Sedykh, a GDR 4×400 relay record of 2:39.86 (with Schonlebe anchoring unpressed in 44.2), a 22.03 200 by Marita Koch and six discus throws over 70m by Galina Savinkova, who looks well capable of capturing the world record later this summer.



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David Smith — A Man For The 80s?

Eric M. Macintyre on Britain's hammer ace

IT'S A fair bet that David Smith will be the first Briton to throw the hammer over \$0 metres, but if he falls to do so, or is beaten by another to his goal, then one gets the impression that the big man will take it in his stride and seek a fresh challenge. For already in his career David has suffered a major disappointment and emerged

from it tougher and better than before.

Although he won the 1984 UK and AAA titles and was ranked third for the year, he was not selected for the Olympics, as Bob Weir made the team in what Mel Watman described in these pages as the "most contentious" omission. He still "can't put into words" the hurt which he felt and, in fact, nearly gave up the sport. A combination of family, fellow throwers and his coach, Max Jones, brought him out of this slough, and, as Max predicted in 'AW' last November, in 1985 he has been "all fired up to prove that not selecting him for LA was a mistake". A giant 6'4" and 19 stones frame leads one to expect an aggressive personality, yet David is truly a 'gentle giant', and a modest one at that. He began, as most athletes, in the sprints and then, at Maler Lambert High School in his native Hull, began to take the hammer seriously. He is grateful to those like Bill Britain, Pete Bateson and others, who nurtured good technique as his body grew. A 21st and then a fourth place in the English Schools Champs preceeded joining Hull Spartan AC on leaving school, and, a year later, he reamed up with National Coach Max Jones.

23-year-old David works full time as an electrician with British Petroleum, and he is full of praise for the generous help which they give him with time off. Visits to Max are precious, and leave little time for pleasant chat. "I see him for a limited time every couple of weeks and he gives you it straight, concentrating on the main points". Video has been a great boon, and when I spoke to them recently at a meeting, they were off to find a corner and view the night's efforts. The years with Max have seen a four to five metres improvement each year until David won this year's UK event with 77.04m. This brings him ever nearer the 80m., which his idol Yuriy Sedykh throws regularly and "apparently so easily".

Max Junes has been constantly surprised and delighted by his protege. He is clearly a late developer and he feels that he might be the next Geoff Capes and thus a medallist at a major Games. Targets have had to be adjusted from AAA Junior titles and a 12th place in the European Juniors because David has done his work so well. He himself feels that if he stays free

of injury, then the 80m throw will come in time. whether it be this or next year. With it, he feels, will also come recognition of the type which throwers have to battle for compared to their track brethren. He mentions the efforts of Sanderson, Whithread and Ottley and hopes to follow them into a limelight built on reaching world class. If, or more probably when, he does, it will be unlikely to alter the outlook of this unassuming man from Humberside. With a father who has run the New York Marathon and the 43 miles Lyke Wake Run across the Yorkshire Moors in his fifties, plus the sound advice of Man Jones, David has too much good sense in himself and from around him to set the matter out of proportion. Besides, there would still be next season, and another four to five metres would make even Sedykh seem less invincible.

Following that unfortunate lapse in the march against the GDR, Dave Smith threw 73.90m behind Yuriy Sedykh (82.14) and Declan Hegarty (76.40) in Cork on July 9th and four days after that, at these Championships, he landed the finest throw of his career to date. It came in the fourth round, at which stage he led with 74,66 shead of Martin Girvan (72.76), Matt Mileham (72.34) and Hegarty (72.16). Smith's great throw was measured at 77.30, which not only smashed Chris Black's championship best of 75.40, but also improved on his own English record of 77.04. In the annals of UK hammer throwing, only Northern Ireland's Girvan (77,54) has surpassed that. Hegarity replied with 76,02 for second place. while Girvan - just starting to get back to form after injury - raised his season's best to 73.42. It was a good day for British hammer throwing as three topped 72m and Paul Head, just nursed 20, improved to 69.02 and Stewart Rogerson to 64.28.

Nine Olympic gold medallists will be in action -Joaquim Cruz, Seb Coe, Dietmar Mogenburg, Al Joyner, Juha Tiainen, Benita Fitzgerald-Brown, Glynis Nunn and Tessa Sanderson, plus a host of other world class athletes. Seb Coe is a definite starter in the 1500, and depending on what happened in Nice on Tuesday, he should line up alongside Steve Cram. Said Coe: "I am pleased to confirm that I will be running in the 1500 at the Peugeot Talbot Games on Friday in what looks to be a tremendous event. If Steve Cram is able to run after his performance in Nice, then we will have a head to head race. Should he not be in the field, then I am committed to running a very fast time. I have been misquoted as far as the virus is concerned. I did have a throat injection in Birmingham and, ironically, some calf trouble afterwards, which meant that I had two weeks of sporadic training. I did not run the Kodak AAA Champs because I felt I needed the training more than the racing, and I subsequently trained very hard over last weekend because I want to give it a go this weekend". Others in the 1500 field include Steve Scott and Mike Hillardt.

There will be a vast array of middle distance talent on show in the various races over the two days. The 800 features Olympic champion Cruz, bronze medallist Earl Jones, Jose-Luis Barbosa and Edwin Koech. The mile includes John Walker, while the 3000 offers Sydney Marce, Dave Lewis, Tim Hutchings and Paul Davies-Hale. The 400 sees another Olympic standard line-up with Bert Cameron, Willie Caldwell, Darren Clark, Darrell Robinson, Derek Redmond, Todd Bennett and Kriss Akabusi. There will be an 'A' and 'B' race in this event, with Grand Prix points being awarded according to times.

The billed highlight of the women's events is, of course, the Slaney-Budd clash on the Saturday and also in the line-up will be Budd's conqueror in Antrim, Darlene Beckford, Olympic bronze medallist Lynne Williams, Ingrid Kristiansen and

Chris Boxer.

The field events will be equally as exciting, with the top names being world record holders, Sergey Bubka, Willie Banka Yurty Sedykh and Lyudmila Andonova. Joining Bubka in the vault will be Alexandr Krupskiy, Mike Tully and AAA champion Kory Tarpenning, while Juha Tiainen, David Smith, Martin Girvan and Declan Hegarty will aspire to give the old campaigner problems in the hammer. Tamara Bykova and Debbie Brill join Andonova in the women's high jump.

Next Tuesday (July 21rd) many of the Peugeot Talbot names will be appearing in the Dairy Crest Games at Meadowbank. Cruz and Cram should clash in the 800, with Steve Ovett taking on John Walker in the mile. Withe Banks, Bubkn, Bykova and Sedykh will be in action in their respective events, while Zola Budd again clashes with Chris Boxer and Darlene Bockford, this time in the

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
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Zhirova's Soviet colleagues, the incomparable Seriev Buhka and Yuriy Sedykh, put on great demonstrations. Sedykh produced another of his amazingly consistent series (80.76, 81.82, 82.56, 81.50, 81.04, 82.70), but Bubka was rather more errant. Fre cleared 5.60m first time, but needed the full quota of vaults to make 5.80, even then clipping the bar at the final attempt. To the delight of spectators, he had the bar raised to the world record height of 6.02 (it was at the same meeting last year that he set a record of 5.90) and had a reasonable shot at his third attempt.

There were good performances also in the other two field events. Grand Prix leader Einar Vilhjalmsson, a somewhat ponderous left hander who gets results, threw the javelin #9.06m in the third round to defeat Dave Ottley, but it was close. Onley's series: 85.30, 80.72, 84.96, 84.88. 88.90, 79.90. Mike Hill, the AAA runner-up, raised his ph for the second week running - this time all the way from 79.56 to 82,30. With John Herbert in subdued form, there was no British challenge on this occasion to Willie Banks (fashion note: pink shorts this time!) who went just over 17m on three attempts to defeat Olympic: champion Al Joyner. Another Olympic medallist. Thomas Jefferson, charged from last to first along the straight in the 200 in which Ade Mafe way a good second. The 110 hurdles was a fine race too, as less than a metre separated an in-form Wilbert Greaves (equalling the UK legal season's best of 13.72) in fourth place from winner Mark McKoy. Jon Ridgeon didn't have a good race, but fellow 18-year-old Colin Jackson reduced his best time to 13.89.



Foreign Stars Shine Brightly In Cork

SYDNEY MARBE, Mary Staney, Yuri Sedykh and Ray Flynn stole the imelight at the Cork City Sports on July 9th. However, their respective victories were only the highlights of a magnificent oight's sport, in which the setion never flagged

from start to finish.

This year, Cork, the second largest city in treland, is celebrating its 800th anniversary, and the organisers made a special effort to attract top class athletes. Their efforts were rewarded with an array of international stars from the United States and Europe, admirably supplemented by a fine collection of the top Irish stars and a large contingent of Marcus O'Sullivan's colleagues at Villanova University. There was also, of course, a serong team of British athletes, including Mike McLeod and Ainsley Bennett, both of whom are now areast favourities with the crowd.

Having put the meeting on the map by setting a world record last year. Yuri Sedykh returned to Carle to win the hammer again. His throw of \$2.14m was well outside his world record, but his presence inspired the much abused Decian Regarty, who silenced his many critics by familing second with an Irish record throw of

76.40, with Dave Smith third.

Mary Statey began ner European tour with a gun-to-tape victory in the 800m. At the bell, only the aspiring Kirsty McDermott and Olympic linafist Caroline O'Shea were in contention. Weakened by a recent flu virus, Caroline was unable to mount a final challenge, but Kirsty produced a great run to draw level in the straight, only to see Mary, who obviously reliables a close struggle, pull out an extra spurt to win in 1:57.68.

in the night's centre piece, the Harp Lager Mile, Ireland's mile hero, Eamonn Coghlan, clearly confirmed recent rumours that he was below his best by struggling home in eighth place outside four minutes. However, the race turned up two heirs apparent to his primacy in Irish in Marcus O'Sullivan and Enda Fitzpatrick. The whole field ignored the pacemaker, Randy Stephens, who ran the first half mile in 1:53.92, with Marce, O'Sullivan, John Walker and Thomas Wessinghage leading the pack. At the bell, it lay between Maree, O'Sullivan and Walker, The New Zealander gave every hope of pulling off a surprise before faltering at 200m, leaving the local boy, O'Sullivan, to chase Marce, who dismissed his challenge down the final straight to win in 3:52.14. Back behind the top three, young Enda Fitzpatrick ran a brilliant race to take sixth in 3:56.36, a magnificant performance for a lad in his first year as a Senior and surely the first of many sub-fours to come.

Ray Flynn eventually won the 5000m with case. However, the race was a splendid one, with athletes suddenly surging up to take the lead and several tooking tikely winners until Flynn's mile pace proved decisive. Ireland's John Treacy led for three laps, before Tim Hutchings took over. Then Julian Gomer and Steve Harris went on and dictated matters, with Flynn always lying handy. Hutchings regained the lead at the bell, ahead of Mike McLeod and Flynn, but Flynn made his move past Hutchings at 300m and was never going to be caught by McLeod, who took second in the straight.

If seemed unlikely that the excitement of the women's 800m could be surpassed, but the men's 800m did just that, with John Marshall and the pacemaker, Johnny Gray, neck and neck on the last lap: Gray just holding out to the line. The women's 2000m was another exciting affair. Carol Haigh cut out most of the early running but could not last the pace, and at the boil Ireland's Monica Joyce led from Carol Bradford and Angels Tooby. Bradford and Joyce then indulged in a fierce duel. Monica was just having the best of it in the straight when Angels Tooby switched to the third lane and got up to win in the last 30 metres.

Birchfield Harriers had a great night, with Auton Moore, Lincoln Asquith, Ena Waldo and Judy Simpson all enjoying good wins. Other Irish highlights of the night were a runaway win for Northern Ireland's Sean McCann in the Junior 3000m, and a most promising win in the women's 400m for Michelle Walsh, better known

as a sprinter.

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
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European Cup Final Preview

"WE'LL BE doing very well", said BAAB Director of Coaching Frank Dick, if the British men's and women's teams duplicate their fourth places of 1983 when the European Cup Bruno-Zanfi is staged in Moscow this weekend. As usual the GDR and USSR are expected to dominate tile proceedings, although the Federal Republic of Germany could be a group challenger in the men's competition.

The British men, fielding the strongest possible team (although Tom McKean has had to come in for the injured Seb Coc at 800), stands a good chance of securing fourth place, but the women have a much tougher task and, as Dick has pointed out, "as little as 10 points could separate

fourth from seventh*

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as Zuliani pipped him in 45.26. It left the home crowd reasonably happy, which was more than could be said for Cameron at the medal ceremony, for he refused to shake hands with the Italian, and that understandably didn't go down too well with the volatile home crowd. Hartmut Weber finished a disappointing fourth, and after a bright start Hassan could manage only seventh.

Whatever the quality of the 400m, it was almost nothing compared with that of the metric mile, as the world record holder, Steve Ovett, faced up to John Walker, Mike Boit, Olaf Beyer and Sydney Marce. Despite the talent on show, they were to find Ovett too much to handle in the finishing straight. Maree took on the early pace and led through 800m in 1:57.70, and after 900m Boit hit the front in a bid to take the sting out of Ovett's kick. Though the pace increased, the tactically aware Ovett was not in any trouble. Boit stayed ahead and went through 200m in 2:54.93, and though he still led with 200m to go that situation was not to last; for with 80m left Ovett's kick left Boit and the rest chasing silver. Having broken the field with one burst, he coasted in for the last 20m and finished in 3:34.95 — there was no doubting his place in the annals of history. Hardly surprisingly, Boit faded badly in the finishing stretch and he had to look on helplessly as first Beyer, and then Walker, went past him. Though the New Zealander got the better of Beyer with his last two strides, it was totally overshadowed by the supremacy of an Englishman called Ovett.

Controversial steeplechase — Henry Marsh disqualified

Any hopes that the Americans had of retaining the men's trophy just blew up into the Roman skies when Henry Marsh, despite coming through in first place in the steeplechase, was to find himself disqualified. As a consequence the Americans got no points. The opening part of the race was fairly tame, and as the Pole, Boguslaw Maminski, led through the first kilometre, by the second, Mariano Scartezzini, the Italian, had taken over. As they entered the penultimate lap the pace had quickened noticeably, and Eshetu Tura, the Ethiopian, was the first to crack. As they came to the bell Maminski led from the Japanese, Masanari Shintaku, with Marsh and the Italian just a stride behind. It was then that all the excitement came about and Scartezzini, who had won the European Cup so convincingly in Zagreb, adopted the same tactics and broke for home with just 200m to go. But just as he came to the final barrier he inexplicably hesitated and all was lost. It was at the final water jump, though, that all the controversy had started. Preparing for his renowned 'last charge', Marsh found that he had to pass the East German, Ralf Ponitzsch, on the inside . . . and there just wasn't enough room. As a consequence he had to leave the track and go

round the barrier. As he came back onto the trace he went on to pass Maminush and finish in first place. Once all the protests were over Marsh was adjudged to have been in the wrong and was disqualified and the victory was given to Maminuski who had finished in 8:19.89 — 0.04 ahead of the Italian. With the Americans having further problems in the discus, any hopes of winning the World Cup disappeared.

The 4 × 100m relay was just to add to the Americans' problems, for though they had the six fastest times of the year, two of the top squad were injured, and it was going to be hard enough anyway against the Europeans, represented en masse, by the fine Polish squad of Kryzsztof Zwolinski, Zenon Licznerski, Lech Dunecki and Marian Woronin; whilst the GDR, anchored by Frank Emmelmann, would also be a potent threat. Though Lattany had quite a good start, the second man, Anthony Ketchup - one of the replacements - had a had start to his leg and from that moment on Licznercki was to give the Europeans a lead they were not to relinquish. Though Floyd can a brilliant third leg in 9.20, Woronin took his squad safely across the line in 38.73, finishing ahead of the GDR, for whom Emmelmann had run a fine anchor leg to snatch second spot. For all the difference a full strength American squad would have made, the Poles had given a lesson to the rest on all that was good in relay running - they were well worth their win.

The distillusionment of the US ream continued in the field, and in the discus in particular, where the season's leading thrower, John Powell, failed to turn up. It appeared that he was in Norway on holiday but had indicated that he would be there - he main't. By the time the US realised that he wasn't going to be there and tried to replace him with Brian Oldfield, it was too late, as the referee refused to let him in. The competition itself was very close, and the Cuban, Luis Delis, who had an opening throw of 64.88m held on to it until the fourth round, when the GDR's European Cup winner. Armin Lemme, threw 66,26m to take the lead. The Cuban retorted with a fine 65.96m in the same round, subsequently equalling Lemme's 66,26m in the next, though sadly for him it was no longer good enough as Lemme, throwing before him in the same round, had reached out to 66,38m. With it was to go the World Cup title.

Though the GDR's Roland Stenk could finish only seventh in the harmer there was no real damage done, as Dave McKenzie of the States could finish only two places above him. The competition was beset by heavy showers, and that made the underfoot conditions difficult for all the throwers. Only three of them could go over 68m, and from Yuri Sedykh's opening throw of 77.42m, the other two Europeans — Karl Hans Riehm and Gian Paolo Orlando — were simply fighting it out for the silver. Riehm was well clear of the Italian and his 75.60m in the fourth round was the closest that anyone got to Sedykh. The

Soviet left no one in any doubt as to his rotal superiority, and as he went over 75m on four occasions, that, in itself was proof of his mastery.

the torrential rain that dienched the crympic stadium also had its effect on the pole vault. causing it to be stopped for an hour mid-way through the competition. On resumption, though the Soviet, Konstantin Volkov, failed on his initial attempt at 5.30m, he went over second try and from then on the competition was really between himself and the Frenchman, Jean-Michel Bellot. It finally did come down to the pair of them after Billy Ofsen failed at 5.50, and as Bellot needed a second attempt, at 5.55m. Volkov cleared first time. As the Soviet succeeded on his initial try at 5.65m Bellot had a crucial fuilure, and was forced to take his remaining two vaults at 5,70m. Though he was not successful, he had done enough to secure second place. Volkov was having a fine competition and despite needing a second attempt went on to clear as 5,70m, finishing the competition with two attempts at the new world record height of 5.82. He had come a long way tince Montreal in '79.

The triple jump was one of the showpiece events of the meeting and certainly lived up to its billing, helped by the presence of well known names such as de Joso Carlos de Oliveira, Willie Banks, Jaak Uudmas and Bela Bakosi, though the meeting was also to see the emergence of a new star in the Chinese, Zhu Zhen-xian, Though Olympic champion Ludmae jumped 16.66m in the opening round, it was the double World Cup winner, de Oliveira of Brazil, who took the lead with 16.90m. As the Soviet loss second place to Bakosi in round two, Zhu Zhen-xian took the lead in round three with a leap of 16.97m and increased it further with 17.14m in the next round. But it was only to be for a brief spell, for de Obveira in the same round cleared a magnificent 17.37m to take the lead again. The Brazilian then fouled his last two jumps and Zhu, with his final effort, made a magnificent attempt to claim the crown with a jump of 17.34m, falling a mere 3cm short of the Brazilian's fourth round effort. It was enough to put Zhu sixth on the all-time list, and

Triple Success For Carl Lewis

CARL Lewis won three events in the USA USSR v Japan match in Tokyo on September 21s /22nd, helping the Americans to a 114-104 victory in the men's match. However, the Soviet women were so dominant (117-50) that the USSR friumped by a wide margin (221-164) on combined acores. Of the 37 events, 24 were won by Soviet athletes.

Before 30,000 spectators on the first day, Lewis heat Harvey Glance by a metre in 10.12 and then joined Glance, Kirk Baptiste and Calvin Smith in winning the 4 × 100 relay in 38.28. Next day, watched by 40,000, Lewis jumped 8.28m. "I had a difficult day", he commented. "It was cold and raining, but it was a good jump for me. I've only jumped once since April". A hamstring injury.

statained on May Isih, had plagued Lewis for most of the summer.

World record holder Willie Banks beat Oles Protsenko with a triple jump of 17.10m, making up for his loss to Protsenko the last time they met in May. Sergey Bubka found 5.70m sufficed for victory in the pole vault. "I was in top condition, but the wind and the rain were just in the way" he aid effer missing at a world record 6.01. The only world record holder to be upset was Yuriy Sedykh, who finished second to countryman Juri

FINLAND: Hammer thrower took steroids

Another Finnish athlete has been eaught uting drugs. The latest culprit in Hannu Polvi, a 37-year-old hammer thrower whose sample in the Finnish Champiombips in Labti in August was found to include traces of anabolic steroids. The reu result was made public on September 12th.

In an open letter to the Finnish Press, Polvi surprisingly stated that his offence had been "partly intentional, a protest against the double standards in the sport." Polvi, who originally had used steroids to heal his trijured knee some time ago, said he was "disguisted with the politicians in Iriland taking control of the moral aspects in sport." He did not admit having done anything liceal — just having broken the rules of an organisation. Polvi, three-times national record holder in the late 1970s, finished third in Lahri with 68.82m, Having thrown his personal best of 24.74 in 1982, he was already on the brink of retirement arrway.

In the Finnish Champsomhips all the medalling in every event (more than 100 athletes) were rested by the Finnish Federation. During the last 12 months, more than 300 track and field athletes have been tested in Finland, which has cost SUL.



Neither did 1, but the later edition of this fascusting publication does let that number of different national records for the men's 100m. ranging from 9.93 for the USA (Calvin Smith) to 12.46 for Guam (Six Limehouse). There are 149 entires for the marathum, headed by Steve Jones' 2:08:05 (these has are as at 31.12.84), with Peter Napoleon of the Pederated States of Microness bringing up the year with his 3:46:38. The particular technical problems of the nammer are underlined by the fact than 'only' 125 countries boast a record: from 86,34m by Yuriy Sedyich (USSR) down to 20.44m by Ronald Hoyre of Barbados - a distance which has been bettered by the shot putters of 20 nations. If a good to see women's annetics occoming universally accepted: there are 172 countries included in the 100m list ranging from 10.76 by Evelya Ashford (USA) to 15.41 by H. Farnana of Libva.

Book Reviews

Not much hands still in millenes, and it's instructive to compare ourrent national records with those listed in previous editions of this book. Take the women's 400m hurdles. Neither Morocco nor India even possessed a national record for the event when the 1978 edition was published The 1981 version listed 58.82 for Fatiena et Faquir of Mosocco (29th best of the 82 national records quoted) and 62.09 for Mary Joseph Angel of India (51st). Now we find that Olympic champion Nawal el Montavakit ranks fourth of 106 records at 34.6) with P. T. Licha. tenth # 15.42. Conversely, such a long standing UK record as Lynn Davier # 23m long jump continues to slip down the runkings. At the time is wax made in 1968, only the USA and USSR boasied a better national record; now there are 13 superior marks. Still, lat's hope Lynn's leap doesn't last as long as two former world records. Peter O'Connor's 7.6f in 1901 and Sylvio Cator's 7.93 in 1928 - which still stand on the Irish and Haitian records respectively!

Occasionally records are discarded when further information comes to light. The women's 400 and 800m records for South Korea were listed in the previous edition as 54.53 and 2:06.1 by Chang Boong Soon, set in Tokyo in 1979. However, Chang Boong Soon "was declared a man later on", notes the current edition, and those marks have been deleted. Likewise, a 46-48m javalin throw by Karnah Sockarta of Indonesia in 1961 is now discounted.

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'Status Quo' Restored In The Hammer

Richard Hymons looks at the career of Juri Tamm

UNTIL THE advent of Yuriy Sedykh and Sergey Litvinov, the hammer had always been considered as an event which necessifated a lengthy apprenticeship before major success could be achieved. Now, with the emergence of Juri Tamm as the world's number one thrower, the 'status quo' has been restored.

Born in Parnu, Estonia on February 5th, 1957. Tamm competed in a wide variety of sports before settling on athletics. His father, August, had been a gymnast and pole vaulter in the 1930s, jumping 3.10m in 1934; a beight which doesn't sound impressive until you realise that Tamm Sor, had

only one arm!

At the age of 17, Tamm threw the 7.26kg implement 49.16m, and improved the following year to 54.76. At that point his technique was less than impressive, but, uported by Olympke champion Anatoliy Bondarchuk, Tamm was asked to go to Kiev to study sports education, and train with the group of throwers under the guidance of Bondarchuk. Results come almost immediately, with an increment of nine metres to 66.86, a mark which removed him from the level of club athlete to eighth on the world Junior fist for the year. Progress from that point was steady—72.44 in 1977 for 33rd on the world list, 74.58 (16th) in 1978, and 75.18 the next year (eq. 19th), a season which featured his first major domestic win, 72.42 at Tbilisi in September at the Soviet Cup (national club championship).

Just as his Junior best had improved markedly in Olympic year, so it was in 1980. The benefits of being coached by Bondarchuk, and training alongside Yuriy Sedykh, began to show through. A personal best of 76.44 in February at Sochi was followed by 77.10 at Lesendre in April. These

marks tended in be overlooked, if only because Sergey Litvinov, Igor Nikulin and Boris Zaychuk were all over 78m by that stage of the season, with Sedykh preparing for later competitions. Sedykh chose to open his summer campaign at Leselidze. expecting to receive a serious battle from Litvinov, and instead was given the fright of his life by Tamm! Sedykh opened with 78.30, but was beaded by Tamm's pb of 78.82 and Litvinov's 78.94. In the second round, Sedykh improved to 79.60, but was opstaged by Tamm's 79.70. Round three saw fireworks, as Sedykh whirled the hammer to 80.38, just 6cm past Karl-Hans Richm's world record. It was the briefest world record in the history of the event, as Tamm replied a couple of minutes later with \$0.46. Sedykh, stung, took the record back two rounds later with 80.64, but it was Tamm who was the sensation, having sumped from 16th to second on the all-time list in the space of one competition. With five throwers over 80m in 1980, and Sedykh and Litvinov virtually guaranteed Olympic berths. a major effort wax required to take the one remaining slot. The Znamenskiy Memorial Meeting provided the deciding result, as Tamm produced his second 80m throw, 80.40, to beat both Litvinov (79.86), and Sedykh (78.96). When it came to the Games, the positions were reversed. with Tamm gaining a satisfying bronze medal with 75.96, behind Sedykh's world record of \$1.80, and Litvinov's 80.64.

Two lean seasons followed, with beats of 77.26 and 74.82, but 1983 saw a resurgence, with a best of 79.18 (though this was only good for fifth place at Leselidze on May 21st), supported with wins in the World Student Games in Edmonton (76.82) and in Birmingham in the UK-USSR match

(76.38). It was on trips like these that Tamm, a good linguist, taught himself English(!) and while his speech is a little faltering, his grasp of the language is good, to add to his fluency in Finnish and, of course, Russian. Russian is mandatory in school in Estonia, but not all Estonians speak the language with enthusiasm, but Tamm, resident in kiev for ten years, and married to a Ukranian, speaks both Russian and Ukrainian as well as his own tongue.

The solid base of marriage, together with the advert of a daughter (in 1983), has helped Tamm in his athletics career. His throwing showed a marked improvement in 1984, although he was again overshadowed by Sedykh. Nevertheless, he produced six competitive marks over 80m, five of which exceeded his previous best, culminating in his current pb of 84.40 at Banaka Bystrica in Czechoslovakia on September 9th.

A solid winter's training, which included using classical martic to enhance his rhythm, ensured that 1985 would be fruitful, and the tall (1.93m) and powerful (123kg) Estonian has been the model of consistency, his one lapse coming in the Soviet Championships, where the qualifying round was dispensed with, despite 19 competitors being present. "There was more than an hour between throws, and I just didn't warm up enough" he said two days later in Budapest, where he ensured his place on the European Cup team with the finest display of throwing seen all season. A winning throw of \$4.08 was backed up by four other marks beyond 83m, a distance reached by no other thrower in 1985. Victories in the World and European Cups, allied with 11 competitions beyond 81m, guarantee him the number one runking in the world.

So how much longer will Tamm throw. "At least until 1988", which leaves no doubt as to his ambitions. Bigger than Sedykb, and stronger than Lixtnov, Tamm may well emulate his training partner's success in World Championship and

Olympic competition.

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

relating to athletics, the report relating to sport's major problems as:

(a) More indoor training centres

are urgently required.

(b) Financial support is needed for athlete/coach contracts.

(c) Better sports medical support is needed.

(d) Greater emphasis needed to develop talent in inner city areas.

(e) Disciplining the athletes to a programme of key preparation competitions as opposed to an income-related programme.

(f) The administrative structure within the sport is complicated. The impression gained by the Review Group was that there was little urgency over unification particularly on the part of the AAA (and indeed the Women's AAA)".

Among the sport's major assets was that "it has a highly developed schools, coaching and club structure which has been successful in identifying talent and developing it to high competitive standards". At the 1984 Olympics, 16 medals were won and 29 athletes reached the last eight in their events. The BAAB's stated targets for the 1988 Games are for ten medals and for 20 athletes to reach the last eight - on the basis that all IOC member countries will compete in Seoul.
