The eight teams are Finland, UK, USSR, Sweden, Bulgaria, Norway, Yugoslavia and Turkey.

Should Finland edge out Britain in the match, another chance to qualify for Zagreb would be by winning the 'B' Final in Athens (August 1st/2nd) — but BAAB general secretary David Shaw warned on Monday that "there is a strong possibility" that the Board would opt out of that fixture for financial reasons. It could cost about £6000, without any guarantee of Sports Council subsidy, and the Board is already financially embarrassed by the poor 'gate' at the Poland/Germany match.

The outstanding clash here should occur in the javelin where Tessa Sanderson (best of 69.70m) meets up with the amazing Antoaneta Todorova of Bulgaria who ranks just below her on the all-time list with 69.66 — and only turned 18 on June 8th! Her progress has been phenomenal: from a best of 47.84 in 1978 she improved to 57.46 in 1979, a world junior record of 66.40 in 1980 (aged 16) and 69.66 this year. If the wind is helpful, Tatyana Biryulina's world record of 70.08 is in danger. The sprints will be high class as Kathy Smallwood opposes Vader of Holland (11.28), Nuneva of Bulgaria (11.31) and Rega of France (11.39) in the 100, and Rega (22.72), Vader (22.99) and Zapryanova of Bulgaria (23.03) in the 200.

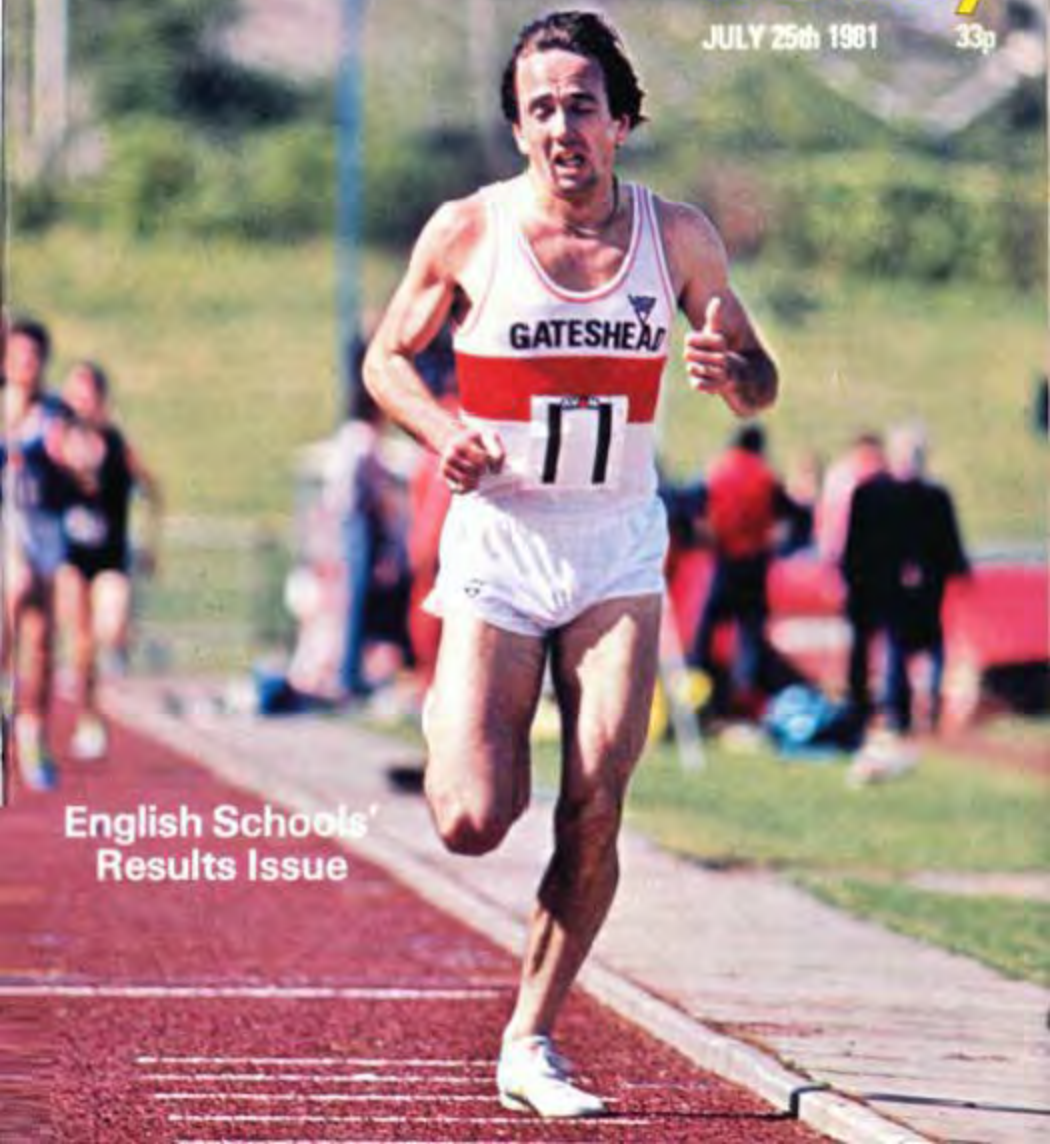

physically", she told *Spartecho* mid-June, "I had never been injured before. So I had some hard weeks, and when both Koch and Wockel proved faster than me at the season's first meeting in Cottbus, when I could only manage 11.30, things looked grim". Marlies, who is a student of psychiatry in Jena, preparing for her intermediate exam this year, feels different about it all more recently. "In retrospect, the 11.30 is not that bad after such a long layoff, and now I know I will get back to the top. But not this year. This year, the exam is the high point, and supporting my husband in his soccer career." At the time of writing, Marlies has a season's best of 11.17.

GDR hammer star Roland Steuk laments that the ball-and-chain gang will have to "get used to it psychologically that the new equipment defined by the IAAF will mean shorter results by 1.5 metres for some time". In the meantime, Mathias Moder (17) is getting on Roland's trail. The first 17 year-old to go beyond the 72m mark, he has broken Steuk's GDR junior record with 72.08m. Olympic champion Yuriy Sedykh of the USSR thinks the new hammer specifications will make only 30cm difference, and even that only for a short while. "That difference will evaporate by year's end", he told Jan Popper of *Ceskoslovenský Sport*.

In Czechoslovakia, predictably, Jarmila Kratochvílová (now down to 11.09/21.97/49.17) remains the rave, and a whole gamut of experts and fellow-athletes have commented on Jarmila's great style. "She is very light and loose", said Steve Williams, "and her action could actually be taught as an example". Barbel Wockel said in Ostrava: "I could not cope with Jarmila at 200m now". And Barbel's coach, Horst Hille: "Her movement flows. Her running has unparalleled harmony. But what I find most amazing about her is that she can take such an incredible loading in training."

Another athlete to draw unmitigated admiration is Carl Lewis. Soviet track and field 'futurologist', Vladimir Kuznetsov, the one-time athlete who is now scientific assistant at the Moscow Institute for Physical Culture, predicted two years ago that the jumper to break Beamon's record "will have to be 21-26 years old, 1.87-1.88m tall, 78-80kg and run 10.00 for 100m". Lewis — just 20 — fits the model (1.88m, 80kg and 10.00) admirably, and Kuznetsov only regrets that he wasn't there in Leningrad for the USSR v USA match. "Carl is capable of breaking the record in Europe, and I feel sure that he would have done so in Leningrad", he says. "In Mexico, he could get beyond 9 metres".

In the women's high jump, the betting is that Kersin Dedner (GDR) and Yelena Popkova-Goloborodko (USSR) may eventually emerge as the inheritors of the Sara-Rosi rivalry. The 1979 European junior champion, Dedner, impressed with her 1.95m in the GDR v UK match and is

now up to 1.96. Yelena, who is a bit short (1.72m) for the event, jumped 1.93 in Tallin and is now the toast of Soviet high jumping again. Having jumped 1.95 and won the Spartakiad in 1979, Yelena was considered a certainty for the Moscow Games. But then, in 1980, she spurned advice, got married, and gave the Olympic qualifiers a miss, thinking that she would get the ticket regardless. She did not. Now USSR chief jumps coach Vitold Kreyer is in favour of letting her represent her country again.

Udo Beyer says he does not expect to get beyond 22m this year, while Brian Oldfield is "clearly capable of 22.50 any time now". He says that his battle to overcome injury had been a nightmare. On August 18th, 1980 — immediately after Moscow — Udo went to Prof. Jungnickel for a complex knee operation, and had two separate operations in fact on his left knee. He rested until the end of February, followed by a six-week limbering up period, playing table-tennis only. "Within three weeks I was back to 20m", recalls, "but that's when the real heavy-duty bit started". His season's best to date: 21.13.

The East German hierarchy is happy about the emergence of Werner Schildhauer (22), and his breaking of Jurgen Haase's decade-old national record in the 10,000m in the match against Britain in Dresden is considered a real boon, even if the tall Jena runner did lose to Geoff Smith, 27:43.76 to 27:49.45. Coach Walter Schmidt, who also trains Waldemar Cierpinski, says that "Haase's record was the oldest record in the books, and its wiping off from there had already been on Werner's agenda last year. This was the main thing in Dresden, and no matter that Smith ran away at the end. Smith would not take the lead for a second. This was a pity, because Werner's time could have been a lot better if he had". Smith has been lauded in the GDR for his dynamic 58 sec last lap, and criticised for his "sneak tactics".

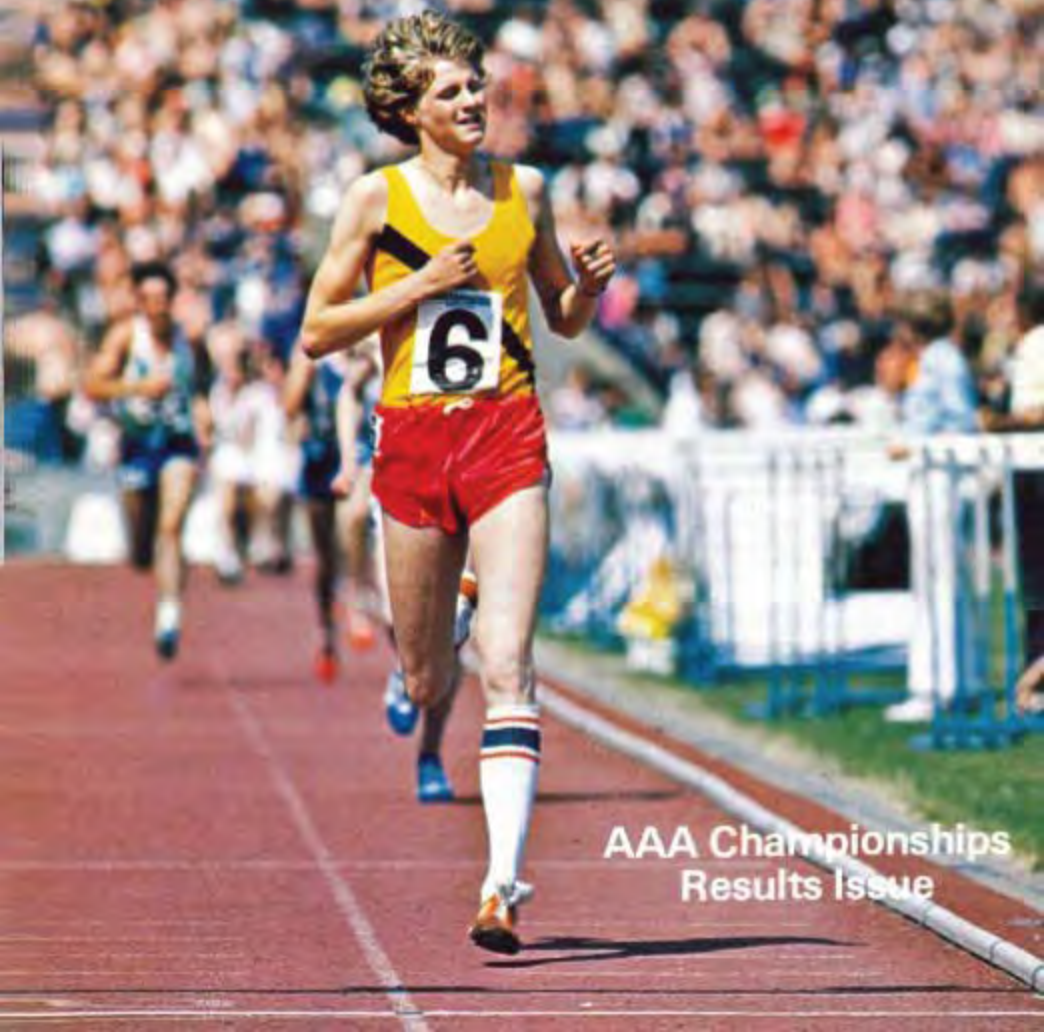

Germany To End GDR/USSR Domination?

FOR the first time in its 16 year history, the European Cup for men could be won by a team other than from the USSR or GDR. The German Federal Republic, which came so close to success in the first two editions of the Cup (losing by a single point to the USSR each time), has a one-in-three chance of victory in Zagreb this weekend. So has the USSR. So has the GDR. If the formbook is anything to go by it could hardly be closer between the three teams and it could all hinge on the final event, the 4x400 relay. If it does, the West Germans — who have a squad capable of lowering the European record inside 3 minutes — will be laughing. The women's contest, as usual, will be a straight fight between the GDR and USSR, with the East Germans favoured to retain the trophy.

Britain's prospects? Fourth in the men's and third in the women's, which would equal our best ever showing, is the likely outcome. Barring a series of disasters by one of the 'big three' and an equivalent run of miraculous results by our lads it would be unfair to expect higher than fourth, but we do seem to have a reasonable margin of security over the nearest challengers, Italy and Poland. The British girls have no chance at all of finishing higher than third and will have to be collectively on form to keep Germany and Bulgaria at bay. Overall, counting men and

women, Britain should finish fourth behind the GDR, USSR and Germany — a satisfactory result.

ZAGREB PREVIEW

As the form guide (p. 46) demonstrates, there are going to be intriguing clashes in every event. Statistics of course tell only part of the story, so don't necessarily expect the finishing order to tally with the athletes' best marks this season! For instance, Allan Wells ranks only 5th in the 100 and 4th in the 200 on 1981 times but he will be fighting for a sprint double. The biggest obstacle to that will take the shape of 19-year-old Frank Emmelmann (GDR) who ran 10.19 into a 1.1m wind and 20.40 last weekend. Other tough opponents for Wells are Christian Haas (Ger) and old rival Marian Woronin (Pol). Hopefully, Wells — who says he doesn't want to run in the relay — will win at least one event, and Britain's other top hopes for individual victories are Seb Coe, Steve Ovett, Dave Moorcroft and Mark Holtom. On paper Coe is much faster than anyone else in the 800, but on the track the physical and tactical factors involved may make it a more competitive affair than the figures might suggest. European champion Olaf Beyer zipped back to top form with a 1:44.31 victory in

last weekend's GDR Championships, Nikolay Kirov — whom Coe beat for the Olympic silver medal — has set a USSR record of 1:45.11 recently, and Germany's Willi Wulbeck is always a dangerous opponent, as Coe knows to his cost!

The unrelated Messrs Gonzalez of France are on paper the closest rivals to Ovett and Moorcroft, but in Zagreb the main challenge could well come from the German pair of Harald Hudak and Thomas Wessinghage despite, like Wulbeck, only having clocked mediocre times so far this year. Given a decent start, unlike at the AAA (where he still managed 13.75), Holtom could be up with anybody in the Cup 110 hurdles — and that might include Olympic champion Thomas Munkelt, although the GDR title went to Andreas Schliske in 13.65. Other British men with a good chance of placing in the first three include David Jenkins, Julian Goater, Gary Oakes, Keith Stock (if he can recapture his UK record form), Roy Mitchell and Aston Moore (who comes in for Keith Connor) — but, as has been emphasised before, in a contest of this nature every athlete's position is important and, relatively, it will be just as helpful to the British team's cause if for example Robert Weir could place 5th rather than the anticipated 6th.

Among the expected highlights of the men's match: European record holder Harald Schmid v Olympic champion Volker Beck in the 400 hurdles; a high flying pole vault (in which Vladimir Polyakov, pending world record holder at 5.81m, is preferred by the USSR selectors to Konstantin Volkov, whose more recent 5.84 may not be ratified as there are indications it was an exhibition vault); another epic hammer duel between Yuriy Sedykh and Karl-Hans Riehm; and that climactic 4x400 relay.

Britain's best hope of an individual win in the women's match rests with Tessa Sanderson, who has already easily beaten the only opponent who ranks ahead of her in distance — Antoaneta Todorova. Kathy Smallwood could pick up a couple of second places behind the seemingly invincible East Germans: Joslyn Hoyte-Smith is in line for a third place; and fourths could be the order of the day for Paula Fudge, Shirley Strong, Yvette Wray, Ann-Marie Cording and Meg Ritchie. The 4x100 squad looks capable of finishing second and the 4x400 girls could place third. If the conditions are favourable there could be a series of UK records in the women's events, including maybe Chris Boxer in the 800 (where she might have to break 1:59 even for 4th) and Venissa Head, who could finish anywhere between 4th and 7th in the shot.

An added incentive for athletes is qualifying for the Europe Select team for the World Cup in Rome. The first two nations go through automatically, which in the case of the women is bound to be the GDR and USSR. Thus, the first non-East German or Russian to finish in each event has a good chance of being picked for

Europe. Again, Tessa has the best prospects among the British girls, particularly as Czechoslovakia's Jarmila Kratochvilova is the obvious choice for the 200 and 400. The men's situation is more confusing, but Wells, Coe, Ovett, Moorcroft, Holtom and Oakes will all be in the running.

Mel Watman is the only British journalist to have attended every European Cup men's final. He will be in Zagreb and his detailed report and the complete results will appear in the August 29th issue of 'AW'.

Best Ever European Cup for Britain

**Wins for Wells, Coe, Moorcroft and Holtom
as GDR and USSR dominate both matches**

"BARRING A SERIES of disasters by one of the 'big three' and an equivalent run of miraculous results by our lads, it would be unfair to expect higher than fourth".

Those were Mel Watman's words in last week's issue in his Zagreb preview. Perhaps 'miraculous' is not the right word to describe our lads' performances, but the efforts of the West German's can only be likened to recent Antipodean batting exploits.

Briefly, in two days of inspired performances, our men's team achieved its highest position ever in the European Cup (third) and should provide a good handful of the Europe Select team to contest the World Cup in a fortnight's time. Allan Wells (100), Seb Coe (800), Dave Moorcroft (5000) and Mark Holtom (110H) were our four winners, and with three seconds and three thirds we finished a good margin clear of the West Germans.

After ten wins in its semi-final in Edinburgh the women's team was brought back to reality by the Eastern bloc and lost third place to the West German's by virtue of them having one

individual winner (Ulrike Meyfarth) to our nil. However, Kathy Smallwood performed superbly to gain two individual seconds to Marlies Gohr and Barbel Wöckel, and Tessa Sanderson proved that she really can compete these days as she ran out a good second to 18-year-old Antoaneta Todorova's world record of 71.88m; clearly the outstanding performance of the meeting.

British European
Cup Triumph

BRITAIN RANKED THIRD IN EUROPE

Mel Watman, in Zagreb, sees UK's best ever Cup showing

THAT this is a golden era for British athletics was further demonstrated in the European Cup Final in Zagreb on August 15th/16th when the UK men's team achieved its highest ever placing of third, the girls officially finished fourth (but third equal on points), and — overall — Britain filled third position for the first time behind the GDR and USSR, ahead of Germany.

The splendid showing of our team was one of the two main talking points of the men's final, the other being the disastrous performance by the German Federal Republic. The Germans had fared poorly in their semi-final, qualifying a mere point ahead of Hungary, but on paper their team for the final looked strong enough for possible victory. However, the first few track events threw up one reverse after another — Harald Schmid losing the 400 hurdles, Christian Haas sixth in the 100, Harald Hudak last of eight in the 1500 — and the final straw came at the start of the second day when Günther Lohre failed to score in the vault. The West German fans became so dejected that even their most popular athlete, Thomas Wessinghage, was derisively whistled when he finished fifth in the 5000, and perhaps the lowest point of all came in their supposed stronghold event, the 4x400, where even a fighting last leg by individual 400 winner Hartmut Weber could take the squad only into fifth place.

By contrast the British lads, with very few exceptions, performed up to or beyond expectations. Whereas the Germans had only one winner, Britain had four in Allan Wells (100), Seb Coe (800), Dave Moorcroft (5000) and Mark Holtom (110H). There were excellent second places by Wells (200), Julian Goster (10,000) and Aston Moore (TJ) — the latter the only member of the team to set a personal best — and valuable thirds were gained by Steve Cram (1500), Keith Stock (PV) and the 4x400 team. Britain's final score of 106½ pts was easily their highest ever, comparing with 71½ in Edinburgh (4th), 83 in Nice (4th), 95 in Helsinki (4th) and 82 in Turin (5th). The breakdown between track and field events is revealing: (track) 1, GDR 76; 2, UK 74; 3, USSR 65; 4, Germany 57; (field) 1, USSR 59½ (nothing worse than second place!); 2, GDR 52; 3, Germany 40; 4, UK 32½.

One of the factors which contributed to the exceptional British team performance was the visible and audible support in the stadium. The 'AW' party, and other smaller groups, certainly made their presence felt and their encouragement was a great filip for the athletes. The British supporters' enthusiasm, and the athletes' appreciative waves, made for a very happy atmosphere — a situation the other national teams must have envied.

The GDR won the men's trophy for the fourth successive time, and with a record score of 128 pts (previously 125 in 1977 and 1979). Out of 20 events the East Germans were first in eight, second in two and third in four. Nevertheless, they were pushed all the way by a Soviet squad who at the finish were only 3½ pts behind with their highest ever score of 124½ despite only 3½ victories (the pole vault first place was shared with France). But the East Germans deserved to win and if, as many feel, a bonus point were awarded for victory in an event (making the scoring 9-7-6 etc) their margin over the USSR would have been a more comfortable eight points.

Other points the European AA should consider before the 1983 contest are extending the length of the meeting (there was simply too much going on simultaneously to appreciate it all), instructing some teams to change their colours as in football clashes (with four of the men's teams wearing blue vests it was very confusing for stadium spectators and televisioners alike — not to mention us poor reporters and commentators) and pruning to the absolute minimum the speeches by local worthies at the opening ceremony. How one feels for the athletes lined up on the arena as some politician or civic leader drones on interminably and, for the majority, unintelligibly.

Javelin: Only a tiny crowd was assembled for the start of an interesting competition which took place before the opening ceremony and which one could therefore watch uninterrupted. The weather was very warm with a slight breeze as left-handed Detlef Michel took the first throw of the contest. It landed at 90.86m, which was to prove the winner, and the East German selectors must have been beaming for Michel, world leader this year at 92.84, had lost by 3m to Gerald Weiss in the previous weekend's GDR Championships. Olympic champion Dainis Kula took four rounds to strike reasonable form, his throw of 87.00 moving him into second place, a position consolidated by his final effort of 88.40. Klaus Tafelmeier, expected to take third, dropped a place to Polish reserve Michal Wacławik who added almost 3m to his previous best with 86.26. Another surprise was Darko Cujnik, who became the first Yugoslav ever to throw 80m; indeed his 83.56 added no less than 3.82m to his previous national record. Dave Ottley, fourth in the 1979 final with 79.40, this time finished fifth but with a much better performance. His fourth-round 84.30, the third longest mark of his career, appeared to have sewn up fourth place, but the Pole later relegated him one place. Dave was unlucky, though, with his fifth-round reply: he couldn't quite stop himself slithering over the line and thus fouled a throw which landed somewhere in excess of his UK record of 85.52. Team scores: 1, GDR 8; 2, USSR 7; 3, Poland 6; 4, Germany 5; 5, UK 4.

400 Hurdles: Not since the 1977 European Cup Final has Harald Schmid been beaten in this event by a European, and it was again Volker Beck who did the damage. The Olympic champion took his chance well. Drawn in lane eight, the East German never saw a soul from start to finish as he clocked a season's best of 48.94. Schmid (lane seven), suffering from a back injury, was not at his best and for the first half of the race had his work cut out against Gary Oakes (lane six). The Briton was on level terms with Schmid at the fifth hurdle (touch down time of 22.0 taken by Dave Cocksedge), close behind Beck, but he dropped away to fifth around the final turn — one place down on what he had expected. "I went off too fast", he admitted. Scores: 1, GDR 16; 2, USSR 13; 3, Germany 12; 4, Poland 11; 5, UK 8.

100: An intriguing duel was in prospect between Allan Wells (29), with a season's legal best of 10.31 and yet to display his best form, and Frank Emmelmann (19) who only the previous week had won the GDR title in 10.19 against a 1.1m wind. Could Wells, with only a couple of 100's behind him this summer, come up trumps yet again on the big occasion? Wells was away fast ("I've been doing new things with my start"), as were Marian Woronin and Christian Haas, and quickly stole a metre advantage over

Emmelmann. The East German proceeded to nibble away at that lead for the remainder of the race but was still nearly half a metre down at the finish and Wells had brought off what could rank as the second most notable 100 victory of his career. The time was a superb one; his 10.17 into an 0.9m wind rates favourably with anything he has achieved previously. Remember, his UK record of 10.11 in Moscow had a 1.3m tailwind, and his only other faster legal mark — 10.15 in 1978 — also benefitted from 1.3m assistance. "I thought I had something up my sleeve", he said. "Emmelmann was coming up at 80 but I had something left". Wells, who was third in the 100 (his last defeat at the distance by a European) and first in the 200 in Turin two years ago, is the first Briton to win the 100 in a European Cup Final. Scores: 1, GDR 23; 2, USSR 17; 3, UK 16; 4, Poland 16; 5, Germany 15.

1500: Deputising for the injured Steve Ovett, Steve Cram will have learned a lot from this typical slow-starting, fast-finishing Cup race — not least that when every point could be vital you don't ease up before the line just because first place has already gone. It was no disgrace losing to Olaf Beyer (whose training is geared to 1500 this season) after pulling out all the stops trying to drop him, but it was careless to be pipped for what should have been a safe second. With Beyer leading at a trot for the first two laps in 62.7 and 64.8 Cram decided to hit the front with 600 to run. The increase in pace was not dramatic at first (the bell was reached in 2:51.8) but with a lap remaining Cram really began to push hard. He flashed past the 1200 mark in 3:05.6 and kept accelerating, but Beyer impressed more along the back straight as he moved up from sixth to a menacing second. Steve gave his all but was powerless to resist when the European 800 champion drove past 40m from the finish. A late burst by another 800 star, Olympic bronze medallist Nikolay Kirov, relegated Cram to third, just 0.2 sec behind the winner. Beyer, clocking 3:43.52, covered the last 300 in 37.7, 400 in 51.6 and 800 in 1:52.4, with Cram's corresponding splits 38.1, 51.9 and 1:52.0. A disappointed Steve said: "I had no alternative but to take it from the

bell, because Beyer is not only fast but strong. I tried to run it out of him. I thought that was the way to do it. Still, it's good experience for the European Championships and I'm not the first British athlete to be beaten by Beyer!" Scores: 1, GDR 31; 2, USSR 24; 3, UK 22; 4, Poland 19; 5, Germany 16.

400: Harald Hudak's last place in the 1500 ended any lingering hopes that the West Germans might seriously challenge for the Cup, but Hartmut Weber produced the goods in a very close race with Mauro Zuliani, 45.32 to 45.35. David Jenkins, with only one 400 (46.7) behind him this season, finished a worthy fourth in 45.86 for his 49th time under 46 sec, just 10 years and 2 days after his first. He was up with everyone sweeping into the straight and only lost third to Andreas Knebel in the closing stages. There was a remarkable run also from the home team's Josko Alebic, who was sharing the lead at 300 and whose final time of 46.20 may well be a world best for a 34-year-old. Scores: 1, GDR 37; 2, USSR 28; 3, UK 27; 4, Germany 24.

Shot: The 1976 Olympic silver medallist Yevgeniy Mironov (disqualified following a dope test at the 1978 European) came into the competition only 33cm behind Udo Beyer on 1981 best marks but the world record holder defeated him by over a metre. Beyer, who twice went over 21m, became the seventh man to win an event in three European Cup Finals, the others being Harald Norpoth (5000), Guy Druet (110H), Wolfgang Nordwig (PV), Viktor Sanyayev (TJ), Wolfgang Schmidt (DT) and Karl-Hans Riehm (HT). Simon Rodhouse, fated to finish last, would have needed a personal best to have improved one position. Scores: 1, GDR 45; 2, USSR 35; 3, Germany 30; 4, UK 28.

Long Jump: European indoor triple jump champion Shamil Abayassov, with a recent 8.16m to his credit, must have fancied his chances against Uwe Lange, particularly when he took the lead in the fifth round with 7.93, a distance he repeated with his final jump, but the GDR champion completed his series with a 7.98 and the East German team moved further ahead.

Joachim Busse had a 2.08m following wind for the 7.82 leap which gave him third place over Roy Mitchell whose 7.79 was achieved with a nil wind reading. Former European record holder Nenad Stekic took only one, modest, jump and finished seventh to the dismay of local fans who whistled him at the presentation ceremony. throughout, was exceedingly slow at 14:56.3 but on the next lap Goater took charge and stepped up the pace. By 6000m (17:43.0) only four of his rivals remained in touch, and a lap later only Werner Schildhauer and Karl Fleischen were still in contact. And that's how it stayed as Goater churned his way past 7000 in 20:30.6, 8000 in 23:21.3 and 9000 in 26:15.2. With 600 to go Schildhauer, with Fleischen in vain pursuit, whizzed past Goater. The East German record holder covered the 200 stretch leading to the bell in an astonishing 26.3 and then toured the last lap in 58.2 for a very accomplished victory. The time was a slow 28:45.89, but look at his finishing speed — 84.5 for 600, 1:57.4 for 800. The second 5000 took him 13:49.6. Goater distinguished himself and surprised many by taking Fleischen (a 27:36.8 performer in 1979) in the last half-lap, running the final 400 in around 61. Second place was an excellent result for Julian, and bearing in mind Schildhauer's finish (taking 10 sec out of Goater and 12 sec from Fleischen in the last 600) who's to say that any other British runner would have done better on the day? Scores: 1, GDR 66; 2, USSR 55; 3, Germany 49; 4, UK 42½.

4 x 100: Two years ago in Turin the Polish quartet of Krzysztof Zwolinski, Zenon Licznarski, Leszek Dunecki and Marian Woronin won in a national record time of 38.47. Here in Zagreb the same well-drilled combo won again in 38.66. The USSR team, which had boasted the previous fastest European time of the year (38.76), took second just ahead of France who had a tough task negotiating the very sharp turns from lane two. The East Germans, on the inside, were more severely handicapped and wound up sixth in 39.37 as against a season's best of 38.86. The British foursome of Steve Green, Cameron Sharp, Mike McFarlane and Drew McMaster ran well for a 39.04 clocking, the third fastest time in British relay history behind the 1980 Olympic squad's 38.62 and the 1979 European Cup team's 38.95. Only McMaster has run in all three of those teams, and his dynamic anchor leg overhauled Christian Haas of Germany to give Britain fourth place. It's a moot point whether Britain would have finished any higher had Allan Wells (who declined selection) been in the team.

110 Hurdles: What a send-off Mark Holtom gave the British side in this one of their greatest days! His victory wasn't as great a shock as suggested by some writers, for his record this year indicated his chances were as good as anyone's given a reasonable start. As it happened, his start wasn't too marvellous, though not as calamitous as in the AAA final, but that of his chief rival — GDR champion Andreas Schliske — was even

slower. Romuald Giegiet was the leader at halfway but Holton's prolonged charge took him ahead at the last hurdle and his powerful run-in did the rest. He hit a number of hurdles en route and the time of 13.79 into an 0.6m breeze emphasised again that the days of Berwyn Price's UK record of 13.69 must be numbered. "I'm after it in every serious race now", said Mark. Note that Schiliske, of whom Mark had never heard before, was second in 13.85 and he had clocked 13.65 in the GDR Championships the week before. Holton, who is working on improving his start but was "too tense" this time, confirmed that this victory was his best to date. Indeed it represents the first outdoor victory at European Championship or Cup Final level by a British high hurdler since Don Finlay won the European title ... back in 1938. Despite his exciting possibilities at 400 hurdles he is in no rush to move up. "There's a fair bit to come in the 110 hurdles before going for the 400 hurdles. I know I can run 13.53. The wind was not that strong in the Midland Championships". Scores: 1, GDR 76; 2, USSR 66; 3, UK 55½; 4, Germany 55.

800: Two years ago in Turin, Seb Coe uncorked a 24.4 last 200 when winning in 1:47.3. In Zagreb, Coe covered the final 200 in 24.6 for victory in 1:47.03. Coe's answer to critics of his tactical acumen was a flawless race, and he appears now to have found the safest formula for winning races when times are immaterial ... by leading and then kicking away from the front in the finishing straight, thus avoiding all the pushing and shoving that goes on behind and ensuring he runs just 800 metres and not several metres more going wide. Coe took the lead just before 200 and passed 400 level with Dragan Zivotic (second to him in Turin) in 54.81, with Willi Wulbeck last. Wulbeck came through strongly along the back straight to challenge Coe, but Seb responded and entered the final straight a stride ahead with Olaf Beyer lurking close behind. But then Coe changed gear, leaving the others — including Nikolay Kirov — struggling while he glid smoothly to a 6m win. "It was comfortable enough in front", said Seb, and that's just the way it looked. Scores: 1, GDR 82; 2, USSR 71; 3, UK 63½; 4, Germany 62.

3000 Steeplechase: One of the finest performances of the entire meeting came from Mariano Scartezzini, the Italian who first made an international reputation for himself at the previous European Cup Final. Leading throughout, on a hot afternoon, he strung together kilometres of 2:47.82, 2:50.31 and a sensational 2:35.19 for the fastest time in the world this year of 8:13.32. Even Boguslaw Matynski, running his fastest ever time of 8:17.23, was helpless as Scartezzini sped around the last two laps in 62 and 60. Was there ever such a fast sustained finish to a world class

steeplechase? For Roger Hackney, though, the race was an unhappy experience. Currently in fine form but here a victim of the weather, Dr Hackney was dropped by the leading six before halfway and was pushed to break 9 min whereas he is probably 'worth' 8:25 on the right day. Scores: 1, GDR 86; 2, USSR 76; 3, Germany 68; 4, UK 65½.

Hammer: Karl-Hans Riehm, seeking a record fourth consecutive European Cup win, was thwarted by that even more formidable competitor Yuriy Sedykh. The two-time Olympic champion held the advantage throughout: he opened with 75.48m (Riehm 74.28) and then topped 77m four times while the German could not better 75.86. Martin Girvan was expected to finish sixth, and that he did thanks to a consistent if not inspired series. Scores: 1, GDR 92; 2, USSR 84; 3, Germany 75; 4, UK 68½.

Pole Vault: What a competition we were promised: Olympic champion Wladyslaw Kozakiewicz (best of 5.78m) against the latest world record breaker Konstantin Volkov (5.84), French champion Jean-Michel Bellot (5.70), Commonwealth record holder Keith Stock (5.65) and German record holder Gunther Lohre (5.60). But what a non-event it turned out to be, won astonishingly at a height of 5.40. Both Kozakiewicz and Lohre 'bombed out', although both could consider themselves unlucky. At his third attempt at 5.20 Lohre was a good 30cm over

EAST GERMAN GIRLS WIN FOR SIXTH TIME

Phenomenal world javelin record of 71.88m by Bulgarian teenager

THERE WAS no stopping the East Germans; in carrying off the women's Cup for the sixth time running they ran up a record score of 108½ points and comfortably brushed aside the Soviet challenge. Once again, the ability of GDR women athletes to hit peak form on the big occasion was evident. On the track they won eight of the ten events, finishing second in the other two, and even though in the field there were below-par performances from Andrea Reichstein and Evelin Jahl they still outscored the USSR 30½-29 in this department. The outstanding individual achievement came from a Bulgarian, though, as 18-year-old Antoaneta Todorova pulverised the world javelin record with a throw of 71.88m.

The British girls didn't quite equal their best ever showing of third place (in 1977, on which occasion they got the better of the Germans on the tie-break rule), but their score of 74 pts was the highest yet. Germany also scored 74 but on this occasion, thanks to one individual victory (Ulrike Meyfarth) to nil, they took third spot

ahead of Britain. Britain picked up four second places; by Kathy Smallwood in the 100 and 200, Tessa Sanderson in the javelin and the 4x100 relay squad. In the entire history of the European Cup, only one British woman has ever won in the final: Lillian Board in the 400 (53.7) in 1967.

Still, there was plenty for the British girls to celebrate — and they did so in style during the closing ceremony. They captivated the crowd as they danced the can-can in front of the main stand, ran round the stadium to thank the British fans for their support, and the high jinks ended with Ann-Marie Cording being ceremoniously lowered into the water jump.

then Nehemiah pulled slowly but steadily away with that dynamic action of his.

Quotes from Seb Coe after the mile record: "I treated the race as a 1500m, planning to take that record, then hold on over the remainder of the way to the mile. I wanted to cut huge chunks off the mile record and put it out of sight of a while. But as it turned out I lost the first and had to dig to get the other one. I was feeling too comfortable in an area of running where one shouldn't feel comfortable in record breaking attempts. That is the reason why I went along with 650m still to go. Thank goodness I have improved my finishing speed, because I had to dig in and concentrate on kicking over the last 150m. Obviously it was a pleasure that at least half of the race went to plan, but I'm disappointed I didn't take the 1500m record as well. I still believe the mile and 1500m records can go simultaneously, but it's mental not physical". Looking ahead to next year, Coe's priority will be the European 800 (he's not sure yet about the Commonwealth Games) and he will also be trying to lower his 800 record to under 1:40. "I think we'll work on some experiments this winter to get through the first lap in 48 seconds plus". His long-term goal: the 1984 Olympic 5000.

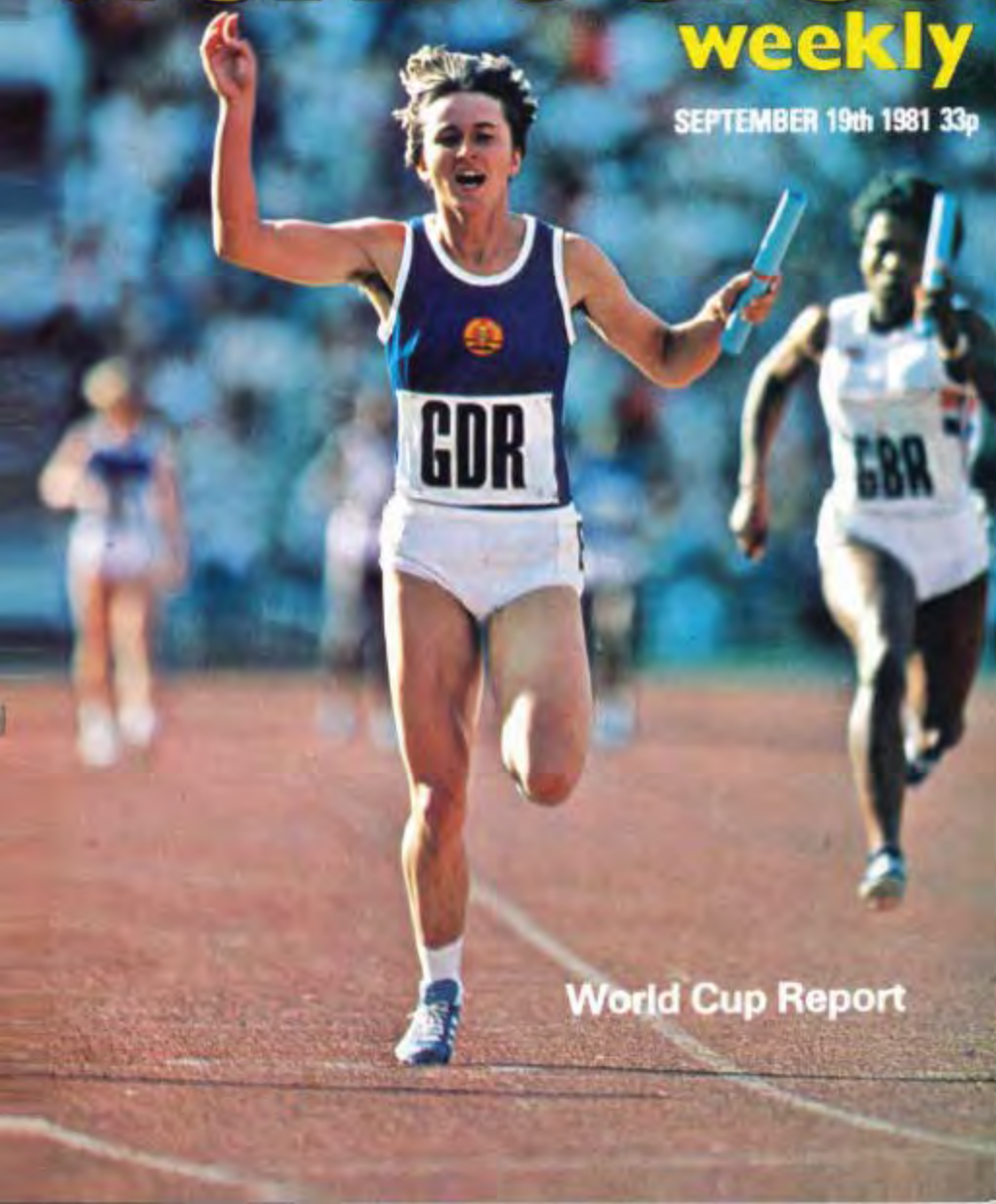

World Cup Report

clocked in a fabulous 48.31 (22.5 at 200)! Her three British colleagues laid a firm foundation: Michelle Scutt (52.6) handed over 3rd, Verona Elder's fiery 51.6 leg enabled her to finish 2nd despite being baulked by Jackie Pusey at halfway, and Jos Hoyte-Smith pulled away from her American and Soviet opposition with a forceful 50.6.

Second Day, September 5th

Hammer: Thunder, lightning and heavy rainfall greeted the throwers, so if the distances achieved were somewhat less than expected the reason is that the poor athletes were struggling to keep a grip as they rotated at less than full speed on the wet circle. In the circumstances the performances of Yuriy Sedykh (77.42m in the 1st round, and three others over 75m) and Karl-Hans Riehm (75.08 in round 1 and 75.60 in round 4) were quite remarkable. Gian Paolo Urlando (71.92) was the only other competitor to exceed even 68m. The man most below form was Roland Steuk, who had finished narrowly ahead of the Italian for 3rd place in Zagreb. This time he was in terrible trouble, his only valid throw landing at 65.74 for a humiliating 7th place.

400: The Russians were up to their tricks again. Viktor Markin was the obvious selection, having run 45.7 the previous week, but the man officially nominated was little known Vitaliy Pyedotov. However, the name which went up on the scoreboard as the runners took their marks was — surprise, surprise — that of the Olympic champion, Markin, however, was never in the hunt and although he ran an electrically timed season's best of 45.78 he finished no higher than 5th. Markin, who ran 44.60 to win the Olympic title but has not otherwise clocked faster than 45.33, would have needed to be at his best for any chance against Cliff Wiley. The American, who at 1.72/5'8" and 61kg/135lb is living proof that you don't have to be big to be good in the 400, ran a fabulous first 300 (unofficially timed in 31.9) to enter the finishing straight 5m up on Berr Cameron. Even the US press corps expected Wiley to tie up but he held on valiantly to score

by 3m in 44.88, just 18/100ths outside his best. Wiley is no stranger to World Cup competition, for in 1977 he was a member of the 4 x 100 squad which set the still standing world record of 38.03. A 10.21/20.39 sprinter who had previously only dabbled at one lap (47.8 440y in 1974, 47.2 in 1978, 46.10 in 1980), Wiley has enjoyed a marvellous season in his new speciality, having won the US title in 44.70 and the World Student Games gold medal in 45.18, and clocked a 44.2 relay leg against the USSR. There was a rare battle for 2nd as Mauro Zuliani (who was far back at 200 in 22.5) made up an enormous amount of ground in the finishing straight to pip Cameron in 45.26, an Italian record. "I started out too slow; I could easily have done 45.16 if I had started off a little faster", Cameron, Commonwealth record holder and 1981 world leader at 44.58, was not at all happy about being awarded 3rd place and refused to shake hands with the Italian at the medal presentation. Said Zuliani: "I'm really very happy I beat Cameron because he said he had never heard of me and didn't want to". The 1979 World Cup winner Hassan El Kashi faded from 3rd to 7th in the finishing straight.
