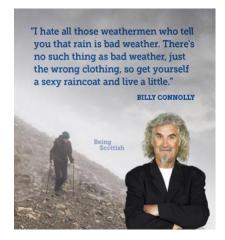
He was instrumental in establishing the Higher Grade walking which the Club is still proud to offer.

Spring Weekend Away Barmouth 15 – 18th March.



The picture to the left, sums up what Wendy & Mike Hilton and Cathy & Dennis Carter kept telling themselves on the two days prior to our Barmouth Weekend. - it was so wet!!!

Thankfully, Friday evening when members arrived it cleared and there was even a beautiful sunset.

32 members enjoyed the weekend in Barmouth, 28 of us staying in the Min-Y-Mor Hotel which provided a friendly, warm welcome and staff could not do enough for us, including providing a bingo session on Sunday afternoon, which a few enjoyed.

Saturday 16 - Cregennan Lakes Walk Circa 10 miles and 1800 ft

Since the weather had been so bad and Saturday forecast was not too promising, we decided to shorten this from a 12 mile to a 10 mile walk, by catching the train from Barmouth just across the estuary (Thanks to Mike Hilton for this brilliant idea). After some slight apprehension when the guard could not be found to be told we wanted to alight at the first stop (it was a request stop), 23 of us enjoyed the ride over the viaduct.

After leaving the train we walked a short way along the Mawddach Trail, then across fields before crossing the road to start our ascent. Fortunately the rain held off and the cloud lifted which meant we were afforded stunning views across the estuary – a revelation since they were not visible due to mist on the recce.



The path took us up alongside a stream with a series of stunning waterfalls, seen at their best due to the heavy rain in previous days. After crossing a couple of steep ladder stiles, at the top, we crossed several fields to join a quiet lane which eventually led us to Big Lake (the first of the two lakes – the other being aptly named, Little Lake.

The lake was beautiful, nestled as it was on the northern slopes of Cadair Idris. Despite its idyllic location, it was the sight where criminals were taken to be hung from an oak tree in the 12th Century. Today however, it is more peaceful and managed by the National Trust with permits for trout fishing.

After a lunch stop here the track hugged the lakeside until we turned right to see Little Lake. From here we began the long descent, back to the valley. Passing on our way, the ruins of the cottage where the composer John Williams was born in 1740. After retracing our steps along the Mawddach Trail, we reached the viaduct which which spans the estuary, this time crossing on foot before making our way back to the hotel.

'B' Walk - Barmouth - Saturday 16 th March - 8 miles

Eight members joined the Saturday 'B' walk on the Mawddach Trail, a disused railway line which runs from Dolgellau to Barmouth. We took the bus from Barmouth to the Penmaenpool Toll Bridge. Crossing the Bridge we joined the path which would eventually take us back to Barmouth. The path meanders along the edge of the Mawddach Estuary providing an ever changing view of the river and the surrounding hills. It is mainly wooded on the left hand side but with open views of the river on the right. The tide was in so we didn't see as many wading birds as we might have hoped, but we did see several egrets. We also saw some paddleboarders, but I'm not sure that they count as wildlife. At the end of the trail, after a brief rest at Morfa Mawddach station, we crossed the railway viaduct over the River Mawddach and back into Barmouth.

Sunday Circuit to the Panarama Walk

Five cars met at the parking lot for the Panorama Walk high up above Barmouth. The twenty hikers were fortified with a chocolate before beginning the steep ascent up the road. After passing a few cottages the road petered out into a track as it wound its way up the hillside. The views over the surrounding countryside were lovely and we were very grateful to have had them before once again hitting the mist.

Eventually we left the track and headed across fields. At one point we were amazed that although we were only metres from a large mast we could not see it in the murk and the drizzle. We then emerged onto a road before going through a farmyard and walking through a lovely wooded area. We stopped here for a short and rather soggy lunch break. Luckily the weather improved when we reached the start of the Panorama Walk itself. Most of us negotiated the climb up to the viewpoint where we were rewarded for our exertions with spectacular views over the Mawddach Estuary. After a group photograph we retraced our steps to the main track and returned to our cars.

'B' Walk - Barmouth - Sunday 17 th March - 6 miles

Eight members took the train over the viaduct to Fairbourne. Alighting at Fairbourne we headed for the seafront. We then followed the miniature railway line for about two miles to the ferry, which takes pedestrians back to Barmouth, but only in the summer months. It was beginning to rain, but a very kind cafe owner, who was preparing for the coming season, let us sit at the tables and chairs under cover of his verandah. He even unlocked the toilets for us to use.

Retracing our steps for about a mile we took a path along the top of an embankment which went around the bay to Morfa Mawddach and once again we walked over the railway viaduct back into Barmouth.
