Inside — Interview with Chris Warden



...outstrips the field

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COE RANKED FIRST

SEBASTIAN COE, voted athlete of the year by our American colleagues Track & Field News, gained top spot in the magazine's world merit rankings at both 800m and 1500m — but only just.

Assessing the 800m rankings, TFN comment: "Seldom, if ever, was the choice affecting 1st as thorny as this one. The characters in the play were Coe, with a scintillating WR, and Maina, with an unheard-of winning streak of 21 finals. Unfortunately, they never locked horns. The Kenyan would appear to have the edge in 2 of our 3 criteria, sequence of marks and honours won. As for win-loss record, both met and beat the cream of the world. The Englishman ran only 4 major international races, but his winning margins ranged from 3.4 sec to 0.8 (the latter being quite good for a tactical European Cup race which was practically decided in the homestretch). Maina won most if not all of his races by narrow gaps, no doubt a reflection of his 'tactical' nature. Finally, we felt Coe proved a class above the rest more clearly than his rival. In addition, his WR - made in the heat of an international contest - was nearly 2 sec faster than Maina's best, a huge gap at this distance. We rated the last 2 factors as sufficient to narrowly tip the scales in Coe's favour, in spite of Maina's advantage in the strict evaluation of the 3 criteria."

Regarding the 1500m, TFN observe: "Has anyone ever achieved so much sterling quality with so little quantity as Coe? He ran only 2 races and achieved world records at both the 1500 and mile. Clockwise, his margin over 1977/78 leader Ovett — who came dangerously close to both records late in the season — is virtually infinitesimal. Since they never met, the decision reverted to their win-loss records or we should say their 'win records', since neither ever lost. Ovett, in fact, hasn't lost a 1500 or mile since Elliott's all-time winning string of 39. Coe met and beat 7 of the other 13 men ranked, while Ovett met and beat 4. And it should be added that the Oslo mile was the greatest in history".

EUROPE: Hammer men in form

Soviet and East European throwers lost little time in showing great form outdoors. In a meeting at Leselidse (USSR) in February, European junior champion Igor Nikulin easily beat his 1979 best of 75,20m when he won the hammer with 78.14 ahead of Olympic champion Yuriy Sedykh (77.56), 1979 top ranker Sergery Litvinov (77.28) and Juri Taunn (77.14). At the same venue a couple of weeks later, Litvinov came out on top with 78.32, followed by Nikulin (77,42) and Sedykh (76.44). In Berlin on February 10th, Irina Mesrymki (GDR) threw the women's discus 64.32m for a world junior record.


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The World Record Avalanche Continues

HAS THERE EVER been such an avalanche of world records so early in the European season? It was Ferenc Paragi (Hun) who started the ball rolling with his 96.72m javelin throw at Tata on April 23rd; next came Ruth Fuchs (GDR) with a 69.96m javelin effort at Split on April 29th and Ilona Slupianek (GDR) with a shot put of 22.36m at Celje on May 2nd. Evelin Jahl (GDR) threw the discus 71.50m at Potsdam on May 10th; and next day, still at Potsdam, Slupianek improved to 22.45m. Also on May 11th, in Milan, Wladvslaw Kozakiewicz (Pol) vaulted 5,72m. The hammer record was broken three times at Leselidse on May 16th: Yuriy Sedykh (USSR) threw 80.38m, Juri Tamm (USSR) 80.46m and Sedykh 80.64m. Karin Rossley (GDR) clocked 54.28 for 400m hurdles at Jena on May 17th; Daley Thompson (UK) amassed 8622 pts at Gotzis on May 17th/18th; Sergey Litvinov (USSR) broke the hammer record with 81.66m at Sochi on May 24th; and the high jump mark was raised to 2.35m by Jacek Wszola (Pol) at Eberstadt on May 25th and equalled the very next day at by Dietmar Mogenburg Rehlingen (Get). Nadyezhda Tkachenko (USSR), who was stripped of the 1978 European title when found to have been taking anabolic steroids, scored 4880 pts for the pentathlon at Donetsk on May 28th.

The hammer has traditionally been a Soviet stronghold. Since 1956, 10 of the 18 available Olympic medals have gone to the USSR, including victories in 1960, 1964, 1972 and 1976 and a clean sweep of the medals in Montreal. But never before has the dominance been so complete. The first five men on the 1980 world rankings are all from the USSR: Sergey Litvinov 81.66m Yuriy Sedykh 80.64, Boris Zaichuk 80.48, Juri Tamm 80.46 and Igor Nikulin 80.02! Litvinov, the smallest but fastest of the great throwers, produced his world record in the second round. Following an 80.56 opener (itself the second longest throw ever), he threw the prodigious distance of 81.66 - adding over a metre to Sedykh's pending mark for the biggest single improvement to the world record since Gyula Zsivotzky obliterated Hal Connolly's 71.26 with a toss of 73.74 back in 1965.

Olympic champion Jacek Wszola's new high jump record came as quite a surprise, for it added no less than 5cm to his previous personal best of

2.30m which he had achieved in 1977 and then again indoors carlier this year. He took the first four heights without failure -2.14, 2.21, 2.27and 2.29 - before flopping over a Polish record of 2.31 at the second attempt. With the competition won (Dictmar Mogenburg and Carlo Thranhardt tied for 2nd at 2.29) Wszola had the bar raised to 2.35m (7'8½'') -42cm (16½'') above his head. That would constitute a new outdoor world record (previously 2.34 by Vladimir Yashchenko) and match Yashchenko's all-time highest leap made indoors. He succeeded

at the first attempt and then went on to try 2.37. The meeting at Eberstudt in Germany was only his second of the outdoor teason, having cleared a mere 2.21 in Madrid the week before. Wszola, who is coached by his father and has trained harder than previously this past winter, is in a good position to become the first athlete to win the Olympic men's high jump title twice particularly as the German and American jumpers will not be in Moscow, and Yashchenko is recovering from an operation. He believes a jump of 2.40m (710¹/s⁻⁷) is now not far away.

Twenty-four hours after Wszola's esploit, it was the turn of 18-year-old Dietmar Mogenburg, who is a gangling 2.01/6'7'4'' tall. Competing at Rehlingen, Mogenburg entered higher than ever before at 2.20 (15), survived a crisis at 2.26 (3rd), and then cleared 2.30 at the 2nd attempt and 2.35

USSR: New pentathlon record

Nadyezhda Tkachenko tops the 1980 world list with a pentathlon score of 4880 (with hand timing), but she has lost her electrically-timed world record - standing at 4839 - to Olea Kuragina who in Moscow on June 20th amassed a score of 4856. Her performances: 13.38 for 100m hurdles, 13,44m with the shot, a high jump of 1.86m and a long jump of 6.41m - and finally a prodigious 800m time of 2:03.8! Olga, who is 21, has progressed rapidly: from 4212 in 1978 and 4629 last year. Another Medal Sweep For USSR Hammer Men?

IN 1975, the year prior to the USSR's resounding triumph in the hammer throw with a triple medal win in the Montreal Games, a 17-year-old blond youngster appeared on the fast-expanding Russian hammer horizon like a shooting star, winning both youth and junior titles in the same season. He was Sergey Litvinov from Rostov, the discovery and ward of coach Igor Timashkov, Instantly tipped by some as a great future champion and a likely gold prospect for the Moscow Games, he was dismissed by others as a flash-in-the-pan shorty.

flash-in-the-pan shorty. Litvinov, born on January 22nd 1958 and already a remarkably consistent 70m-plus performer with the 6kg junior hardware, appeared a quite unusual ball-and-chain specialist in several respects. He originally started out as a sprinter (he now does 11.2 for the 100m) and developed high jump ambitions at one stage, to that Valeriy Brumel remains his idol to this day. This in itself would not have marked him as out of place though. What did in the eyes of some was his physique. Though muscular and immensely strong, he was only 1.78/5'10" tall and 85kg/1871b heavy, which is hardly the required bulk even for a 17-year-old. Another odd thing about him way that he had only been training for the hammer for two years.

It was in 1973 that Timashkov won young Sergey over to the event. A believer in speed and all-round athletic ability rather than brawn, the innovative coach was being proven right by 1975. Litvinov was making up in speed of turn and balance for what he lacked in height and weight.

A polished four-turn man already in his junior days, Sergey threw 76,98m in Dresden in 1976, which was hailed by the Russians as a world junior record. By the time of the 1977 European Junios Championships in Donetsk, which was very much his own backyard, Litvinov reached his full height of 1.80/5/10%" and weight of 94kg/207lb. He seemed to have all the cards stacked in his favour. But in the event the 1.88/62", 110kg/242lb Roland Steuk from East Berlin who, having recently converted to the four-turn, had just improved in quick succession to 75.42m, 75.62m and 76.04m in the run-up to the Championships, pipped him at the post with a modest 70,78m in a cold, tainy final. The big local favourite had to be satisfied with a silver.

But this adverse experience did not retard his progess. Having thrown 72.74m in the same year with the adult equipment in Kiev, he improved his best to 76.22m the following year (1978) in the Soviet hammermen's paradise, Leselidse, although in the USSR national championships he only managed to place 7th with a modest 72.46m. On the 1978 world list, Litvinov placed 10th.

That of course was a year of revolutionary advance in the hammer, which transformed the all-time list out of all recognition. First the West German Karl-Hans Riehm, who had held the world record with 78.50m for three months back in 1975, came close to the world mark of his compatriot, Walter Schmidt (79.30m), with a 79.12m throw mid-May, and then Soviet veteran Boris Zaichuk (30) showed big form by raising his personal best to 78.80m in June. The two were to remain the dominant figures of the scated.

The breaking of the 80m 'barrier' had for some time been on the cards, with several people claiming to have exceeded it in training. Nonetheless it was a major surprise even for his fellow-Russians when ex-boxer Zaichuk accomplished the feat with 80,14m on July 9th in the City of Moscow Championships, Suddenly 'old-man' Boris became the centre of attention. He recounted how he had been desperate for years for having had to abandon his first love, the ring, due to a broken right hand and how he converted to the hammer pretty late, fighting against the odds for years to emerge from the welter of his country's booming hammer scene.

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Boris, who has a reputation for being garrulous even under normal circumstances, was over the moon. He kept reaffirming his determination to break the world record again in the Prague Europeans, talking his head off about 85m results "soon" and even invented several versions of how he became a hammer thrower "only a few years ago". It will probably remain unclear for ever just how Zaichuk converted to the hammer, but it is known that he has been in regular, full-scale training since age 17, and that he has switched coaches, clubs and nominal jobx almost as often as some people change shirts. His annual progression was 53.70m (1964), 57.64m (1965), 58.38m (1966), 61.48m (1967), 62.46m (1988), 64.20m (1969), 65.94m (1970), 69.56m (1971), 69.34m (1972), 67.48m (1973), 69.20m (1974), 72.38m (1975), 75.42m (1976), 76.50m (1977).

Another thing about Boris Zaichuk is his size: like Litvinov, he is comparatisely small an 1.83/6'0' and 97kg/214lb. So can this be mere coincidence, or have the Russians come up with a new training techniques which favour smaller men? An answer is unlikely to materialise in a hurry, but the end to Boris' haleyon days did First his world record was broken by Richm (80.32m) in August, and then he flopped miserably in the European final — an event won by Yuriy Sedykh — finishing a lowly tixth with 75.62m. Riehm was held to a bronze by Steak. who had earlier raised the world junior record to Allevies Weekly

78.14m.

Pre-Olympic 1979 saw the emergence to the top of Sergey Litvinov, 21 by this time and rocksteady, who finished No 1 on the world list and proved the undisputed world leader for the year. He threw 79.82m in the GDR v USSR match in Leipzig, with which he advanced to 3rd place on the world all-time list; won the gold in the Moscow Spartakiad with 77.08m; and was victorious in the Montreal World Cup (78.70m), beating Richm (75.88m) and Steuk (74.82m). His only big-time defeat was in the European Cup Final in Turin, where Richm (78.86m) beat him (76.90m).

A sub-licutenant in the Red Army by this time, and married, Sergey did not only achieve impressive results, but also earned some cestatic praise from top experts in the hammer trade with his smooth style and lightning-fast turns. Dr Anatoliy Bondarchuk (1972 Olympic champion), Sedykh's mentor, coach and surrogate father tabbed him the most complete thrower of all times; Pat Connolly of the US simply referred to 'awesome'; and, perhaps more him as importantly in terms of his personal career, he also won the fullest confidence of USSR chief. coach Nikolay Politiko, who let it be known tacitly that Sedykh and Litvinov were already assured of their Olympic spots, and only the third place remained in contention.

Sergey, who is a modest, quictly confident young man with something of an intellectual bent

and a liking for the Russian literary classics 75.20m, just ahead of another great prospect, (Tolstoy, Dostoyevaky and Pushkin in particular, apparently), told the press in the autumn of 1979 that he expected 82m to be reached in Olympic year, but it might take another 15 years to reach 90m. "I hope to set up one or two world marks in the lower 80's myself", he added.

The Russians, determined to repeat the medal triple in Moscow, decided on a stricter-than-ever preparation for the 1980 Olympics. Thus last November, seven select throwers withdrew into the seclusion of a Black Sea training camp, led by national hammer coach Stanislav Voznyak, to spend much of the remaining months there. The seven, who have since been subjected to some uncompromising training spells interspersed with control tests and occasional trips to Leselidse, the Soviet's hammermen's prime competition site, are: Yuri Sedykh, 25; Sergey Litvinov, 22; Igor Nikulin, 20 (the reigning European junior Zaichuk, champion); Boris 32: Aleksey Malyukov, 30; and 1979 discoveries Juri Tamm. 20, and Pavel Repin, 26.

The likeliest 'Third Man' is young Igor Nikulin, son of Yuriy (4th in the 1964 Olympics). who placed 15th on the 1979 world list with Tamm (75.18m). Father Yuriy started Igor on the sporting path at the age of 9, and though he has been in hammer training since 13 insisted on allround ability all along. Igor improved first to 77.42m and then to 78.14m this February, and at the end of April he became the third man to surpass the 'dream barrier' with 80.02m in Leselidse in cold, rainy weather.

In the wake of Nikulin's breakthrough, Olympic title holder Sedykh broke Riehm's world record with a thumping 80.64m in Leselidse on May 16th after a spirited competition with Tamm, who also bettered the old record with 80.46m. Just eight days later, at Sochi, Litvinov captured the record with a prodigious throw of 81.66m. Clearly, the Russians are on the march, with five men over 80m this year!



Double Olympic champion Tatyana Kazankina (USSR) smashed her own world 1500m record by a second with a time of 3:55.0 in Moscow last weekend, ahead of Lyubov Smolka (3:56.7) and Nadyezhda Olizaryenko (3:56.8). The 800m intermediate time was 2:07.0, and 1200m was reached by Kazankina after a scorching 61.2 third lap in 3:08.2. Other highlights of the Znamenskiy Memorial meeting included a 17.07m triple jump by Yevgeniy Anikin (with the immortal Viktor Sancyev 4th with 16.76m), a hammer victory for Juri Tamo (80.40m) over Sergey Litvinov (79.86) and Yuriv Sedvkh (78.96) a world junior 200 record of 22.45 by Natalia Bochina, a 1:55.1 800 by Olga Mineyeva, and a 7.00m long jump for Tatyana Skatchko.

VIFTER FOR 5000/10,000



put more than 11/2 times the distance. Defending champion and world record holder Udo Beyer looks set to join Ralph Rose (1904/1908) and Parry O'Brien (1952/1956) as a two-time winner but be could have his work cut out if Capes, Reijo Stahlberg or former world record holder Aleksandr Baryshnikov hit top form. The three Yugoslavs (headed by Vladimir Mille at 21.14m) have been withdrawn by their national federation after failing a dope test.

Women's 200m: Marita Koch has been selected for this event as well as the 400 but is most unlikely to run as the 2nd round heats are due only half an hour before the 400 final. It probably won't make much difference to the GDR's gold rally, for 1976 champion Barbel Wockert (née Eckert) is currently in her best ever form, having run 200 in 22.19 and a windy 100 in 10.92. European champion Lyudmila Kondratyeva, Marlies Gohr, and the British duo of Sonia Lannaman and Kathy Smallwood will lead the fight to dethrone the champion.

Thursday, July 31st

3000m Steeplechase: The Ronos and US record holder Henry Marsh will be missed but even so this event could feature one of the great duels of the Games: Filbert Bayi v Bronisław Malinowski. A dramatic dress rehearsal took place in Stockholm on July 8th . . Bayi set off at world record pace (2:40.3 at 1000, 4:02.8 at 1500) far ahead of his rival but slowed (5:27.6 at 2000) sufficiently for Malinowski to pass him with 500 to go and pull away — only for the Pole to 'do a Baumgartl' at the last barrier. Bayi won in easily, his best time of \$18.0, with Malinowski picking himself up for an \$21.0 finish. Both men could run under \$10 in Moscow. The bronze medal is wide open and unpredictable Tony Staynings could be in contention if he can only stay with the nack.

Hammer: The one man who might have prevented another Soviet clean sweep of the medals, Karl-Hans Richm, is out of the Games, so the main interest will be in which order the mighty trio of Sergey Litvinov, 1976 champion Yuriy Sedykh and Juri Tamm (all of whom have held the world record at some point this year) finish. Best of the test may be Detlef Gerstenberg, Paul Dickenson or Chris Black will have to go over 74m for a chance of placing in the top eight.

Women's Long Jump: World record holder and European champion Vilma Bardauskiene flunked her last chance of making the USSR team, leaving Tatyana Skatchko (7,00m this year), Lidiya Alfeyeva and Tatyana Kolpakova to carry the home colours. The East Germans also field an immensely strong trio, and a danger to all will be Poland's Anna Wlodarczyk. Those close rivals Sue Reeve and Sue Hearnshaw both have the ability to break Mary Toomey's UK record of 6.76; such a jump on the day could win a place in the first six.

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SEDYKH REGAINS WORLD HAMMER MARK

THURSDAY, JULY 31st

THREE FINALS only — but what finals! A world record in the hammer by Yuriy Sedykh; a dramatic steeplechase in which Filbert Bayi foolishly or gallantly — depending on your viewpoint — tried to run away with the race but proved a sitting target for Bronislaw Malinowski on the last lap; and quite simply the greatest women's long jump competition in history climating with the most astonishing turn of events in the final round.

As happens to often in the throws at major championships the first round of the hammer proved crucial. Yuriy Sedykh, the defending champion, opened - and as good as closed --the competition with a mighty throw which clanked into the turf an astounding \$1.80m (268'4") away from the circle. The world record, which he held briefly earlier in the season, was his again. So too, it transpired, was the Olympic title - thus becoming the first to defend this event successfully since Ireland's Pat O'Callaghan in 1932 and going one better than his celebrated coach and surrogate father Anatoliy Bondarchuk, who was champion in 1972 and bronze medallist in 1976. Knowing the importance of taking advantage of being drawn first to throw, Sedykh warmed up for a long time and channelled all his determination into that opening effort. Still only 25, which is no age for a hammer thrower, he can aspire to equalling John Flanagan's record of three Olympic titles (1900-08).

It was revealing, in view of the oproar over whether or not Soviet officials were guilty of favouring their own athletes, that a television

replay showed perfectly clearly that a subsequent 81.46m throw given the white flag was in fact a foul. Sedykh's left foot touched the top of the tim of the circle. Whether the judge in question was not paying sufficient attention or whether he chose to ignore what he saw is a matter of conjecture; either way it reflects badly upon the standard of officiating. Sedykh's series: 81.80, 81.46, 79.68, foul, 80.98, 80.70! Sergey Litvinov, much the smallest of the Soviet trio at 1.80/5'10'4'' and 95kg/209lb also released his best throw (80.64) in the first round; indeed it was his only valid throw. The bronze went to the Estonian, Juri Tamm (another pupil of the great Bondarchuk), and so the USSR scored a clean sweep for the second Olympics running.

Intriguing steeplechase

The steeplechase brought together two of the most popular runners in the sport, each of whom would have been a deserving Olympic champion on account of their contribution to athletics over a period of several years. Filbert Bayi, who as a novice ran the 1500 and steeplechase in Munich in 1972 (clocking a highly respectable 8:41.4 at the age of 19), lost his big chance of Olympic glory in 1976 due to the African boycott. Would he have beaten John Walker for the 1500m title as he had in the Commonwealth Games two years earlier? We'll never know, but having opted this time for the steeplechase - despite only a handful of attempts, like Kip Keino in 1972 - there were many who hoped he would win. But there was much sentimental support also for Bronislaw Malinowski, one of the event's all-time greats and a pace setter in the last two Olympic finals in which he finished 4(h (1972) and 2nd (1976), At the age of 29 this would be his last Olympic opportunity. There were other good men in the field, notably Eshetu Tura of Ethiopia who was another African victim of the Montreal boycott, but it looked like being essentially a two-man race.

True to his instincts — the natural front runner — Bayi set off at a devilish pace. He had committed himself; either he would blow up, leaving himself desperately vulnerable in the

closing stages, or he would run clean away with the race and perhaps in world record time. He was gambling, but so too was Malinowski who decided to let the Tanzanian go and trust to his own pace judgment. It was an intriguing situation.

Mile Same

Only two men were tempted to try and match strides with Bayi: Eshetu Tura and Francisco Sanchez, one of two very fine Spanish runners in the final. Malinowski wasn't drawn; he was in 4th place some 15m behind Bayi after 600m and a similar distance adrift at 1000m which Bayi reached in an extravagant 2:38.8 (that's 7:56.4 pace!), followed by Tura (2:39.2) and Sanchez (2:39.9) with Malinowski through in 2:41.0, which at 8:03.0 pace was fast enough to be going on with. Bayi slowed only very slightly during a phenomenal second kilometre of 2:41.5 which

If it wasn't for Bob Beamon and that jump, Lutz Dombrowski would now be world record holder. His fifth round \$.54m overtakes Larry Myricks on the all-time list and he has proved the most clearcut champion so far. Three of his efforts exceeded the second place leap of \$.21 and the average of his five legal jumps was \$.31. Perhaps at Mexico City, with a 2m/sec following wind, \$.90 might not look all that impossible to this young East German.

Wednesday, July 30th

The total sum of events this morning at the Lenin Stadium was the hammer and women's long jump qualifying. Simply, the Sues did, Paul Diekenson and Chris Black didn't, Yuriy Sedykh opened the hammer with a new Olympic record (78.22m), which was followed by a 79m-plus foul by Sergey Litvinov. I expect a Soviet 1-2-3 again, and I've a feeling that 80m line is going to take some hammer... sorry! Tonight we could lift three more medals, maybe none.

Sadly, Britian's chances slipped away. David Jenkins was drawn in the outside for his final, but that's been no problem for him in the past, yet by the start of the home straight it was obvious there was another gold coming up for the USSR. During the afternoon break Stan Greenberg had said be thought Markin looked incredibly strong. So it proved, with Rick Mitchell's 44.84 silver run being a new Commonwealth record.

Commonweath records too for Jamaica's Merlene Ottey with 22.32 in her semi -- in front of Barbel Wockel and Kathy -- followed by a blistering 22.20 for bronze in the final. Wockel

had obviously been having us on, as she never tooked troubled, Ripping through the field, she lowered Bochina's earlier Olympic record to 22.03 to retain her title. Our trio placed 5th, 6th and 5th, but with Denise Boyd there as well the Commonwealth did outnumber the rest. A personal best for Bev in the semi and for both her and Kathy in the final. Reading AC can feel proud tonight.

Geoff Capes' first round effort of 20.50m was the best he could muster, but it was good enough for only 5th. Kiselyev was a worthy winner, four of his efforts being over 21m. Beyer suffered from whatever the East German throwers were suffering from . . and, surprise surprise, there wasn't one put over 21,50m.

The second nought for Britain came in the 5000m semis, With first four plus four fastest to qualify, you must feel sorry for Nick Rose. Fifth in the first heat, well ahead of a dejected — and very ill — Dave Moorcroft, the Bristol man saw his chances go as the second semi went some 11 seconds faster. Barry Smith was left for 9th on the last lap, but still ran faster than Nick. Unthinkable to watch a 5000m final with no domestic involvement, but the likely Ethiopia/Coghlan battle should be intriguing.

Meanwhile, the pole vault was in operation. The French had probably their best ever chance of an Olympic medal. Three 5.70m vaulters with



5.77m-man Houvion leading the challenge. But it wasn't to be. On a night when fortune really favoured the bold, Wladyslaw Kozakiewicz became my man of the Games. He shared the lead at 5.60m, took it singly at 5.65m, but then, instead of sitting back and waiting, the mightly man stayed in with the rest. What demoralisation they must have felt. His first-time clearance at 5.65 was enough for the gold, but when he did the same at 5.70 and 5.75 it had to be a special night. It was. He made 5.78 at his second attempt — a new world record. As for the French — rien.

Thursday, July 3141

The evening proceedings started at 17,00 hours. By 17,02 the hammer was won and the world record lists were again rewritten. First competitor: Yuriy Sedykht first throw 81,80m. Game over, Sergey Litvinov threw third - \$0,64 - Silver medal, Sandwiched between them, Juri Tamm - whose opening 77,84 was good enough for bronze - improved to 78,96 second time around, Short and sweet.

The women's long jump was a complete contrast. As they entered the last round it was Skatchko 7.01m, Wlodarczyk 6.88, Wujak 6.88, Kolpakova 6.87, Nytrynova 6.83, Wlodarczyk improved to a stronger silver place (6.95), then with three jumps left it all happened. Kolpakova jumped 7.06, a new Olympic record, for first place. Wujak 7.04 for second place: and lastly, Siegl 6.87 to climb to fifth. One felt immense sorrow for those who didn't have a chance to fight back. The Sues placed 9th and 10th; but a new British record would only have gained seventh.

The relay heats/semis were uninspiring: the only excitement came in a men's sprint semi when the strongly fancied Cubans eventually completed the final change nearer the tape than the changeover box. From a completely neutral viewpoint, the aftermath was hilarious — plenty of chest beating, verbal obscenties and murderous looks. Not Silvio Leonard's Games.



14 August 16th

Filbert Bayi tried the only way he knows to lift the Gold he may have been denied in Montreal. From gun to last water jump he led bravely, but the second night in succession belonged to Poland. Malinowski was about 20m down at the bell, but he knew Bayi was coming back fast. Another worthy winner, in 8:09.7.

Rounding up the night the 1500m semis, like the 800m, kept Coe and Ovett apart until it really matters. On paper Seb had the harder draw, but with a performance that at last looked like the real thing he made it look casy. Ovett and Cram were already there as Ovett again proved a comfortable winner. I don't think I've ever seen him wave whilst still in second place before, but that's Steve. At 5.30 tomorrow it's for real. Until tonight I was 100% sure that Ovett would lift the double, but now I'm down to 99%. Perhaps that's all Seb will need.

Friday, August 1st

First event to start was the men's high jump final. It was a fitting climax to the Games — in that it was also the last to finish — as it provided us with another World record. With Soviet involvement eliminated early on the crowd were at last appreciative without being biased, and Gerd Wessig's ovation earned by his second clearance of 2.36m was well deserved.

The other field event saved until last was the women's discus, which really went off with little or no attention at all. East European hulks throwing dinner plates around hardly has the same attention as Coe, Overt and Miruts Yifter. Evelin Jahl duly recovered her form, with four efforts over 68m, whilst Meg Ritchie just missed the final cut, placing 9th with 61.16m — same position as Mark Naylor (2.21m) in the high jump.

The East German girls produced the other world record of the evening in the sprint relay preventing a clean sweep from the Russians in the baton events. Good to see both of our girls' teams winning the bronze medals. It meant that both

Kathy Smallwood and Linsey Macdonald got their medals, and they had worked so hard for them. The men though, were not so lucky. Drew McMaster could not hold France's Herman Panzo (though the team did set a UK record), whilst Glen Cohen 'had an accident' and failed to finish in the longer race.

Meanwhile, out on the streets of Moscow the marathon runners were in action. Stadium coverage was poor - non-existent once a non-Russian was leading — and the TV coverage was really less than adequate. Shots of river boats, sights of Moscow and Africans back in 20th place filled the monitors all too often. You had to watch hard to pick up the leaders. Our trio were nothing less than a great disappointment. In these days of ever-increasing participation in the longer events, the retention of the title by Valdemar Cierpinski was an exceptional feat. Apparently Yifter is going for this event in LA. For now though, the wizened Ethiopian settled for the 5000/10,000 double. Another team effort saw the Africans set up their second gold for Miruts, something we never really doubted. And his was the only double.

And so to the 1500. Difficult to know what to say really. The race details, I'm sure, are familiar



ITALY'S GREAT NIGHT

Rome, August 5th

A crowd of over 60,000 watched the first of the major post-Olympic international meetings: the 'Golden Gala' in Rome's Olympic Stadium. It proved a great night for the fans, sweltering in a temperature of 35°C, as they watched Pietro Mennea defeat Don Quarrie by 4m in a 20.01 200 (just 1/100th outside Valeriy Borzov's world best at or near sea level), Sara Simeoni win the high jump with 1.98m (only just failing at a world record 2.02); Gabriella Dorio duck under 4 min for 1500 for the first time to become the first non-East European to break the barrier, Mariano Scatterzini chase kip Rono home in the steeplechase with a great national record of 8:12.5, and Maurizio Damilano win the 3000 walk. In addition there were near world records in the pole vault where Thierry Vigneton defeated Olympic champion Władysław Kozakiewiez and came close to breaking the Pole's new world record when attempting 5.80m, the hammer in which Karl-Hans Richm (\$0,78m) upset Olympic gold medallist Yuriy Sedykh and the women's hurdles in which surprise Moscow champion Vera Komisova took another big chunk off her personal best with 12.39. Another Olympic revelation, Viktor Markin, wound up a distant. 3rd in the 400 won by Harald Schmid.

Gordienko First Over 6000 In Women's Heptathlon

THE HEPTATHLON replaces the pentathlon as the official all-rounders connetition for women at the beginning of 1981, and holder of the as yet unofficial world record is Yekaterina Gordienko (USSR), who along with Nadyezhda Tkachenko was disqualified after the 1978 European Championships pentathlon when doping tests showed she had been taking anabolic steroids. Gordienko, originally placed 5th in Prague, returned to top competition this year and in Odessa on September 13th/14th she became the first to score over 6000 points for the new sevenevent test. She clocked 14.06 for the hurdles, put the shot 14.80m, high jumped 1.74m and ran 200m in 24.53 on the first day, and long jumped 6.43m, threw the javelin 32.08m and covered 800m in 2:11.4 on the second to amass 6144 points, Her pentathlon score during the competition was 4620, and it's obvious that her heptathlon total will be bettered considerably next year when athletes like the Olympic medallists Tkachenko, Olga Rukavishnikova and Olga Kuragina get going. The UK best so far is 5357 by Sue Longden in 1979.

Steeplechasing for women? Why not, say the Finns if nobody else. The first women's 1500m steeplechase was staged in Finland in August 1979 when Tuija Toivonen clocked 5:00.2; the second was held this past August and this time Tuija improved to 4:42.3 — only to lose to Marjo Riitta Lakka (4:41.8).

Book Reviews

"The 1980 Olympics: Track & Field", photographed by Mark Shearman, reported by Matti Hannus; published by The Sports Market Ltd; obtainable from the 'AW' Book Dept, £8.30 (inclusive of postage).

With expert reporting by Matti Hannus, well over 200 superb photos (many in colour) by Mark Shearman, the complete results and much other material of interest, this is without doubt the most comprehensive and sumptuously produced book on Olympic athletics I have seen.

Mark Shearman, whose work frequently adorny the pages of this magazine, has surpassed himself with the range of photos in this book. The months that have passed may have dimmed memories of the Moscow Games - but they come flooding back as you turn the pages, Recaptured is the moment when Allan Wells" uncertainty turned to joy as he realised from the TV playback that he had won the 100m; Steve Ovett's elation and Seb Coe's despair after the 800m, followed by Seb's "Lord, I did it" expression as he won the 1500; and the many facets of Daley Thompson's road to the gold. (showing plenty of scope for technical improvement in his hurdling, by the way!). There are numerous studies of that ever intriguing mystery man Yifter, and world record breakers. Wessig, Kozakiewicz, Sedykh, Olizaryenko and Tkachenko are included also of course. But to too are the likes of Thipsamay Chanthaphone of Laos who was last man home in the 20km walk and the 'third world' tailenders in a heat of the women's 800.

Matti Hannus, the well-informed Finnish journalist, has written a detailed and perceptive event-by-event report in English, Little has escaped his attention. He notes with justified scepticism that the athletes from Sierra Leone performed far below the Olympic qualifying performances claimed for them by their national federation. Three sprinters said to have run 10.20 each (more likely a hand-timed 10.2, but even that's doubtful) all ran outside 11 sec, a supposed 46,40 400 man took 52,98, a "1:47,4 800 performer" clocked 2:06.5 and a female credited with 2:02.8 recorded 2:33.4 in Moscow! Mattl takes several verbal swipes at the unsporting behaviour of certain segments of the crowd; as when the USSR 200 metres representative Aleksandr Stasevich pulled a muscle after 40m in his heat and fell to the track in agony. "The merciless crowd whistled at its own man", he observes. He mentions other cases where speciators attempted to put off athletes with a good chance of defeating Soviel contenders.

He also cites various instances of "dubious judging" in the triple jump when Joao Carlos de

Oliveira and Ian Campbell were persistently redflaceed, while in his report of the discus he writes of Luis Delis's final throw (66.64m to win): "The 22-year-old Cuban . . . gets his big body well behind the discus and throws far - to about 67m. Spectators are roaring, but, for some reason, the throw is measured only as 66.32. The discus sailed as if to gold but it only brought bronze". Equally disturbing was the measurement accorded Dalnis Kula's third-round javelin throw, remember, he had opened with two fouls and all depended on this one if he was to remain in the competition. Matti writes: "The throw is straight from the book, a masterpiece, low against the wind but lands quite flat at about 87m, bounces forward - and the officials measure 8-8-8-8!" With his next throw the reprieved young Latvian recorded 91 20, and the gold medal was his.

Adding to the breadth of coverage are presscomments on various events, personalities and incidents culled from correspondents from Britain, Finland, Norway, USA, France, Switzerland, Germany, Italy, Sweden and the GDR; a who's who of the gold medallists; and highlights and leading results of all the previous Games.

Among records that might otherwise have eluded your notice ... Fastest run backwards; 100 yards in 13.1 by Paul Wihon (NZ) in 1979, Longest 'non-stop' run: 568km (352.9 miles) in 121 hours 54 minutes by Bertif Jarlaker (Swe) in May 1980, during which he was moving for 95.04% of the time. Longest sequence of weekly marathons: Jay F. Helgerson (USA) ran a certified marathon or longer cach week for 52 weeks in 1979/80.
