International Meeting Madrid 9th June

DANNY HARRIS and Roger Kingdom ended their first sortie into Europe in much the same way they left last season, winning, Paul Larkins reports.

There was, however, a few minor differences to last season. Harris for one looked a little vulnerable last year whereas Kingdom most definitely did not. This time it was the one lap hurdler who won as he pleased in a fast 47.77, while the high hurdler, Kingdom, was pushed all the way to the line by ex San Francisco footballer Renaldo Nehemiah, and more importantly the world record holder before Kingdom. The Olympic champion ran a very ordinary 13.60, admittedly into a strong breeze, but Colin Jackson must surely take heart from this result.

It was a day for the old men. Nehemiah enjoyed a brief moment of glory, finishing second, but Bert Cameron, the 1983 world champion went one better, winning easily in a fine time of 45.38. He had expected a strong challenge from 44.22 second man Roberto Hernandez, but the Cuban failed to show up, complaining of a slight strain.

Fellow Cuban one lappper Ana Quirot took the 400 metres. Elsewhere on the track Ibrahim Boutayeb, the Olympic 10,000 champion won the 3,000 metres in relaxed style. Cyrille Laventure of France put in a 2:30 second kilometre sorting out the field that included Peter Koech, the world steeplechase record holder. Boutayeb, however, covered that move and sprinted away in the final straight glancing over his shoulder several times.

Patrik Sjöberg showed that he is returning to something like his old form by winning the high jump with a third time clearance at 2.30. He tried 2.35 once, but never got close, calling it a day at one attempt.

Little known Kenyan Stefan Ole-Mara ran a smooth race in the 800 metres. He easily won in a swift 1:45.35, not bad for someone who thought he was in the mile until getting to the track. The Kenyan electric worker, who boasts a best of 1:44.3 at altitude, now heads off to Frankfurt to base himself in Europe for most of the summer. Look to him to do a "Robert Kibet" somewhere this season and produce a really fast time.

IAAF/Mobil Grand Prix Znamensky Memorial Meeting Moscow, 10th June

THE traditional Soviet strength events—the triple jump and the hammer—provided the outstanding moments of the third IAAF/Mobil Grand Prix meeting of the season on Sunday.

Oleg Protosenko produced the world's best jump of 1990 with a leap of 17.75 metres to lead four athletes beyond 17 metres. Andrey Abduvaliyev eclipsed the USSR's top thrower of 1989, Igor Astapovich, and overshadowed the first confrontation of Yuriy Sedykh and Sergey Litvinov since the Seoul Olympic final with a superb throw of 83.16m. All four throwers exceeded 80 metres.

Natalya Artyomova ran 4:02.53 in the 1,500 metres, the best mark outdoors this year, with Hasiba Bulmerka setting an African record with 4:05.02 in fourth place. Olga Nazarova produced the second fastest 400 metres of the year—50.40—in beating a strong Soviet field, while Natalya Grigoryeva ran the fastest time of the year in the 100 metres hurdles clocking 12.62.

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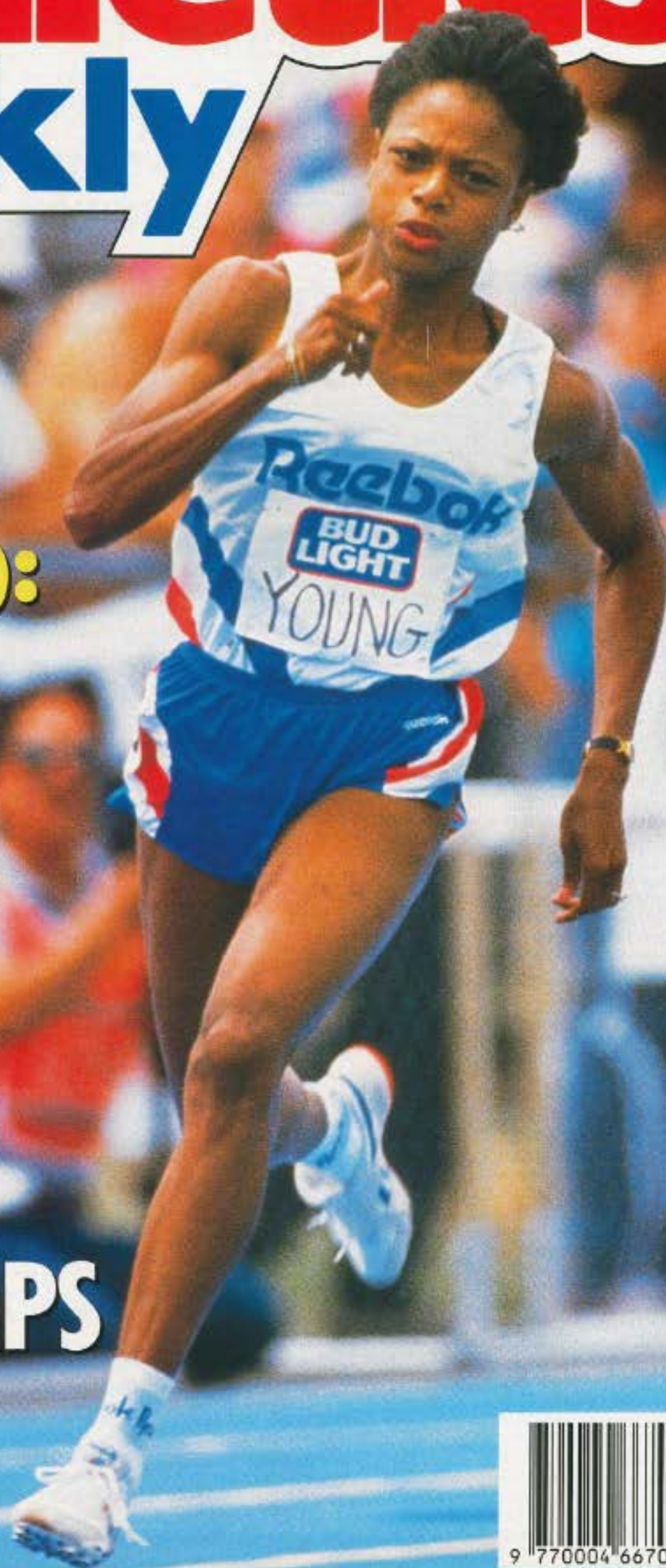

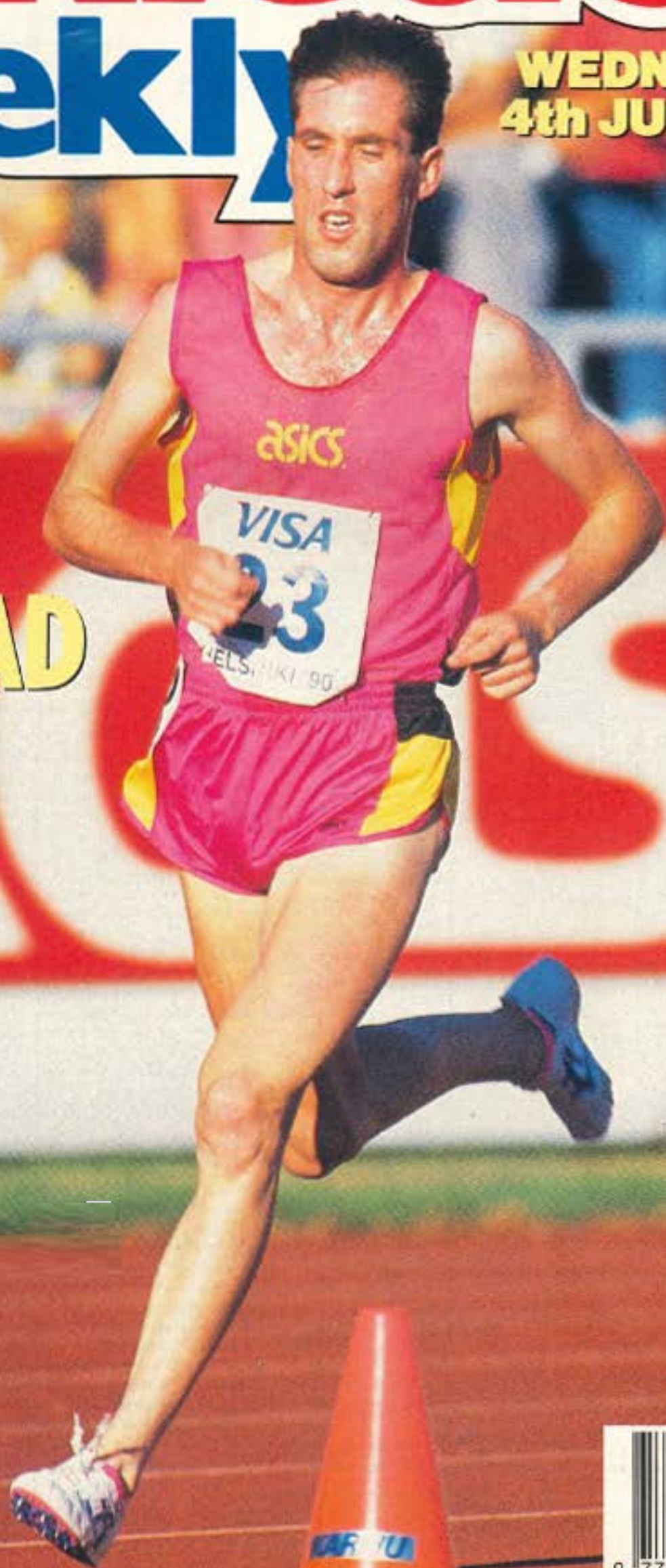

Stepping out of the shadow

IT OFTEN happens that a brilliant junior athlete can overshadow an exciting prospect in the same event and this season this has happened in the men's high jump where Brendan Reilly has stolen all the headlines and Liverpool's Steve Smith has been relegated to the small print. At only 17 years and two months, Smith has cleared 2.20m which, in world terms, is just about top of the class and has the luxury of having three full seasons as a junior whereas Brendan Reilly, six months his senior, has only two years.

In Helsinki, at the GB v Finland fixture, I was impressed by his clearance of 2.15m when his best then stood at 2.16m - but his coach Mike Holmes says he has always been a good competitor. Holmes is the National Junior Combined Events Coach and his all-round training approach has made the 6ft 1in Smith into a useful all-round athlete, a the 7.21m long jump immediately prior to the 2.20m high jump testifies. Starting with an English Schools' title in 1987 (1.84) Smith has progressed smoothly to 1.99 in 1988, 2.10 in 1989 and now to 2.20 and certainly the Liverpool schoolboy is worth watching out for.

Hammering home

BARRY WILLIAMS, the former British record-holder (73.86m) in the hammer, recently spent two weeks at a Soviet training camp at the Black Sea. The camp was open all year round and exclusively for athletics. Athletes came with their full-time coaches. Full-time is a key factor in the Soviet Union and their successes are based upon having thousands of full-time athletes and coaches.

Athletes become full-time when they achieve Master of Sports status which in hammer equates with around 69 metres (70 athletes). Full-time coaches abound, with the city of Volgograd alone having six

full-time hammer coaches. It becomes Williams why that with all these inbuilt advantages they are not more successful and that Britain could defeat them in Gateshead last year. The conclusion was that for the majority of them, athletics became "just a job" and the vital spark that converts the good into the great was missing.

Coaches appeared to be a very knowledgeable and dedicated bunch and they carried high status in the sport, top coaches being paid three times the average wage, with the very elite (eg Bondarchuk) five times. Facilities were accessible but were very basic with the few machines that existed being broken and in decay.

For the future Williams is sure that the Soviets have found a successor to Sedykh and Litvinov in Andrey Abduvaliyev who recently threw 83.48m. The former European Junior Champion (1985) is both strong (170kg power clean) and athletic (3.30m standing long jump) enough to become the best in the world.

For those girls wondering what the standards of women's hammer will be when it is finally introduced by the IAAF, they should take heed of the fact that eight women hammer throwers were at the training camp and their distances varied between 53 and 62 metres and, according to Williams, all exhibited excellent technique. Don't look for soft medals in women's hammer - 70 metres plus will be the order of the day!

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Doherty turns

IT WAS in Helsinki that Emil Zatopek fired the imagination of the Olympic crowd by winning all three distance races at the 1952 Games. Appropriately, it was once again the distance running that provided most of the excitement in what was otherwise a somewhat lacklustre Grand Prix meeting.

Until John Doherty, the American-based Irishman, stepped on the track there had been little to shout about. The racing had been fairly good, but nothing to get too enthusiastic about. But the Finns love distance running, and once the 5,000 metres got underway, the rhythmic clapping in time with the runners' feet began, and so the excitement level in the massive Olympic Stadium was raised a notch.

Doherty's fellow Irishman, Paul Donovan, a 13:24 man, carved out the early pace, passing one kilometre in 2:36 and 2,000 metres in 5:15. Doherty and the Olympic champion, Brahim Boutayeb, followed at one-stride intervals with the rest of the field strung out in Indian file. When Donovan dropped out after five laps, Doherty was not about to let the pace drop and he pushed on to 3,000 metres in 7:56.1, gradually turning the screws.

The Irishman's hard work put the pressure on the Moroccan to such effect that when the Norwegian Are Nakkim passed Boutayeb, he began to look in trouble, and eventually dropped out with three to go, feeling the pace. One lap later, Nakkim too was gone, leaving Doherty to run out an easy winner in the excellent time of 13:15.28, the fastest in the world this season and only just short of his best of 13:15.09, which he ran last year.

In the women's 10,000 metres, Viorica Ghica did a similar demolition job on the field. Spurred on by the crowd, she clocked 31:18.18, another fastest time of the year. The former East, now West, German, Uta Pippig, got revenge on Jill Hunter by beating her for the runner-up spot. Hunter beat her on the roads in America, but couldn't produce that kind of form on this occasion as she felt somewhat the worse for wear from a slight stomach bug.

Sally Gunnell showed that she has continued to progress after the Commonwealth Games with an emphatic 56.06 sec 400-metre hurdles victory. True, it was a field that she was expected to handle with ease and that's exactly what she did, leading to the first hurdle. She looked strong up the home straight and in slightly warmer, less windy conditions, should run

considerably faster.

The other British hurdler running should have been David Nelson, but the Sunday before the Helsinki meeting he ran into the window of the commentary box at a small meeting in Lapinlahti, north Finland. Nelson dipped for the line in a race which he lost by 0.01sec, but instead of pulling up as usual, could not keep his balance and continued on, shoulder-first into the window. After more than a dozen stitches and a quick visit to the hospital he was put on the first plane home.

Kevin McKay and Brian Whittle, the other Britons running in Helsinki, both wound up fourth, one pleased and one not. Whittle was happy enough to run third-placed Abdi Bile so close, but was a little surprised that the time was so slow (1:47.20). McKay, on the other hand, was rewarded with a personal best of 3:38.50, but was displeased with the negative way he ran. The race, he felt, was there for the taking, but he left it far too late. He was in good company,

however, as both Joe Falcon and Wilfred Kirochi let the Australian, Simon Doyle, get far too far ahead. Despite a frantic sprint up the straight by the two favourites, Doyle had easily for his biggest win yet.

In the women's 1,500 metres, Doina Melinte deposed of the Soviet, Svetlana Kitova, with ease with a 4:03.26. Kitova had clocked 4:04.29 in Lapinlahti just two days earlier, but was no match for Melinte's finishing burst. World Cross-country champion Lynn Jennings stepped down in distance and ran a reasonable 4:08.84 in third.

In the field, Rodion Gataullin handled the notoriously bad vaulting conditions better than everyone to win with 5.72. Few vaulters, Sergei Bubka included, can handle the swirling winds in

the stadium and it's generally agreed that they can cost up to 15 centimetres.

Hollis Conway was awarded the performance of the meeting award by scaling 2.37 in the high jump.

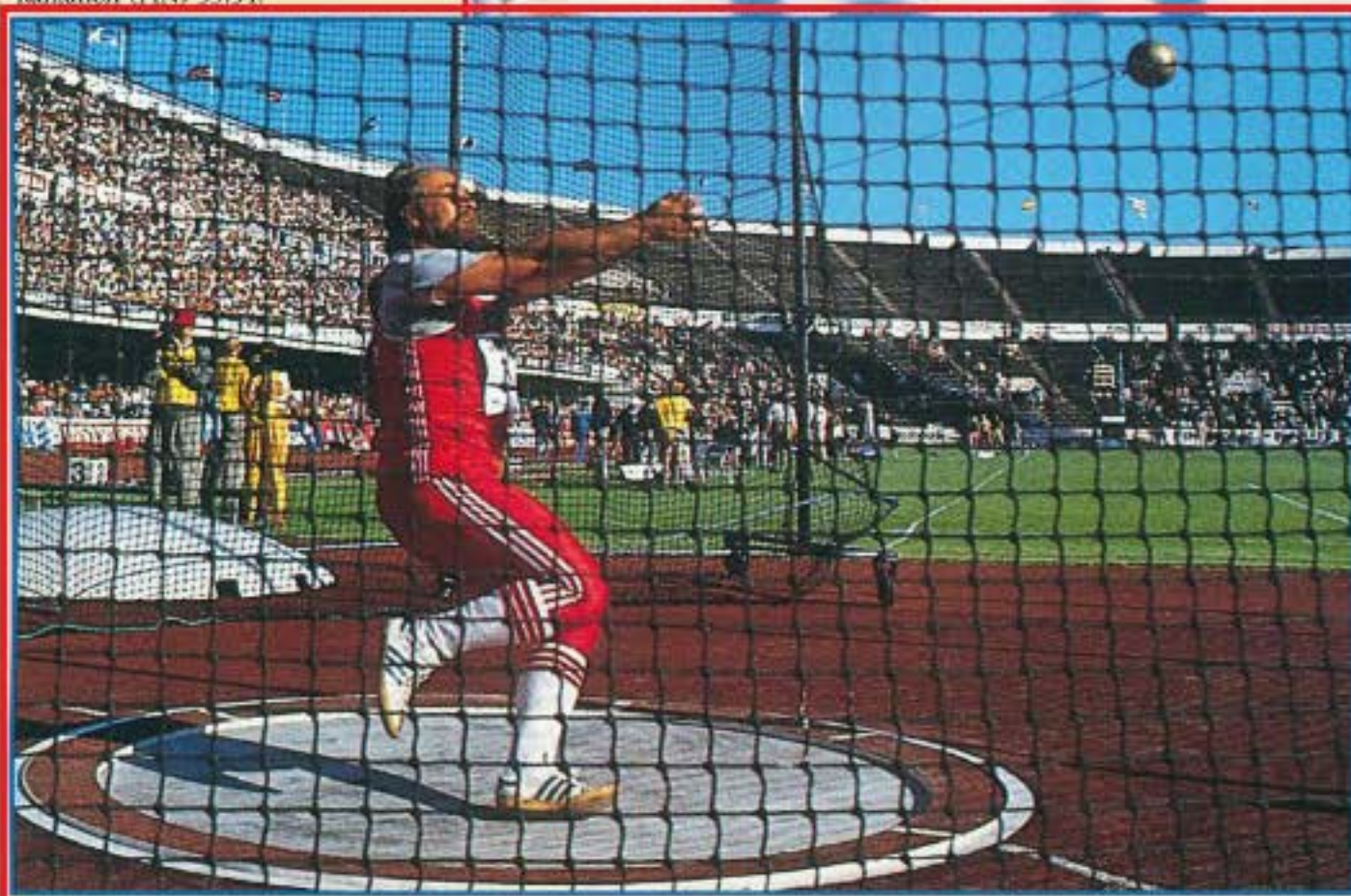

Harris catches fire

WHO would ever expect to see Carl Lewis running in the B-race of the 100 metres, especially at this point of his career? That's exactly what happened to the Olympic champion on Thursday night at the Lausanne Grand Prix.

Athletissima meeting director Jacky Delapierre was fortunate to have both Lewis and Leroy Burrell at his disposal for sprinting duty, but at this stage of the season neither the yearly leader nor the world record-holder was interested in a showdown. So, multiple sections were contested, with Burrell's A-race actually being slightly inferior on overall average to Lewis' race.

Both Americans used the same formula to gain victory, namely superior acceleration over the final half of the race. Burrell had only a small disadvantage to overcome, as he ran 10.05 to easily dispose of Mark Witherspoon (10.15) and Linford Christie (10.20). Moments later, Lewis had one of his less memorable starts but he was still able to confirm a statement of a few hours earlier by gliding past the field for a 10.09 victory over runner-up Olapade Adeniken (10.12).

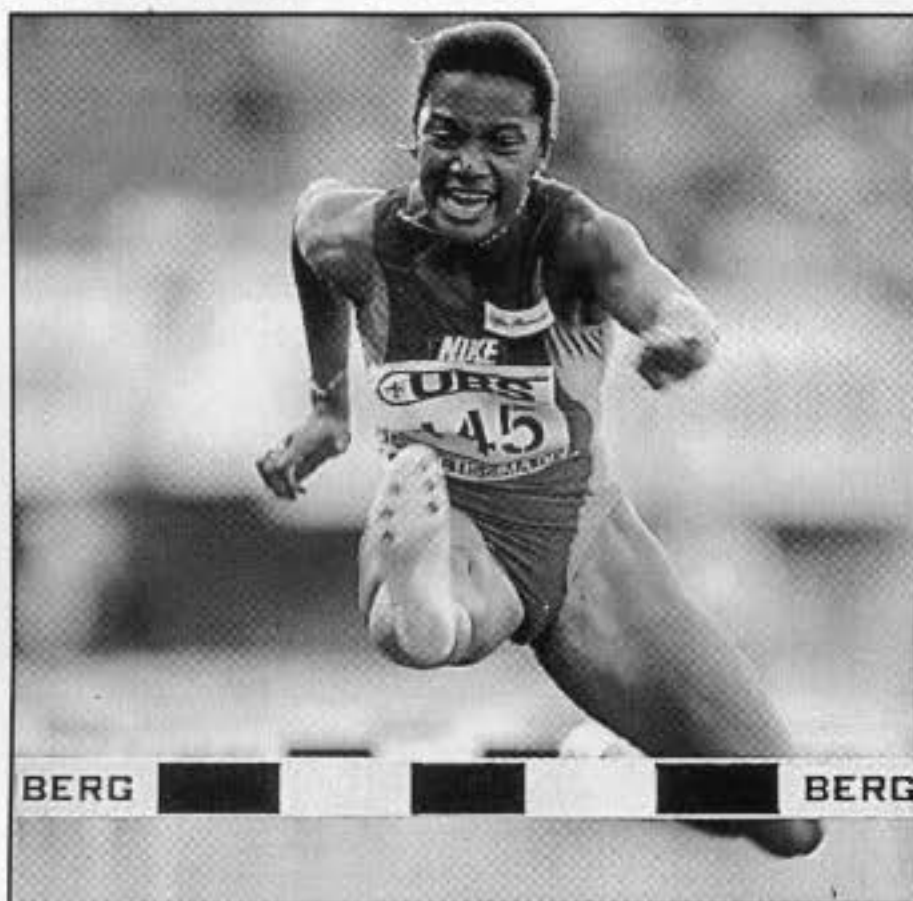
Lausanne's Stade Olympique provided an ideal setting for an athletics meeting, with 15,000 seats, all occupied, gracefully arranged close to the oval and perched on a hillside overlooking Lake Geneva. Unfortunately, the locale is often plagued with swirling winds, as was the case on this evening.

Normally, such a situation spells doom for a 400-metre hurdler, but Danny Harris disavowed any awareness of climatic problems with a world-leading 47.49.

"I actually thought a time in the 48s would win here tonight. But with such a great response from the crowd during my race, my legs just caught fire," Harris said afterwards.

After making headlines this year in the 200 metres, Michael Johnson turned to the full-lap event where most of his experience has been in relays. Initially, it looked like and overly ambitious order for the young American, as Roberto Hernandez, running on Johnson's inside as a result of a last-minute lane change, carved a formidable lead through the initial furlong. But then, Johnson put on his Butch Reynolds act, first chewing up the Cuban's lead during the final turn and then showing tremendous reserve power down the final 80 metres to lower his PB to 44.27.

Much interest centred on the

women's 3,000 metres and the return of Patti Sue Plumer to the scene of her upset of Paula Ivan last year. With Ivan on the mend this year, Yvonne Murray stepped forward to create the challenge. The two were locked in a tight duel, with Viorica Ghican close at hand should either falter. Plumer decided to start her kick with 800 metres to go, but she perhaps miscalculated Murray's strength at that point. With a lap left, the Scot took a two-metre lead and was waiting for a ripe moment to deliver the knockout blow. That moment never arrived, however, as Plumer sprinted away with 200 left for a 59.8 last lap and a 8:47.23 win, six metres ahead of Murray's 8:48.20.

Tom McKean looked quite content at the end of the first lap of the 800 metres, about 10 metres behind Washington's sub-50 pace, the American's second such obligation of the night. Things became pretty well jammed up after Washington departed, and there was some jostling on the penultimate curve. No one seemed willing to force the pace, however, which is tantamount to playing right into McKean's hand. Even an impressive final kick of George Kersh at the end was not enough to catch the Scot as the two were timed in 1:45.67 and 1:45.79 respectively.

"I had expected that there would be a rabbit through 600 metres," said McKean later.

Waiting until the world is watching

KHALID SKAH in the 3,000 metres, Julius Kariuki over the steeplechase barriers, Igor Nikulin in the hammer circle and - yet again - Merlene Ottey in the women's 200 metres brought to life a Nikaia Meeting in Nice last Tuesday which for the first hour lacked any atmosphere.

Of the Britons, Colin Jackson, back after injury, was his dominant self while Linford Christie asserted his European ascendancy but was once again beaten to the line by world leader Leroy Burrell.

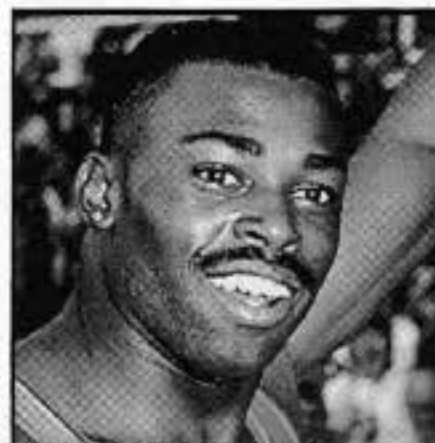
Unaccustomed Cote D'Azur weather - black skies and a strong headwind for the sprinters - failed to stop a string of world best performances, led by Ottey, one of the world's top sprinters for the last 10 years. Beaten only once over 200 metres last season, the Jamaican has continued her brilliant competitive record into the 1990s. Now 30, and living in Italy with former European Indoor champion Stefano Tilli, she made a world-class field look ordinary, opening up an eight-metre gap in the finishing straight.

Her time of 21.80sec was a personal best and more surprisingly was achieved into a 1.10m/s wind. It moves her to seventh on the world all-time list and Grace Jackson, who finished third (22.40) could see her Commonwealth record of 21.72, achieved at the last Olympic Games, removed sometime this season.

Skah, already at the top of the 5,000 metres rankings, allowed the pacemakers in the 3,000 metres to lead him and a pack which included Kenya's Yobes Ondieki and 10,000 metres world record-holder Arturo Barrios through the first kilometre in 2:33.69 and the second in 5:09.25. With two laps to run, the pace heated up considerably - indeed, the last 800 was run in just outside two minutes. Though Barrios, and Frenchman Cyrille Laventure, showed briefly at the front on the final circuit, the World Cross-country champion from Morocco was always in control, even though he had to shift to top gear in the homestraight, his last lap taking 57.1sec. Ondieki beat Barrios to the line but there is no doubt more will be seen of the Mexican later this year.

In the steeplechase, Kariuki had his first Grand Prix win of the year. The 16,750 crowd watched the familiar sight of three Kenyans (the Olympic champion plus Peter Koech and Patrick Sang), follow the sensible pace of Henryk Jankowski through a 1,000 metres in 2:41.94. Former Essex Beagle, and now a Canadian citizen, Graeme Fell was running gamely with them and was still in strong contention when they passed 2km in 5:31.48, Sang, hav-

ing gone to the point. The last lap was a burn-up with Kariuki leading and he comfortably came home in 8:13.28 ahead of Koech, Fell just failing to catch Sang.

Colin Jackson was beaten out of the blocks in the high hurdles (wind -1.60m/s) by Frenchman Philippe Tourret who appeared to have a flier. They were still level at the fifth barrier before the Welshman eased ahead. Tourret concentrated on beating Tony Jarrett, who is involved in a heavy training programme at the moment, but Britain's No. 2 took him on the run-in. Afterwards Jackson said, "I haven't really been right since Portsmouth and will have to race more than I like to get fit". The Commonwealth champion added he would rest after Zurich until Split: "The European Championships are most important".

Linford Christie would disagree. He has bravely taken on Burrell twice in just over a week and firmly believes that by the Zurich meeting in mid-August he will be at his best. "Zurich is more important than Split because the whole world will be watching," he said. "Who's going to beat me in Split? Remember, I have never got it wrong yet on the big ones."

Certainly, 10.29sec into a 1.10m/s wind behind the American is a commendable performance but more importantly, despite the defeat, his confidence has been unaffected.

It is 10 years ago that Nikulin - now 30 - became the youngest ever 80-metre hammer-thrower, and although he placed second and third in the last two European Championships, he has always been overshadowed by his fellow Soviets. He trailed the greatest ever exponent of the event, Yuriy

Sedykh, until the third round when he unleashed a personal best 83.96 metres to improve his fourth place on the world all-time list.

It was a delight to watch Jan Zelezny, the former world record-holder, now recovered from a serious back injury - improve his season's best to 86.52 metres in the javelin. There were only four competitors and all threw over 80 metres, including a national record for Frenchman Pascal Lefevre.

Nixon Kiprotich held off Olympic champion Paul Ereng to win his third successive Grand Prix 800 metres while over 1,500 metres the 20-year-old Algerian, Nourredine Morcelli (a good winner in Verona last week), had a thrilling win in 3:35.05, Abdi Bile, struggling in fourth place.

Dalton Grant was still smiling - "too heavy a training programme and run-up problems" - despite propping up the high jump while Chris Cahill, who is off to Bologna for warm-weather training, was happy with her seventh spot in the 1,500 metres predictably won by Doina Melinte with a sub-58sec last lap. Alison Wyeth ran pluckily, and a summer's best, in the 3,000 metres but couldn't stay with the fast finishers (Patti Sue Plumer's kick making Yvonne Murray's Edinburgh victory look all the better) and Janet Boyle finished fifth in the high jump.

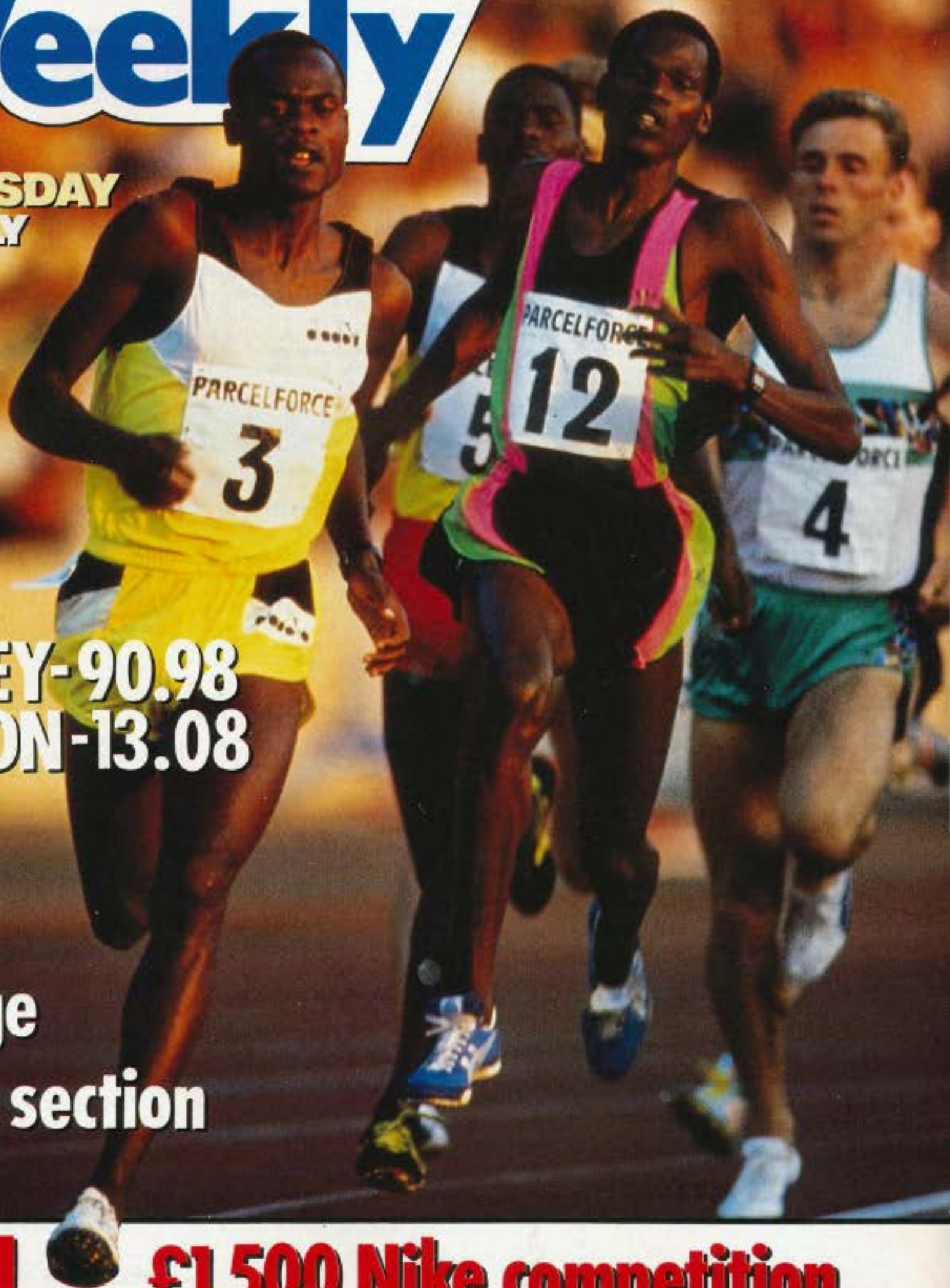

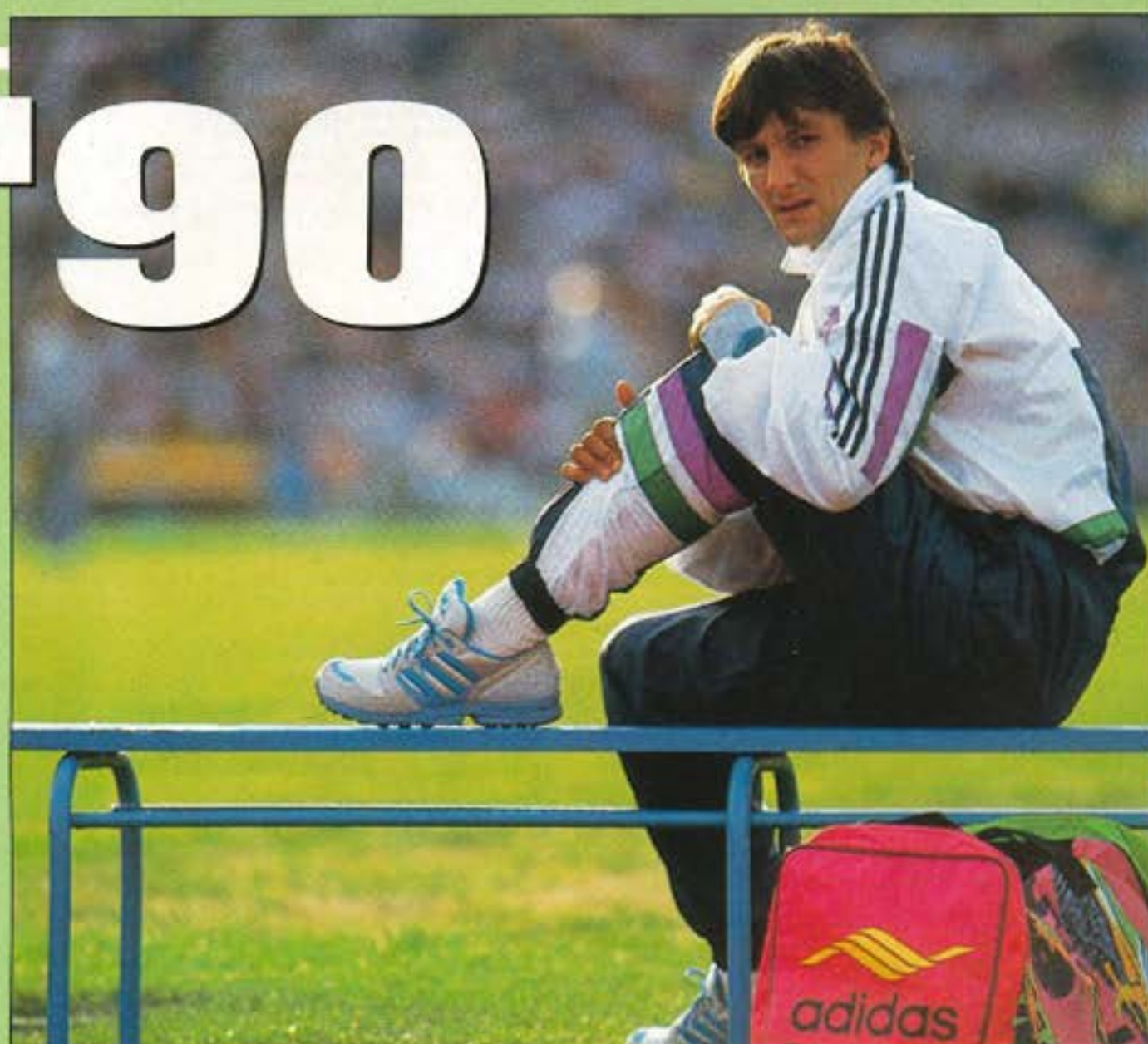

Skah waits for his moment

DAVE MARTIN reports on the last stop on the Grand Prix circuit before the European Championships

TWO season's best performances, Khalid Skah over 3,000 metres and Ana Quirot, in the 400 metres, were the highlights of last Sunday's Grand Prix meeting in Cologne.

Skah, the World Cross-country champion, was quite happy to sit behind the pacemakers and instead follow the real threats - Yobes Ondieki, and Cyrille Laventure, the Frenchman who has been rounding into dangerous pre-Split form. The first kilometre was passed in 2:31.16, the second in 5:03.62, as with just over two laps to run, Ondieki went to the front slowing the pace considerably. Skah waited to strike, and did so 250 metres from the line, as suprisingly both the Kenyan and Laventure went with him. However, as all three entered the straight abreast, it was the tiny Moroccan who possessed the most speed for a deserved victory, although Laventure claimed a PB.

Ana Quirot has been training

hard in Spain for the last 10 days and was delighted with her time of 50.03sec. "I'm convinced that I can run under 50sec at next month's Grand Prix final in Athens," the winner of last year's World Cup said.

In third place was East German Petra Schersing whose time of 50.31sec was the second fastest by a European this summer, only 0.1sec behind that of team mate Grit Breuer.

Breuer actually stepped down to 200 metres where again Merlene Ottey was in superb form, posting her fifth sub-22sec time of the season.

Both 1,500 metres races were slow-run, Australia's Simon Doyle proving that his win in Berlin on Friday was no fluke. In the women's event, Doina Melinte won the sprint for the line from the two Soviets, Natalya Artyomova and Svetlana Kitova, jokingly dismissing the race for its slow early pace (2:10 at 800 metres). Slow pace or not Teena Colebrook, the only Briton at the meeting, achieved a life time best running a sound tactical race before being dropped over the last 200 metres as the pace heated up.

Michael Johnson had his second outing over 400 metres in Europe and won easily in 44.25sec from world record-holder Butch Reynolds.

In the 100 metres, Leroy Burrell was never in trouble thanks to a magnificent start, and the two 4x100 metres relay races on the programme almost saw the Santa Monica club team beaten by an Americas quartet (which included jamaican Ray Stewart) while in the women's event East Germany won as they pleased while behind them West Germany set a national record.

"I cannot thank the medical team enough for the work they did on my knee last night," Jackson said. "I know it sounds corny, but without them I wouldn't have won today."

"I've been troubled with it for some time. At first we thought it was a ligament injury, but it turned out to be cartilage, and once I get back I'm going into hospital to have an operation so that I can get back into training as soon as possible."

Jarrett was delighted with his PB having also been carrying a niggle from the semi. "The real truth is that he pulled me through. I wanted to stick with Colin, and I managed that all the way to the finish."

THERE had been a packed stadium for the race, the first since the opening ceremony. The Yugoslavs arrived early to see their medal hope Biljana Petrovic take on Heike Henkel in the high jump, both women having cleared two metres this year, the former for the first time.

With the bar raised to 1.93 there was a mass exodus with only Henkel, Petrovic and the 20-year-old Soviet Yelena Yelesina, getting clear.

All three cleared 1.96 with their first jumps and Petrovic was technically in the lead having had no failures.

The German put the pressure on the other two by clearing 1.99 easily at the first attempt. Neither the Soviet nor Petrovic made the height and the Yugoslav took silver.

Lea Haggett, brought to the championships for experience, was eliminated in the qualifying round clearing 1.80.

IN THE heptathlon, last year's top woman, Larisa Nikitina was missing after having being positively drug tested at the Goodwill Games, while Anke Behmer, who was also undefeated last season, was not selected, leaving the competition a little more open.

The 100 metres hurdles was a disaster for Jenny Kelly, the Bromley athlete injuring herself after a heavy fall at the third hurdle, leading to her withdrawal. Peggy Beer of East Germany ran a personal best of 13.27 followed by her team mate Birgit Gautzsch and Romania's Liliana Nastase.

The high jump saw Sabine Braun, of West Germany, surpass her PB, clearing 1.91, the nearest two jumpers being six centimetres adrift, allowing her to take the lead with 2,162 points from her team mate Christiane Scharf who was equal second with Beer on 2,087 points. Clova Court, who had made a good start with 13.83sec in the hurdles, suffered the team's second disaster when she no-heighted but she pluckily decided to carry on.

Braun, sixth at the 1984 Olympics but kept out of the sport with an injury for two years in 1986 and 1987, remained in the lead (2,987) after a 14.46 shot putt.

Gautzsch had the fastest 200 metres time to place fifth (3,779) at

the end of the first day, with Braun (24.61sec) well ahead on 3,910 points from Beer.

Braun and Beer began Friday by tying on 6.38 in the long jump, Nastase having the best effort of 6.44.

In the penultimate event, the 1988 East German champion Heike Tischler threw her javelin 53.24 to move into second spot with 5,540 points from Beer who was over 10 metres behind her. Braun wasn't far off her PB, throwing 53.06 and moved her score to 5,798.

The final 800 metres was memorable for the second heat which Belova won in 2:02.75 from Tischler and Beer. However, the two East Germans kept themselves in their respective silver and bronze positions, Belova finishing only 10 points away from a medal.

Braun ran 2:15.20 to win her first title with a personal best score of 66.88, and said: "My 800 running is not good so I knew I had to achieve an advantage before the last event."

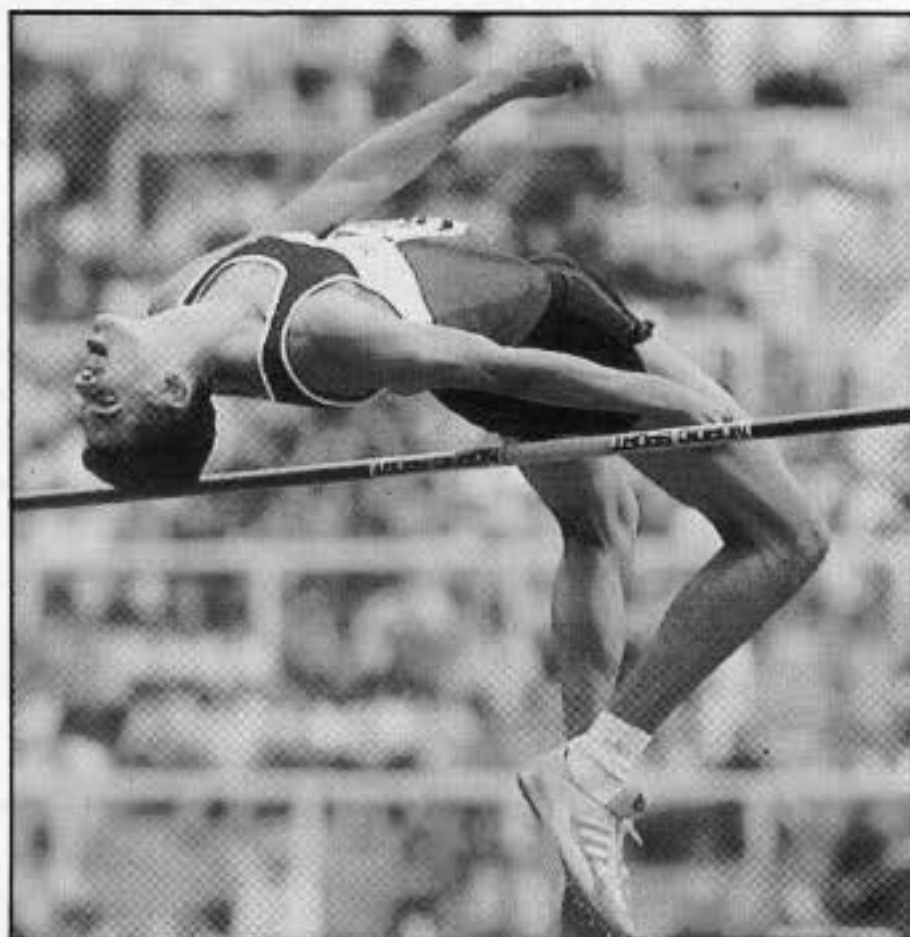
Joanne Mulliner finished 12th with 5,849 while Court (5,058) is to be congratulated for keeping her chin up and finishing the event.

KHRISTO MARKOV, the reigning triple jump champion, had been in indifferent form since winning the Olympic title, but an opening leap of 17.43 was an ideal start. Only Lapshin, the world student champion, and Boloshin cleared 17.0, John Herbert being credited with 16.70, and though he improved to 16.73 with his last jump, was not able to make the last group.

In round four, Boloshin, who has only taken up the triple jump this year and qualified for Split with a 17.40 leap in Bryansk two weeks ago, improved his personal best yet again to 17.74, the fourth best in

the world this year and a performance which moved him to ninth on the world all-time list.

Boloshin, who had an 8.46 long jump two seasons ago, said: "I knew Markov was favourite but I wasn't scared of him. I had a lot of luck."

A SOVIET without such luck was hammer thrower Yuri Sedykh of the three consecutive European wins, and although reputed to be having a "quiet" year Sedykh was nevertheless annoyed that he could not defend his title, and angrily predicted that in the absence of himself and Litvinov, no one would exceed 83 metres.

Certainly no one got near to the distance in the qualifying round, where Paul Head set a personal best of 74.02 to become the first Briton to make the European final in 16 years.

The first round proper featured only two 80-metre throws, but the next round could possibly rank as the worst ever seen in a major European competition, the best being 77.00 by Bulgarian Plamen Minev. Head, after throwing 72.68 in the first round, then failed in round two by stepping on the back of the circle. "I've never done it before. If it was going to happen, it was bound to happen here," the big man said.

Thankfully, in round three Astapkovich 84.14, threw the second furthest in the world this year to increase his lead. Head could not improve his mark - his hammer hit the 70-metre field marker - and so went out.

With his last throw, Gecsek put a spanner in the Soviet machine, splitting the leader and Nikulin.

WITHOUT Petra Krug to worry about, after the East German withdrew from the finals of the women's 400 metres hurdles due to

injury, Tatyana Lidovskaya showed that the other six women against her were mere pretenders to the gold, as the Soviet stormed away and came off the bend nearly a barrier clear of Monica Westen, who was caught from the final flight in the race for silver by the fast finishing Swiss, Anita Protti. After a fast first 200, Sally Gunnell ended up sixth without showing her sparkling form of last year.

WHILE all this was going on, the walkers had been on their 50km trudge, in the 29-degree heat and 68 per cent humidity, and the undulating circuit plus some harsh judging took their toll as only half the field finished.

Among the casualties were Paul Blagg, whose badly blistered feet forced him to stop within 5km of the finish, and Darrell Stone, who was taken off the course around 20km by a medical team.

Those pulled included sometime leaders Bo Gustafsson, Andrei Plotnikov and Alexandr Potashov, leaving the way clear for Andrei Perlov. He had a two-minute winning margin and would have still carried on had an official not told him he could stop, which he did removing his headband, from which he then wrung out with sweat of his 3hr 54min labour.

Because of the walk's slow progress, the women's 10,000 metres got off to a late start but for 9,200m only Midde Hamrin seemed in a hurry to get it finished.

The Swede set off on a long solo run, building up to a 70-metre lead as she passed through the kilometres in 6:31.11 (2km), 16:03.88 (5km) and 25:37.56 (8km). She was always six to eight seconds clear of the main group which was led by the likes of Viorica Ghicam and Wanda Panfil with varying amounts of commitment. Jill Hunter was always thereabouts while Julie

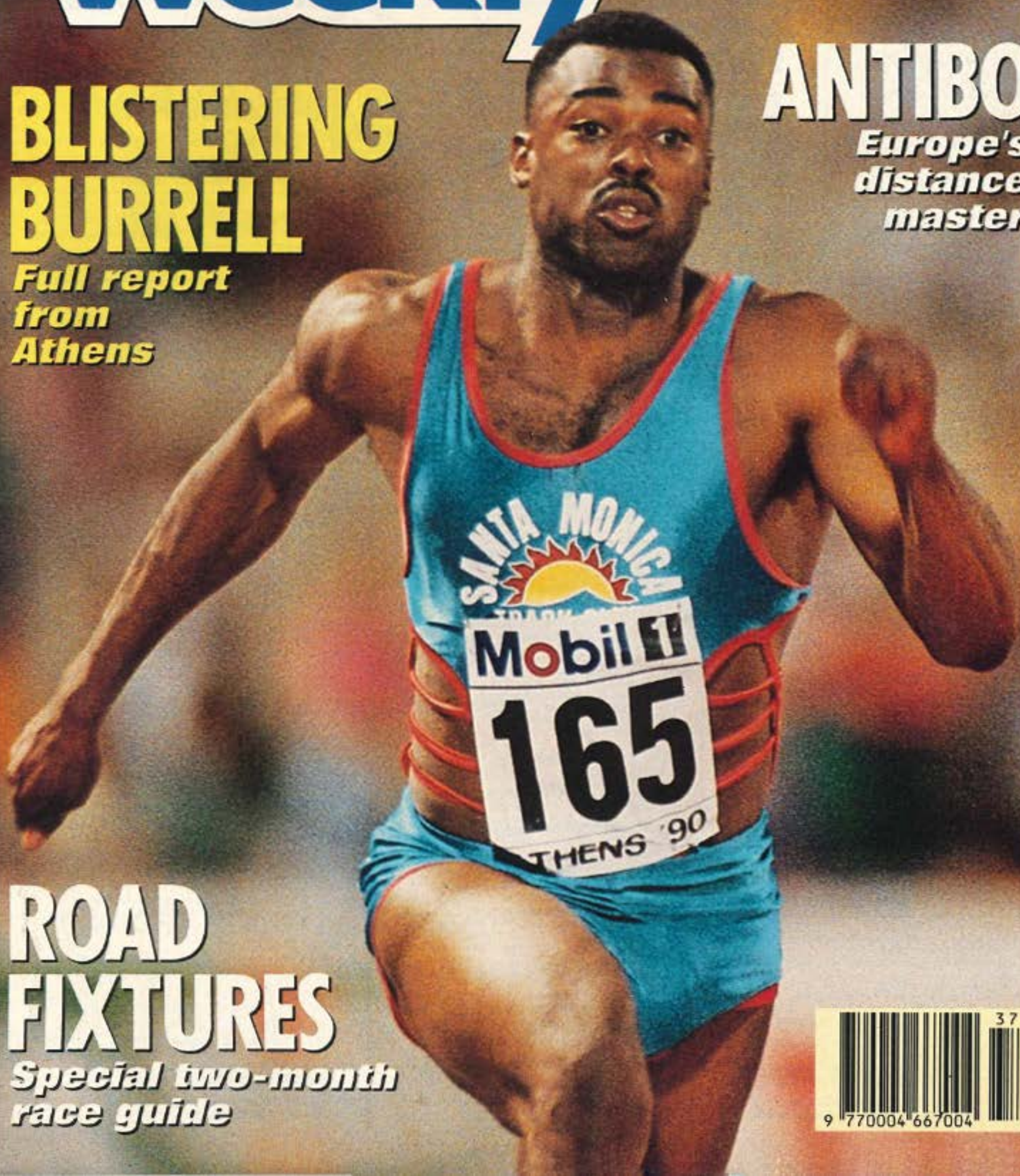

Burrell claims top spot

LEROY BURRELL became the first sprinter to win the IAAF/Mobil Grand Prix men's overall title since its inception in at the Olympic Stadium in Athens last Friday but, more importantly, he established himself as the world's No.1 100 metres runner with a crushing victory over Carl Lewis.

Burrell's 10.04sec gun-to-finish win left his illustrious American colleague floundering, although his training partner held his form in the middle of the race before losing out for second place to Mark Witherspoon on the line - a decisive clean sweep for Santa Monica Track Club.

"I was very tired as I have had a lot of races this year," Burrell, who has been beaten only once in 21 races this year, said. "It was very competitive having Lewis next to me but my aim in every race is to break the world record."

With his second win over the Olympic champion this summer, Burrell has removed the the myth

of invincibility attached to Lewis, and may have signalled the end of an era for the world's greatest ever sprinter.

To compliment Burrell's performance, Merlene Ottey won the women's Grand Prix title, her 21.88sec 200-metre victory being her ninth sub-22sec this year.

Elegant as ever, the Jamaican had swept away any challengers by the middle of the bend, and the new double European sprint champion Katrin Krabbe was made to look very ordinary in sixth place, almost a second behind, although her younger East German colleague Grit Breuer excelled to finish

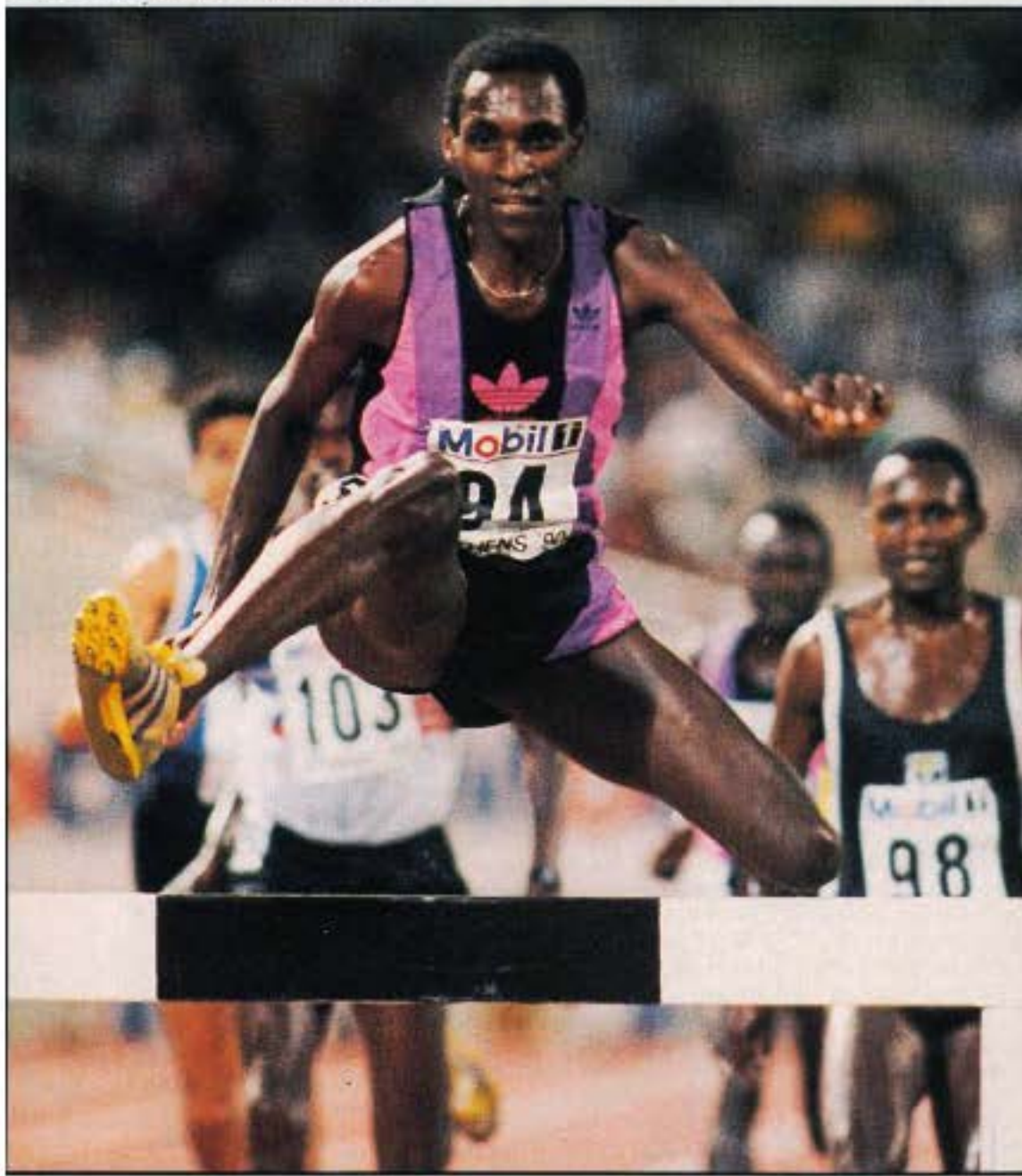
second.

In fairness to Krabbe, she slowed almost to walking pace after appearing to stumble with 80 metres to run, but the blonde, who is to marry next week, must know she has a lot of hard work ahead of her if she is to emulate the achievements of Marlies Gohr and Marita Koch.

Danny Harris planned to celebrate his 25th birthday with his 14th 400 hurdles win of the year, but Samuel Matete became only the third Commonwealth athlete to run under 48 seconds as he beat the Olympic silver-medallist in a photo-finish. The Zambian's 47.91sec is 0.01sec faster than Kriss Akabusi ran in his Split victory and both must have their eyes on John Akli-Bua's record of 47.82sec which has stood for 18 years.

The 800 metres was a predictable win for William Tanui in 1:44.95. The Kenyan happily followed the 50.90sec opening lap from Stephen Ole-Marie and reserved his effort until the home straight, zipping ahead of Algeria's Reda Abdenouz who was given the same time with third-placed Nixon Kiprotich.

Another Algerian, Noureddine Morceli, was a decisive winner of the mile. As the 12-man field crawled through 440 yards in 59.56sec and the half-mile in 2:00.52, hopes of a British win rose as both Steve Cram and Peter Elliott

GRAND WINNERS: Ottey and Burrell

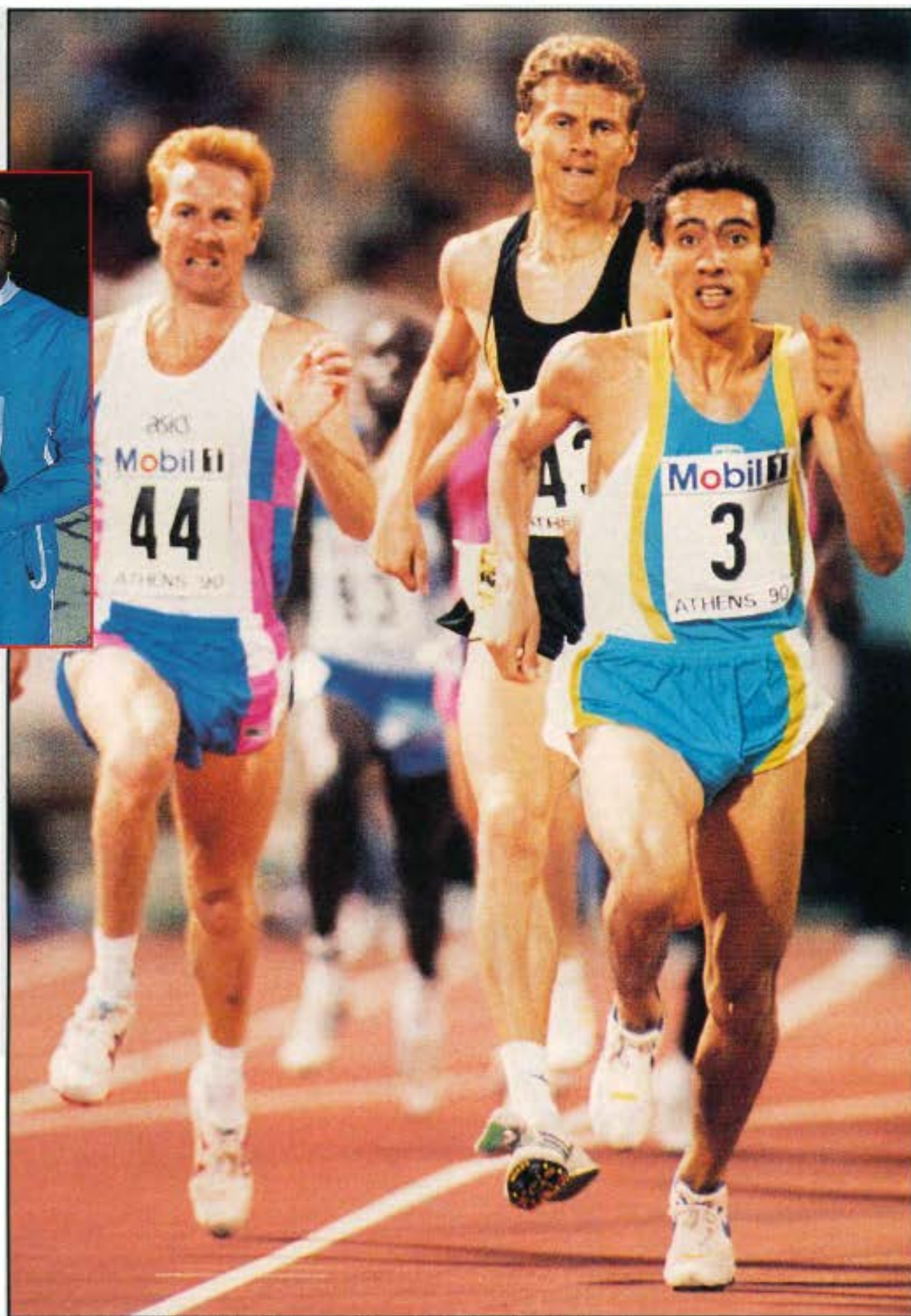
were looking comfortable and hopefully not expending too much energy before the last lap blitz commenced.

The bell was passed in 2:59.80 and Cram was the first to make his run for home, just over a furlong out. However Morceli and Elliott were tracking him and although the world record-holder strived to find oxygen in the last 50 metres, first Morceli then fast finishing Jens-Peter Herold and finally Elliott went by. Morceli held off the European champion to win in 3:53.28, only 0.79sec covering the first four, an indication that both Elliott and Cram are not that far away from regaining winning form.

In the 5,000 metres, Brahim Boutayeb had his finest victory since winning the Olympic 10,000 metres title when he outsprinted the favourite, Khalid Skah, with a 54.9sec last lap. Another group of Africans, from Kenya, dominated the steeplechase, occupying the first four positions with Olympic and Commonwealth champion, Julius Kariuki, leading his "team" home in 8:24.08.

Michael Johnson made a 20.10sec 200 metres appear a stroll, finishing five metre ahead of Floyd Heard while in the 110 hurdles Tonie Campbell's somersault at the finish gave him second place behind Tony Dees.

Dalton Grant (2.25) finished seventh in the high jump behind an unexceptional 2.34 from Sergey Malchenko. Both of his fellow-Soviet's also won their events, Leonid Voloshin, unknown until becoming European triple jump champion in Split, having a best of 17.35, while Yuri Sedykh - still angry at not being selected for the

European Championships, won the hammer with a throw of 80.26. Ulf Timmerman cleared exactly 21.00 metres to win the shot putt.

Ana Quirot was determined to go under 50 seconds in the 400 metres, but the absence of world-leader Grit Breuer who deserted to the shorter distance, didn't help her and she had to be content with a 50.31sec victory - her eighth over top class opposition this year.

Sandra Gasser had her most notable win after returning to top

class athletics after suspension. She took the 1,500 with 4:06.11 as the overall Grand Prix leader Doina Melinte slipped to sixth after a long and weary season which has seen her win plenty of dollars but no championship medals. Teena Colebrook finished ninth in 4:11.70.

PattiSue Plumer as expected won the 5,000 metres as the field braved the Athens heat. Jill Hunter ended up sixth in 15:26.64 staying with the leaders until 500 metres from the finish

while Julie Holland's 15:39.74 was only eight seconds away from her best, no mean achievement in the humid conditions.

Monique Ewanje-Epee had her worst race of the year, Gloria Siebert of East Germany reversing their Split positions with Lidia Yurkova again in third place.

Heike Drechsler could not get over seven metres in the long jump

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but her third round 6.98 was still 16cm clear of runner-up Inessa Kravets. Fiona May had her best effort of 6.40 in the opening round into a 1.6m/s wind, finally ending up sixth. Newly crowned European champion Ike Wyludda was almost four metres clear of the Split bronze medallist Martina Hellman in the discus while fellow East German Petra Felke, with three throws over 65 metres ended her season with a 66.44 javelin victory.

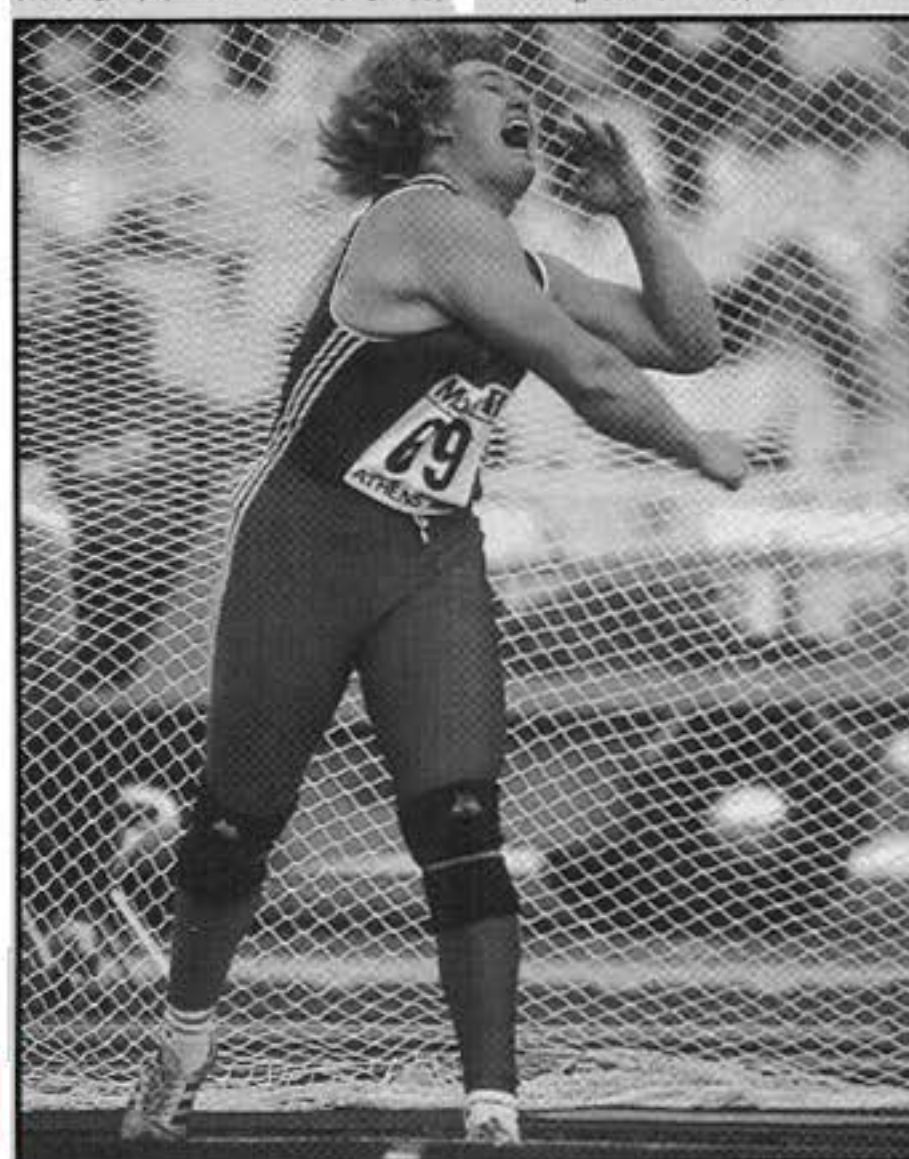
